



In compliance with section 126 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Comptroller of the City of New York herewith publishes the following "full and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the corporation" during the year ending on the first day of August, 1889, and the "cash balance or surplus" in the City Treasury at that date; also "the different sources of city revenue and the amount received from each source," together with "the several appropriations made, the objects for which the same were made, and the amount of money expended under each"; and also "the money borrowed on the credit of the corporation, the authority under which each loan was made, and the terms on which the same was obtained."

SIR—I respectfully submit the subjoined list of streets, for which I recommend a surface of asphalt on the present stone block pavement. These streets are almost entirely devoted to private residences, and they are selected for asphalt surfacing because the present pavement is in excellent condition to make a foundation for asphalt, and the character of the streets and nature of the traffic are favorable to the use of asphalt:

At a meeting of your Honorable Board, held August 19, 1889, a resolution was passed directing the repavement of Lexington avenue with granite blocks, upon a foundation of concrete, from Twenty-first to Thirty-second street; between Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth streets, and between Fifty-ninth and Ninety-seventh streets. Additional examinations of this avenue have been made, and convince me that it would be more satisfactory, and I would, therefore, recommend that the section from Twenty-first to Thirty-second street be paved with asphalt, upon a foundation of concrete, because of the college at Twenty-third street, and also because this avenue is mostly built up with private residences, and the grades of the avenue are such that there are no obstacles to the use of asphalt.

I would also recommend that the section of the avenue between Sixty-sixth and Sixty-ninth streets

be repaved with asphalt, upon concrete foundation, because of the Normal School, the Mount Sinai Hospital, the Foundling Asylum, and other institutions of a like character.

In the matter of repaving a portion of the Boulevard, for which the sum of \$200,000 was set aside, I would recommend that the work be commenced at Fifty-ninth street, and proceed northerly as far as the appropriation will permit. It is estimated that the work can be completed for the sum reserved, between Fifty-ninth street and Eighty-sixth street.

The railroad company have heretofore attempted to do some paving between their tracks, but the paving stones used are of a miscellaneous character, and out of keeping with the general character of the thoroughfare, and would greatly mar its appearance after the asphalt pavement had been laid. I therefore recommend that the roadway, in and about the rail-tracks, be paved with specification granite, on a sand foundation, and that the railroad company be required to pay the expenses thereof.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The petition of Nicholas Haughton and John J. Morris respectfully shows:

1. We were Commissioners of the Board of Excise for the County of New York, appointed on May 1, 1883, to serve for three years and until others should be duly appointed in our places.  
2. On the 17th of March, 1884, an act of the Legislature was passed entitled "An act to centre responsibility in the municipal government of the City of New York," which provided that after January 1, 1885, all appointments to office in the City of New York, then made by the Mayor and confirmed by the Board of Aldermen, should thereafter be made by the Mayor without such confirmation.

3. On the 4th of March, 1886, the Corporation Counsel, at the request of the Mayor, gave an official opinion to the latter, to the effect that Excise Commissioners were State officers, that consequently the said act did not apply to such officers, and that our successors could not be appointed without confirmation by the Board of Aldermen.

4. In pursuance of this opinion, as we verily believe, the Mayor, on the 17th of April, 1886, nominated our successors to the Board of Aldermen.

The said Board failed to act thereon and on the 1st day of May, 1886, the said Mayor, notwithstanding the said opinion, designated persons to be our successors without confirmation by the Board of Aldermen.

5. Relying upon the said opinion of the Corporation Counsel and being advised to the same effect by the Counsel of the Board of Excise, and being further advised by the latter that it would be contrary to our official duty to hand over our positions to persons not properly appointed, and that personal responsibility might attach if we did so, we continued to perform the duties of our office down to July 7, 1886, when we turned over the offices and records to the persons designated by the Mayor, as aforesaid, ceased to act, and entered into a stipulation made in an agreed case submitted to the Supreme Court to determine who was entitled to the office.

6. During the period from May 1, 1886, to July 7, 1886, we had the exclusive control of the offices and records of the said Board, we received, examined and considered nearly 900 applications for licenses, of which number 641 were granted, for which we were paid \$45,630, a large portion of which was paid to and received for by the City Chamberlain while we were so exercising the functions of Excise Commissioners. The remainder was received by him after July 7, 1886, under the circumstances hereinafter stated. During the said period we were at the said offices the whole of each working day.

7. On May 4, 1887, an act, known as chapter 275 of Laws of 1887, was passed, with the concurrence, as we believe, of the officials of New York City, authorizing the recognition of the licenses issued as aforesaid as valid licenses, and directing that the moneys received therefor as aforesaid be turned over to the Chamberlain, to be disposed of according to law. That under said law all of the licenses issued by us were recognized as valid, and the remainder of said moneys have been received by the said Chamberlain.

8. We are informed and believe that since the passage of the last-mentioned act, by the vote of your Honorable Body, and on the advice of the Corporation Counsel, all the employees in service under us, from May 1 to July 7, 1886, have been paid in full for their services during that period.

9. The compensation for our services, from May 1, 1886, to July 7, 1886, at the rate established by chapter 642 of the Laws of 1874, for the salaries of Excise Commissioners, would be \$930.48 to each of us, no part of which has been paid.

10. By the law last referred to, the salaries of Excise Commissioners are payable out of money received for licenses, and we claim that the said amount of \$930.48 and interest to each of us, is an equitable lien upon the moneys for licenses collected by us and paid over to the City Chamberlain as aforesaid.

Your petitioners therefore pray that your Honorable Board will direct that there be paid to each of us, out of any excise moneys now on hand, the sum of \$930.48, with interest from July 7, 1886.

SIR—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of the communication of the 22d instant, in which your Board asks advice as to whether the amount of certain expenses incurred by the Commissioners appointed under chapter 522 of the Laws of 1884, entitled "An act laying out public places and

parks and parkways in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York, and in the adjacent district in Westchester County, and authorizing the taking of the lands for the same," should not be paid out of the fund appropriated by this Department for the payment of contingent counsel fees.

In reply thereto, I beg to call your attention to that portion of section 9 of chapter 522 of the Laws of 1884 which reads as follows:

"Each of the said commissioners shall receive ten dollars a day for the time actually spent in the business of said commission, provided the said compensation should not exceed, in the aggregate, the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars to each of said commissioners; and they shall also be allowed the necessary expenses for clerk hire, surveys, survey maps and examination of titles and other necessary expenses, a sum to be allowed by a general term of the supreme court, first judicial district."

Section 10 of the same act reads as follows:

"For the payment of the damages awarded by the commissioners of estimate, and the expenses, disbursements and charges in the premises, it shall be lawful for the said mayor, aldermen and commonalty to raise the amount by loan, by the creation of a public fund or stock, to be called the New Park Fund, which shall bear interest not exceeding three per centum per annum, and shall be represented by bonds redeemable within a period of time not exceeding thirty years after the passage of this act."

Pursuant to the provisions of these sections of the act under consideration an application was made to the General Term of the Supreme Court in the First Judicial District for the allowance of the several sums particularly set out in the copy of the preamble and resolution accompanying your communication. The General Term, under the provisions of the act quoted, allowed these expenses and an order to that effect was duly entered on the 21st day of June, 1889, in which it was distinctly provided that the Comptroller of the City of New York raise the amount necessary to pay these bills by the sale of bonds as provided for in the 10th section of chapter 522 of the Laws of 1884.

A consideration of the sections of the act of 1884 above quoted, and the proceedings taken for the allowance of these bills, together with the action of the General Term, can lead to but one conclusion, which is, that the sum total certified to by the General Term as necessary expenses under the act of 1884, being the amount of \$10,478.38, shall be paid from the fund called the New Park Fund, which was created by chapter 522 of the Laws of 1884.

I have the honor, therefore, to advise you that the different amounts referred to in the preamble and resolution, a copy of which you have sent me, cannot be paid from the fund appropriated to this Department for the payment of contingent counsel fees.

In the examination and judgment of plans the Board will be assisted by a Committee to be appointed by the Mayor, consisting of not more than three competent architects and a civil engineer.

All plans submitted for competition, for which premiums are awarded, shall become the property of the city, and all plans must be filed with the Comptroller on or before the date mentioned. Each plan submitted shall be marked with such assumed designation as the architect may select, provided there shall be filed with the Mayor a sealed envelope, giving the real name of the author of the plans so designated, which shall be opened by the Mayor in the presence of the Board, after the premiums shall have been awarded.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH AN ORDINANCE OF the Common Council, "In relation to the burial of strangers or unknown persons who may die in any of the public institutions of the City of New York," the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction report as follows:

At Morgue, Bellevue Hospital, from foot of Twenty-eighth street, North river—Unknown man, aged about 65 years; 5 feet 7 inches high; gray hair, mustache and chin beard. Had on black frock coat, black vest, brown striped pants, white shirt, white cotton drawers.

Unknown man, from Pier 7, East river, aged about 40 years; 5 feet 8 inches high; auburn hair, dark beard and mustache, about one week's growth. Had on gray coat and vest, blue jean pants, striped shirt, brown barred socks, buckled shoes.

At Homoeopathic Hospital, Ward's Island—James Connell, aged 52 years; 5 feet 10 inches high; gray eyes, brown hair. Had on when admitted gray coat, brown striped pants, gaiters, black derby hat.

Kate Moore, aged 35 years; 5 feet 2 inches high; brown eyes and hair. Had on when admitted black laced skirt, black merino waist, button gaiters, black head bonnet.

Each estimate must contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with them therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact. That it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same work, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud. That no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested in the estimate or in the work to which it relates or in the profits thereof.

Each estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the same, that the several matters therein stated are true, and must be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, to the effect that if the contract is awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall refuse or neglect to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

The consent last above mentioned must be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, or otherwise, and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith, with the intention to execute the bond required by law.

No estimate will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for

the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the estimate-box, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by the City of New York, as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of the deposit will be returned to him.

## TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

**ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT** act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the City of New York, to the effect that if the contract is awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall refuse or neglect to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

## PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

**PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT** in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 927 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

## REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

**UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 AND 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:**

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to

time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. \* \* \* \* \*

The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents."

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

**BAKERSIES.**—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

**BARBER SHOPS** shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

**BATHING TUBS** in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

**BUILDING PURPOSES.**—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

**COWS.**—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

**DINING SALOONS** shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**FISH STANDS** (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: **HORSES, PRIVATE.**—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

**HORSES, LIVERY.**—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

**HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.**—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

**HORSE TROUGHS.**—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

**HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES** shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**LAUNDRIES** shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS** shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

**PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES** shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**PRINTING OFFICES**, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

**SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS** shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

**STEAM ENGINES**, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

**WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.**—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

**WATER-CLOSET RATES.**—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

## METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." \* \* \*

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent. per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

## NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

**NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN** made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
