The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Department of Charities:

No. 2377—(S. O. No. 168).

Department of Public Charities,
October 9, 1905.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the last administration in its allowance to this Department for the year 1904 reduced the departmental estimate of supplies \$135,650.41. This, of course, greatly crippled the Department, but by deferring action upon everything which would admit of delay without detriment to the service and by the exercise of the strictest economy the deficiency for the year was kept below \$25,000 which your Honorable Board subsequently voted for the relief of the Department. Now another year has passed away and the conditions are financially much worse. The effect of the past two winters, very unusual as they were for length and severity, has been to largely increase the cares and responsibilities of the Department. For instance: The departmental estimate of supplies for 1905 was based upon an approximated census of 9,755, when in fact, the average daily census for the first six months of 1905 was 10,127, or 372 persons more than the number approximated. On that basis and for that purpose the Department should receive \$38,313.46 more than it asked. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment had of course no reason to contemplate or anticipate the conditions which so largely increased the burdens of the Department and did in fact, reduce the original amount asked, for supplies \$121,318.69.

Increase in the census causes corresponding increase in other directions for supplies, salaries, equipments, etc.

No provision has been made for the board of New York City patients at the New York State Hospital for incipient tuberculosis at Raybrook, N. Y., established last year by authority of the Legislature, and the sum of \$12,000 is needed for that purpose.

The fund for donations to Grand Army Veterans was only \$18,000, while the actual expenditures amounted to \$23,164.64 for the year 1904, hence about \$5,000 is needed to make good the deficit.

Supplementary contracts for flour, provisions, vegetables, coffee and other supplies were opened August 4 and 21, but in the absence of funds applicable thereto, cannot be certified.

Your Honorable Body is therefore most urgently requested to appropriate the sum of \$120,000 and have the same added to the appropriations to this Department for the year 1905 as follows:

Sir—Hon. James H. Tully, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities, in communication under date of October 20, 1905, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock for the following purposes: Municipal Lodging House on East Twenty-fifth street, Manhattan \$99,000 00 Tuberculosis Hospital on Staten Island 2,000,000 00

I would report:

1. Municipal Lodging House \$99,000 00

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at meeting of September 16, 1904, authorized an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$250,000.

"To provide means for the erection of new buildings and additions and improving and permanently bettering and equipping existing buildings under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Public Charities."

And at meeting of the Board held October 7, 1904, \$135,000 was authorized for the same purpose, making a total of \$385,000; of this amount \$210,000 has been anticipated for various improvements, leaving a balance of \$175,000 which is available for the erection of the Municipal Lodging House.

The following bids were received by the Commissioner of Charities for the Municipal Lodging-house:

The Commissioner states that the lowest bid is \$99,000 in excess of the amount available; this statement I do not think is correct; it is a question who is the lowest bidder. For your information I give the full bids of the Church Construction Company and that of Daniel J. Ryan.

If all of the extra work is to be done, the bid of Daniel J. Ryan is the lowest, if not, Church Construction Company is the lowest, but I think it safe to say that part of the extra work will be performed, making the total contract, exclusive of architect's fees, at least \$276,000; adding architect's fees, \$13,800, will make the grand total about \$290,000, which is \$115,000 in excess of the amount (\$175,000) available.

I have gone over the plans and specifications with the Architect, Raymond F. Almira, and he has furnished me with an estimate of \$238,111 (exclusive of architect's fees), which he submitted to the Commissioner of Public Charities on April 4, 1905, and on going over his estimate on September 1, 1905, he re-estimated the cost of the work to be about \$260,000. The lowest bid figures but about 26½ cents per cubic foot, a fair figure considering the expensive foundation.

I concur with the architect, that if the entire limestone and terra cotta were stripped from the front, the cost would not be reduced more than \$10,000. This deduction is small, and I do not think it advisable, for the building as planned only calls for what is strictly necessary and proper for the construction and operation of a building to be used as a municipal lodging-house.

The amount available, \$175,000, not being sufficient, I would request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$115,000, to provide means for the erection

of new buildings and additions and improving and permanently bettering and equipping existing buildings under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Public Charities.

2. Tuberculosis Hospital, Staten Island..... \$2,000,000 00

In communication under date of February 8, 1905, the Commissioner of Public Charities requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$500,000, for building tents, heating plant, etc., to accommodate five hundred (500) consumptives at Farm Colony, Staten Island, and at meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held March 16, 1905, \$200,000 was authorized for this purpose.

It is now proposed, if the request is allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to construct the entire plant, consisting of an administration building, dining-room, chapel, eight ward buildings, Nurses' home, heating plant, etc., to be expended as follows:

About \$800,000 the first year; \$900,000 the second year, and the balance, \$300,000, the last or third year.

In order that the Board may have a full understanding of the scope of the proposed improvements, I add a general description and estimate of the work prepared by and furnished me by the Architect, Mr. Raymond F. Almira.

"The ward buildings are arranged on an arc. In the middle of the arc is the chapel. At one end is the amusement hall, with women help quarters above and the Nurses' Home about one hundred feet (100') north. At the other end of the arc is the power house (which will ultimately serve also the Farm Colony and Poor House buildings) and laundry buildings and ambulance and omnibus house. In the middle of the straight line connecting the ends of the arc is the administration building, and to the south of it, located centrally, is the kitchen and dining hall building. The buildings are generally reinforced concrete throughout, giving a light gray wall surface; red tile roofs, flat and pitched; and light iron and concrete verandahs, the iron to be painted a bluish green.

"The eight ward buildings accommodate one hundred (100) beds each. The wards are arranged as a T, dividing the patients into three groups of twelve beds and two of six, each group separated by glass partitions and arranged for supervision by one person. The roof is a roof garden. Each building is four (4) stories high, with some four (4) feet of space beneath for dryness and the service of pipes. The dimensions are: Length, one hundred and thirty (130') feet; width, thirty (30') feet; height, sixty-five (65') feet.

"The chapel is cruciform in plan in a square of eighty-seven (87) feet a side and forty-five (45) feet high, and will accommodate four hundred (400) people.

"The covered passageway connecting all buildings, has a tunnel beneath for pipes and small industrial car and track service to the several buildings.

"The amusement hall provides facilities for indoor recreations. The dimensions are: Length, one hundred and seventeen (117) feet; width, thirty-two (32) feet; height, thirty (30) feet. On the second floor, accessible by a separate entrance, are the sleeping quarters, toilets and sitting room of the women help.

"The Nurses' Home contains, in addition to the sleeping rooms, toilets and baths, the kitchen and dining room, a small class kitchen and experiment room, a reception room, sitting room and library, which can be thrown into one room for lectures by folding doors. The dimensions are: Length, one hundred and nineteen (119) feet; width, thirty-two (32) feet; height, thirty (30) feet.

"The dining hall divides itself into three (3) rooms, accommodating one thousand (1,000), to provide for the seating of the tent colony as well as the ward patients. It is one story high. The dimensions are: Length, two hundred and forty-six (246) feet; width, forty-five (45) feet; height, twenty (20) feet. The kitchen part contains the general kitchen, bakery, scullery, serving and dish washing, with two small dining rooms for the women and men help, toilets and wash rooms. The dimensions are: Length, eighty-one (81) feet; width, eighty (80) feet; height, thirty (30) feet.

"The Administration Building provides a basement for storage of supplies. The first floor is arranged for general reception rooms, examination rooms, offices for staffs, toilets, etc. The two floors above are divided into medical and surgical wards; in the upper story are located the operating rooms, etherizing and recovery rooms, nurses' rooms, etc. The dimensions of the building are: Length, 141 feet; width, 31 feet; height, 60 feet.

"The power house accommodates the boilers, coal bunkers, machinery, laundry, etc., and pump rooms, and will ultimately serve all the buildings of the Department of Charities located on their Staten Island property. The dimensions of the building are: Length, two hundred and thirty-four (234) feet; width, thirty-three (33) feet; height, twenty-five (25) feet.

"The ambulance and omnibus house provide on the first floor accommodations for ambulances, omnibuses and dead wagon and a small repair shop, and on the second floor the sleeping quarters, sitting room and toilets for the men help. The dimensions are: Length, seventy-eight (78) feet; width, thirty-three (33) feet; height, forty-two (42) feet.

"Approximate estimates of cost of the entire work of building construction if contracted for at one time and under present prices."

Ward building—cubical contents, 360,700 cubic feet; approximately estimated cost at 39½ cents per cubic foot, \$142,476.50, and for eight ward buildings \$1,139,812 00

Chapel—cubical contents, 95,860 cubic feet; approximately estimated cost at 47½ cents per cubic foot..... 45,533 00

Connecting passageway and tunnel under—cubical contents, 449,000 cubic feet; approximately estimated cost, 38 cents per cubic foot..... 170,620 00

Amusement hall and women help quarters above—cubical contents, 112,200 cubic feet; approximately estimated cost at 35 cents per cubic foot.... 39,270 00

Nurses' home—cubical contents, 112,200 cubic feet; approximately estimated cost, 35 cents per cubic foot..... 39,270 00

Dining hall and kitchen building—cubical contents, 446,450 cubic feet; approximately estimated cost at 38 cents per cubic foot..... 169,651 00

Administration building—cubical contents, 262,000 cubic feet; approximately estimated cost at 40 cents per cubic foot..... 104,800 00

Power house and laundry building—cubical contents, 198,000 cubic feet; approximately estimated cost at 32 cents per cubic foot..... 63,360 00

Ambulance and bus house, men help quarters above—cubical contents, 108,000 cubic feet; approximately estimated cost at 35 cents per cubic foot 37,800 00

Power plant, including laundries, equipment—approximately estimated cost 200,000 00

Architect's commissions 100,505 80

Grand total \$2,110,621 80

General.

(a) Total number of beds estimated to be 800.

(b) Cost per bed estimated approximately \$2,500.

(c) Cost of entire work of building construction, less the architect's fees, \$2,000,000.

The general scheme of providing a suitable hospital of easy access to accommodate the tuberculosis poor of the City, and relieve the general hospitals from the care and treatment of those patients, should in my opinion be favorably considered by the Board.

The arrangement and general plan of the building as shown on the general drawings of the architect, I consider good; they have been arranged to give the maximum sun exposure from the south, east and west and provide for the best circulation of fresh air.

The Commissioner requests that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the full amount, \$2,000,000, for the completion of all the buildings, and I see no reason why the City should not commit itself to the general scheme as outlined by the architect, and I would so recommend, but as it is impossible to expend all of the money within a year or two, I would suggest to only provide for a portion of the plant; there being at present \$200,000 available for the purpose, I would suggest that \$800,000 be authorized by the Board, making a total of \$1,000,000; this will provide for the erection of the administration building, four of the eight ward buildings, power house and plant, ambulance station, connecting passageways and tunnel, nurses' home and dining hall.

Therefore, if the financial condition of the City warrants the expenditure, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller,

pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$800,000 to provide for the erection and completion of a New York City Tuberculosis Hospital on Staten Island, Borough of Richmond.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of eight hundred thousand dollars (\$800,000) in addition to the amount heretofore authorized, to provide means for the erection of new buildings, additions, improving, permanently bettering and equipping existing buildings under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Charities.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 27, 1905, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding eight hundred thousand dollars (\$800,000), in addition to the amount heretofore authorized, to provide means for the erection of new buildings, additions, improving, permanently bettering and equipping existing buildings under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Charities, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding eight hundred thousand dollars (\$800,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Alderman McCall moved the adoption of the ordinance.

1. Municipal Lodging-house \$99,000 00

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at meeting of September 16, 1904, authorized an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$250,000.

"To provide means for the erection of new buildings and additions, and improving and permanently bettering and equipping existing buildings under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Public Charities."

—and at a meeting of the Board held October 7, 1904, \$135,000 was authorized for the same purpose, making a total of \$385,000; of this amount \$210,000 has been anticipated for various improvements, leaving a balance of \$175,000, which is available for the erection of the Municipal Lodging-house.

The Commissioner states that the lowest bid is \$99,000 in excess of the amount available. This statement I do not think is correct. It is a question who is the lowest bidder. For your information I give the full bids of the Church Construction Company and that of Daniel J. Ryan:

If all of the extra work is to be done the bid of Daniel J. Ryan is the lowest; if not, Church Construction Company is the lowest; but I think it safe to say that part of the extra work will be performed, making the total contract, exclusive of architects' fees, at least \$276,000; adding architects' fees, \$13,800, will make the grand total about \$290,000, which is \$115,000 in excess of the amount (\$175,000) available.

I have gone over the plans and specifications with the architect, Raymond F. Almirall, and he has furnished me with an estimate of \$238,111 (exclusive of architects' fees), which he submitted to the Commissioner of Public Charities on April 4, 1905, and on going over his estimate on September 1, 1905, he re-estimated the cost of the work to be about \$260,000. The lowest bid figures out about 26½ cents per cubic foot, a fair figure considering the expensive foundation.

I concur with the architect that if the entire limestone and terracotta were stripped from the front, the cost would not be reduced more than \$10,000. This deduction is small, and I do not think it advisable, for the building, as planned, only calls for what is strictly necessary and proper for the construction and operation of a building to be used as a Municipal Lodging House.

The amount available, \$175,000, not being sufficient, I would request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$115,000, to provide means for the erection of new buildings and additions, and improving and permanently bettering and equipping existing buildings under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Public Charities.

2. Tuberculosis Hospital, Staten Island \$2,000,000 00

In communication under date of February 8, 1905, the Commissioner of Public Charities requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$500,000 for building tents, heating plant, etc., to accommodate five hundred (500) consumptives at Farm Colony, Staten Island, and at meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held March 16, 1905, \$200,000 was authorized for this purpose.

It is now proposed, if the request is allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to construct the entire plant, consisting of an administration building, dining room, chapel, eight ward buildings, Nurses' home, heating plant, etc., to be expended as follows:

About \$800,000 the first year, \$900,000 the second year, and the balance, \$300,000, the last or third year.

In order that the Board may have a full understanding of the scope of the proposed improvements, I add a general description and estimate of the work prepared by and furnished me by the architect, Mr. Raymond F. Almirall:

"The ward buildings are arranged on an arc: in the middle of the arc is the chapel. At one end is the amusement hall, with women help quarters above and the Nurses' home about one hundred feet (100') north. At the other end of the arc is the power-house (which will ultimately serve also the Farm Colony and Poor-house buildings) and laundry buildings and ambulance and omnibus house. In the middle of the straight line connecting the ends of the arc is the administration building, and to the south of it, located centrally is the kitchen and dining hall building. The buildings are generally reinforced concrete throughout, giving a light gray wall surface; red tile roofs, flat and pitched, and light iron and concrete verandas, the iron to be painted a bluish green.

"The eight ward buildings accommodate one hundred (100) beds each. The wards are arranged as a T, dividing the patients into three groups of twelve beds and two of six, each group separated by glass partitions and arranged for supervision by one person. The roof is a roof garden. Each building is four (4) stories high, with some four (4) feet of space beneath for dryness and the service of pipes. The dimensions are: Length, one hundred and thirty feet (130'); width, thirty feet (30'); height, sixty-five feet (65').

"The chapel is cruciform in plan, in a square of eighty-seven feet (87') a side and forty-five feet (45') high, and will accommodate four hundred (400) people.

"The covered passageway, connecting all buildings, has a tunnel beneath for pipes and small industrial car and track service to the several buildings.

"The amusement hall provides facilities for indoor recreations. The dimensions are: Length, one hundred and seventeen feet (117'); width, thirty-two feet (32'); height, thirty feet (30'). On the second floor, accessible by a separate entrance, are the sleeping quarters, toilets and sitting room of the women help.

"The Nurses' home contains in addition to the sleeping rooms, toilets and baths, the kitchen and dining room, a small class kitchen and experiment room, a reception room, sitting room and library, which can be thrown into one room for lectures by folding doors. The dimensions are: Length, one hundred and nineteen feet (119'); width, thirty-two feet (32'); height, thirty feet (30').

"The dining hall divides itself into three (3) rooms, accommodating one thousand (1,000), to provide for the seating of the tent colony as well as the ward patients. It is one story high. The dimensions are: Length, two hundred and forty-six feet (246'); width, forty-five feet (45'); height, twenty feet (20'). The kitchen part contains the general kitchen, bakery, scullery, serving and dish washing, with two small dining rooms for the women and men help, toilets and wash rooms. The dimensions are: Length, eighty-one feet (81'); width, eighty feet (80'); height, thirty feet (30').

"The administration building provides a basement for storage of supplies. The first floor is arranged for general reception rooms, examination rooms, offices for staffs, toilets, etc. The two floors above are divided into medical and surgical wards; in the upper story are located the operating rooms, etherizing and recovery rooms, Nurses' rooms, etc. The dimensions of the building are: Length, one hundred and forty-one feet (141'); width, thirty-one feet (31'); height, sixty feet (60').

"The power-house accommodates the boilers, coal bunkers, machinery, laundry, etc., and pump rooms and will ultimately serve all the buildings of the Department of Charities located on their Staten Island property. The dimensions of the building are: Length, two hundred and thirty-four feet (234'); width, thirty-three feet (33'); height, twenty-five feet (25').

"The ambulance and omnibus house provide on the first floor accommodations for ambulances, omnibuses and dead wagon and a small repair shop, and on the second floor the sleeping quarters, sitting room and toilets for the men help. The dimensions are: Length, seventy-eight (78) feet, width thirty-three (33) feet, height forty-two (42) feet.

"Approximate estimates of cost of the entire work of building construction if contracted for at one time and under present prices."

The general scheme of providing a suitable hospital of easy access to accommodate the tuberculosis poor of the City and relieve the general hospitals from the care and treatment of these patients should in my opinion be favorably considered by the Board.

The arrangement and general plan of the building, as shown on the general drawings of the architect, I consider good; they have been arranged to give the maximum sun exposure from the south, east and west, and provide for the best circulation of fresh air.

The Commissioner requests that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the full amount, \$2,000,000, for the completion of all the buildings, and I see no reason why the City should not commit itself to the general scheme as outlined by the architect, and I would so recommend, but as it is impossible to expend all of the money within a year or two I would suggest to only provide for a portion of the

plant. There being at present \$200,000 available for the purpose, I would suggest that \$800,000 be authorized by the Board, making a total of \$1,000,000. This will provide for the erection of the administration building, four of the eight-ward buildings, power house and plant, ambulance station, connecting passageways and tunnel, Nurses' home and dining hall.

Therefore, if the financial condition of the City warrants the expenditure, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock, to the amount of \$800,000, to provide for the erection and completion of a New York City Tuberculosis Hospital on Staten Island, Borough of Richmond.

As noted in a communication from Commissioner Featherston to James W. Stevenson, Esq., Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of July 20, 1905, and a second communication from said Commissioner to the Comptroller, under date of September 25, 1905, the reason for the request is that with the establishment of the Staten Island Municipal Ferry, to be operated under the direction of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, there will be need of a somewhat increased staff in the Dock Department of expert Mechanical Engineers.

The character of employment of these engineers is similar to that of engineers in other departments, where work of skilled examination and supervision is required. The boats of the new Staten Island Municipal Ferry will be of the highest type built, and it will be necessary to maintain them at the highest efficiency. Their machinery is of the most costly kind, demanding high-class supervision.

By the creation of these positions the Commissioner believes that he will be in a position to employ necessary skilled assistance in proper gradation to suit the needs of the new work to be done in his Department. The maximum salary requested by Commissioner Featherston, namely, \$4,000, is reasonable, as compared with similar salaries paid in other departments to employees of a similar character.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the grades be established as requested by the Commissioner.

Sir—I hereby respectfully request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of the position of Mechanical Engineer for this Department, with grades as follows: \$1,500, \$1,800, \$2,100, \$2,400, \$2,700, \$3,000, \$3,300, \$3,600 and \$4,000 per annum.

In connection with the operation of the municipal ferry between the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, it will be necessary for this Department to assign a Mechanical Engineer to take responsible charge of the ferry boats when completed, as well as of the old boats which the City will become possessed of as soon as the municipal ferry is placed in operation.

There are at the present time established for this Department grades for the position of Mechanical Engineer at \$1,500, \$1,800 and \$2,700 per annum. It will be noted that between the rates of \$1,800 and \$2,700 there are no intervening grades, and an increase from \$1,800 to \$2,700 might be too high. At the same time the rate of \$2,700 per annum would be insufficient for a Mechanical Engineer taking responsible charge of the ferry boats, as the duties which he will be required to perform are of a very responsible character. The new ferry boats are of modern build and are different in character to any now in use, and require a thorough knowledge on the part of the Mechanical Engineer in charge of them, with the modern types of machinery such as will be contained in these boats; all of which would warrant a higher salary.

At the present time it is absolutely impossible to definitely determine the exact number of employees that will be required in connection with the operation of the ferry, and in order that the Department may not be hampered when the actual operation commences, the request for the establishment of the grades as stated above, is made.

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 189 of the Revised Ordinances of 1897, in relation to awnings.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 189 of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended so as to read as follows: Awnings of tin or other light metal or canvas may be erected across the sidewalk of any of the streets of New York except Broadway, Fifth avenue, Madison avenue and the Bowery, and those parts of Lexington avenue which are distant 200 feet from any intersecting cross street upon which a surface car is operated, provided any and every awning shall not be higher than the floor of the second story of the building, the first floor being the ground floor, but in no case to be covered with wood; and every such awning that may be built on Lexington avenue shall be constructed of steel with glass roof, and every awning or water shed of any kind covering one-half, or more than one-half, or less than the full width of the sidewalk shall have connected therewith a gutter and leader of material and size sufficient for conducting the water from the same to the outer line of the curbstone; a penalty of \$5 for each day such awning or water shed shall remain without such appurtenances to be imposed.

Sec. 2. All awnings erected hereunder, or under and pursuant to this section, shall be erected only with the consent and subject to the supervision of the President of the Borough wherein such awnings are to be erected.

Sec. 3. Any person, firm or corporation erecting any awning hereunder shall be liable for all loss or damage that may happen or come by reason of the erection and maintenance of such awning.

Sec. 4. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the revocation by the Board of Aldermen of the license to erect any awning hereunder.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they therefore recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

The application of the Roman Catholic Church of St. Mary, in Clifton, for leave to enlarge its burying ground.

To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The petition of James F. Mee respectfully shows:

That he is the pastor of the Roman Catholic Church of St. Mary, in Clifton, a religious corporation, located at Rosebank, in the Fourth Ward of the Borough of Richmond, City and State of New York, and as such is in charge of the property of such corporation.

That said religious corporation owns and maintains a burying ground for the burial of the dead of the church parish, which burying ground is located on Parkinson avenue, Grasmere, in the said Fourth Ward of the Borough of Richmond, City and State aforesaid.

That such burying ground contains about eight acres of land, and has been owned, maintained and used by the said the Roman Catholic Church of St. Mary, in Clifton, for many years.

That by reason of such long and continued use of such burying ground for burial purposes by said religious corporation as aforesaid the said burying ground has become filled up or spaces therein sold to different persons and families for the exclusive use, so that there is no longer sufficient or adequate room for the further burial of the dead of such parish, and more particularly for the allotting and setting apart of single graves in said burying ground, by reason of all of which it has become and is necessary to provide other and additional ground for burial purposes, to the end that the parishioners of said church may be properly interred according to the precepts of the Roman Catholic Church.

That the said the Roman Catholic Church of St. Mary is the owner of and in possession of the following described property:

All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land, situate in the Town of Southfield, County of Richmond, in the State of New York, known and designated on a certain map entitled "Supreme Court Sale in Partition of the Estate of Leonard Parkinson on Staten Island," and filed in the office of the Clerk of the County of Richmond as Lot No. 15, containing three and seven hundred and ninety-eight one-thousandths (3,798-1,000) acres of land, be the same more or less, and bounded northerly by Lot No. 14, easterly by Parkinson avenue as laid down on said map, and southerly and westerly by the Old Town road.

That said plot is approximately adjacent to the burying ground aforesaid.

That the burying ground aforesaid is situated on an elevation which slopes gradually southward to the waters of the Lower Bay of New York.

That almost all the land to the south of said plot as far as to said bay consists of salt marsh.

That no stream or brook flows through said plot nor does any water course or source of water supply flow through said plot.

That the only house or habitation in the immediate vicinity of said plot does not lie in the course of the natural drain from said land, but does lie in the course of the drain from the original cemetery plot as it now exists.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that the Roman Catholic Church of St. Mary, in Clifton, may have leave to add said plot of ground to its present burying ground and make the same a part thereof for the purpose of interring human bodies therein.

The Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, to whom was referred on April 25, 1905 (Minutes, page 236), the annexed ordinance in relation to public hacks and hackmen, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to public hacks and hackmen.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Article I.—Public Hacks and Hackmen.

Section 1. Any vehicle kept for hire shall be deemed a public hack, and a vehicle intended to seat two persons inside shall be deemed a cab, and a vehicle intended to seat four persons inside shall be deemed a coach, and the term hackman shall be deemed to include owner or driver or both.

Sec. 2. None but licensed hacks shall use the designated public hack stands in the City. The owner of any hack not intended to use the public stands and having the written consent of the owner or lessee of the premises, in the discretion of the Mayor or the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, may be specially licensed and permitted to use temporarily a portion of the street in front of said premises as a stand, and shall be confined to carrying passengers from said premises.

Sec. 3. The owner of hacks specially licensed shall, in addition to the lawful fees hereinbefore provided, pay annually an additional fee of \$25 for each hack allowed any stand other than a public hack stand, and no other licensed hackman shall come upon or use said stand.

Sec. 4. The legal rates of fare, of which an official copy shall be furnished by the Bureau of Licenses and carried by every licensed hackman, shall be as follows:

Mileage Rates Charged for General Driving.

Cabs—	
For one mile or any part thereof.....	\$0 50
For each additional half mile or part thereof.....	25
For any stop over five minutes in a trip, for every fifteen minutes or fraction thereof.....	25
Coaches—	
For one mile or any part thereof.....	1 00
For each additional half mile or any part thereof.....	50
For any stop over five minutes in a trip, for every fifteen minutes or fraction thereof.....	40

Hourly Rates.

These hourly rates are to apply only to shopping or calling, and shall not include park or road driving, nor driving for more than three miles from the starting point.

Cabs—	
For one hour or any part thereof.....	\$1 00
For each additional half hour or part thereof.....	50
Coaches—	
For one hour or any part thereof.....	1 50
For each additional half hour or any part thereof.....	75

Sec. 5. Ferriage and bridge tolls in all cases to be paid by the parties using the vehicles.

Sec. 6. Twenty blocks north or south to constitute one mile; seven blocks east or west to constitute one mile.

Sec. 7. Every hack shall be provided with a suitable lamp on each side and shall have securely fastened across the middle of the outside of each lamp a metal band not less than two inches in width, out of which the official number of the license shall be cut after the manner of a stencil plate, the component figures of such numbers to be not less than one and one-half inches in height, and the style of the whole to be approved by the Mayor or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses. Every licensed hack shall have the official number of the license legibly engraved or embossed upon a metal plate and affixed inside, as designated and approved by the Mayor or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, and no licensed hack shall carry or have affixed to it, inside or outside, any number except the official number as aforesaid.

Sec. 8. Every licensed hackman, immediately after the termination of any hiring or employment, must carefully search such hack for any property lost or left therein, and any such property, unless sooner claimed or delivered to the owner, must be taken to the nearest police station and deposited with the officer in charge within twenty-four hours after the finding thereof, and in addition, a written notice with brief particulars and description of the property must be forwarded at once to the Bureau of Licenses.

Sec. 9. Every licensed hackman shall have the right to demand payment of the legal fare in advance, and may refuse employment unless so prepaid, but no licensed hackman shall otherwise refuse or neglect to convey any orderly person or persons upon request anywhere in the City unless previously engaged or unable so to do. No licensed hackman shall carry any other person than the passenger first employing a hack without the consent of said passenger.

Sec. 10. All vehicles for hire shall be licensed and the owner thereof shall pay the sum of two dollars with his original application as the license fee for each and every vehicle so kept for hire, and one dollar for each vehicle for annual renewals.

Sec. 11. Failure to pay the lawful rate of fare, where no agreement has been made, or to pay the agreed amount where an agreement has been made, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars or by imprisonment for not more than ten days or both.

Article II.—Public Hack Stands.

Section 1. Any duly licensed hackney coach or cab shall stand while waiting for employment at any of the following places and for the periods of time hereafter provided:

- Stand No. 1—South Ferry, foot of Whitehall street, along the Park.
- Stand No. 2—Broadway, around Bowling Green.
- Stand No. 3—In Barclay street, west of Washington street.
- Stand No. 4—In Murray street, between Washington and West streets.
- Stand No. 5—In Broad street, from Stock Exchange to Beaver street; one line in centre of street.
- Stand No. 6—At Fulton Ferry, along the Market side, south and east.
- Stand No. 7—Broadway, from north side of Beekman street, to Chambers street, and Chambers street, from Broadway to west side of New Court-house, Park side.
- Stand No. 8—In Canal street, west of Washington street.
- Stand No. 9—In Chatham square.
- Stand No. 10—North, west and south sides of Union square.
- Stand No. 11—North, west and south sides of Madison square.
- Stand No. 12—The vacant squares, junction of Broadway and Sixth avenue, Thirty-second and Thirty-fifth streets.
- Stand No. 13—On Fourth avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-second streets, each side of the cut to the tunnel.
- Stand No. 14—At the junction of Broadway and Seventh avenue on the squares, Forty-third to Forty-seventh street.
- Stand No. 15—On the north side of Fortieth and south side of Forty-second streets, from Fifth avenue to Sixth avenue.
- Stand No. 16—On Fifty-ninth street, north side, from Fifth avenue to a point 100 feet east of Eighth avenue.
- Stand No. 17—At all ferries.
- Stand No. 18—At all passenger steamboat landings, fifteen minutes before the usual time of arrival of such passenger steamboats.
- Stand No. 19—At all theatres and other places of public amusement, fifteen minutes before the conclusion of the performance.

Stand No. 20—At all railroad depots, five minutes prior to the arrival of passenger trains, licensed owners and drivers may solicit passengers without their vehicles, except that at the Grand Central Depot such hackmen shall not stand on the sidewalk more than three feet within the curb.

Stand No. 21—Broadway, opposite St. Paul's Church, from 5 p. m. until sunrise.

Stand No. 22—On all street corners, from 10 p. m. until sunrise.

Stand No. 23—South side of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, between Ninth and Manhattan avenues.

Stand No. 24—North side of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, from the corner of Eighth avenue three hundred feet east.

Stand No. 25—North side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, to extend a distance of one hundred feet west of Eighth avenue.

Stand No. 26—North side of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, from the corner of Eighth avenue three hundred feet east.

Stand No. 27—West side of Third avenue, near the Fordham station of the New York and Harlem Railroad, extending southerly about one hundred feet from the southerly intersection of Pelham avenue.

Stand No. 28—Every elevated railroad station in The City of New York shall be deemed a public cab stand, and public cabs and coaches shall be and are hereby authorized to stand on the street corners at such places.

Stand No. 29—Park avenue, from Sixtieth street to Sixty-first street, and Seventy-second to Seventy-third street.

Stand No. 30—Fifth avenue, Sixtieth to Sixty-second street, on west side of avenue, and Seventy-first to Seventy-second and Seventy-second to Seventy-third streets, on west side of avenue.

Stand No. 31—Fifth avenue, Eighty-first to Eighty-second street, and from Ninetieth to Ninety-first street, on west side of avenue.

Stand No. 32—Sixty-third street, from Broadway to Columbus avenue, north side.

Stand No. 33—From Sixty-third to Sixty-fourth street on Broadway, west side.

Stand No. 34—Sixty-sixth street, between Broadway and Columbus avenue, south side.

Stand No. 35—Sixty-fifth to Sixty-sixth street on Broadway, east side; Amsterdam avenue, Seventy-second to Seventy-third street, on west side.

Stand No. 36—South side of Seventy-third street, between Broadway and Amsterdam avenue.

Stand No. 37—From Seventy-ninth to Eighty-first street on Columbus avenue, east side.

Stand No. 38—On Eighty-first street, from Columbus avenue to a point one hundred feet east of Columbus avenue.

Stand No. 39—Sherman square, north side of Seventieth street, from Amsterdam avenue to Broadway.

Stand No. 40—West side of Broadway, from Seventieth street to Seventy-first street.

Stand No. 41—Amsterdam avenue, from Seventieth to Seventy-first street, east side.

Stand No. 42—All Subway stations.

Stand No. 43—North side of Fifty-eighth street, west of Fifth avenue and the Plaza Circle, facing north.

Sec. 2. That not more than two cabs or coaches shall stand at any such station (meaning thereby the uptown or downtown station), and they shall not impede or obstruct proper access to and from the stairways at such stations.

Article III.—Penalties.

Section 1. Any person violating any of the provisions hereof, except those of Article I, section 10, upon conviction thereof by the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, either upon confession of the party or by competent testimony, may be fined for such offense any sum not less than one dollar, nor more than ten dollars, and in default of payment of such fine within five days the license of such person may be revoked.

Article IV.—Repeal of Inconsistent Ordinances, etc.

Section 1. Conflicting ordinances repealed. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, including section 6 of Article IV. of the ordinance in relation to Rules of the Road, adopted by the Board of Aldermen and approved by the Mayor on December 14, 1903, are hereby repealed.

Article V.—When to Take Effect.

Section 1. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be adopted, with the following amendment: Substitute for section 3, Article I, the words:

"Sec. 3. No hackney coach, carriage or cab, which shall be specially licensed by virtue of the provisions of this ordinance shall make use or come upon any stand that is now or may be hereafter designated as a hackney coach stand, or at any other place in The City of New York, except in front of or adjacent to any hotel or hotels, or at any other place which may be designated by the Mayor, and which may be used as a stand, with the approval and consent of the persons occupying the premises in front of which said coaches, carriages or cabs are to be permitted and allowed by the authority of the Mayor, as aforesaid, provided that the owner or driver of any such coach, carriage or cab shall not solicit nor take any passenger or passengers on the streets, but shall confine themselves solely to and for the use of the guests of said hotel or hotels."

AN ORDINANCE in relation to public hacks and hackmen.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Article I.—Public Hacks and Hackmen.

Section 1. Any vehicle kept for hire shall be deemed a public hack and a vehicle intended to seat two persons inside shall be deemed a cab, and a vehicle intended to seat four persons inside shall be deemed a coach, and the term hackman shall be deemed to include owner or driver, or both.

Sec. 2. None but licensed hacks shall use the designated public hack stands in the City. The owner of any hack not intended to use the public stands and having the written consent of the owner or lessee of the premises, in the discretion of the Mayor or the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, may be specially licensed and permitted to use temporarily a portion of the street in front of said premises as a stand, and shall be confined to carrying passengers from said premises.

Sec. 3. The owner of hacks specially licensed shall in addition to the lawful fees hereinbefore provided, pay annually an additional fee of \$25 for each hack allowed any stand other than a public hack stand, and no other licensed hackman shall come upon or use said stand.

Sec. 4. The legal rates of fare, of which an official copy shall be furnished by the Bureau of Licenses and carried by every licensed hackman, shall be as follows:

Mileage rates charged for general driving.

Cabs—	
For one mile or any part thereof.....	\$0 50
For each additional half mile or part thereof.....	25
For any stop over five minutes in a trip, for every fifteen minutes or fraction thereof.....	25
Coaches—	
For one mile or any part thereof.....	1 00
For each additional half mile or any part thereof.....	50
For every stop over five minutes in a trip, for every fifteen minutes or fraction thereof.....	40

Hourly rates—These hourly rates, except by special agreement, are to apply only to shopping or calling and shall not include park or road driving, nor driving for more than three miles from the starting point:

Cabs—	
For one hour or any part thereof.....	\$1 00
For each additional half hour or part thereof.....	50
Coaches—	
For one hour or any part thereof.....	1 50
For each additional half hour or any part thereof.....	75

For driving around Central Park the charge shall be \$3, where the starting point is between Twenty-third street and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street; if the starting point is below Twenty-third street, or north of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, an additional charge of 50 cents, for each mile or fraction thereof, shall be paid.

For driving around Central Park and Riverside drive, where the starting point is between Twenty-third street and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, the charge shall be \$4; if the starting point is below Twenty-third street or north of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, an additional charge of 50 cents for each mile or fraction thereof shall be paid.

On all park drives one half hour shall be allowed for sight seeing, without extra compensation.

Sec. 5. Ferriage and bridge tolls in all cases to be paid by the parties using the vehicles.

Sec. 6. Twenty blocks north and south to constitute a mile; seven blocks between the numbered and lettered avenues will be deemed a mile, as from Avenue B to Sixth avenue, or from Second avenue to Ninth avenue.

Sec. 7. Every hack shall be provided with a suitable lamp on each side and shall have securely fastened across the middle of the outside of each lamp a metal band not less than two inches in width, out of which the official number of the license shall be cut after the manner of a stencil plate, the component figures of such numbers to be not less than one and one-half inches in height, and the style of the whole to be approved by the Mayor or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses. Every licensed hack shall have the official number of the license legibly engraved or embossed upon a metal plate and affixed inside, as designated and approved by the Mayor or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, and no licensed hack shall carry or have affixed to it, inside or outside, any number except the official number as aforesaid.

Sec. 8. Every licensed hackman, immediately after the termination of any hiring or employment, must carefully search such hack for any property lost or left therein, and any such property, unless sooner claimed or delivered to the owner, must be taken to the nearest police station and deposited with the officer in charge within twenty-four hours after the finding thereof, and in addition a written notice, with brief particulars and description of the property, must be forwarded at once to the Bureau of Licenses.

Sec. 9. Every licensed hackman shall have the right to demand payment of the legal fare in advance, and may refuse employment unless so prepaid, but no licensed hackman shall otherwise refuse or neglect to convey any orderly person or persons upon request anywhere in the city unless previously engaged or unable to do so. No licensed hackman shall carry any other person than the passenger first employing a hack without the consent of said passenger.

Sec. 10. All vehicles for hire shall be licensed, and the owner thereof shall pay the sum of two dollars with his original application as the license fee for each and every vehicle so kept for hire, and one dollar for each vehicle for annual renewals.

Sec. 11. All disputes as to the lawful rate of fare, where no agreement has been made, and all refusals to pay the agreed amount where an agreement is claimed, shall be determined by the police officer in charge of the police station nearest to the place where such dispute is had, and, except in the case of a freeholder or householder in The City of New York, failure to comply with such determination shall subject the offending party to a charge of disorderly conduct, punishable by a fine of not exceeding ten dollars, or in default thereof imprisonment for not more than ten days.

Article II.—Public Hack Stands.

Section 1. Any duly licensed hackney coach or cab shall stand while waiting for employment at any of the following places and for the periods of time hereafter provided:

- Stand No. 1—South Ferry, foot of Whitehall street, along the park.
- Stand No. 2—Broadway, around Bowling Green.
- Stand No. 3—In Barclay street, west of Washington street.
- Stand No. 4—In Murray street, between Washington and West streets.
- Stand No. 5—In Broad street, from Stock Exchange to Beaver street; one line in centre of street.
- Stand No. 6—At Fulton Ferry, along the Market side, south and east.
- Stand No. 7—Broadway, from north side of Beekman street to Chambers street, and Chambers street from Broadway to west side of new Court-house, park side.
- Stand No. 8—In Canal street, west of Washington street.
- Stand No. 9—In Chatham square.
- Stand No. 10—North, west and south sides of Union square.
- Stand No. 11—North, west and south sides of Madison square.
- Stand No. 12—The vacant square, junction of Broadway and Sixth avenue, Thirty-second and Thirty-fifth streets.
- Stand No. 13—On Fourth avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-second streets, each side of the cut to the tunnel.
- Stand No. 14—At the junction of Broadway and Seventh avenue on the squares, Forty-third to Forty-seventh street.
- Stand No. 15—On the north side of Fortieth and south side of Forty-second streets, from Fifth avenue to Sixth avenue.
- Stand No. 16—On Fifty-ninth street, north side from Fifth avenue to a point 100 feet east of Eighth avenue.
- Stand No. 17—At all ferries.
- Stand No. 18—At all passenger steamboat landings, fifteen minutes before the usual time of arrival of such passenger steamboats.
- Stand No. 19—At all theatres and other places of public amusement fifteen minutes before the conclusion of the performance.
- Stand No. 20—At all railroad depots, five minutes prior to the arrival of passenger trains, licensed owners and drivers may solicit passengers without their vehicles, except that at the Grand Central Depot such hackmen shall not stand on the sidewalk more than three feet within the curb.
- Stand No. 21—Broadway, opposite St. Paul's Church, from 5 p. m. until sunrise.
- Stand No. 22—On all street corners, from 10 p. m. until sunrise.
- Stand No. 23—South side of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, between Ninth and Manhattan avenues.
- Stand No. 24—North side of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, from the corner of Eighth avenue 300 feet east.
- Stand No. 25—North side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, to extend a distance of 100 feet west of Eighth avenue.
- Stand No. 26—North side of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, from the corner of Eighth avenue 300 feet east.
- Stand No. 27—West side of Third avenue, near the Fordham Station of the New York and Harlem Railroad, extending southerly about 100 feet from the southerly intersection of Pelham avenue.
- Stand No. 28—Every elevated railroad station in The City of New York shall be deemed a public cab stand, and public cabs and coaches shall be and are hereby authorized to stand on the street corners at such places.
- Stand No. 29—Park avenue, from Sixtieth street to Sixty-first street, and Seventy-second to Seventy-third street, on west side of tunnel.
- Stand No. 30—Fifth avenue, Sixtieth to Sixty-second street, on west side of avenue, and Seventy-first to Seventy-second and Seventy-second to Seventy-third street, on west side of avenue.
- Stand No. 31—Fifth avenue, Eighty-first to Eighty-second street, and from Ninetieth to Ninety-first street, on west side of avenue.
- Stand No. 32—Sixty-third street, from Broadway to Columbus avenue, north side.
- Stand No. 33—From Sixty-third to Sixty-fourth street, on Broadway, west side.
- Stand No. 34—Sixty-sixth street, between Broadway and Columbus avenue, south side.

Stand No. 35—Sixty-fifth to Sixty-sixth street, on Broadway, east side; Amsterdam avenue, Seventy-second to Seventy-third street, on west side.

Stand No. 36—South side of Seventy-third street, between Broadway and Amsterdam avenue.

Stand No. 37—From Seventy-ninth to Eighty-first street, on Columbus avenue, east side.

Stand No. 38—On Eighty-first street, from Columbus avenue to a point 100 feet east of Columbus avenue.

Stand No. 39—Sherman square, north side of Seventieth street, from Amsterdam avenue to Broadway.

Stand No. 40—West side of Broadway, from Seventieth street to Seventy-first street.

Stand No. 41—Amsterdam avenue, from Seventieth to Seventy-first street, east side.

Stand No. 42—All subway stations.

Stand No. 43—Northwest side of Plaza, between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets.

Sec. 2. That not more than two cabs or coaches shall stand at any such station (meaning thereby the uptown or downtown station), and they shall not impede or obstruct proper access to and from the stairways at such stations.

Article III.—Penalties.

Section 1. Any person violating any of the provisions hereof, except those of Article I., section 11, upon conviction thereof by the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, or Deputy Chief, either upon confession of the party or by competent testimony, may be fined for such offense any sum not more than ten dollars, or be subject to the suspension or revocation of his license in the discretion of the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, or Deputy Chief, with the approval of the Mayor.

Article IV.—Repeal of Inconsistent Ordinances.

Section 1. Conflicting ordinances repealed. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Article V.—When to Take Effect.

Section 1. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Municipal Civil Service Commission,
No. 61 Elm Street,
New York, October 4, 1905.

A meeting of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held on Wednesday, October 4, 1905, at 10 a. m. at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street.

All the Commissioners were present.

The minutes of the meeting held September 29 were approved.

The Committee on Transfers recommended that the following transfers be approved:

Daniel B. Dwinell, from the position of Attendant to that of Watchman in the Department of Docks and Ferries.

John Noonan, from the position of Watchman to that of Attendant in the Department of Docks and Ferries.

William T. Doyle, from the position of Architectural Draughtsman in the Board of Education to a similar position in the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission.

William A. Leonard, from the position of Attendant in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan to a similar position in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

And that the following requests for transfers be denied:

William A. Danes, Boatman in the Department of Docks and Ferries to the position of Watchman.

Dr M. S. Gregory, from the position of Physician in Bellevue Hospital to that of Alienist.

The recommendations of the Committee on Transfers were adopted.

The Committee on Reinstatements recommended that the reinstatement of the following named persons be approved:

Thomas R. Brown, Janitor in the Board of Education, he having been off the pay-roll since April 1, 1905.

Charles T. Mellen, Janitor in the Board of Education, he having resigned from that position on August 29, 1905.

George W. Thatcher, Janitor-Engineer in the Board of Education, he having been off the pay-roll of that Department since February 1, 1905, on account of illness.

The recommendation of the Committee on Reinstatements was adopted.

The President presented a report on the request of Mr. Gustavus L. Gabriel, a Bookkeeper in the Department of Finance, that he be certified as eligible for promotion without further examination, which request had been referred to him at a meeting held September 8, 1905. It appearing from the report of the President that under the rules Mr. Gabriel was not eligible for an increase in compensation without examination, the request was denied.

A communication was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated September 28, recommending that the appeal of Edward C. Ford for a rerating of his examination for Janitor (steam heating) be denied. It appearing from the report of the Acting Chief Examiner that the said appeal did not come within the provisions of Civil Service Rule XX., the recommendation was adopted.

A communication was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated October 3, with reference to the request of the Fire Department for an examination for promotion in that Department from Telephone Operator to Telegraph Operator. After a consideration of the matter the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Fire Department and state that in the opinion of the Commission such an examination could not properly be allowed.

The Secretary reported that he had ordered a non-competitive examination of Mr. Charles T. Earl, under Rule XII, paragraph 3, to qualify him for provisional appointment as Automobile Engineman in the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, there being but two names remaining on the present eligible list for that position and neither of said persons being willing to accept the appointment. The action of the Secretary was approved and he was directed to hold an open competitive examination for the position of Automobile Engineman at the earliest possible date.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated September 29, stating that at a meeting of that Board, held on the 28th instant, that part of the resolution of the Municipal Commission adopted August 23, which related to the exemption of the position of Secretary to the Board of Parole, Department of Correction, was approved, and the part of the resolution which related to the positions of Overseer of Reformatory and Special Parole Officer was referred to Commissioner Brown for "consideration and report." The letter was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Education, dated September 26, requesting approval of a leave of absence, without pay, from September 21 to October 31, granted Mr. William Hagan, Examiner of Claims in the Bureau of Audit and Accounts of that Department. It appearing from the certificate furnished that the leave of absence was granted on account of illness in order that Mr. Hagan might be able to leave the city for the period mentioned, the same was approved.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Education, dated September 28, requesting an examination for promotion from the position of Special Laborer in that Department to Inspector of Pipe Covering. The request was denied, there being no such title in the classification as "Inspector of Pipe Covering."

A communication was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Board of Education requesting that Mr. George G. Brown, Jr., an Examiner in the Bureau of Supplies of that Department, be examined for promotion. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Department of Education and request to be informed as to what grade it is intended to promote Mr. Brown.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Education, dated September 29, in answer to the request of the Commission for a list of the persons who are employed as teachers in the evening schools, in order that it could be compared with the list of persons who are now serving as temporary clerks, to the end that any cases of dual employment might be detected. Secretary Palmer stated in his communication that before furnishing the Commission with the list requested he desired to call its attention to the fact that the Corporation Counsel had issued an opinion in reference to the matter of dual employment in the City service under date of December 9, 1901, in which it was held that a person who had rendered services to the Department of Education was entitled to draw a salary for the same even though he were employed daily in another City Department. The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the fact that the Corporation Counsel had addressed a communication to the Comptroller on the same subject at a later date in which he advised Mr. Grout that evening school Teachers could not serve in his Department as temporary Clerks unless they obtained leave of absence from the Department of Education during such period. The matter was referred to Commissioner Talley for consideration and report.

A communication was presented from the Comptroller, dated October 3, requesting permission to make six appointments to the position of Junior Clerk in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears of his Department from the eligible list for that position established after an open competitive examination. It appearing that an examination for promotion to Junior Clerk in the Department of Finance was to be held shortly, in accordance with the Comptroller's request, the request was denied, and the Secretary was requested to communicate with Comptroller Grout and state that it would be necessary to fill the vacancies in the grade of Junior Clerk from the promotion list when announced.

A communication was presented from the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, dated September 21, requesting that the eligible list for promotion to first grade Clerk in his Department be construed by the Commission to have covered the second grade also, and that the clerks whose names appear thereon be certified for promotion to the second grade without further examination. It appearing that the same questions were used in that examination for the first four grades of Clerkship, the request was granted.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Board of Water Supply, dated September 27, transmitting copy of a letter addressed to the Chief Engineer of that Department by Mr. James E. Troy, One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street and Jerome avenue, Borough of The Bronx, who was certified for appointment to the position of Axeman on September 7, 1905, and whose name was dropped from the list for the reason that the Board of Water Supply notified the Commission that he had "failed to report." It appearing from the copy of Mr. Troy's communication transmitted by Assistant Secretary Murray that he presented himself within the four days prescribed by the rules, the Secretary was instructed to restore his name to the list.

A communication was presented from the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of The Bronx, dated October 4, requesting that a non-competitive examination for promotion to the ninth grade be held for Mr. John H. Hanan, Chief Clerk in his Bureau. The request was granted under the provisions of Rule XV., paragraph 9.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated September 30, requesting that Michael A. Sullivan, the only third grade Clerk in the employ of that Department, be permitted to compete in the coming examination for promotion to the fifth grade of Clerkship. The request was granted.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated September 28, stating that the Dock Commissioner had appointed Edward McMahon to the position of Engineer in that Department, compensation at the rate of \$125 per month, under the provisions of chapter 533 of the Laws of 1905, and transmitting a certificate from the Rapid Transit Ferry Company to the effect that Mr. McMahon had been in its employ for a period of ten years, and also a copy of his United States license. The papers were ordered filed.

A communication was presented from Comptroller Grout, dated October 3, requesting that the Bookkeepers in the Bookkeeping and Awards Division of his Department be examined for promotion from the sixth to the eighth grade. The request was granted.

A communication was presented from Comptroller Grout, dated October 2, requesting that in the examination for promotion from fourth to fifth grade Clerk in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears a separate list be made for the Clerks in the Queens Borough office of that Bureau. The request was denied.

A communication was presented from the President of the Board of City Magistrates, First Division, dated September 26, requesting that the appointment of Mr. Samuel Bruckheimer to the position of Stenographer in that court on May 16, 1905, be confirmed by the Commission as a permanent appointment on that date, and stating that the action of that Board in notifying the Commission that Mr. Bruckheimer had been appointed "temporarily" was an error, it having been its impression that the appointee would have to serve a temporary period of probation—three months—before his appointment could be made permanent. It appearing that Mr. Bruckheimer was eligible for permanent appointment on May 16, 1905, the request of the Board of City Magistrates was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to change his records accordingly.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Health Department, dated September 29, requesting that Oscar I. Levy, Office Boy, be permitted to enter the examination for promotion to Junior Clerk (Grade B), and that Thomas Hanley, fourth grade Clerk, and George P. Foulke, Law Clerk, be permitted to enter the examination for promotion to sixth grade Clerk. It appearing that the examinations were already being held, and that the candidates had presented themselves for examination for the grade for which the Commission had originally notified them, the request was denied.

A communication was presented from the Secretary to the Fire Commissioner, dated September 27, transmitting a copy of a letter from the foreman of Union Hose Company 8, Richmond Borough Volunteers, requesting that the name of Peter J. Donohue, age 25, be placed upon the list of volunteer firemen transmitted to the Civil Service Commission by the Fire Commissioner. The Secretary was instructed to add the said name to the list.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated September 27, requesting approval of a leave of absence, without pay, for six months, from October 1, granted John V. Sheridan, a Transitman in his Department. It appearing from the certificate furnished that the leave of absence was asked for on account of ill health, the same was approved.

The request of Joseph Brady, No. 1070 Third avenue, under date of September 27, that his name be restored to the list for Topographical Draughtsman, was granted, he having produced the certificate of a physician to the effect that he is now in good health and able to accept an appointment. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Kenney and state that the examination of October 4 was conducted in accordance with the advice of the Corporation Counsel, contained in a communication addressed by him to the Commission under date of August 29, 1905.

The application of Mr. Frank L. Clapp, Boston, Mass., for the position of Assistant Engineer, Board of Water Supply, bearing the certificates of three residents of New York City and one resident of Waterbury, Conn., was accepted, under the provisions of Rule VIII., paragraph 2.



GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
