

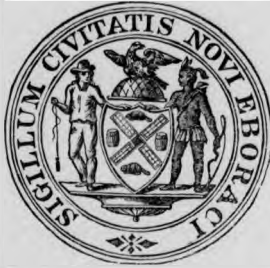

The Board met this day.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 4, 1884.

- The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,534.
- The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 954.
- During the past week 180 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
- 61 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.
- 1 permit was issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds).
- 110 permits were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.
- 29 premises were visited where contagious diseases were reported, and 23 disinfections and 14 fumigations were performed.
- 6 cases of contagious disease were removed to Riverside Hospital.
- The number of vaccinations performed was 989, of which 155 were primary and 834 revaccinations.
- 9,349 pounds of meat and 8,350 pounds of fish were seized and condemned.
- 85 specimens of milk were examined, 1 analysis of same made, 93 quarts of adulterated milk destroyed, and 6 arrests made.

The certificates of 621 births, 55 still-births, 272 marriages and 609 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 4, 1884. This shows a decrease of 38 deaths and 63 births, and an increase of 14 still-births and 84 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there is an increase of 69 deaths and 21 births, and a decrease of 5 still-births and 17 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 3; croup, 2; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro spinal fever, 3; puerperal diseases, 3; inanition, 2; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 13; convulsions, 4; solar-heat, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; gastritis, enteritis, gastro enteritis and peritonitis, 21; Bright's and nephritis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; surgical operations, 1; suicides, 4; and drowning, 2; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 9; whooping cough, 8; malarial fevers, 10; bronchitis, 3; heart disease, 12; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 23; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; brain and nervous, 6; premature and preterm births, 9; while the deaths from measles, erysipelas, diarrhoeal diseases, pneumonia, aneurism and apoplexy was the same in two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 168 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 217 under two years, 255 under five years, and 40 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 28 less than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 41.86 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 122 were in institutions, 345 in tenement-houses, 131 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 127 on the first, 153 on the second, 112 on the third, 57 on the fourth, 27 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 606 were stated to be residents of New York City and 3 non-residents; 60 were stated to be single, 145 married, 68 widowed, and the condition of 336 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 609; still-births, 55; bodies in transit, 16. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 71 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 621 births, 272 marriages, 55 still-births; 609 deaths, 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated; 91 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 9 transcripts of the birth record, 16 of marriage, and 49 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 4, 1884, was 68.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.016, the mean humidity was 83.0, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 938, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.45 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 582 deaths and still-births, or 87.66 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 22; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 264; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 67; Greenwood (undenominational), 27; Lutheran (undenominational), 74; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 22; Evergreen (undenominational), 43; Woodlawn (undenominational), 23; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 8; Machpelah, L.
