### AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Tuesday, March 14, 1899, at 11 o'clock A. M.

Present—Commissioners Ryan (President), Ten Eyck, Power and Windolph.  
The minutes of stated meeting of March 7, 1899, were read and approved.  
Commissioner Ten Eyck moved the adoption of the following preamble and resolution:  
Whereas, The Chief Engineer of this Commission, under date of March 9, 1899, has certified that, in his opinion, John J. Hart & Company have completely performed and carried out the provisions of the contract made by them with this Commission on the 27th day of April, 1898, for constructing retaining and stairway masonry, and doing other work pertaining thereto, near Shaft No. 25 of the New Croton Aqueduct, in The City of New York, and has stated from actual measurements the whole amount of work done and materials furnished under and according to the terms of said contract, and of the true value thereof; now, therefore, be it  
Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do accept the work done and materials furnished by John J. Hart & Company, under the contract above referred to, and direct that a proper voucher for the final payment for work done and materials furnished under said contract be approved by the Commissioners and certified to the Comptroller for payment.  
Which was carried by the following vote:  
Affirmative—Commissioners Ryan, Ten Eyck, Power and Windolph—4.  
Commissioner Ten Eyck, as Chairman of the Committee of Finance and Audit, reported the examination and audit of estimate contained in Voucher No. 12,778, amounting to \$2,306.54, and of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 12,779 to 12,790, inclusive, amounting to \$1,599.61.  
Which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:  
Affirmative—Commissioners Ryan, Ten Eyck, Power and Windolph—4.

The following report was received from the Secretary:

NEW YORK, March 14, 1899.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—This is to report that I have received the sum of \$175 from William R. Strong, being the amount agreed upon between him and the Aqueduct Commissioners for the removal, etc., of his dwelling-house and out-buildings situated near the Village of Golden's Bridge, Westchester County, N. Y., which amount has been transmitted to the City Chamberlain for the credit of the "Additional Water Fund," and his receipt is on file.

I have also to report that Mr. Strong has deposited with me the sum of \$100, to be held as a guarantee for the faithful performance of the work of regrading the land about his buildings, as provided for in the minutes of the Commissioners of February 28, 1899.

Commissioner Ten Eyck moved that the contract and specifications for building overflow and blow-off sewers, water pipes and appurtenances, in connection with the Jerome Park Reservoir of the New Croton Aqueduct, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, of The City of New York, be referred to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form and sufficiency.

The following was received from the Chief Engineer:

REPORT NO. 55.

NEW YORK, March 14, 1899.

To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—I hand you herewith a statement of the buildings on the site of the New Croton Reservoir which, I think, should be sold at auction in April with a view of clearing the land taken for the reservoir and of reducing our assessments. In the statement I give approximately the minima values which I would set on the buildings.

The two churches in Katonah and the buildings of Nelson Brothers and possibly one or two buildings in Purdy's Station may be added to this list.

Mr. Dykman, who has been consulted about the advisability of selling the buildings, wrote on the 6th instant: "The buildings referred to in your letter of February 24 have all been measured with one or two exceptions, but they will be measured so that we can sell them early in April. I consider your course in selling these buildings a very wise one for the reason that we must get a reduction in our assessed values."

If you approve of the proposed sale I would respectfully recommend that the auction be held on April 13 and 14, 1899.

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, the President of this Commission be and hereby is authorized and directed to enter into a lease with the owner of the building at the southwest corner of Sixth avenue and West Fifty-fifth street, in said city, for the occupancy of the fourth and mezzanine floors of said building from May 1, 1899, to January 1, 1901 (one year and eight months), at a rental of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) per annum, payable quarterly, at the end of each quarter.
