

#### AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Note. - On Wednesday, July 18, 1894, no quorum being present, the meeting stood adjourned. EDWARD L. ALLEN, Secretary.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, July 25, 1894, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon. The Construction or Executive Committee recommended the adoption of the following resolu-

Resolved, That the action of the Chief Engineer in assigning Caleb H. Watkins to temporary duty as Laborer, at two dollars per day, at Reservoir "D," on July 17, 1894, be and hereby is

approved.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was adopted.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:
Resolved, That the action of the Chief Engineer in assigning Noah Cummings to duty as Laborer, at two dollars per day, at Reservoir "M," on July 20, 1894, be and hereby is approved.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was adopted.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:
Resolved, That the action of the Chief Engineer in discharging Daniel Carpenter, employed as Laborer on the Upper District of the New Aqueduct, on July 10, 1894, be and hereby is approved.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:
Resolved, That the action of the Chief Engineer in assigning Isaac S. Rossell to duty as Skilled Laborer, on June 27, 1894, at the rate of four dollars per day of eight hours' duration, be and hereby is approved.
On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was adopted.
The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:
Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, the accompanying bills are hereby approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment:
1st. Of Samuel Hopkins, for transportation and board, amounting to \$28.54.
2d. Of Sing Sing Lime Company, for four barrels of lime for sanitary purposes, amounting to \$4.

3d. Of Skinner & Connolly, for material and labor to make one brass pipe-holder for use at Shaft No. 25 of New Aqueduct, amounting to \$13.10.
4th. Of Charles D. Ward, for services rendered in determining lines on site of proposed Jerome

Park Reservoir, amounting to \$25.
On motion of Commissioner Cannon, the same was adopted.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following preamble and resolution:
Whereas, Application has been made by John L. Merritt, the purchaser of the hay in Reservoir "M," for an extension of time to September I, 1894, in which to remove the same; and the Chief Engineer having recommended that such extension of time be granted; therefore
Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners hereby grant to John L. Merritt an extension of time to September I, 1894, in which to remove the hay now standing on lands taken for the construction of Reservoir "M," on Titicus river, near Purdy's Station, N. Y., provided said John L. Merritt waives in writing all claims whatsoever for damages due to the raising of the water in the basin of said reservoir, or to any other causes.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the same was adopted.

The Committee also recommended that that part of the resolution adopted on July II, 1894, approving of bill of C. B. Travis for lease of right of way through property of E. H. Ganong, made necessary by flooding of highways at Carmel, N. Y., in June, 1894, amounting to ten dollars, and ordering the same certified to the Comptroller for payment, be rescinded; and, in lieu thereof, recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners (subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment) hereby approve the accompanying bill of C. B. Travis for lease of right of way through property of E. H. Ganong, made necessary by flooding of highways at Carmel, N. Y., in June, 1894, amounting to ten dollars, and direct that the same be certified to the Comptroller for payment.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the recommendation was approved and the resolution.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners on November 23, 1893, approving of bill for taxes due the Town of South East, Putnam County, N. Y., School District No. 2, for the year 1893, amounting to one hundred and twenty dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$120.39), and ordering the same certified to the Comptroller for payment, be and hereby is rescinded.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners on July 11, 1894, approving of bill for taxes due the Town of South East, Putnam County, N. Y., for the year 1893, amounting to fifteen hundred and one dollars and sixty-six cents (\$1,501.66), and ordering the same certified to the Comptroller for payment, be and hereby is rescinded.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have said vouchers canceled upon the books of the Aqueduct Commissioners.

The Committee also presented forms of contract, specifications and bond, received from the Commissioner of Public Works on July 13, 1894, to provide for constructing highways or roads, and their appurtenances, fences, etc., at Reservoir "D," in the Towns of Carmel and Kent, Putnam County, N. Y., and recommended the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the forms of contract, specifications and bond, submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works on July 13, 1894, and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation "as to form," for constructing highways or roads and their appurtenances, fences, etc., at Reservoir "D," in the Towns of Carmel and Kent, Putnam County, N. Y., be and the same are hereby approved and adopted; and the Secretary is hereby directed to have triplicate copies thereof prepared for certification by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and filed in accordance with section 25, chapter 490, Laws of 1883.
