### Quarterly Report of Work Done by Paid and Unpaid Labor ending March 31, 1893.

Carpenters—Repaired ventilator in old prison, door in female prison, and gate in yard; put on new door for Hospital cell, female prison; made and put in 2 window-sashes for Matron's room; repaired portion of floor on fourth tier, old prison; made and put up new wooden bars inside boys' prison; made 8 new benches for female prison and dormitory; put down new floor in front office.

Plumbers—Repaired water-closet in front office; put on new faucet for hydrant in yard; made and put on new cover for sewer-trap in cellar; put one steam water-glass in new female prison and pump-rod in old prison; repaired water-pipe in new prison; repaired gas-pipes in various parts of the prison.

Masons—Put in firebrick in boilers in female and boys' prisons; repaired pavements in prison yard and gateway passage, Franklin street.

Roofers—Repaired roofs of old male and female prisons.

Tinsmiths—Made and put on 3 new weather-caps on north end of the prison; made 6 new tin dippers, 6 new pails (tin), one ash-can (galvanized iron); repaired 6 boilers for prison kitchen, and made 1 dozen of tin cuspidors.

Painters—Painted interior of new male prison, interior of female prison, 8 new benches for female prison; done jobbing work in boys' prison.

Glaziers—Put in 6 new panes of glass in female prison.

Miscellaneous—Repaired cell door in new male prison; put on large lock on main gate to old prison.

The carpenters have been employed in making necessary repairs about the premises, fitting keys for locks, repairing furniture, putting shelves in general office, rearranging cold air shafts in cellar, making new stretcher for boat use.

The painters have painted the General office and Waiting-room, Nurses' dining-room, Drug Store, Branch Penitentiary Keeper's rooms, and have put in a number of panes of glass.

The Engineer, Firemen and Assistants have attended to the manufacture of the gas consumed on the Island, kept the machinery in the boiler and gas houses and laundry in order, and have kept the steam and gas pipes in order.

The Workhouse men have been employed as helpers to the Machinists and as Firemen, Drivers and Laborers on the farm. Have assisted in the Store-room and Kitchen.

The Workhouse women have been employed in the Laundry, Kitchen and Dining rooms, and as scrubbers doing general housework about the building.

Engineer—Repaired Croton water supply pipes and regulated ball cock in cistern over water closet; repaired and cleaned out gas brackets, burners, waste-pipes of water-closet, bath tubs and sinks; thawed out frozen water-pipes; repaired and packed steam-pipes and valves; also repaired plug for bath tub in Hall 1. Bakery—402,696 pounds white, 18,620 pounds graham, 10,825 pounds ginger, 4,340 pounds rye bread and 10,000 pounds domestic cake.

Tailor Shop—New work—Jackets, 294; pants, 143; vests, 18. Repaired—Jackets, 403; pants, 1,669; vests, 701; overcoats, 155; hemmed 109 spreads; cut and hemmed 16 aprons; repaired 30 pairs drawers; 25 hospital shirts; upholstered 16 mattresses and 3 cushions (for row boat).

Shoe Shop—Made 12 pairs new shoes and 35 pairs canvas slippers, 31 razor strops for wards, and repaired 1,244 pairs shoes.

Mat Shop—Made 106 coir, 34 brush, 97 spittoon and 1 rush mats; repaired 20 brush mats; upholstered 10 hair mattresses; caned 6 chairs; remade 4 cushions and spliced 2 elevator ropes.

Broom Shop—Made 694 brooms for wards, 7 wood baskets and 6 waste-paper baskets.

Tin Shop—Made 6 each coffee and tea pots, 12 roasting pans, 62 lengths 7-inch stove-pipe,

mil cans; making and laying 232 sheets roofing plate; making and putting up 116 feet speaking tube; 67 1/2-inch galvanized-iron elbows; repaired Attendants' food boxes, coffee cans, tin chamber-pots, spittoons, watering-pots, dust-pans and other general repairs to cooking utensils, tinware, etc., throughout the Asylum.

Out-door Improvement—Excavating for new buildings; quarried large quantities of stone on southeast side of the island, and breaking same for repaired roads; cleared remainder of brush and wood at the west side of the island; macadamized roads; graded walks; unloaded 13 barges of coal; carted goods from dock to Asylum and Ward's Island Hospital; removed swill from buildings and attended to other general work about stable, boiler-house, farm and grounds, etc.

## LABOR REPORT.

Of the male patients, a daily average of 74 have been engaged as follows: 16 in kitchen; 5 in laundry; 4 in engine-room; 2 in stables; 1 in store-room; 1 in office; 1 in carpenter shop; 3 in bake-shop; 7 in pavilion; 2 as help for Acting Medical Superintendent and Staff; 32 unloading coal, shoveling snow, farming, grading, repairing roads, making sea-wall, removing freight from dock, drawing coal to pavilions and boiler-house, painting general dining-room and bake-shop, white-washed stoves, removing ashes from pavilions, pumping water, and kept the grounds around the pavilions clean.

Of the female patients, a daily average of 525 have been engaged in the following manner: Housework, sewing and knitting, 433; in the laundry, 67; in the general dining-room, 9; at out-door scrubbing, 8; as help for Medical Staff and officers, 8.

130,553 pieces have been laundered during the quarter.

4,049 articles of clothing and bedding have been made, and 27,732 articles repaired.

## For Ward's Island Asylum.

Repaired, shirts, 116; socks, 875—991.

The Engineer, Fireman and assistants cleared out locomotive and horizontal boilers twice, put new boxes on crank-pin and scraped main bearings of engine, put new faucets in Pavilions 2, 3 and 5; put steam heat with 4 radiators in men's quarters, ran coal engine on dock 14 days; put new sewer in Pavilion 2; and altered over-flow pipe from tank in Pavilion 3; put new water supply in Pavilions A and C; made 32 lengths of stove-pipe, put new guards round stove in Pavilion 3; repaired Worthington pump and suction from steam-pipe from cistern, repaired steam-pipes and packed valves in Pavilions 4 and 5, and General Drug Room, repaired roof of Hospital and Laundry, repaired ball-cock in tank of Laundry and Pavilion 4, water-closet cisterns in Pavilion 5, sinks in Pavilions 2, 3, 4 and 5, and General Drug Room; repaired and cleared waste-pipes of water-closets, sinks and bath-tubs in all pavilions, and kept electric lights and wires in repair.

The Painters and assistants painted employees' rooms, bakery, ice-house and kitchen in Officers' quarters; mixed putty and paint, put in glass in all pavilions and painted General Drug Room.

The Carpenter and assistants built house over ice-box at back of kitchen, put up shelving for bread in bakery, built new shafts for coal cart, 2 packing boxes for patients' clothes, 2 centres for mason to build oven in bakery, new float for boat landing, pipe bench for engineer; laid floor, sheathed up sides, and put in door in stable; repaired doors and locks in Physicians', Engineer's and Matron's apartments; made 1 pine water-closet seat for laundry, repaired floor in water-closet and bath-room in Pavilion C; fixed up bathing-house for temporary hospital, put up 2 canvas tents and laid floor for same; repaired door of Carpenter's shop and put on new lock; repaired windows, made shutters for basement windows and put up hand-rail to entrance door of Chapel; made new front for storm door, astricals and stops for inside doors, new sash cords in dining-room windows; repaired dining-room tables and put on 3 new pass locks in Pavilion 1; repaired windows and floor in hall and drawers in pantry, put in new sash cords and 3 pairs saddles in doorway; repaired woodwork round sink, put in fan-light sash over door of clothes room; repaired medicine chest and made new closet for soiled clothing, changed shelving in clothes room in Pavilion 2; repaired woodwork round sinks and windows, put new cords in 10 pairs windows and 7 new saddles in doors; repaired outside double door and frame and put on new lock in cutting-room; parting slips and cords in windows of sick hall; repaired floor in Attendants' room and put on 2 new pass locks on outside doors in Pavilion 3; repaired tops of bath-tubs and floor in bath-room, sash in cords in 4 pairs of windows, new flush-bolt on outside door; put on 4 new pass locks and repaired 3 in Pavilion 4; put up new door with lock on same, water-closet, north end, and repaired door of water-closet, south end, sheathed up door leading from day-room; locks on 2 medicine chests, 3 saddles in doors of dining-room; repaired 4 tops for bath-tubs, sash cords in water-closet windows, shelves in bread closet, and floor of stoop outside day-room in Pavilion 5.

The Stone Mason and assistants have built 600 cubic feet of sea-wall, 2 walls outside of boilers in new boiler-room, 14 by 6 by 12 feet; concreted a floor for ice-box, 10 by 6 feet; built a wall across steam-vault, 4 by 6 feet; set 3 sets of fire-brick in kitchen range; built 2 baker's ovens, one 10 by 8 feet, the other 12 by 12 feet; cut 20 feet of fine-axed coping for oven, and repaired cement wall in Pavilion 5.

Shoemaker—Repaired 213 pairs men's shoes, 127 pairs men's boots, 12 pairs women's shoes.

Mason—Repaired furnace walls and rebuilt flue arches in boiler-house; cast 6 cement boundary land marks; repaired plastering in two bath-rooms, pantry of centre group and Wards 1, 2, 3, 7 and 9; repaired brick wall in cellar of Ward 3; reset flagstone under urnal in Ward 5; laid cement floors in cellar of Ward 8, cemented under foundation walls, plastered outside walls, rebuilt cellar door, laid stone steps and reset flags under wooden steps; set fire blocks in two kitchen ranges; repaired plastering and brickwork of furnace in cellar of Administration Building; repaired plastering and calcimined in Engineer's residence; laid two fire hearths with encaustic tiles and repaired plastering in Medical Home; cemented and repaired piers in cellar of Ward 2 and in cellar of centre group dining-room; graded for and laid two cement flagstones at foot of steps of kitchen doors; removed part of old plaster and replastered same in Ward 3.

Striped 1 farm cart, 1 sleigh. Miscellaneous work done: 50 pounds putty made, 176 panes of glass put in.

#### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

#### PLANS FOR A MUNICIPAL BUILDING IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

#### NOTICE TO ARCHITECTS.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS of chapter 299 of the Laws of 1890, entitled "An act to amend chapter 323 of the Laws of 1888, entitled 'An act to provide for the erection of a building for certain purposes relating to the public interests in the City of New York,' and chapter 414 of the Laws of 1892, amending the same, the Board of Commissioners hereby constituted will, until 12 o'clock M. the first day of September, 1893, receive plans and specifications for a New Municipal Building, provided for in said statutes, to be erected in the City Hall Park.

In the examination and judgment of the designs the Board of Commissioners will be assisted by a committee to be selected by the said Board from a list nominated by the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects and the Architectural League of New York. This committee will consist of three competent architects who do not take part in the competition.

Five equal premiums, of two thousand dollars each, shall be awarded to the authors of the designs adjudged by the Board of Commissioners to be the second, third, fourth, fifth and sixth, best, of those submitted, and the author of the designs adjudged to be the first best by the said Board of Commissioners will be appointed Architect for the construction of the building, provided his professional standing is such as to guarantee a proper discharge of his duties. He will be paid a commission on the total cost of the work, namely, five per cent. on the first \$1,000,000 of the cost, four per cent. on the second \$1,000,000 and three per cent. on the remainder.

Each set of drawings is to be accompanied by a brief specification of the materials proposed to be employed, and of the mode of construction and of heating and ventilation to be adopted, and of the manner of lighting.

An approximate estimate of the cost of the building is also to be submitted.

No plans or papers submitted are to have upon them any mark by which they can be known, but there shall be sent with them a sealed letter, addressed in type-writing, to the Mayor, giving the author's name and address. This letter will not be opened until the awards shall have been made. The drawings and papers will be known by numbers corresponding with numbers given to the letters.
