



The 789 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.42, against 24.26 for the previous week and 23.89 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 49, 85, 34, 49 and 6, against 47, 115, 55, 30 and 20 for the previous week, a total of 223 against 267. Diphtheria increased slightly between Grand and Rivington streets, cast of Norfolk, and between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets East, while there was a marked decrease between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets West, and slight changes elsewhere. Measles, as a rule, decreased, but there was a marked increase between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets West. The decrease of scarlet fever was especially marked between Fourteenth and Eighty-sixth streets West; 27 of the 49 cases of typhoid fever were below Fourteenth street, and 12 of the remaining 22 were above Fortieth street.

Note.—Of the cases of typhus fever reported since the week ending June 25 the following came from Quarantine, viz.: For the week ending July 2, one case; July 16, all three cases; July 23, one case. In the latter week, also, one case of typhoid fever in the Tenth Ward was incorrectly reported as typhus.

ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1880), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing tovenants requiring the grantees and their successors to jave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and he expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no farther assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or syenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such late may notify the Commissioner of Public Works in

the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such that most further provides that the owner of any such writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns thall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to avec, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are to rever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent rosaid lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants

thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ardinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That section 270 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 270.† It shall be the duty of every undertaker having notice of the death of any person within the City of New York of smallpox, diphtheria, scaflet fever, yellow fever, ryphus fever, Asiatic cholora, measles, or any other contagious disease dangerous to the general health of the community, or of the bringing of the dead body of any person who has died of any such disease into such city, to give immediate notice thereof to this Department. And no undertaker shall retain or expose, or assist in the retention or exposure of the dead body of any such person except in a coffin or casket properly sealed; nor shall he allow any such body to be placed in any coffin or casket unless the body has been thoroughly disinfected and wrapped in a sheet saturated with a proper disinfecting solution and the coffin or casket be immediately and permanently sealed; nor shall he assist in the public or church funeral of any such person.
