Also a letter from the Assistant Secretary dated May 2, 1902, calling attention to the provision of chapter 454, Laws of 1902, relating to the "preference and employment of persons upon public work," etc.

From Hon. C. V. Collins, Superintendent Prison Department, dated May 2, 1902,

notifying the Board that the desks and chairs recently ordered have been entered for shipment.

From J. Hampden Dougherty, Commissioner, Department Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in relation to contracts for lighting of public buildings in 1901-02. To be answered.

From Hon. P. J. Scully, City Clerk, forwarding copy of an ordinance, adopted by Board of Aldermen, April 22, 1902, regarding office hours of all public offices in the City.

From Chief Clerk of Manhattan, Bronx and Queens, in regard to the filing of enrollment certificates, etc.

The President made a statement as to certain enrollment certificates recently pre-



sented for filing in the office of the branch office in Manhattan, and as to which there was good reason to suspect fraud.

On motion of Commissioner Dady the President was authorized to take steps to bring the matter to the attention of the District Attorney of the county for such action as that officer might deem proper.

The following preambles and resolution were on motion adopted, viz.:

Whereas, Applications have been and are being made from time to time by parties interested in the manufacture and sale of voting machines of various styles and kinds for adoption by the Board of Elections for use at the elections in this City, some of which machines have been exhibited and others are being prepared for inspection; and

Whereas, The number of voting machines required for this City, if adopted for general use, would call for an expenditure of several hundred thousand dollars, but would—it is claimed—enable the result of elections to be more quickly ascertained and announced than at present through the system of voting by ballots; and

Whereas, All of said machines are manufactured under and subject to letters patent duly issued, and can be purchased by the City only under such conditions as shall be prescribed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; therefore, in view of the foregoing,

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York be and hereby is respectfully requested (when deemed advisable) to prescribe, in compliance with the provisions of section 1554 of the Charter of Greater New York as amended, the conditions for securing a fair and reasonable opportunity for competition in the furnishing of voting machines for use in this City.

The Board then on motion adjourned.

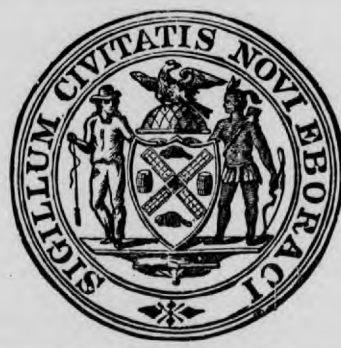

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
