SIR—There were 8,182 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the three months ending September 30, 1877, which is an increase of 2,119, as compared with the number reported the preceding three months, and 840 less than were reported during the corresponding three months of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the three months ending September 30, 1877 was 8,165, which is 1,006 below the average for the corresponding quarter of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 30.31 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,077,228.
