

There were 14,300 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.
There were 471 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.
There were 235 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.
There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 18 permits.

The 972 deaths represent a death-rate of 29.70, against 29.63 for the previous week, and 23.42 for the corresponding week of 1891.

The total of deaths was almost the same as in the previous week. There was an increase of 22 in the deaths from heart disease, and of 7 from phthisis, and a decrease of 15 in the deaths from pneumonia, and of 6 from Bright's disease. The variation in the number of deaths from other causes was slight.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twenty-second Ward, from measles in the Nineteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards.

Any person making an estimate for the above work shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope to the President of said Armory Board, indorsed "Estimate for Furnishing Materials and Work in the erection of an Armory Building on the easterly side of Fourth avenue, extending from Thirty-third to Thirty-fourth street," and also with the name of the person or persons presenting the same, and the date of its presentation.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and must have satisfactory testimonials to that effect; and the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract by his or their bond, with two sufficient sureties, in the amount of ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$100,000).

1st. 2d. This price is to cover all expenses of every kind involved in or incidental to the fulfillment of the contract, including any claim that may arise through delay, from any cause, in the performing of the work thereunder.
