Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 12, 1878. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,666 as follows, viz.:

5 public buildings, 776 tenement-houses, 173 private dwellings, 53 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 39 stables, 37 slaughter-houses, 1 fat rendering establishment, 1 manure dump, 3 garbage dumps, 21 sunken and vacant lots, 42 yards, courts, and areas, 69 cellars and basements, 154 waste-pipes and drains, 130 privies and water-closets, 23 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 public sewers, 1 sausage factory, 5 dangerous stairways, 3 cesspools, 2 dangerous chimneys, 6 other nuisances, 90 visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 600.

During the week 68 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspector for investigation and report.

45 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers received from the Health Officer of the Port.

38 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privv-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 59 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and funigated 55 houses and 55 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

3 persons sick with contagious disease were removed to hospital.

During the week ending January 12, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 563 burial permits for city deaths, 17 for bodies in transitu, and 53 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 563 deaths, 144 marriages, 552 births, 53 still-births, 17 applications for transit permits, and 60 returns from coroners. There were 37 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 3 of marriage, and 29 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—563 deaths were reported to this Bureau as having occurred in this city, during the week ending Saturday, January 12, which is an increase of 60 compared with the preceding week, and 104 more than the number reported during the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending January 5, was 519, which is 7 below the average of the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.86 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,085,446.

The principal increase in the number of deaths during the past compared with the proceding week, were of children under 5 years, pneumonia, diphtheria, croup, bronchitis and diarrheeu, the increase in those 5 diseases were 89, as follows: Pneumonia, 28; diphtheria, 22; croup, 10; bronchitis, 13; and diarrheeal diseases 10. The deaths of children under 5, were 249 against 195 for the previous week, there was also an increase of 5 deaths from scarlatina, 1 from inanition, 1 from rheumatism and gout, 5 from diseases of the heart, 1 from aneurism, 2 from marasmus and scrofula, 3 from diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1 from cyanosis and atelectasis, and 3 from premature and preternatural births, and a decrease of 7 deaths from measles, 3 from whooping-cougly, 1 from erysipelas, 1 from typhoid fever, 2 from cerebro-spinal fever, 2 from puerperal diseases, 5 from cancer, 6 from phthisis pulmonalis, 10 from hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3 from gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 9 from Bright's disease, 1 from suicide, and 2 from drowning.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 72 were in institutions, 299 in tenement-houses, 173 in houses containing three families and less, 11 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, boats, streets, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 111 on the first, 190 on the second, 106 on the third, 50 on the fourth, 15 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 556 were residents of New York City and 7 non-residents, 56 were stated to be single, 137 married, 68 widowed, and the condition of 302 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

Report on defective drainage of dwellings south side Fifty-second street, between Fourth and Lexington avenu

Sanitary Bureau—Health Department, 301 Mott street, New York, January 14, 1878.

SIR—In accordance with your instructions I have carefully inspected the buildings recently erected on the south side of East Fifty-second street, between Fourth and Lexington avenues, known as numbers 100, 102, 104, 106, and 108 East Fifty-second street, with the view of ascertaining whether there is anything in the construction of said buildings, such as bad drainage or ventilation, that would tend to produce the sickness which has developed in many of them since their occupation as dwellings. The following conditions were found, which are considered dangerous to life and detrimental to health, viz.: The houses are four stories in height, built during the past spring, and are rented out as flats. The earth beneath the basement floor was very damp, and retained considerable moisture, due to defective drainage. The sewer-pipe is used in common by several adjoining buildings, and the portion inspected, on taking up the floor, showed that the lengths of earthenware pipe, of which it is constructed, are slipped one into the other without cement or other attempt to make a close joint. This method of construction leaves the hub of the pipe open for the escape of sewer-gas into the apartments and also tends to cause a saturation of the soil beneath the house in case of obstruction in the sewer, which is very common to houses of this kind. The soil-pipe at No. 100 was also found open, without any attempt at a joint at the point where it discharged into the sewer-pipe. This necessarily caused a constant escape of foul air and sewer-gas from the main sewer into the building, which is conveyed by means of the recess in which the soil-pipe is set, throughout the house, and diffused through the apartments of the occupants. The soil-pipe, which extends to the surface of the roof, is also used as a leader, so that when we have a heavy rain there is absolutely no ventilation for the drain, and a compression between the main sewer and the roof exists that causes all the foul gasses

a free ingress of sewer-gas into the building.

At No. 100 one death has already occurred from malarial fever, and several persons are prostrated from the same complaint; the building has not been free from sewer gas since it was built. At No. 106, two cases of diphtheria occurred, and the persons who lived there at the time informed me that they were always subject to foul odors, which caused them to remove. Two of the family who have since moved into the same flat have also taken diphtheria.

At No. 114 there is a case of typhoid fever. As it is apparent the conditions enumerated will seriously impair the health of all persons dwelling there, I have forwarded to this Board a special complaint against each house, with the recommendation that a separate sewer connection by means of an iron pipe, with joints well caulked with lead and laid in accordance with the regulation of the Department of Public Works, be made, that a proper trap be provided in each sewer-pipe near the outer wall, so adjusted as effectually to prevent the entrance of sewer gas into the building; that the lead trap of each water-closet and sink be connected with their respective soil and waste-pipes by and through an iron sleeve with joints well caulked with lead; that each independent waste-pipe be extended two feet above the roof, and that the cellar of each house be connected with the sewer thereof, so that the same may be properly drained. A short distance from the row of houses described there is another row almost precisely like it, and I have been credibly informed that many other houses have been recently erected in the manner described, a partial list of which is in my possession. As soon as an inspection of these can be made, a report will be forwarded to this Department stating their actual condition.

Report on Peruvian Coffee.

New York, January 10, 1878.

W. DE FOREST DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent:

SIR—I have the honor to report the following results of the examination of the sample labelled Peruvian coffee received December 20, 1877. The sample contains little or no genuine coffee, but is made up of what appears to be chiccory, some cereal (probably barley), and some leguminous seeds; the whole roasted and ground. The results of the examination, as compared with the results of a similar set of tests made upon coffee known to be genuine, may be thus summarized:

The rapidity with which a sample of suspected coffee imparts a color to cold water is mentioned by all authorities on adulteration as a good indication of the probable presence of chiccory and some other adulterants. The test is readily applied and is of great value.

The specific gravity of an infusion made by pouring upon the sample ten times its weight of cold water, raising the water to boiling, filtering, and cooling, is also mentioued as of value. Messrs. Graham, Stenhouse, and Campbell determined the specific gravity of infusions of various probable adulterants of coffee and of coffee itself. The results showed a mean gravity of about 1.008 for infusions of coffee while chiccory gave a gravity of from 1.010 to 1.022 malt of 1.021 peace and infusions of coffee, while chiccory gave a gravity of from 1.019, to 1.023, malt of 1.021, peas and beans of 1.007 and 1.008.

The action of ferric chloride upon the infusion indicates the probable presence of genuine coffee in the sample, if the reagent cause a deepening of color, and the formation of a flocculent precipitate. The proportion of sugar in genuine roasted coffee is very small, varying from 0 to 1.14 per cent. The gentlemen above referred to found an average of 0.26 per cent. in twelve different specimens grown in different places, while roasted chiccory, carrots, dandelion root, etc., contain from about 7 to 17 per cent. of sugar.

Genuine roasted coffee also contains no starch, which the most of its adulterants do. is made by decolorizing the infusion with permanganate of potassa and applying the iodine test. The ash of coffee averages about 4 per cent., while that of chiccory is over 5 per cent. The proportion of coffee ash soluble in water is about 3.24 or about 80 per cent. of the whole ash, while with chiccory it is about 1.74, or about 34 per cent. With the sample under consideration the percentage of ash and the proportion soluble in water are too high to allow the supposition that chiccory is the only adultagest present.
