

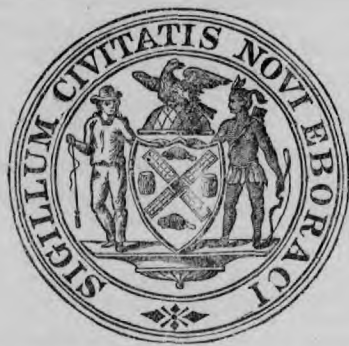

*To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:*

We, the undersigned, residents and property-owners on the line of Mount Morris avenue in the Twenty-seventh Assembly District—in view of the incidental annoyances, and delays in receipt of letters and packages growing out of the fact that on the map of the City of New York, in an adjacent Assembly District (the Thirtieth), there is a Morris avenue, the similarity of which names leads to confusion—respectfully petition your Honorable Body to change the name of Mount Morris avenue (extending from One Hundred and Twentieth to One Hundred and Twenty-fourth streets) to that of Mount Morris place, which change, it is believed, will be both appropriate and euphonious, and will serve to remove the annoyance to which we refer.

#### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Alderman Brown—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the United States Automatic Dispatch Company to lay a conduit from the United States Post-office on Park Row along Park Row to the entrance of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, for the purpose of transmission therein of United States mails and packages; such permission be and is hereby given also to said company to extend said conduit through and under such other streets, lanes and alleys as may be necessary for the prompt and expeditious transmission of said United States mail and packages, provided the said United States Automatic Dispatch Company shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned by the exercise of the privilege hereby given during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of laying said conduit, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and said company further stipulates that it will pay to the city such just compensation as may be imposed by this Board.

#### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR,  
January 19, 1893.

*To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:*

I return, without approval, the resolution of your Honorable Body, adopted January 17, 1893, requesting "that the National, State, Municipal and Polish flags be displayed on the flagstuffs of the City Hall, on Saturday, January 21, 1893; said Polish flag to be raised at half-mast, in commemoration of the one hundredth anniversary of the partition of Poland."

On the request of a representative organization of foreign-born citizens, it has been the practice to display the colors of their native country on the City Hall on a recognized national holiday. This does not even suggest a lack of patriotic pride in the citizenship of their adopted country, and the practice has had the support of public sentiment. But I do not favor, and cannot approve of any proposition looking toward the recognition of a day of mourning over an event in the history of a foreign land, however great its political or historical importance.

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR,  
January 24, 1893.

*To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:*

I return herewith, without approval, three resolutions of your Honorable Body, as follows:

Permitting the German Emanuel Church to place transparencies on the public lamps at the corners of Eighty-third street, Second and Third avenues, until February 15.

Permitting the Duane Methodist Episcopal Church to place transparencies on the public lamps at the intersections of Hudson and Varick streets with Spring and Broome streets, until March 15, proximo.

The Commissioner of Public Works reports that there are certain objections which apply with equal force to each of these resolutions, to wit:

"This would allow the lamps to be inclosed in transparencies for a period of from two to six weeks, during which time the lanterns could not be cleaned, and the light would be obstructed. The Superintendent of Lamps and Gas states that this would be specially objectionable at this time, when, in consequence of frost, the gas-light service is defective, and, at times, entirely cut off by the frost."

SIR—You are hereby required, in conformity with the provisions of the Sanitary Code, to alter, repair, cleanse and improve premises south side West One Hundred and Twentieth street, beginning one hundred and fifty feet east of Seventh avenue and extending seventy-five feet east, New York City, as follows, viz.: That the vacant lots be properly fenced.

Your attention is called to the fact that, by section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, it is provided that any violation of the Sanitary Code subjects the person responsible therefor to penalties, and this notice is sent to you in order that the necessity of legal proceedings may be avoided by your compliance with the foregoing requirements within five days from the receipt of this notice. ## BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met at the Mayor's office on Friday, January 20, 1893, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to the usual notice.

The roll was called, and all the members were present and answered to their names.

The minutes of the meetings of January 13, 1893, were read and approved.

The Board then took up the matter of the Mulberry Bend Park assessment.

Mr. David Gerber, in a lengthy argument, contended that the City at large should bear the entire cost and expense of the laying out and opening of this park. Mr. John C. Shaw, Mr. Hitching, ex-Judge Hall and others followed in the same strain, and Messrs. Mulqueen & Mulqueen, Drachman & Nelson, Henry Parsons and Edward J. Dunphy presented petitions and written arguments all in support of this view.

After a patient hearing, the Board promised to take the matter under consideration.

The following report from the Commissioner of Public Works in the matter of the application for a public place on Twelfth avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirty-third streets, was presented and read:

Hon. THOMAS F. GILROY, Chairman, Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to transmit herewith report on the inclosed petition addressed to your Board and referred to the Commissioner of Public Works at a meeting held on the 28th ultimo.

The petition asks that the strip of land lying between the westerly line of Twelfth avenue and the easterly line of the property of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, from One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to One Hundred and Thirty-third street, be laid out and acquired as a public street or place. The petitioners state that their object is to obtain better access to the water-front. This object is no doubt a desirable one, and would be a great improvement to that section of the city known as Manhattanville, as all the facilities for maritime commerce for that section are concentrated on the river-front between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirty-third streets.

The questions which, in my opinion, are to be considered in this matter are: (1) Will the laying out and acquisition of this land accomplish the desired object? and (2) Will the benefit to be derived be commensurate to the cost involved?

On the first question, I beg to submit that the presence of the railroad tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, on which trains are constantly moving back and forth, presents an obstacle to the free and safe access to the water-front, which would not be removed by the laying out and acquisition of this strip of land as a public place or street, as without great changes of grades, either in the streets or the railroad tracks, and consequently great cost of construction, the crossings over the rail-tracks would have to be on grade level.

In respect to the question of cost, I would refer to the cost of acquiring the necessary land in the proceeding recently completed for widening and extending Manhattan street, which will enable your Board to make an approximate estimate of what would be the cost of acquiring the strip of land in question.

At the written request of, and on account of the absence of Mr. James A. Deering, the consideration of this matter by the Board was laid over to the next meeting of the Board.

The following communication from the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, relating to "that portion of a map which discontinues Brook avenue, West," and inclosing a copy of a report from the Counsel to the Corporation, was presented, as was also a letter thereon, received from Mr. Frank Loomis, counsel for the New York and Harlem Railroad Company:

CITY OF NEW YORK—COMMISSIONER OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS,  
TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS,  
COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, January 18, 1893.

To the Honorable the Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

GENTLEMEN—In regard to the communication of F. Loomis, Esq., general counsel for the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, addressed to the Mayor, a copy of which has also been forwarded to me, opposing the final adoption of that portion of a map which discontinues Brook avenue, West, and contending that Brook avenue, from substantially One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to Third avenue, has been discontinued by the action of the Department of Public Parks, I respectfully submit the following:

The title to Brook avenue, from tide water (Bronx Kills) to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, was acquired by the City on or about the 1st day of April, 1876. Subsequently a grand trunk sewer was constructed therein, which was completed about April, 1880. The avenue has also been paved from the Harlem river to One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, which was completed about April 16, 1892, and from Third avenue to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, which latter portion was completed about December 15, 1892. The assessments for the opening of said avenue and the construction of the trunk sewer have been duly levied and paid by the property-owners assessed for benefit.

The Department of Public Parks, by the adoption of a map filed in the Register's office, May 16, 1888, laid out a new street, known as Brook avenue, West, running from a point about two hundred and five feet north of One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street along the westerly side of Brook avenue to Third avenue. The laying out of Brook avenue, West, was done with a view of deflecting the course of Brook avenue, and was seemingly designed to operate as a practical discontinuance of the avenue between One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street and Third avenue. No resolution, however, to discontinue this portion of Brook avenue was ever adopted by the Park Board, nor does it appear, by any map filed by said Board, to have been officially eliminated or discontinued. No legal right existed in said Board to do so, as will hereafter more fully appear.

Brook avenue, between the points above indicated, crosses the depressed tracks of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, and the effect of a discontinuance or disuse of the portion of Brook avenue referred to, would be to relieve the railroad company of the obligation to construct a bridge carrying the street over the tracks between these points. If such a bridge is constructed there will be no necessity for the existence of Brook avenue, West. It is evident that Brook avenue, West, was laid out only as a substitute for that portion of Brook avenue which was intended to be abolished.

Apart from the question whether Brook avenue, being a street the title to which has been acquired by the City, and so largely improved as before stated, was or could be legally discontinued for any portion of it, in the manner indicated, or whether it could be discontinued at all, I desire to draw your attention to the fact that any device whereby the continuity of this important public highway will be destroyed would operate as a great wrong and injury to the public. The avenue being eighty feet wide and connecting with Webster avenue, is a direct communication between the upper and the lower portions of the territory, and should not be interrupted or deflected from its established course for the single purpose of relieving the New York and Harlem Railroad Company from the obligation to construct the bridge referred to. The proposition is simply this: Shall the City be obliged to acquire title to land for the purpose of establishing and constructing a wholly unnecessary street and building additional sewerage at a large expense to property-owners, and shall, besides, the public interests suffer by a permanent interruption to a main highway for the sole purpose of accommodating the railroad company? That this most unreasonable proposition was intended to be carried out is apparent from the contract and agreement subsequently entered into and executed on the 9th day of July, 1889, between the Department of Public Parks and the said railroad company, relating to plans for the depression of the tracks of the Port Morris branch of said railroad (a copy of which is annexed), which contains no provision for the building of a bridge over the depressed tracks between the points above mentioned. But the power to compel the railroad company to construct such a bridge is secured, however, in the following paragraph of the agreement:

"It is also further agreed, That additional crossings shall be made and maintained by the New York and Harlem Railroad Company whenever so directed by the Department of Public Parks, said crossings to be made in the manner and at such points as indicated by the said Department, but over such streets only as are now laid out and opened, or may hereafter be laid out and opened across said railroad."

Under the provisions of chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887, and fortified by the opinion of the Corporation Counsel delivered to me at my request, a copy of which is annexed, and after a public hearing which was duly advertised in pursuance of law, I have altered the map adopted by the Department of Public Parks filed May 16, 1888, as before mentioned, and I have re-established and adopted the map as it existed prior to said last-mentioned date and discontinued Brook avenue, West.

The authority of the Park Department under chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887 to discontinue streets and avenues was limited to those streets and avenues "the title to which had not been acquired by the City," and therefore no power was vested in that body to discontinue Brook avenue or any portion thereof.

The absurdity of the contention that Brook avenue, for the distance referred to, is discontinued is illustrated by the suggestion that that if so discontinued the public authorities could have no access, without the permission of the railroad company, to the trunk sewer running underneath. The sewer at this point may need repairing or cleaning but the work could only be done subject to the will of the railroad company. Within the prescribed limits the railroad company and not the City would practically control the sewer.

The map establishing Brook avenue, West, was filed April 5, 1888, and the map showing plans for the depression of the tracks of the Port Morris Branch of said railroad was filed March 15, 1889. Neither map shows a discontinuance of Brook avenue, between the points in question.

Therefore, in any view of the case, it cannot be maintained that the portion of Brook avenue referred to has been discontinued. The fact being thus established that it exists intact as a public street and highway, the necessity of constructing a bridge continuing its course between the points mentioned is obvious, and the obligation upon the part of the railroad company to construct it when so directed by the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, it seems to me, is clearly established. This being so the map adopted by me discontinuing Brook avenue West, should, I respectfully submit, be approved of by this Board.

Hon. LOUIS J. HEINTZ, Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards:

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of December 2, 1891, in relation to your authority to alter and amend the maps and change the location of certain streets in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

You state that the title to the streets affected has not been acquired by the City, and that the streets are among those embraced in the map made and filed by the Department of Public Parks in pursuance of chapter 81 of the Laws of 1886.

In my opinion, you have authority, under the provisions of chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887 and chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890, subject to the approval of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, to alter and amend the maps and change the location of streets, the title to which has not been acquired by the City, embraced within the bounds prescribed in chapter 681 of the Laws of 1886, and which were adopted and filed in pursuance of said act.



I have examined the agreement, of which a copy is inclosed by you, but do not understand in what particulars you think it may affect your powers in relation to the matters specified in your letter.

As I am at present advised, I do not see that it has any relation thereto, but will ask you to make your inquiries more specific if you wish further advice on that subject.

Brook avenue—Matter of approval by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of a map presented by the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, showing a proposed discontinuance of the avenue on the westerly side of the roadway of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, which avenue extends Brook avenue from a point where it is eighty feet wide, to Third avenue, with a width of sixty feet.

To the Honorable the Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

In the above matter, on the 30th of December, 1892, I sent a communication to the Honorable the Counsel to the Corporation, and on the 3d instant I sent a communication to the Honorable the Mayor, and I also sent copies of each of said communications to the Hon. Louis J. Heintz, Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

On the 18th instant I received from Mr. Heintz a letter inclosing a copy of a communication which, the letter stated, was to be submitted to the Board of Street Opening and Improvements at its meeting on this, the 20th of January, 1893.

In the communication of Mr. Heintz to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, reference is made to an opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, and I wrote to Mr. Heintz for a copy of that opinion and received a copy of it this morning.

I find that the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation referred to by Mr. Heintz is dated May 12, 1892, and I am inclined to think from the tenor of that opinion that the matters presented by me to the Counsel to the Corporation in my communication to him of date December 30, 1892, were not considered at the time he gave his opinion of May 12, 1892, to Mr. Heintz, and I think the matter is of such gravity that before the action of the Board the opinion of the Corporation Counsel upon the matter as lately submitted to him should be had, and I wish an opportunity to consider such opinion if it shall be given.

Owing to the absence from the city of one of my assistants and the illness of another, I am unable to be present to-day at the meeting of the Board, and respectfully request a postponement of the determination of the matter.

The Assistant Superintendent of Repairs to Buildings is to assist in making plans, specifications, estimates and requisitions for repairs and alterations required to the buildings of the Department, and in the superintendence of the same. This saves architect's commissions and enables a closer superintendence of the work. The Department has ninety buildings requiring more or less repairs and alterations annually.

In consideration of the arduous and extra-hazardous duties and great responsibility devolving upon the Chief of Department and his two deputies, the Fire Commissioners consider that the increase in their respective salaries as proposed above, in accordance with chapter 710, Laws of 1892, has been well and fully earned. They also consider that, for substantially the same reasons, a proportionate increase of salary should be allowed to the other officers of the uniformed force.

There is also provision for an additional Chief of Battalion. This is to enable the organization of another battalion. The Tenth Battalion has now 9 companies, and its territory extends from Fifty-ninth to about One Hundredth street on both sides of Central Park; while the other battalions average 6 companies and cover less territory. It is proposed to organize a new battalion on the west side of Central Park and to add to it some companies and territory from the adjoining battalions on the north and south, and thus to equalize the battalions generally. The present organization of the Tenth Battalion, divided as it is by Central Park, is disadvantageous.

The increase on this pay-roll over the allowance for the current year amounts to \$136,920, of which \$76,200 is for additions to the force, and \$60,720 for additions to salaries authorized by chapter 710 of the Laws of 1892.

The additional force is required for two new companies, for the whole year, one at One Hundred and Fifteenth street, near Lenox avenue, and the other on One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, near Seventh avenue, where houses are now in course of erection; and for two new companies for one-half of the year to be located at One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, near Willis avenue, and near One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Cypress avenue. This is equivalent to three companies for the whole year, which, at an average cost of say \$13,400, amounts to \$40,200. The remainder of the \$76,200 required for additional force (\$36,000) is for thirty-six additional firemen for theatre details provided for by chapter 703 of the Laws of 1892.

That the theatre details are a necessity, the experience of the past sixteen years amply shows. During that time there were 311 fires in theatres, 155 of which occurred while the detailed firemen were on duty in the theatres. 84 of these were discovered and extinguished by the details alone, 21 by the Department generally, and the remainder by the theatre employees. Every one of these fires was so promptly extinguished that the loss was only nominal.

On the other hand, of the remaining 156 fires occurring in theatres during these years, while there were no firemen on duty in them, 9 resulted in the destruction of the building, and 4 others in serious damage.

The duty is, however, a very onerous one, and is constantly growing more so with the increasing number of theatres, because the firemen are detailed for this purpose during the hours of the day and night when most of the fires occur, thus impairing the efficiency of the companies at the most important time.

The appropriation for this purpose for the current year is \$9,100. At the beginning of the present year this Bureau was reorganized, and has thereby become much more efficient. Under the provisions of section 44, chapter 275 of the Laws of 1892 (known as the Building Law), enacting section 517½ of chapter 410, Laws of 1882, this branch of the Department became the "Bureau of Fire-alarm Telegraph and Electrical Appliances," and was charged, in addition to the care and maintenance of the Fire-alarm Telegraph, as heretofore, with the new and important duties of directing and superintending the wiring, etc., in all buildings in which electricity is to be used for the generation of heat, light or power.

To properly direct and supervise the wiring and placing of electrical appliances in buildings, as required by the act referred to, the following will be required as specified in the above estimate:

It is proposed to divide the city into eight districts, each one under an Inspector, and to have two General Inspectors to supervise their work. The Draughtsman is for the examination and making of plans of electrical work. All must have practical and technical knowledge and experience.

The Stenographer and Clerk, and Clerk and Messenger are necessary for the proper conduct of the business of this bureau.

It is estimated that there are more than 8,000 buildings in the city wired to furnish electricity for light or power, or both, and, as is well known, the number of such plants is constantly and rapidly increasing. During the past two and a half years 91 fires caused by defective electric wiring in buildings occurred, causing a loss of \$228,210.

For the original purposes of this bureau, the care and maintenance of the Fire-alarm Telegraph, \$26,945 was allowed for the current year, and for the same purposes \$37,900 is called for in the above estimate. The increase for Fire-alarm Telegraph purposes is made as follows:

This is \$11,306 more than was allowed for the present year, and is made necessary by the additional mechanical force required to keep the apparatus, implements, tools, etc., used in fire extinguishing in good repair. There has been no adequate increase of this appropriation for years, and it has not kept pace with the enormous and constant increase of fires and alarms. As a consequence, the larger part of the working force at the Repair Shops has necessarily been laid off, at frequent intervals, to keep the expenditure within the appropriation, and the plant cannot be kept in the perfect condition demanded by the best interests of the community without additional appropriation.

The amount allowed for apparatus, supplies, etc., for the current year, independent of the item "Building and Repairs," which was separately considered, was \$307,000. For the same items \$353,900 is asked for the coming year, the increase being \$46,900, which is made up as follows:

These increases are very necessary. Those for coal and wood and for horse-feed and straw being caused mainly by the steady increase in price of these supplies. For repairs to fire-boats, the appropriation has been found to be very inadequate. The Department now has three of these important apparatuses, which often require extensive repairs, largely to satisfy the peremptory requirements of the United States Steamboat Inspectors, which, if not complied with, would result in keeping the boats out of commission. The increase on the remaining items is due to the growth of the Department.

For buildings and repairs, detailed statements of alterations and improvements and repairs required will be submitted. \$73,000 was allowed for this purpose for the present year. The statements referred to show that the total amount asked for is necessary.

\$215,000 was asked for twelve new houses for the current year, but only \$70,000 was allowed. This was hardly enough for four new houses.

The first of these is for a new organization in a very important, but not adequately protected, section, in which the dangers of fire are constantly increasing.

The second is to effect a change of location of a company to cover a section that is becoming very dangerous by reason of the many large factories and wood-working establishments therein.

The remaining three changes are especially in the interests of economy, all of the property being occupied under leases which will soon expire.

### TO ARCHITECTS.

A GENERAL INVITATION IS HEREBY extended to architects to furnish competitive designs and plans for an armory building for the use of Troop A, of the National Guard of the State of New York.

The building to be erected on the ground 200 x 100 feet in the rear of the Eighth Regiment Armory, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, and fronting on Madison avenue. The building to be of brick, with stone trimmings, and provided with a roof of glass, slate, tile or other durable material, and in design should harmonize as near as possible with the Eighth Regiment Armory adjoining.

The excavation for the building to be over the whole area of 200 x 100 feet, and to give a depth that will insure nine feet clear from the floor of the cellar to the ceiling above.

The cellar to contain a target range, marker's pit, large saddle room, armorer's room, boiler room and a runway for horses to the floor above.

The remainder of the cellar to be left unfinished and to be used as a stable, and to be fitted up by the Troop at their own expense, and not to be provided for in the present plans or estimates.

The main floor, on street level, is to be occupied with a ring of tan bark or dirt (similar to riding school rings) of the largest possible dimensions. This floor to be supported on columns and arches.

The plans to show accommodation in the building for Troop Meeting-room, Captain's Room, Lieutenant's Room, First Sergeant's Room, Quartermaster Sergeant's Room, Janitor's Apartments, Kitchen, with range, etc.; Locker-rooms, with lockers, to be provided for 105 men; suitable Water-closets, Bath-rooms, etc.; as much Gallery and Seating Accommodations as possible.

Building to be lighted by electricity and gas. Heated by steam. Ample provisions made for drainage.

Plans to be submitted, to be drawn scale 1/8 inch equal to one foot with a perspective drawing, rendered in black and white.

The entire cost of building, as called for in these specifications, shall not exceed \$140,000.

The Armory Board reserves the right to reject any or all plans which may be offered if, for any reason, they deem it best to do so, and in case any plan is accepted as presented or with alterations or suggestions of the Armory Board, and it is subsequently found that a contract satisfactory to the Armory Board can be made for the complete erection of the building as herein called for, for a sum, including the architect's fees, which shall not exceed the appropriation for the work, the architect presenting such plans shall be engaged for the work and his compensation for plans and superintendence shall be four per cent. of the amount of such contract.

The plans must be prepared with the view of inviting proposals for the erection of the building for a gross sum, and must be presented to the Committee on Plans, at this office, on or before March 1, 1893.

A map showing the site is on file in this office, and must be consulted by architects for such information as they may need in that respect.

Each estimate shall state the name and place of residence of the person making it; if there is more than one such person, their names and residences must be given; and if only one person is interested in the estimate it must distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation is directly or indirectly interested therein or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he

shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the preliminary security required, and in the proposals stated, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by law. The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered will be subject to approval by the Comptroller of the City of New York after the award is made and prior to the signing of the contract.

The amount of security required upon the execution of the contract will be in each case fifty per cent. of the cost of the articles awarded to each contractor; the amount of preliminary security to be given until each award, and in which the sureties shall justify, shall be TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS.

Should the person to whom the contract may be awarded neglect or refuse to accept the contract within five days after written notice that the same has been awarded to his bid or proposal, and that the adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered has been approved by the Comptroller, or if he accept but do not execute the contract and give the proper security, he shall be considered as having abandoned it and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be re-advertised and relet, as provided by law.

### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1892), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
