REPORT OF THE COST OF OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION FOR THE YEARS 1914 AND 1915.

March 12, 1917.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller, The City of New York:
Dear Sir—Under date of October 20, 1915, there was submitted to you by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, pursuant to subdivision 6 of section 151 of the City Charter, a report upon the cost of Operation and Maintenance of the Department of Correction in 1913 and 1914. This first report dealt with:

1. The history of correctional institutions in Greater New York.
2. The institutions or buildings controlled in whole or in part by the Department of Correction.
3. The organization of the Department on June 30, 1915.
4. The cost of operation and maintenance.
5. The revenues.
6. General remarks.

Having gone quite fully into these matters in the first report, it is proposed to confine this second report mainly to a consideration of the financial operations and results of the activities of 1914 and 1915.

This report contains:

1. The organization of the department on June 30, 1915, and June 30, 1916.
2. The cost of maintenance and operation for the years 1905 to 1915, inclusive.

Of the increase in "Executive," \$2,916.70 occurs in the Bureau of "Registration and Passes."

The functions of this bureau comprise the issuing and recording of passes to prisoners' relatives and friends, the recording, etc., of the passing in and out of prisoners of the several institutions of the department, the auditing of fines or bail paid for discharge, the keeping of a daily census of the institutions and the compilation of all vital statistical data relative to prisoners coming under the jurisdiction of the department. This bureau is, therefore, a central information bureau in regard

to the total population of each institution and, in a measure, an auditing and statistical bureau as well. The statistics compiled are more complete and extended than formerly and show the complete departmental record of each prisoner.

This Bureau was organized during the year 1914, and in January, 1915, a prison registrar at \$1,410, a tabulating machine operator at \$720 and three clerks were appointed.

The increase in supplies is due to the installation of the tabulating machine system in 1915 and the purchase of supplies and materials necessary to carry on the work.

Bureau of Maintenance and Construction.

This bureau was put into operation in 1915. It acts as a central record or control of new construction and repair work. A Fuel and Mechanical Engineer assigned to organize this work effected a saving in heat and power plant service of approximately \$40,000 per annum.

These figures represent a decrease in the cost of this function from \$65,791.77 in 1914 to \$53,488.55 in 1915, or \$12,303.22. This decrease, representing as it does 18.7 per cent, is especially gratifying, when considered in connection with a decrease in the previous year of 16.04 per cent, under 1913.

Practically all of the heavy freight is carried by the "Correction." The "Hart's Island" is a reserve boat and used only as a relief boat for steamer "Riker's Island." The "Massasoit" was transferred to the Department of Charities on June 30, 1914. Upon the completion of the central stores and elevator building, now under construction, to connect the island with the Queensboro Bridge roadways, a considerable reduction is anticipated in the present transportation charges.

Principal Increases.

(a) City Prison, Queens—Increase \$18,774.32. The transfer of all female prisoners from the Penitentiary to this institution increased the cost of kitchen and dining room service and general care of prisoners. The average daily census in 1915 was 227, in 1914 it was 116.

(b) Workhouse, Blackwell's Island—Increase \$27,552.53, due in part to a new position of Superintendent of Women at \$1,200, created in 1915, and in part to an increase in the census from 747 in 1914 to 912 in 1915.

(c) Workhouse, Hart's Island Branch—Increase \$12,114.67. The increase in the census by 120 in 1915 over 1914 caused the increase of \$15,403.89 in the cost of kitchen and dining room service and the general care of prisoners. The increase in maintaining structures is due to a new floor throughout Dormitory No. 5 and a new cement floor in the Mess Hall. There was in 1915 a decrease of \$8,911.78 in the light, heat and power plant service cost of 1914.

(d) Workhouse, Riker's Island Branch—Increase \$35,621.94, due to the creation of the new position of Deputy Warden at \$1,920 per annum, to extensive alterations to Dormitories Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, at a cost of \$13,504.26, to the overhauling of the heating plant and changes in hospital and doctor's quarters, etc., and to an increase in the census by 207 inmates, causing an increase of \$20,118.80 in the cost of kitchen and dining room service and the general care of prisoners.

(e) Reformatory, Hart's Island—Increase \$8,265.03, due partly to the increased cost of medical and surgical service through the installation of a separate hospital with salaries aggregating \$1,425.16 and equipment costing \$733.49. During the year 1914 the Reformatory inmates were treated at the branch workhouse hospital. The great rise in the cost of cloth for the manufacture of reformatory uniforms due to the war accounts for the increase cost of wearing apparel. The appointment of 10 additional keepers at \$900 per annum caused the increase in the cost of general care of prisoners.

(f) Reformatory, New Hampton Farms—Increase \$32,813.52. The census at this institution increased from 36 in 1914 to 103 in 1915, and a sufficient number of keepers, senior prison artisans, instructors of industries and other employees were transferred to take proper care of the inmates.

(g) Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island—Increase \$30,707.74. This is due mainly to the increase of \$27,602.03 in the cost of kitchen and dining room service and the general care of prisoners caused by an increase in the census from 1,356 in 1914 to 1,574 in 1915, a net increase of 218.

(h) District Prisons—Increase \$4,110.46, due to the equipment of these institutions with various housekeeping necessities.

In 1914 there was instituted in this department the first real attempt to record the total daily number of inmates in all the institutions of this department and to show the cost of food consumption on a per capita basis. As compared with 1914, the year 1915 shows an increase of \$772.37 in sales, and an increase of \$1,935.65 in "other charges" and a decrease of the percentage of profit on sales of 6.12. The difference between the materials purchased as per the industry records and the expense report for the year 1914, was caused by a lack of correlation between the two divisions of the department. The manufacturing industry closed its accounts as of Dec. 31, 1914, while the expense report shows materials that were delivered for about two months succeeding though being chargeable to the 1914 accounts.

The chief items manufactured are brooms, shoes, brushes, clothing and beds, and these articles are sold to City departments and bureaus only. These departments are required by law to purchase from the Department of Correction before going to the outside market. The chief purchasers are Charities, Correction, Street Cleaning, Police, Education, Fire and Docks and Ferries. During 1915, the cost of raw materials for manufacture began to rise, but the sales prices to the City departments remained practically stationary. In 1916, the selling prices of the finished products were increased to keep pace with the rising costs of raw material. The net profit derived from this source is placed in a special fund and used to buy more material. If this fund exceeds \$50,000 the excess is returned to the General Fund.

6. General Remarks.

1. The total expenditures of the department for 1915, excepting those for the manufacturing industries, were \$1,478,156.73, or \$172,707.91 in excess of similar expenditures for 1914. Substantially all of this increase was in prison service.

This increase would seem to be satisfactorily explained by the increase in the number of inmates in the various institutions, accompanied, as it is by a reduction in the unit cost:

This is a good showing. Similar information available soon after the close of the particular month under consideration should enable the executive to trace the reasons for the increases or decreases and to take prompt advantage of such information.

2. The character of the information furnished us as to the net profit on the manufacturing industries convinces us that the accounts pertaining to them are not properly handled. Prices for raw materials increased heavily in 1915, but the selling prices to cover such increases do not appear to have been advanced until 1916. Had accurate profit and loss statements been furnished monthly, the decrease in profits would have been detected immediately and the advances in the prices charged could have been made in 1915 and not delayed until 1916.

3. Despite the greatly increased number of inmates in the correctional institutions in 1915 there is a heavy decrease in the amount of fines collected there and forwarded to the City Chamberlain. The reason for the decrease in the collection of fines was explained by the Commissioner of the Department of Correction as follows:

"In the higher courts there has been a steady campaign to reduce the number of fines and impose jail sentences, as the practice of imposing fines as punishment is manifestly unfair to the poorer classes, inasmuch as the rich man can go free while the poor man must serve sentences. This is proven by the collection of fines at the Court of Special Sessions, where a decrease of \$32,371 is shown in fines collected during the year 1915 when compared with the year 1914, although the lower courts show an increase."

4. The cost of food per employee day and per prisoner day, while less in 1915 than in 1914, and more uniform in the various institutions, still show considerable divergence, and it is possible that further investigation of them may lead to further reductions.

5. The statement of receipts for Federal, State, County and Sheriff's prisoners does not indicate the profit or loss to the City in connection with such service.

The expense records, installed in the department in 1913, show that the cost of maintaining a prisoner one day at the City institutions during the year 1914 was 67 cents. This amount includes the direct cost of maintenance at the institution, plus a proportion of the cost of general administration, but does not include the cost of carrying the City's investment in land, buildings, equipment, etc., which cost is very large.

On January 1, 1916, the rates for boarding both Federal and County prisoners on Blackwell's Island were fixed at 67 cents a day. It is doubtful if the new rates fully reimburse the City for the cost of these prisoners, notwithstanding the fact that the prisoners do considerable work which otherwise would have to be paid for by the City.

As regards the compensation for State prisoners the rate of 45 cents a day for tramps is paid pursuant to chapter 151 of the Laws of 1915, and the rate of 30 cents a day for felons was fixed by chapter 372 of the Laws of 1895. For the nine months ending June 30, 1916, the City cared for State prisoners as follows:

Had the City received 67 cents per prisoner instead of 30.6 cents the additional receipts for the nine months would have been \$44,033.44, or at the rate of over \$58,000 per annum. Respectfully,
