Hon. WM. R. ROBERTS, Fresident Board of Aldermen :

DEAR SIR—This Department is in receipt of the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, approved by his Honor the Mayor on the 24th ult., requesting the Commissioners of this Department to com-municate "such plans as they should adopt relative to restoring Tompkins square as a public park, pursuant to the act of 1878, in the event of being directed by the Common Council to so restore said square.'

All plans heretofore followed by the Department necessarily provided for a parade ground in said ire. The recent act, viz., chapter 411 of the Laws of 1878, removes this obstacle to the proper square.

square. The recent act, viz., chapter 411 of the Laws of 10/0, femores this obstacts to the Fifther improvement of the square. The result of this is that new arrangements will have to be made, and new plans made. The appropriation to pay for the preparation of the plans is provided by chapter 411, Laws of 1878, but is dependent upon the Common Council directing the improvement to be made, so that the Department is unable to comply with your request until you have, in the first instance, directed the work to be proceeded with.

I may state that the Commissioners have already directed that no plans be adopted for the improvement of the square until first submitted to the residents of the neighborhood, who will be given an opportunity to express their views concerning them. The same courtesy will be gladly extended to the Board of Aldermen.

Risabeck, Cyrus Edson, and Edwin Sage—who so man-fully upheld the honor of their native land, on the anniversary of its natal day, at the capital of the nation from whom, a century ago, we won our political independence, and who, until this great victory of Columbia College, claimed to be our superiors in manly sports and athletic games, particulary as oarsmen; and

of Columbia College, claimed to be our superiors in many sports and athletic games, particulary as oarsmen; and Whereas, This brilliant achievement of a distinctively American college rowing crew, following so closely upon the victories of our American riflemen, and the admitted superiority of American yachtmen, proves conclusively that the men of this young republic have not deteriorated morally, mentally or physically, the assertions of the enemies of free government to the contrary notwithstand-ing, but proves, on the contrary, and most conclusively, that they are more than the equals of the best men in the old world, and that the glories of our free institutions is bearing its legitimate fruit— ambition, self-reliance, energy, and determination to succeed—being the chief characteristics of our countrymen : and

ambition, self-reliance, energy, and determination to succeed—being the chief characteristics of our countrymen; and Whereas, The "Columbia Crew," being also distinctively the crew of a New York City rowing club, imposes upon the people and government of this city the duty of recognizing in an especial and particular manner the renown they have reflected upon the City of New York in winning the "Visitors' Cup," by defeating the crews of the Oxford and Cambridge Colleges, in the ever-memorable rowing race at Henley-on-the-Thames, in the city of London, on the 4th and 5th days of July, 1878; be it therefore Resolved, That a special committee of five members of this Board, of whom the President shall be one, be appointed to receive the crew of the Columbia College Rowing Club on their arrival in this city, to welcome them home; to tender them the congratulations of the people and government of the Governor's room in the City Hall, on any day that may best suit the convenience of the members of the ir friends and our citizens generally; and be it further

members of the crew, to receive personally the felicitations of their friends and our citizens generally ; and be it further Resolved, That a copy of this preamble and these resolutions be engrossed and framed, duly authenticated by the signatures of his Honor the Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen, the corporate seal affixed and attested by the Clerk of the Common Council, and presented to the President and Faculty of Columbia College, to be retained in the institution as a slight token of the appreciation of the people of the City of New York of the britliant achievements of the Columbia College Crew of 1878 in defeating their competitors, the crews of Oxford and Cambridge Colleges, at the international rowing regatta, at the capital of the British empire, July 4 and 5, 1878. Whereas, The need of enlarged facilities for the transaction of business on the water front of the east side of the city, north of Seventy-ninth street, is so apparent that steps should be taken at once to afford a landing place for vessels of every description at the foot of Eighty-sixth street, and as the present pier at the foot of said street is very small, in fact only half of its original size, and is old, dilapidated, and greatly in need of extension and repair, be it therefore Resolved, That the Department of Docks be and is hereby respectfully requested to cause the old pier at the foot of Eighty-sixth street, East river, to be widened and extended southerly so as to include the old broken crib formerly used to inclose the ferry slip (the ferry being now located at the foot of Ninety-second street), or to remove the old pier and collapsed crib adjoining and construct a bulkhead the full width of the street, in order to afford a much needed addition to the pier facilities of that part of the city, and with a view especially of providing a landing place for steamboats, for the accommodation of the great number of people, residents of the vicinity, who now are compelled to use a private and nearly inaccessible pier at the foot of Eighty-fourth street, which is not opened, regulated, or graded, for the purposes of a steam-boat landing. To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen : GENTLEMEN—Under chapter 476, Laws of 1875, there has been appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for "Repaving Streets" the sum of \$200,000 for 1877, and \$300,000 for 1878. The appropriation for 1877 was supplemented by a transfer of \$11,000 from surplus balances of other appropriations of this Department, making the total amount hitherto appropriated for "Repaving," \$511,000. With your authority and approval the appropriation of 1877 was expended in laying 105,624 square yards of new granite and trap-block pavements, and for the year 1878 contracts have been made and partly completed for 143,574 square yards of granite and trap-block pavements, and 23,000 square yards of Macadam pavement, covering the appropriation of \$300,000. These contracts do not include Waverley place, from Broadway to Christopher street, which is one of the streets which you authorized to be repaved by your resolution, approved February 26, 1878. The necessities of public travel and the condition of the pavements are the only considerations which have controlled the Department in the difficult duty of selecting from among the many miles of streets requiring repavement the comparatively few that could be repaved out of these appropri-tions. The improvement in the facilities for traffic and in cleanliness are quite appreciable in the localities where the repaving has been done, but the wear and tear and decay of old pavements in other places counterbalances in good part the work so far done. I have deemed it proper, therefore, to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer to the appropriation for "Repaving Streets" the sum of \$55,000 from the appropriation for "Lamps and Gas," on which there is a large surplus in consequence of the reduction in the cost of lighting public lamps. This transfer will enable the Department to repave Waverley place from Broadway to Christo-

And I further certify and report to your Honorable Board, in accordance with the provisions of section 1, chapter 476, Laws of 1875, that the safety, health, and convenience of the public require that Second avenue, from Twenty-third to Forty-second street, be repaved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, of which mode and manner of paving said avenue I hereby approve. As the season is already far advanced, and the preparation of contract and specifications, adver-tising, letting, approval of sureties, execution of contracts, etc., will consume considerable time, I respectfully request your immediate action in this matter. By Alderman Jacobus -AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter XXXVII. of the ordinance of 1866, entitled "Of carts and cart-men, dirt carts, public carts, and garbage carts."

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do, as amended by ordi-nance of May 6, 1878, ordain as follows: Section I. Chapter XXXVII. of the ordinance of 1866 is hereby amended, and shall read as

follows :

ARTICLE I.

OF CARTS AND CARTMEN.

Section 1. All licenses to persons to keep public carts shall expire on the last day of October next after the date thereof, and all licenses granted under this ordinance previous to October 30, 1877, shall remain in force for one year from that date, unless sooner revoked, as provided in this ordinance; and it shall be lawful for the Mayor to renew and continue any or all of such licenses for a year succeeding, provided that the application be made therefor prior to the expiration thereof.
Sec. 5. Sec. 15. It shall not be lawful for any cart, wagon, coach, public cart or any other vehicle to be driven through any of the streets of the city of New York at a greater speed than six miles an hour ; nor shall it be lawful for any such vehicle to be driven around the corner of any of the streets of said city with the horse or horses thereto traveling at faster gait than three miles per hour ; and all and every such public carts, and all other vehicles, when passing through or along any of the streets of said city shall, when meeting any other vehicle, be driven to the right-hand side of the way, so that such vehicles shall pass clear of e

In shipping goods, wares, or other merchandise at any of the shipping lines by railroad, steam-boat, or sailing vessel, when a truck is kept in line waiting to ship goods more than thirty minutes, the truckman shall be entitled to an extra allowance at the rate of one dollar per hour for the time so

detained. Sec. 19. Every public cartman and public porter shall be entitled to be paid the legal rate or compensation allowed and provided in this chapter immediately upon the carting or transportation of any article or thing, and it may be lawful for any such public cartman or public porter to retain any article or thing so carted or transported by him for which he is not so paid his cartage, and to convey the same without delay to the office of the Superintendent of Police, and he shall be entitled to the lawful rate of pay or compensation for the so conveying. All disputes or disagreements as to distance or rates of compensation, between public cartmen or public porters and persons employing them or owing for cartage or transportation, shall be determined by the Mayor. Sec. 20. It shall not be lawful for any public cartman, or any other person, to cart or transport through any of the streets of said city, any planks, poles, spars, timber or other thing exceeding thirty feet in length, except on a suitable truck or other vehicle, and such plank or other thing shall be placed lengthwise thereon, so as not to project at either end beyond the line of the side or width of such truck or other vehicle : and all persons so carting or transporting any such poles, planks, timber,

such truck or other vehicle; and all persons so carting or transporting any such poles, planks, timber, spars or other things in any manner shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this chapter. Sec. 21. It shall not be lawful for the driver or other person having charge of any public cart, dirt cart or any other vehicle to be off or away from any such cart or any other vehicle while the dirt cart or any other vehicle to be off or away from any such cart or any other vehicle while the same is moving or passing along any of the streets or avenues of said city; nor shall it be lawful for any public cartman, while waiting for employment at any place assigned for his cart, to stand wait-ing for employment at any other place, or to snap or flourish his whip, or to be away from his cart, unless from necessity or on business, or to sit or stand about the doorsteps or platforms, or in front of any house, store or other building, to the annoyance of the occupants thereof. Sec. 22. It shall not be lawful for any person who has been licensed to keep public carts, or to be a public cartman, and whose license has been suspended or revoked by the Mayor, to keep, drive or use any public cart in the city of New York, under the penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such oflense. such offens such offense. Sec. 23. Every cartman who shall be duly licensed in the city of New York shall be permitted to place and leave his cart, when unemployed, in front of the house or premises where he shall at the time reside, or in front of the stable where he shall at the time stable his horse, or in front of any other house or stable, providing he shall receive the permission of the occupant thereof, provided that such cart shall be placed on the street upon the carriageway thereof, in close proximity to the curb-stone next to his said residence or stable, and shall not extend beyond said curb-stone any greater distance than the width of such cart, nor beyond the line of the lot on which his said residence or stable is situated, and provided that such place of residence or stable shall be specified upon the license for such cart. such cart Sec. 24. It shall be the duty of the person or officer exercising the duties of Superintendent of Carts to visit daily the several stands and places in the city where cartmen are in the habit of waiting for employment, and to see that all the ordinances regulating carts and cartmen, including dirt carts, are in every respect complied with. Sec. 25. It shall be the special duty of said person or officer to ascertain and to report all offenses or violations of this ordinance to the Mayor's marshal.

Sec. 26. It shall not be lawful for any person to keep, drive, use or employ any cart, wagon, truck, dray or other vehicle other than such as are licensed, as herein provided, for the transportation or conveyance of any article or thing within the city of New York, unless the name and residence or place of business where such owner can be found (of the owner thereof) be fairly and distinctly painted, in plain letters and figures at least two and a half inches long, in a conspicuous place on both sides of such cart or vehicle, so as at all times to be easily seen thereon.

ARTICLE II. OF DIRT CARTS.

OF DIRT CARTS. Section 27. The Mayor of the City of New York may grant licenses to such and as many persons as he may deem proper to keep and use such number of dirt carts as he shall think expedient, to be employed exclusively in the carting and transportation of dirt, sand, gravel, clay, paving-stones, ashes, garbage, and building rubbish ; and revoke or suspend any or all such licenses at his pleasure; and it shall not be lawful for any person to drive or use any cart, wagon or other vehicle for the transportation of any such dirt, sand, gravel, clay, paving-stones, ashes, garbage or building rubbish within the city of New York unless the said cart or other vehicle be licensed as aforesaid ; provided that nothing herein shall prevent any person licensed as a public cartman, or to keep public carts, from driving or using any such public carts in the carting or transporting of any such sand, gravel, clay, paving-stones, ashes, garbage, and building rubbish, the same as if they were licensed as dirt carts. This section shall not be construed to permit any dirt cart to be used in the transportation for wages, hire or pay of any article or thing whatsoever other than is here specified. Sec. 28. Every license granted as aforesaid shall continue in force for one year from the date thereof, and may be renewed by the Mayor at any time before the expiration thereof for a succeeding year.

year. Sec. 29. Every person, upon receiving a license to keep and use one or more dirt carts, as here-inbefore provided, shall pay to the Mayor, for the use of the city, one dollar for every cart so licensed, and the further sum of twenty-five cents upon the renewal of the license for every such cart. Sec. 30. Every dirt cart and every public cart when used as a dirt cart, shall be furnished with a good and tight box, the sides and fore-part of which shall be two feet and the tal-board eighteen inches high, and of capacity to contain twelve cubic feet ; and on all dirt carts the letters D. C., and the number of the license thereof, shall be fairly and distinctly painted with black paint on a white ground, on the square of the after-part of the shaft, on both sides, in plain, legible letters and figures, at least two and a half inches long, so as to be easily and distinctly seen, and so continued ; and every person driving or using a dirt cart, without being so furnished and numbered, shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this chapter. Sec. 31. It shall not be lawful for the owner or driver of any dirt cart or any other vehicle, or for any other person, to use or employ, or permit to be used or employed, any such dirt cart or any other

Sec. 31. It shall not be lawful for the owner or driver of any dirt cart or any other venicle, of for any other person, to use or employ, or permit to be used or employed, any such dirt cart or any other vehicle for the conveyance or removal of any dirt, sand, gravel, stones or other thing from any of the streets or avenues, or highways, or from any lot of land or other place, or to dump, deposit or leave any dirt, sand, gravel, rubbish or other thing in any of the streets or highways, or on any dock or wharf, or on any lot or lots of land within said city, without being duly authorized or permitted so to do by the public officer or other person competent to give such authority or permission. Sec. 32. All persons offending against the provisions of the last section shall forfeit and pay twenty-five dollars for each offense.

ARTICLE III.

OF PUBLIC PORTERS.

OF PUBLIC PORTERS. Sec. 33. The Mayor shall license and appoint as many and such persons as he may think expedient to be public porters of the city of New York, and revoke or suspend any or all of such licenses at his pleasure ; and it shall not be lawful for any person to use any wheelbarrow or hand-cart to carry, transport or convey baggage, goods or other things from place to place within said city for hire, wages or pay for such conveyance, or to be at any hotel, boarding-house, ferry, steam-boat landing, railroad station or depot, and solicit of strangers, travelers, citizens or other persons, or accept the conveyance of baggage or other articles, without being licensed as aforesaid by the Mayor. This section shall not be construed to prevent any person keeping or employed in any hotel or boarding-house from conveying any baggage or other articles to or from such hotel and boarding-house, and using a hand-cart or wheelbarrow therefor ; provided the name of the hotel or boarding-house, and the keeper thereof, be painted distinctly on both sides of such wheelbarrow or hand-cart, and on a badge worn on the front of his hat or cap, so as to be easily and distinctly seen. Sec. 34. All licenses to public porters, granted as aforesaid, shall run one year from the date thereof, and may be renewed by the Mayor at any time within the said year for a succeeding year. Sec. 35. Every person receiving a license to be a public porter as aforesaid, shall pay to the Mayor, for the use of the city, one dollar ; and a further sum of twenty-five cents upon the renewal of every such license.

Sec. 36. Every public porter shall wear, in a conspicuous place about his person, so as to be easily seen, a brass plate or badge, on which shall be engraved his name, the words "public porter," and the number of his license; and it shall be unlawful for any other person to wear or exhibit any badge purporting to resemble or be similar to the badge of a public porter, and no public porter shall permit any other person to wear his badge, or use his name in any way whatever, in the trans-

portation or conveyance of anything. Sec. 37. Public porters shall be entitled to charge and receive for the carrying or conveyance of any article, any distance within halt a mile, twenty-five cents if carried by hand, and fifty cents if carried on a wheelbarrow or hand-cart; if the distance exceeds half a mile, one-half of the above

rates in addition thereto, and in the same proportion for any greater distance. Sec. 38. No public porter or hand-cartman shall be entitled to recover or receive any pay or fare from any person for the transportation of any article or articles unless his name and number of license and the rates shall be fixed, and the badge worn, agreeably to this chapter. Sec. 39. Upon the trial of any cause commenced for the recovery of any of the aforesaid prices or rates, it shall be incumbent on the plaintiff in such action to prove that the badge was worn and the uniferent ford acrosphy to the late presenting section at the time, the services ware randward for

prices fixed, agreeably to the last preceding section, at the time the services were rendered for which the suit was brought.

Sec. 41. No public porter or hand-cartman shall suffer or permit any other person than himself to carry any article or articles in his wheel or hand barrow, or hand-cart, or to wear his badge, under the penalty of five dollars for every such offense.

If any public porter shall ask or demand any greater rate of pay or compensation for the carrying or conveyance of any articles than is herein provided, he shall not be entitled to any pay for the said service, and to so ask, demand or receive any such greater pay or compensation shall be deemed a violation of this chapter.

It shall not be lawful for any person to represent himself as or to wear or exhibit any badge, inscription, card, or device, purporting or implying that he is employed or authorized by the keeper, proprietor, agent or officer of any hotel, boarding-house, vessel, steamboat or railroad com-pany, to solicit, receive or convey persons, baggage, or other things, to or from any such hotel, boarding-house, vessel, steamboat, or railroad company's station or depot, without being actually and duly authorized by such keeper, proprietor, officer or agent so to do, under the penalty of twenty-five dollars for every offense.

GENERAL PROVISION.

Sec. 44. All persons who shall violate or fail to comply with any of the provisions of this chapter shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be punished pursuant to the provisions of sections 20 and 21 of an act relative to the powers of the Common Council of the City of New York and the criminal courts of said city, passed by the Legislature of the State of New York, January 23, 1833; or in lieu thereof shall forfeit and pay, for the use of said city, ten dollars for each and every offense, except where a penalty is prescribed in said chapter.

ARTICLE IV.

OF GARBAGE AND OTHER CARTS.

Sec. 45. Every cart or other vehicle used to convey or transport dirt, manure, sand, gravel, mud, ashes, lime, garbage, swill, offal or other loose materials, in any of the streets of said city, shall be fitted with a good and substantial tight box thereon, the sides of which shall be twenty-four inches and the tail-board eighteen inches high, so that no portion of such dirt, sand or other loose material be scattered or thrown into any of said streets; and all carts or other vehicles, when used in carting slaked lime, garbage, offal, swill or other offensive matter, or ashes, shall have the box thereof closely covered with a sufficient covering of cloth or boards, closely fitted, so as to prevent the escape or flying about of any of the contents or effluying therefrom : and every person using any cart escape or flying about of any of the contents or effluvia therefrom ; and every person using any cart or other vehicle for any such purpose without its being so fitted shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this chapter

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, except the ordinance relating to express wagons, which shall remain in full force, are hereby repealed.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

To the Honorable the Common Council : GENTLEMEN—I herewith transmit the report of Elliott F. Shepard, Esq., as Commissioner to Codify the Ordinances of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York. The work submitted consists of eight hundred and forty-four sections, numbered serially, and contains all the municipal ordinances in force on the fourth day of July, 1878, and nothing else. This work is one upon which the Commissioners have been engaged for a long period, and has been prepared with great care, and has been highly commended by several of our most eminent iudges, to whom it has been submitted for examination. As the city ordinances have not been revised as a whole since the year 1859, and have not been compiled or published since the year 1866, since which time almost innumerable changes have been made in the laws affecting this city and in the ordinances, this report constitutes a work of great value and importance, and I therefore respectfully recommend that the same receive your prompt and care-ful consideration. ful consideration.

SMITH ELY, Jr., Mayor of the City of New York: YOUR HONOR—I have the honor to make my report as Commissioner to Codify the Ordinances of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York. As you are aware, my appointment by the Mayor (which was unanimously confirmed by the Board of Aldermen) was to prepare the "New York Municipal Code," which was to embrace all the ordinances of the city, and all the laws of the State relating to the city and to affairs therein. A great part of that work had been performed by me, when the Common Council passed a reso. Iution directing that my efforts thereafter should be confined to codifying the municipal ordinances. This work has been prosecuted with all the diligence its nature would permit, and is now com-pleted.

pleted.

pleted. The ordinances were last revised and adopted as a whole in 1859. The almost innumerable changes in the laws affecting this city, and in the ordinances, and especially the reorganization of the Corporation by the Charter of 1873, entirely remodeling it, and rendering obsolete many ordinances which have not been technically repealed or modified by the action of the Common Council itself, combined with o ther circumstances, nave rendered this work one of great intricacy, difficulty, and responsibility, involving most careful investigation, analysis, detail, and consideration. consideration.

I have necessarily required assistance, which I have had of the most competent and skillful character, and also books, for some of which I have had to pay very large prices. I have consulted freely with the various Departments of the Corporation, and have been able, in this manner, to obtain their understanding as to what are the ordinances now in force.

this manner, to obtain their understanding as to what are the ordinances now in force. I have examined the ordinances of various other cities, as well as those of the Health and other Departments prevailing here, with a view of selecting the best models and utilizing them in the pre-paration of this Code. The plan which I have adopted in serially numbering all the sections of this work, from first to last, has been found by experience to be the most ready of reference and convenience in use ; the same system prevailing in the United States Revised Statutes, of five thousand six hundred and one sections ; in the Sanitary Code of the Health Department of this City, containing one hundred and ninety-seven sections ; in the Code of Civil Procedure of this State, containing one thousand four hundred and ninety-six sections, and in other instances which might be cited. No plan has ever been divised superior to it, whereas the opposite plan, as illustrated in the New York Revised Statutes, where it is necessary to give the numbers of the part, chapter, title, article, and section, in order to cite the statute, is onerous and dilatory and liable to such slips of the pen as to confuse or destroy the intention of the reference. intention of the reference.

intention of the reference. The so-called "Revised Ordinances" of 1866, which should, in fact, be called the "Compiled Ordinances" of that date, contain about two thousand sections ; the work which I now submit, eight hundred and forty-four sections—this difference being chiefly caused by the present Charter. I think that the work that is now submitted contains absolutely every municipal ordinance m force on the fourth day of July, 1878, and nothing else. I have been asked by some of the Departments to suggest amendments for new enactments, but have invariably declined to do so, as not being within my province : and I now present a complete and harmonious code of municipal ordinances, with an analysis and index. Of course, I have added the usual repealing and explanatory sections at the end, which are purely of a technical and perfunctory nature, and do not in the least alter, modify or amend the ordinances as they are now actually in force. Had I been employed and instructed to prepare new ordinances, that would have been a very different matter, obliging quite another report. It is not for me to suggest the course to be pursued

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, property owners, tradesmen, and residents of the Ninth, Fif-teenth, and Sixteenth Wards of this city, respectfully petition that the block of ground bounded by Gansevoort, Little West Twelfth, Washington, and West streets, known as part of the "Fort Ganse-voort property," be set apart as a depot for farmers' wagons, for the sale of garden produce by market gardeners.

voort property," be set apart as a depot for farmers' wagons, for the safe of garden produce by market gardeners. Your petitioners respectfully represent that the market gardeners have at present no fixed or permanent stand, and their locations are continually changing, to the great detriment of their business. This is unjust, as the tax paid by them is a large source of revenue to the city, and their interest should be protected by the city authorities. Having regular customers among the retail tradesmen of the city, the continual shifting of their stations entails great injury and loss, not only upon them but upon these who deal with them. The "Fort Gansevoort property," so called, is a valuable property, is owned by the city, and no revenue is at present derived from it. Should it be selected as a depot for this purpose, and a permanent stand thereby secured, the number of market wagons doing business in the city will be largely increased, and the revenue derived by the city from this source be greatly augmented. The location is a desirable one for this business, being situated about midway between the Battery and Fifty-ninth street. The possible objection that it is too far west is met by the statements that there is no suitable plot on the east side of the city where these wagons could be stationed, and that the retail grocers and others on the east side are supplied in the neighborhoods of Twenty-third street and Thirty-fourth street ferries by the Long Island farmers who cross those ferries. By the selection of this site the narrow, crowded streets is in the lower part of the city will be greatly relieved, as under the present system of stationing these wagons in the vicinity of the markets, traffic and travel in the lower part of the city are greatly obstructed. A great evil, which has been the source of continual complaint and remonstrance from the business community, will thus be remedied.

If this course be pursued, every one can immediately know what the ordinances are—a result long and generally wished for, and in bold contrast with the present confused, contradictory, and partially annulled condition of the ordinances. On the other hand, it will be entirely within the power of the legislative department of the city to make immediate amendments, if desired, so that no conceivable harm can arise from the adoption of the Code as reported; especially as nothing new is attempted in it, but only a collection and systematizing of the valid ordinances as they now actually exist. The Charter of 1873 evidently points out this method of procedure. The great care given to the preparation of this Code is a guaranty of its correctness on which the Common Council can rely with confidence. Dated New York, July 16, 1878. UNFINISHED BUSINESS RESUMED.

Alderman Perley called up G. O. 210, being a resolution, as follows: Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be authorized to lay a Croton water-main from the High Service Reservoir over the High Bridge and along the line of the aqueduct and the McComb's Dam road, to the Kingsbridge road, pursuant to chapter 477 of the Laws of 1875. The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the negative, on a division, two-thirds of all the members elected not voting-in favor thereof. viz.:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen: GENTLEMEN—By chapter 386, Laws of 1878, passed June 3, 1878, the Law of 1877, chapter 477, is so amended as to authorize the Commissioner of Public Works to erect and construct such structures and fixtures as he may deem necessary to deliver Croton water at higher levels and in greater quantities, when thereunto authorized by a three-fourths vote of all the members of the Com-

greater quantities, when thereunto authorized by a threz-fourths vote of all the members of the Com-mon Council, to be approved by the Mayor, the expense to be paid out of the funds appropriated by said chapter 477, Laws of 1875. To carry out the purposes of this act or amendment, viz., to deliver Croton water at higher levels, so as to supply buildings above the level of 60 feet above mean tide, which are now inade-quately supplied with water, I deem it necessary to erect a suitable building, with two pumping engines and fixtures, including a tank and stand-pipe, on the lots situated between Ninety-seventh and Ninety-eight streets, west of Ninth avenue, formerly occupied by the Aqueduct, and retained for this purpose after the removal of the Aqueduct, and to lay the necessary pipes to connect such pump-ing works with the proper distributing mains, at an expense not exceeding \$220,000. I therefore submit a draft of a resolution to confer the necessary authority, and respectfuly urge your early action thereon, to enable the Department to meet as soon as possible the rapidly growing demands for greater pressure of water.

your early action thereon, to enable the Department to meet as soon as possible the rapidly growing demands for greater pressure of water. Vear after year a large extent of additional water-pipe has been laid. Even within the past two and a half years, during my administration of this Department, 42 38-100 miles have been put down, being an addition of more than ten per cent. to the length of pipes previously laid. The effect of this is to reduce the pressure in the previously existing mains. The city has also been extended on the higher grounds in its upper portion, where water can at present be supplied only in the lower stories. This subject has been fully presented in various reports of the Department, and there can be no doubt that the carrying out of the proposed plan will much improve our water system in respect to the delivery at higher elevations.
