The reading of the minutes of the meetings held October 5, 6, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 16, 17, and 18, 1899, was dispensed with.

The Comptroller presented the following :

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

The St. Vincent's Hospital of The City of New York respectfully asks for an appropriation to aid in defraying its expenses.

The hospital was incorporated in 1871, as a benevolent and charitable corporation. Since that time it has supported and cared for over sixty-seven thousand patients. It receives no aid whatever from City, County or State, and is dependent for its support solely upon the board of some patients and upon charitable contributions. The work in the hospital is mainly done by Sisters of Charity, fifty-one of whom are employed there day and night without compensation.

In order to meet the increased demands upon the hospital, it was found necessary to erect a new hospital building on Eleventh street, capable of accommodating more than twice-and-a-half times as many patients as the old hospital building. The new hospital was completed in the early part of this year, and is now occupied and in full operation.

The hospital owes at present \$406,000 on bond and mortgage, \$200,000 of which has been borrowed for the purpose of erecting a new hospital. The new building cost about \$318,000, without any furniture.

The balance of the cost of the property has been raised by charitable donations. The increased expense of the care of the new building and the interest on the new mortgages involves a large outlay, which the hospital has no means to meet.

A very large proportion of the inmates of the hospital are patients who are brought there in response to ambulance calls. The ambulance boundaries of the hospital are : Fourteenth street on the north, Canal street on the south, Hudson river on the west, and the Bowery on the east. The hospital has two ambulances, three horses and two drivers. In 1898 the ambulances responded to 2,551 calls; of these cases 868, being nearly one-half of the entire number of cases in the hospital, were brought to the hospital. The number of days of treatment in the hospital of such cases was 4,733, an average of between five and six days for each such patient. In the previous year the number of days of treatment of such patients was 11,777. Last year, owing to want of facilities, by reason of pulling down the old hospital and the unfinished condition of the new hospital, the number was largely reduced, but it is fair to suppose that next year it will be largely increased and return to at least its old number. The cost of such patients is \$1.35 per day each. This low cost is largely owing to the fact that most of the work in the hospital is done by the Sisters gratuitously. None of the physicians or surgeons or other professional men receive any compensation whatever. This amount is saved to the City, each and every one of these ambulance cases being cases which would otherwise have become a direct charge to the City.

In order to enable the hospital to carry on and increase its charitable work, it asks from your Honorable Body, for the support of its ambulance service and the board, nursing and medical or surgical aid or attendance of patients received in the hospital under ambulance calls, the sum of one dollar (\$1) per day for each such patient, which is much less than the actual cost. It

is estimated that the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) per annum would be sufficient to meet such expense.

And your petitioner will ever pray.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from your Honorable Board, inclosing copies of two communications from the Department of Public Charities, in regard to the Bakery and Stable on Blackwell's Island, which are now used jointly by that Department and the Department of Correction.

In regard to the Bakery, I informed Commissioner Keller some time ago that the Master Baker had stated to me that three ovens were ample for the requirements of the Department of Charities, and that the Bakery could be divided by a partition, giving three ovens to each Department.

I am at present considering a plan for establishing a bakery at the Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island, which I hope I may be able to put in execution during the coming year at a small expense, after which the present Bakery can become a part of the Department of Public Charities.

In regard to the Stable, which has always been under the control of the Department of Correction, I desire to say that I am quite willing to make an equitable division of the horses, etc., with the Department of Public Charities should that Department decide to build a stable, as, under the provisions of section 7, chapter 912 of the Laws of 1895, the Department of Correction is debarred from erecting any new buildings on Blackwell's Island.

I would be glad to confer with your Honorable Board or with President Keller regarding this matter should your Honorable Board desire the division above referred to.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—In the Departmental Estimate of this Department for the year 1900, transmitted to your Honorable Board on the 5th ultimo and considered by it on the 4th instant, the sum of \$1,000 was asked for the maintenance of the volunteer system in the Village of Flushing, Borough of Queens, under a provision contained in section 722 of the Greater New York Charter, that,

until the paid department should be extended over the territory in said borough, the volunteer companies therein should continue to discharge the duties for which they have been associated or incorporated, and receive for their support and maintenance such sums as at the time of the enactment of the Charter had been awarded to them by the villages or towns in which they were respectively located; and, from the best information that the Deputy Commissioner could obtain, \$1,000 per annum appearing to have been the amount of the allowance in said village prior to its incorporation within the territory of the greater city, the same amount has been asked since annexation.

It now appears to my satisfaction, from the accompanying affidavit submitted from the former members of the Board of Trustees of said village, that an amount approximating \$4,000, instead of \$1,000, was the sum allowed said Department prior to consolidation for the six companies composing its fire fighting force, and that, therefore, the village is entitled to receive \$4,000 from the City for maintenance.

The population of the Village of Flushing is approximately 15,000 people, and it contains nearly 8 square miles of territory.

There is no question in my mind as to the justice of the claim presented by the said village, and I, therefore, trust that your Honorable Board may increase to \$4,000 the appropriation for the maintenance of its fire department, and thereby afford the means for adequate protection of its citizens and their property from the possible ravages of fire.

John Hepburn, being duly sworn, deposes and says: I reside at Flushing, Borough of Queens, City of New York, and have resided in that village for many years. I was during the whole of the year 1897, the year last prior to consolidation of the then Village of Flushing, a member of the Board of Trustees of said village, and was not only present at the meetings of said Board, but was thoroughly familiar with all business transacted and the manner in which it was done. I know that each year an appropriation was made, as allowed by the village charter, for the Fire Department; that as soon as that appropriation was exhausted that Chief James H. McCormick would communicate with the proper Committee of the Board and they would investigate thoroughly the suggestion, or requisition, and, on their favorable report, the articles required would be purchased and payment made from some other fund over which said Board had control.

Deponent further says: I know that there has never been a year for many years past, last prior to consolidation, when the Fire Department of Flushing has not required and received from said Board, for maintenance and betterment, more than the \$1,000 appropriation. Deponent further says: The total amount expended, as copied from the official figures in his possession, for the years 1893, 1894, 1895 and 1896, was \$18,150.60; the figures for 1897 are not in deponent's possession, but he is informed and believes the amount was about \$3,000. Deponent of his own knowledge knows that it was largely in excess of \$1,000. Deponent further says: I am familiar with the present deplorable condition of the Department existing on account of lack of funds with which to properly maintain the existing equipment, or to purchase new.

Deponent further says: I have carefully examined the affidavit of Chief McCormick, and consider his estimate of the needs of his department for 1900 very conservative.

FLUSHING ASSOCIATION,
FLUSHING, N. Y., October 18, 1899.

To the Honorable Members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—I beg to submit, on behalf of the citizens of Flushing, through their committees, the following facts regarding the Flushing Fire Department and its necessities: The department is volunteer and is made up of six companies, having an aggregate active membership of about 225. The Holly System is used, viz., pressure direct from the pumping station, instead of from the fire engines. The sum of \$1,000, through some misunderstanding or inadvertence, was all that was appropriated by the City of New York for the year 1898. When you consider that the territory covered by the firemen is nearly 6 square miles; that the population is nearly 15,000, and that the value of the property under their protection is nearly \$20,000,000, it becomes apparent that \$1,000 is grossly inadequate; and, as a matter of fact, as is shown by the attached affidavits, for many years past the amount appropriated by the village trustees of the Village of Flushing has been on an average of \$4,000. The result of last year's inadequate appropriation is as follows:

The houses are out of repair.
The plumbing is in some instances almost entirely destroyed and in every case in need of a great deal of repair.
The hose has become rotten and bursts when pressure is applied.
The other apparatus must be repaired extensively.
Private citizens during the past winter purchased and paid for coal with which to heat the hose houses.

Private subscription has also been paid for the ringing of the church bell, which has always been the summons for our volunteer firemen to attend with their machines at once, the fire alarm being heard by only the few members who happen to be at the hose house when the same is turned in; and, summing up, the whole Volunteer Fire Department of the Village of Flushing has become demoralized, not for lack of good material in the personnel of the department, but simply for want of proper implements with which to work.

James H. McCormick, being duly sworn, deposes and says: I am Chief of the Flushing Fire Department, and have been in that position since 1887. That during the year 1897, last prior to consolidation with New York City, he received from the Board of Trustees of the Village of Flushing over three thousand (\$3,000) dollars, same being obtained as follows:

Appropriation, village charter, \$1,000.
Appropriation from other funds over two thousand (\$2,000) dollars.
Deponent further says, after consolidation he was asked to and did make statement that the village charter only allowed an annual appropriation of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars, but explained that it always took more than three thousand (\$3,000) dollars to run the Department, the balance of the amount being appropriated by the Board of Trustees as needed.
Deponent further says, the fire-alarm system, hose, hose carriages, cleaning and drying hose, general repairs to houses and apparatus, new houses, maintenance of fire-alarm system, and any other supplies deemed necessary by the Chief, approved by the Board of Trustees, were purchased, after the \$1,000 was exhausted, by said Board of Trustees from other funds than the \$1,000 above referred to.

Deponent further says that there is now a large district, called Ingleside, Flushing, N. Y., utterly without an alarm box, and that same should be put in as soon as possible.

Deponent further says the following is a very conservative estimate of what his Department will need for the year 1900, viz.:

Deponent further says the people of Flushing are earnestly demanding adequate fire protection, which, owing to the lack of funds and the consequent condition of the service, I am unable to give them.

Deponent further says, I deem their demands well grounded and absolutely just, and therefore join with them in requesting that the amount above mentioned be placed at the disposal of my department as soon after January 1, 1900, as practicable.

DEAR SIR—Your letter of September 14, relative to the applications of volunteer fire companies for appropriations, under the provisions of chapter 281, Laws of 1899, to hand. It arrived too late for our regular meeting in September, and was brought before the Company at its regular monthly meeting on October 14.

I was instructed by the Company at this meeting to ask for an appropriation of \$500, to be used, together with an appropriation from our own fire district, for the equipment and support of this Department.

A good portion of this fire district lies in the Town of Flushing, Borough of Queens, City of New York, with no fire apparatus (other than Floral Park Hook and Ladder Company) nearer than Queens, a distance of two miles.

The Jamaica Water Supply Company have lately been granted a franchise to supply this fire district with water, and a number of hydrants have already been put in. This will necessitate the purchase of a considerable amount of hose, a hose carriage and other apparatus necessary to do effective work, and we think the appropriation asked for a fair amount, considering the extra paraphernalia we are compelled to purchase for the proper maintenance of an effective Department here, now that an abundant water supply is assured.

DEAR SIR—In reply to your letter of October 12, in relation to a request of the Board of Supervisors of Queens County for an appropriation of \$18,200 for the care and maintenance of the County Court-house, Jail and Administration Buildings, and \$900 for a Janitor to the County Clerk's office, I beg to say:

The Deputy Commissioner of this Department in the Borough of Queens informs me that all the positions mentioned in your communication have been filled and are necessary, with the exception of the position of Assistant Engineer, which he considers is necessary.

The amount of salaries mentioned in your letter have all been paid in 1899, with the exception of an advance of \$300 in the pay of the Engineer, and Electrician's salary; \$180 in the Warden's salary, and \$400 in the Jail Physician's salary. These items, with the \$1,000 for Assistant Engineer, makes an increase of \$1,880 for the year 1900, requested by the Supervisors. I did not know of the law transferring the care and maintenance of the County Court-house to this Department, which is my excuse for not including it in the Budget for 1900.

An additional allowance of \$2,500 should be made for heating, lighting and Janitor's supplies for the year 1900 for this building.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In response to a communication from his Honor the Mayor, I inclose an estimate of the cost to apply the provisions of the Labor Law to the Department of Public Charities for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the year 1900. In his communication to his Honor, the Mayor says:

"All officers and departments of the City must prepare their estimates for the year 1900 with a view to a full compliance on their part with the provisions of the Labor Law. A legal day's work under this statute consists of eight hours, and the wages of laborers, workmen and mechanics should be at least \$2 for a legal day's work, and not less than the prevailing rate of wages for a day's work in the same trade or occupation in this City. If this matter has been overlooked, it should receive immediate attention, as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will shortly take up the preparation of the budget for the next year and will consider all communications that come before it as prepared with a view to a full compliance of the provisions of the Labor Law."

When this communication reached me my estimate for the year 1900 had already been sent to your Honorable Board. Inasmuch as this Department has always lodged and fed its employees, and still does so, I was of the opinion when I made out the estimate submitted to you, that the Labor Law did not apply to this Department so far as its employees were concerned. To be clear upon that point, however, I had already written to the Corporation Counsel, under date of August 18th, asking for an opinion as to whether or not the Labor Law did apply to this Department and, if so, to what extent. After receiving the communication from the Mayor, which is quoted above, I wrote again to the Corporation Counsel, but as yet have received no opinion and no communication upon this subject. Therefore I do not know whether or not the Labor Law does apply to the Department of Public Charities. If it does not apply the estimate for salaries for 1900 which is before you is enough. If it does apply it will require an increase of \$516,398.40 over the appropriation for 1899, in order to meet the requirements of the Labor Law. I enclose the detail of this estimate. I do not believe that the Labor Law contemplated any such increase in the cost of salaries in this Department, and I present this estimate to you now only in order that I may follow the instructions of His Honor, the Mayor, and that in making the appropriation for 1900 you may know all the conditions of the Department so far as the Labor Law is concerned.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—Since I appeared before your Honorable Board, on October 4, to present my estimate of expenses for the Department of Public Charities for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the year 1900, I have had before me the head of every institution in my Department, and have been assured by all these heads that the stock they are now carrying is not in excess of what they ordinarily carry, and is not in excess of what is needed for the proper conduct of the Department. To satisfy myself of the truth of their statements, I have continued the taking of stock, which was already in progress when I appeared before you. Whatever faults the Commissioners of Accounts may have found in the bookkeeping of this Department, shall be corrected by me on the receipt of the report of the Commissioners of Accounts. If the books of the Department make it appear that there is a greater stock on hand than is really here, the books should be corrected. But it seems to me that the basis on which the estimate for 1900 must be made is the actual stock in the Department. Owing to the isolated condition of the island institutions and the long distance to the Fordham Hospital and the restrictions of the Charter as to purchases in the open market, it is necessary that at least a month's supplies should be kept in this Department at all times. Last winter, when the blizzard came, a famine of coal on Blackwell's Island was prevented only by the most extraordinary efforts. Seven barges were lying at the docks awaiting discharge of cargo by prison labor when the ice-floe carried them away and sunk them all. This left the supply so short that the contractors had to be called on to furnish more coal. They couldn't get their barges through the ice, and the

Department was reduced to the extremity of carrying coal in small quantities on the Department steamboat from a coal-yard in the city to the island. After that experience I issued an order that the reserve coal on Blackwell's Island should never be less than two months' supply. In a smaller degree the same danger applies to food supplies. In all the hospital service there must always be in stock medicines and surgical appliances necessary to meet any emergency. Under the Charter I am restricted to \$1,000 a month as the limit of my purchases in the open market. Any excess of that sum must be expended under contract. If one of my contractors should fail in any way to carry out his contract, and, for any reason, I could not force him to carry it out, I could not go into the open market and purchase supplies in excess of \$1,000 a month, but would have to make a new contract and go through the delay of advertising, of approval by the Corporation Counsel and of acceptance by the Comptroller. All these things make it necessary that I should carry stock on hand. I do not believe that my stock on hand to-day is larger than the needs of the Department require. I do not believe that the sum of \$870,000, which I had this year, and for which I ask next year, is too large for the needs of this Department. Prices have advanced all along the line. My meat contractor told me only yesterday that he was losing a dollar a hundred on his contract, and that I might expect to pay from 20 to 30 per cent. more for meat next year. Wherever I have made inquiry as to the probability of prices for next year I have been told that there will be an increase. In addition to this increase of prices there will have to come out of the Supply Account next year any possible increase in the cost of coal and ice, for discharging the same. My experience of last year and of this year shows that I cannot depend upon the Department of Correction to discharge my coal and ice. The trouble during the blizzard of last winter was due to the failure of prison labor to discharge the coal on Blackwell's Island. Shrinkage and demurrage in ice, for which this Department has had to pay, are due to the same cause. To correct these evils I have advertised for bids and proposals to discharge the coal and the ice for Blackwell's and Randall's Islands. I hope that the assurance to coal dealers and ice dealers that their cargoes will be promptly discharged will result in a decrease in bids sufficient to pay the cost of discharging, but I do not know whether this will be true or not. The necessity that confronts me is to have the cargoes discharged. I cannot take any chance to have a recurrence of what came so near to being a catastrophe in the blizzard of last winter. In view of all these things I would ask your Honorable Board to consider the actual stock in this Department as the only basis on which to fix the appropriation for supplies for the year 1900. If the books of the Department show one thing and the actual stock shows another, then the books should be corrected and the people responsible for the errors should be punished, but I am sure that you will not permit the sick and the poor of the city to suffer through a possible error of the employees of the City.

DEAR SIR—I have to-day finished taking an inventory of the stock on hand and not immediately in use in the institutions of the Department of Public Charities for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and ask the privilege of submitting it to you for your consideration in fixing the appropriation for 1900 for these boroughs. Old employees of this Department declare that this is about the normal condition of the stock, except in so far as the almshouse and the Randall's Island institutions are concerned. It happens just now that in the almshouse and on Randall's Island they have a large stock of clothing material which is being made up for use during the ensuing winter. Within two months all of this stock of clothing will be in use. When I took charge of this Department I found that in the matter of clothing the supply was usually from six to ten months behind instead of being, from six to ten months ahead. For instance, the winter clothing was got in at the beginning of the spring and the summer clothing was ready at the beginning of the fall. I changed this so that the summer clothing was ready at the beginning of summer and the winter clothing was ready at the beginning of the winter. In 1898 the stock of clothing was so low that in some of the hospitals there was not enough bed linen to make the necessary changes. In some instances women patients had to use garments instead of sheets for bed clothing. In the almshouse many of the inmates that year had to use old blankets for coats. It was to avoid a recurrence of such scandals as these that I have asked for the appropriation for supplies contained in my estimate. I have got the department now in such a condition that no complaint can be made as to the sufficiency of supplies, while I believe that the most careful investigation will show that there is no waste of supplies. The general plan of the conduct of the Department has been to keep in stock about ten per cent. of the appropriation. In my judgment this is ample, but not excessive.

The large decrease in the amount required for the redemption of bonds of the City of New York, as now constituted, is due to the fact that the last appropriation for this purpose included the item of \$7,175,850.88 of Special Revenue Bonds issued to supply the deficiencies in the Budgets for 1898, of the municipal corporations consolidated into the present City of New York.

If, for purposes of comparison, this item should be eliminated, the grand total of the amounts required for 1900 for both redemption of and interest on the city debt would show an increase over 1899 of \$3,245,629.10, due chiefly:

- (1) To the workings of the Charter provisions in regard to Sinking Fund Installments.
- (2) To the additional amount required for interest on the large amount of bonds issued during the current year, while only a comparatively small amount of bonds have matured and been cancelled.
- (3) To the increase in the amount of Revenue Bonds issued to pay judgments (chiefly on account of old liabilities inherited by The City of New York on consolidation); and,
- (4) To the Revenue Bonds issued to pay for increases of teachers' salaries required by the Ahearn Act, for the Dewey celebration and for the removal of snow and ice during the past winter.

In addition to the foregoing statements I also present statements of all bonds maturing during the year 1900, and payable from the Sinking Funds or from assessments; and statements showing item by item the detail of the manner in which the Sinking Fund installments have been calculated.

I also present a statement showing the condition of the Fund for Street and Park Openings. On October 1, 1899, the excess of the liability of this fund over the cash balance was \$1,792,786.26. I have advertised for sale, however, Corporate Stock to the amount of \$1,849,107.32, the proceeds of which are, according to the law, payable into this fund, so that it will not be necessary to make any provision in the Budget for 1900 to replenish this fund. Last year the amount appropriated for this purpose was \$4,448,513.56.

I also present communications from the State Comptroller showing that the amounts required to be inserted in the Budget for State taxes aggregate \$7,905,488.02—an increase over the amounts required for 1899 of \$1,643,152.97, as shown by the following statement:

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for annually recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. No payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, and Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

DEAR SIR—In consequence of the inadequacy of the appropriation made to the Department of Highways, Borough of Queens, for "Labor, Maintenance and Supplies," for the year 1899, this Department will be unable to continue the necessary work of repairing and maintaining the roadways in that borough to the end of this year, unless the appropriation shall be supplemented by transfers from other appropriations in which there will be unexpended balances December 31, 1899.

The area of the Borough of Queens is greater than that of any other borough in The City of New York, and there are in it 722 miles of streets, of which about 300 miles are unpaved, necessitating constant work and heavy expenditure in repairing washouts and keeping the roadways in passable condition. If all repair work should be stopped at this time and not resumed until next year's appropriation shall become available, several of the streets would be rendered impassable, serious accidents might happen, and a greatly increased expenditure would have to be incurred before the roadways could be restored to fairly good condition next Spring.

Under these circumstances, I earnestly request that, pursuant to section 461 of the City Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by unanimous vote, transfer to the appropriation for "Labor, Maintenance and Supplies," Department of Highways, Borough of Queens, 1899, the sum of \$12,000 from "Labor, Maintenance and Supplies," Borough of the Bronx, 1899, and \$8,000 from "One Hundred Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct—Maintenance and Repairs," Borough of Manhattan, 1899. These sums can be spared from the appropriations named.

The appropriation made to the Department of Highways, Borough of Manhattan, for "Boulevards, Roads and Avenues—Maintenance of," 1899, is in a similar exhausted condition, and the important work of repairing and maintaining the 21 miles of macadam and gravel roads and the 33 miles of unpaved or dirt roadways in charge of the Bureau of Streets and Roads cannot be continued without supplementing that appropriation by a transfer. The many heavy rain-storms this year caused unusual and unforeseen damage to the suburban roads in the upper section of the city, particularly those with steep grades, down which surface water poured in torrents, washing away large quantities of surface material, and in many cases so badly rutting the roads that they were temporarily impassable. This condition of affairs accounts for the exhaustion of the appropriation at this time when there remains much necessary work to be done, which cannot be postponed until next year's appropriation becomes available.

I therefore respectfully request the Board to transfer to the appropriation made to the Department of Highways, Borough of Manhattan, for "Boulevards, Roads and Avenues—Main-

tenance of," 1899, the sum of \$9,000 from "Salaries—Administration," Department of Highways, Borough of Manhattan, 1899, from which latter account said amount can be spared.

DEAR SIR—In response to your order to measure the quantity in cubic yards of the earth filling required to place over and around the following-mentioned sewers for their protection, I respectfully report that such has been done, and submit the following:

The sewers are situated in:

Osborn street, from Hegeman avenue to 180 feet north of Riverdale avenue.
Hinsdale street, from Hegeman avenue to Newport street.
Hegeman avenue, from Osborn street to Powell street.
Hegeman avenue, from 30 feet west of Snediker avenue to 40 feet east of Williams.
Sutter avenue, from Fountain to Crescent.
Market street, from Sutter avenue to 325 feet north.
Sackman street, from Hegeman avenue to 30 feet north of New Lots avenue.

All of these sewers are main sewers, and were built in 1893 and 1894. They were not at that time sufficiently covered with protective filling. The result is that in each case the sand has washed away, been blown away and removed by persons, perhaps for building purposes.

These sewers stand out in the open air, their arches exposed to the weather, and the filling extending only as high as their springing lines. In Osborn street and Hinsdale street the filling does not reach this level even, and their remaining in this condition through another winter will probably result in their destruction. The paring of the arches has been destroyed, and evidence is given of ice having formed in the joints of the brickwork during the winter seasons, which, if allowed to continue this coming winter, will result in the sewer's downfall.

You are aware of the recent failure of 160 feet of the 96-inch sewer at Hegeman avenue, near Williams street, and also of about 80 feet of 42-inch sewer at Market street, near Sutter avenue, due to this condition, the weight of water in the sewer bursting the arches and sides out. Fortunately these breaks occurred in an unimproved district, and little damage was done.

It is estimated that should these sewers fail, it will cost \$77,500 to replace them, in addition to \$7,000, which would also be required to place protective covering, not considering the liability to recovery for damages, of large amounts, by citizens.

Their immediate protection is imperative, and as these sewers have been paid for by assessment proceedings, it appears to me that as the City has provided an inadequate system in regard to liability, to the safety of property-holders, that it is its duty to immediately make said sewers secure.

I therefore request that this subject may be placed before the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting an appropriation of \$7,000 to place protective covering over and around these sewers.

The number of cubic yards necessary is 10,000 in round numbers, estimated at 70 cents per yard, for earth filling in this vicinity.

SIR—The Hon. Jas. Kane, Commissioner of Sewers, in communication of September 15, 1899, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmits a report from the Deputy Commissioner of

Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, inclosing report of the Chief Engineer in relation to covering for sewers in Osborn street, Hinsdale street, Hegeman avenue, Sutter avenue, Market street and Sackman street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and stating that these sewers were built during the years 1893 and 1894, and were not at that time sufficiently covered with protective filling, and that the result is that in each case the filling has washed away or removed by persons for building purposes. He says that it is absolutely necessary that something should be done to protect these sewers, and requests an appropriation of \$7,000 to do the work.

The report of the Chief Engineer to the Deputy Commissioner is full; he enumerates the sewers as follows:

Osborn street, from Hegeman avenue to 180 feet north of Riverdale avenue.
Hinsdale street, from Hegeman avenue to Newport street.
Hegeman avenue, from Osborn street to Powell street.
Hegeman avenue, from 30 feet west of Snediker avenue to 40 feet east of Williams street.
Sutter avenue, from Fountain to Crescent.
Market street, from Sutter avenue to 325 feet north.
Sackman street, from Hegeman avenue to 30 feet north of New Lots avenue.

He says that all these "sewers are main sewers, and were built in 1893 and 1894. They were not at that time sufficiently covered with protective filling. The result is that in each case the sand has washed away, been blown away and removed by persons, perhaps for building purposes.

"These sewers stand out in the open air, their arches exposed to the weather, and the filling extending only as high as their springing lines. "The number of cubic yards necessary is 10,000, in round numbers, estimated at 70 cents per yard."

I have had the matter set forth in this report investigated by Mr. A. J. Provost, Assistant Engineer of this Department, who reports that he has "examined the said main sewers between the limits stated and finds them, on account of lack of covering and embankment, to be for the most part entirely unprotected from frost action, and in many places so unsupported down to and below the springing lines of the arches as to be in constant danger of outward collapse from the weight and pressure during heavy storms. Within the last few weeks there have occurred three serious failures of this kind, entailing a total loss of about 300 linear feet of 96-inch sewer, and nearly 100 linear feet of 42-inch sewer within the district stated. There can be no question that the work for which the appropriation is asked should be done, and immediately.

"In discussing the question of how the expense for the work should be met, I would state that the sewers were constructed during the years 1893 and 1894, under special legislation secured by chapter 91, Laws of 1889, as amended by chapter 72, Laws of 1891, as further amended by chapter 462, Laws of 1892. Under these laws the expense of constructing the main sewers, purification works, etc., together with the cost of securing the necessary lands by easement or fee, was met by the issue of bonds by the City of Brooklyn. The interest on the bonds is placed in the Tax Levy and collected from the property directly benefited by the improvement. The entire cost of the work has been apportioned and will be paid for by the property within the area of assessment in ten equal annual installments, so that the City will have the money to cancel the bonds when they shall expire in 1914 and annually thereafter for fifteen years. The bonds are denominated 'Twenty-sixth and adjacent Ward Sewer Bonds,' and the proceeds therefrom constitute a fund known as the 'Twenty-sixth Ward and adjacent Wards Drain and Sewer Fund.' Since the laws referred to specifically state that the moneys from said fund may be applied only to the construction of the main sewers and the purification plant, and since these sewers have been completed for some years and accepted by the former City of Brooklyn as completed, it would seem that any work to be done upon them should be considered as repairs and charged against the appropriation allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to the Department of Sewers" for repairs.

"The Department of Sewers claims that at the time of preparing its budget for the current year, the necessity of the work in question was not realized, that no allowance was asked therefor, and that from the appropriation allowed it has not sufficient money to perform the work. It therefore asks for \$7,000 additional to the amount appropriated for similar work. It is the intention I believe to cover all exposed arches and haunches with earth filling to a thickness of not less than 3 feet at any point and to sod the slopes, should the character of the filling material render it desirable. Such a plan, if carried out, would in my opinion afford to the sewers all necessary protection and render them safe against inward pressure. I consider the estimate of the Chief Engineer of Sewers for the Borough of Brooklyn, as to the amount of filling material required (10,000 cubic yards) to be not excessive, and his estimate of cost per cubic yard (70 cents) a reasonable price for this location."

This report of Mr. Provost's sets the matter forth so fully that I present it as embodying my own views.

As to the responsibility for the present condition of these sewers, there seems no question that they were not, when constructed, covered as deeply as good practice would demand, and that since they were built the covering has disappeared, partly by natural erosion and partly by theft, for which it would be difficult to fix the blame.

I think it is of great importance that proper steps should be taken to protect the sewers, to avoid future large expense, and the simplest and best way is to cover them as proposed. The estimate of cost appears to have been carefully made. I know of no other mode of executing the work than by the Department of Sewers—the same being considered as repairs.

SIR—Referring to request of Department of Sewers to Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of September 16, 1899, for an appropriation of \$7,000 for the purpose of covering and protecting certain main sewers in the Twenty-sixth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, reported as exposed to frost action and in dangerous condition, I beg to report that I have examined the said main sewers between the limits stated, and find them, on account of lack of covering and embankment, to be for the most part entirely unprotected from frost action and in many places so unsupported down to and below the springing lines of the arches as to be in constant danger of outward collapse from the weight and pressure of water during heavy storms. Within the past few weeks there have occurred three serious failures of this kind, entailing a total loss of about 300 linear feet of 96-inch sewer and nearly 100 linear feet of 42-inch sewer within the district stated. There can be no question that the work for which the appropriation is asked should be done and immediately.

In discussing the question of how the expense for the work should be met, I would state that the sewers were constructed during the years 1893 and 1894 under special legislation secured by chapter 91, Laws 1889, as amended by chapter 72, Laws 1891, as further amended by chapter 462, Laws of 1892. Since the laws referred to specifically state that the moneys from said fund may be applied only to the construction of the main sewers and the purification plant, and since these sewers have been completed for some years and accepted by the former City of Brooklyn as completed, it would seem that any work to be now done upon them should be considered as repairs and charged against the appropriation allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the Department of Sewers for repairs.

The Department of Sewers claims that, at the time of preparing its Budget for the current year, the necessity of the work in question was not realized, that no allowance was asked therefor, and that from the appropriation allowed it has not sufficient money to perform the work. It therefore asks for \$7,000 additional to the amount appropriated for similar work. It is the intention, I believe, to cover all exposed arches and haunches with earth-filling to a thickness of not less than three feet at any point and to sod the slopes, should the character of the filling material render it desirable. Such a plan if carried out would, in my opinion, afford to the sewers all necessary protection and render them safe against inward pressure. I consider the estimate of the Chief Engineer of Sewers for the Borough of Brooklyn as to the amount of filling material

required (10,000 cubic yards) to be not excessive, and his estimate of cost per cubic yard (70 cents a reasonable price for this location).

The responsibility for the present condition of these sewers is, I believe, a divided one. There seems to be no question that the sewers when constructed were not in many places covered as deeply as good practice would seem to demand, and that where the sewers were constructed over filled ground the haunch embankments were unusually light. There also seems to be no question that much of the material which was deposited around and over these sewers at the time of their construction has through various causes disappeared, perhaps partly by natural erosion and partly by theft as suggested by the Chief Engineer in his statement to the Deputy Commissioner of Sewers. The elevated position of the sewers above the natural grade would render the former cause possible and probable and the value of the sand-filling for building purposes would explain the disappearance of the material by the latter suggested means. The elevated position above the natural surface of many of the main and lateral sewers in this ward will cause them to be a continuing source of trouble for many reasons until the streets in which they lie are permanently graded and paved.

In the matter of the work in question, I would recommend approval of the necessity of the work and of the estimate of its cost as submitted by the Department of Sewers.

DEAR SIR—As Commissioner of the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, I have to call to your attention the fact that the appropriation for the Department for Supplies and Repairs, for the year 1899, including the transfers, was \$249,520, which is \$116,000 less than the appropriation for 1898.

A transfer was made by the Board of Estimate on September 15 of \$4,000 for Lamps and Lighting, but including that transfer, the Department is still very much crippled by the lack of money to fill the necessary and urgent requisitions made upon it.

The balance of the appropriation on the 1st of October was about \$2,000, and the monthly expense account for supplies and repairs of the Department has been about \$30,000 up to the present time. To properly conduct the Department it should be at least that amount for the remaining three months in this year.

I therefore have to request that you will cause to be transferred from some other account where the money is not needed, to the account of Supplies and Repairs of this Department, for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, the sum of \$75,000. I am obliged to make this request for the reason that there is no account in the appropriation of this Department from which I can ask a transfer.

Attached hereto is a memorandum of the approximate cost of labor, materials and supplies for which requisitions have been made upon this department, but for which no orders have been given, for the reason that the money is not appropriated for the purpose.

Each item of these supplies seems absolutely necessary, and the total is more than \$25,000.

I have prepared the modification of said contract of February 4, 1898, which excludes from the supervision of the work upon the construction of said bridge said firm of architects, and by substituting in place and stead thereof the Chief Engineer of this Department.

This is the only modification in this contract, and I respectfully ask that your Honorable Board approve the same.

He says he finds "that in the contract, and under the resolutions of the Board of Parks, Clinton & Russell were employed to prepare the plans, specifications and form of contract and to supervise the work of construction." That "under the operations of the Greater New York Charter a staff of engineers for the purpose of supervising the construction of bridges in this Department is provided and have been appointed, so that the presence of the architects upon this work is not necessary." That he "has had frequent conferences with the architects for the purpose of getting them to withdraw in order that confusion in the construction of the work might be avoided. They have consented to do this provided that the fees to which they are entitled for the preparation of the plans and specifications and such preliminary work in connection therewith as they have done shall be paid them."

The modified contract, presented by the Commissioner for the approval of the Board, only changes the original contract by eliminating the names of Clinton & Russell, architects, who were appointed by the Board of Parks, "to prepare plans and specifications for and supervise the construction of the new bridge across the Harlem river at One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, authorized by chapter 986 of the Laws of 1895," and substituting therefor the Chief Engineer of the Department of Bridges, expressed in the modified contract, as follows:

"By striking from said contract and specifications the word 'architects' whenever and wherever the same occurs in said contract and specifications and substituting therefor the words 'Chief Engineer,' and by striking from the said contract and specifications every other word plural or expression therein, used to denote or intended to describe said architects, and substituting therefor words necessary and proper to designate and describe said Chief Engineer."

To compensate the architects, Messrs. Clinton and Russell, for the work done by them, the modified contract names the sum of three and one-half per cent. of the contract price of said work.

The work of the Engineer is mainly completed when he has worked out his plans, and drawn his specifications, and, in my judgment, three and one-half per cent. of the cost of the work is justly due when they are submitted and approved; I would therefore say that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may, in my opinion, properly approve of that amount, as fixed in the modified contract.

In my opinion the change made by the modification of contract is good in every way, placing the execution of the work in the hands of the Department of Bridges, where it ought to be, and avoiding any confusion that might result under the original contract; and, being agreed upon by all the parties interested, it may properly receive the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The change will result in saving to the City the one and one-half per cent. of the cost, which would otherwise be payable to Messrs. Clinton and Russell, amounting to \$15,029.85.

The proposed modification of contract is drawn in great detail, and appears to me fully to cover everything necessary in such a document.

The work for the completion of the building was duly advertised in the CITY RECORD on carefully drawn plans and specifications, calling for proposals, and that three bids were received, ranging from \$225,459 to \$237,777.

The award was made to the lowest bidder, James J. Loonie, at his bid of \$225,459.

I find no reason why the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should not approve the appropriations, as set forth in the resolutions.

Resolved, That same be and hereby is recommended to the Board of Public Improvements, this city, to cause the necessary proceedings to be instituted toward carrying out the desires of the petitioners as hereinbefore stated; also,

Whereas, At regular meeting of this, the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, held this 6th day of October, 1899, public hearing was afforded to all whom it may concern in relation to petition received by the President of Borough aforesaid, and submitted same for the consideration and favorable action of this Board to have Myrtle avenue, from Flushing and Newtown Turnpike road to Corona avenue, Newtown, Second Ward, said Borough, legally opened; and

Whereas, It appears to this Board that to legally open said avenue from and to the points aforesaid, would be to the best interests of this city; it is accordingly,

Resolved, That same be and hereby is recommended to the Board of Public Improvements, this city, to cause the necessary proceedings to be instituted toward carrying out the desires of the petitioners as hereinbefore stated; also

Whereas, By section 473 of the Charter of the Greater New York, the Municipal Assembly is empowered on recommendation of the Board of Public Improvements to fix and establish a uniform scale of rents and charges for supplying water to The City of New York, and to modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time; and

Whereas, The Water Department of The City of New York continues to charge unequal rates for water supplied from same sources and plants to the inhabitants of same ward wherein such water supply is obtained, to the extent of difference of fifty per cent. additional rates therefor; and

Whereas, The conditions which existed during the former village governments which made such distinction permissible, became totally null and void by its consolidation into the Greater New York; and

Whereas, Nearly two years have elapsed since said union of public interests and obligations were nominally affected, which thereby makes aforementioned discrimination unjustifiable, and is seriously complained of by such of our citizens and tax-payers who are thus made subject to such additional burden of taxation; and therefore,

Resolved, That this, the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, in meeting assembled this 6th day of October, 1899, does hereby recommend to the Municipal Assembly of said city, that it take such prompt action in the foregoing matter as will make the city water rents or charges uniform throughout this borough and city, without further unnecessary delay; and further

Resolved, That certified copy of the foregoing be transmitted to each branch of the Municipal Assembly.

4. The drive shall be used only by persons in pleasure carriages drawn by horses, on bicycles or on horseback, the ride only by persons on horseback; animals to be used on either shall be well broken and constantly held in such control that they may be easily and quickly turned or stopped; they shall not be allowed to move at a rate of speed which shall be alarming or cause danger, nor under any circumstances at a rate of speed on the drive of more than seven miles nor on the ride of over ten miles an hour; and when any Park Keeper shall deem it necessary to safety, good order or the general convenience that the speed of an animal shall be checked or that it should be stopped, or its course altered and shall so direct, by gesture or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the rider or driver of such animal to follow such direction; and no horse or other beast of burden or draft shall be driven or suffered to stand anywhere, except on the drive or ride. Sec. 134. That the owners, lessees, tenants and managers of every blacksmith or other shop, forge, coal yard, foundry, manufactory and premises where any business is done, or in or upon which an engine or boilers are used, shall cause all ashes, cinders, rubbish, dirt and refuse to be removed to some proper place, so that the same shall not accumulate at any of the above-mentioned premises or in the appurtenances thereof, nor the same become filthy or offensive. Nor shall any owner, lessee, tenant, manager, engineer, fireman or any other person cause or allow any smoke, cinders, dust, gas, steam or offensive odor to escape or be discharged from any such building, place or premises; and every furnace employed in the working of engines by steam, or in any mill, factory, printing house, dye factory, iron foundry, glass house, distillery, brew house, sugar refinery, bake house, gas works or in any other buildings used for the purposes of trade or manufacture shall be so constructed as to consume or burn the smoke arising therefrom.

Section 171. That no new burying-ground, cemetery, tomb or vault for dead human bodies shall be established, nor shall the remains of any dead body be placed in any existing burying-ground, vault, tomb or cemetery in The City of New York, nor any of said receptacles be opened, exposed or disturbed, except according to the terms of a permit therefor given by this Department; and every body buried in any such place shall be buried to the depth of six feet below the surface of the ground and four feet below any closely adjacent street, except that in the Borough of Queens a body may be buried to the depth of three feet below the surface of the ground.

No food, beverage or other article for human consumption shall be sold, exposed or offered for sale in any cemetery or burying-ground within The City of New York.
