MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

Subject—Annual Report of Examination of Comptroller's and Chamberlain's Accounts for the Year 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and the Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—Section 195 of the Charter reads in part as follows:

"* * * The accounts of the Chamberlain shall be annually closed on the last day of December, and shall be examined in the month of January in each year by the Commissioners of Accounts. Such Commissioners shall examine the accounts and vouchers of all moneys received into and paid out of the City Treasury during the year ending on the last day of December next, preceding such examination, and shall certify and report to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen in the following month of February the amount of moneys received into the Treasury during such year, the amount of moneys paid out during the same period by virtue of warrants drawn on the Treasury by the Comptroller, the amount of moneys received by the Chamberlain who shall be in office at the time of such examination, if he entered upon the execution of his duties since the last preceding report, the balance in the Treasury on the last day of December preceding such examination, the amount of moneys borrowed for or on the credit of the City during such year, and the amount of the bonds of the City issued during such year, with the purposes for which and the authority under which such bonds were issued. Such Commissioners shall also compare the warrants drawn by the Comptroller on the Treasury during the year ending on the last day of December preceding such examination, with the several laws and ordinances under which the same shall purport to have been drawn, and shall in like manner certify and report whether the Comptroller had power to draw such warrants; and if any shall be found which, in their opinion, he had no power to draw, they shall specify the same in their report, with their reasons for such opinion."

The magnitude of the work involved in this mandatory provision of the Charter is much greater than was appreciated by the framers thereof, and it has not been found feasible to await the end of the year before making the examination and comparison of vouchers and warrants demanded. As a matter of practice and to fully comply with the requirements of the law, the Commissioners of Accounts employ six Accountants on their staff to perform this duty and their work is continuous from the beginning to the end of the year.

Certification.

The Commissioners of Accounts do hereby certify that they have complied with the law as quoted above, and that for the year 1904 they have examined 124,045 vouchers paid by the Comptroller, and have examined and compared 124,045 warrants drawn by the Comptroller on the Treasury in payment thereof, making a total of 248,090 papers examined; they do further certify and report that, in their opinion, the Comptroller was duly authorized by the several laws and ordinances to draw the warrants examined and that none was found which was improperly drawn; and finally, they do certify and report that they have made from the books of account of the City Chamberlain a compilation of the moneys received into and paid out of the City Treasury, from which the following condensed statement is prepared:

Gentlemen—At the last meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Queens Borough Library held February 15, 1905, the salaries of several of the employees of the library were voted increased. All but three of them have been approved by your Board for their respective grades. The following cases have been referred back to us with a request that reasons for the payment of a salary higher than that already paid in the grade be given.

The Librarian, Miss J. F. Hume, to whom a salary of \$2,000 has been voted, has had additional work and responsibility during the past year owing to the opening of the three new Carnegie Libraries; during the coming year three additional Carnegie Libraries will be opened and she will then have 11 branches under her supervision. A circulation of nearly 300,000 volumes was reached during the past year. The work of Miss Hume requires executive ability of no small order and she has done most efficient and valuable work in the management of the library's affairs. Miss Hume's salary has been \$1,500.

The Assistant Librarian, Miss Bowen, to whom a salary of \$1,200 has been voted, has been and will remain in charge of the cataloguing department. The work of cataloguing has increased as new branches are opened in addition to which all new books for the regular branches require the exacting attention which has been given by Miss Bowen. The services she has rendered and which require also considerable executive ability have been very efficient. Miss Bowen's salary has been \$900.

The Junior Assistant Librarian, Miss Jones, to whom a salary of \$660 was voted, does clerical and office work acting as Assistant to the Secretary in recording minutes of meetings held by the Board of Trustees and doing other responsible work in correspondence and on bills for materials furnished the library. Miss Jones's salary has been \$540.

The changes were considered well deserved by the Board, who voted unanimously for them. We trust, therefore, that your Honorable Board will sanction them and have the new schedule date from February 1, 1905. It was a matter of regret to the Board of Trustees that their February meeting could not be held at an earlier date during the month so that this matter could have been placed in your hands sooner.

The position demands a high quality of executive ability and involves the supervision of the entire force of Laborers and Mechanics employed in the City Departments of the Greater New York and the regulation of the various changes in that service. They number some 20,000.

The labor service, which, in 1895, covered only the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, now extends over the Greater City, and includes the counties of Nassau, Putnam, Westchester, Dutchess and Ulster.

Sir—In regard to the request of the Municipal Civil Service Commission to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the salary of the position of Labor Clerk in the office of the said Commission be fixed at \$3,500 per annum, being an increase over present salary of \$500, which request has been referred to me for investigation, I beg to report as follows:

The present occupant of the position was appointed January 27, 1896, with annual salary of \$1,200. On July 1, 1896, his salary was fixed at \$1,500; on June 1, 1898 (five months after consolidation of Greater New York), his salary was fixed at \$2,500, and on December 29, 1899, the salary of the position was made \$3,000.

It is very difficult to get an accurate comparison of the duties and salary of this position with those of other positions, for the reason that there are no other positions exactly the same or similar in either the municipal or State service.

—each receives an annual salary of \$3,000, and \$600 in lieu of traveling expenses. The United States Civil Service Commissioners receive \$3,500 per annum each. In New York City the Municipal Commissioners receive no salary, with the exception of the President, whose salary is \$6,000 per annum.

These positions are, however, more honorary than remunerative, and an examination shows that in most cases the men appointed to these Commissionerships do not have to depend entirely upon the salaries received from this source for their living.

The Labor Clerk has charge of all certifications of Laborers in the Greater City, and also Laborers employed by the City in the Counties of Nassau, Putnam, Westchester, Dutchess and Ulster.

According to the annual report of the Municipal Civil Service Commission there were 3,930 appointments to labor positions during 1903, and the number of applications filed during that year was 10,621; number of changes of title, 300; number of transfers, 76; number of resignations, 536, and number of reinstatements, 791.

Hon. Bird S. Coler, former President of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, in requesting the creation of the proposed salary, stated that "the position demands a high quality of executive ability and involves the supervision of the entire force of laborers and mechanics employed in the City Departments of the Greater New York, and the regulation of the various changes in that service. They number some 20,000."

Dear Sir—Inclosed herewith you will find a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Health at its meeting held Wednesday, March 1, 1905, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to fix the salary of that nurse in the employ of the Department of Health who is assigned to duty in charge of the staff of nurses engaged in the work of this Department in the public schools and tenement houses at the rate of \$1,200 per annum.

The salaries of the other nurses assigned to this work are at the rate of \$900 per annum, but the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is requested to discriminate in favor of the person in charge of these nurses for the reason that she has entire charge of all school nurses and also those assigned to contagious disease work, and she is responsible for the efficiency and character of the work performed by each nurse in all boroughs of the City. It is her duty to make the necessary arrangements for the beginning of the nurses' work in the schools and to see that the supplies are provided by the Department of Education for each school.

The Supervising Nurse regulates the proper amount of work for each, making whatever changes are necessary, and she inspects the work of the nurses as far as possible and necessary and sees that record is kept of the time spent in each school. It is her duty to instruct the nurses as to the proper methods of carrying out orders and treatment, and she is responsible for the discipline of the service. She receives each week a report of the work done by each Nurse, which she examines and submits to the Medical Inspector in charge of the Division of Contagious Diseases, along with a summary of all reports.

It is the duty of the Supervising Nurse to make a report in writing of the work of each Nurse, which contains a record of each Nurse's practical ability, punctuality, tact, etc. Applicants for the position of School Nurse are interviewed by her and their credentials obtained and investigated, which results she forwards, with her own recommendation, to the Board of Health.

The Supervising Nurse reports to the Sanitary Superintendent in the Borough of Manhattan and to the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent in each of the other boroughs when requested by them. The staff of Nurses in charge of the Supervising Nurse numbers 44, assigned to duty as follows:

Excavation—

Furnish all labor and material required to do all the excavation necessary for the foundation, etc., and all back filling necessary.

Stone Foundation—

Furnish all labor and material necessary for footings concrete and construct a proper stone foundation in accordance with detail plan.

Brickwork—

Furnish all labor and material required to erect brick piers and walls for building, using the same style brick, water table, lentils, sills, etc., as now on present building, lining the interior of walls with hollow brick, all in accordance with detail plan.

Also finish off the building with a brick cornice in keeping with design of present building, topping off the walls with a stone coping same as present building.

Also where partitions are shown in the interior of building, same to be constructed of hollow brick.

Also this contractor to hang all sash with brass chain, furnishing the proper sash weights and any other hardware to render this work complete.

Roofing and leader—

Furnish all labor and material to lay a tin roof with Meurer's old style roofing tin, under side of tin to receive a coat of metallic paint before it is laid; also make the proper size leader connections to cast-iron leader, furnished under plumbers' specification.

Roof to receive three coats of Prince's metallic paint and guaranteed for one year.

Skylight—

Furnish and erect a galvanized iron skylight, 4 feet by 4 feet, with heavy wire-ribbed glass top and stationary louvers on sides.

Window guards and doors—

Furnish and erect for all windows, iron guards, to be built in brick work.

Also furnish and erect an iron gate and frame, with a Yale lock, similar to those now on other gates in the prison building, with three keys; lock to be operated from either side.

Also furnish a new lock for iron gate leading from present Female Prison to Matron's office, with three keys.

All of the above to be done in accordance with detail drawings and approved by the Engineer in charge.

Painting—

This contractor to give all the inside woodwork and trim a hard-oil finish, and all outside iron and woodwork three coats of paint, color to be selected by the City.

Composite Floor—

Furnish all labor and material to lay R. A. Keasby Company, or equal thereto, sanitary floor in Matron's office and in both toilet and bath rooms, color to be selected by the City.

Plumbing and Gas Fitting—

Furnish all labor and material to run the proper size gaspipe for both floors, leaving outlets for fixtures where directed by the Engineer in charge.

Number of fixtures as follows:

One combination fixture, Matron's office, 3 gas, 3 electric.

One combination fixture, Matron's quarters, 2 gas, 2 electric.

Four combination wall fixtures, 1 gas, 2 electric.

Wall fixtures to be located where directed by Engineer in charge.

Fixtures to be similar in design to those in new building.

Waste and Vent Lines—

Furnish all labor and material required to run a 4-inch extra heavy cast-iron sewer line from the nearest connection in present building, carry same up through new building, leaving outlets for waste connections for closets, basins and bath, as shown on drawing; also run a separate line for leader.

Also run a 2-inch galvanized vent line for the above fixtures; all of the above to comply with the Sanitary Laws of Manhattan.

Fixtures—

Furnish and connect two (2) syphon jet closets with post hinge quartered oak seats 1½ inches thick.

Furnish and connect one (1) iron enameled roll rim bath-tub 5 feet 6 inches with No. 4½ Fuller's double bath cock, with standing overflow and waste, with brass trap and connections, the outside of tub to receive three coats of white paint and finished off with a coat of white enamel.

Furnish and connect two (2) roll rim enameled iron basins, 24-inch, with Fuller's basin cocks, and N. P. traps and connections with N. P. chain stays, chain and rubber stoppers and N. P. soap tray attached.

The two syphon closets to be connected to flushometers of Kenny, Pierce, Butler & Pierce, Motts or equal thereto, with an extra valve on each flushometer for adjustment of pressure.

Hot and Cold Water Lines—

Furnish all labor and material required to run the proper size hot and cold water lines, for all fixtures, furnishing all stops, valves, etc., necessary, using galvanized lead lined pipe and fittings.

All of the above to be done in compliance with the Sanitary Laws of Manhattan.

Electric Work—

Furnish all labor and material required to run the proper size iron pipe conduits to receive the electric light wires, leaving outlet boxes for fixtures to run the same general direct as the gas pipe, wiring to be of size for the proper conduction of current and when work is completed a certificate of acceptance must be delivered to this Department by the contractor from the Bureau of Water, Gas and Electricity.

Steam Heating—

Furnish all labor and material necessary to run the risers and returns for radiators as shown on drawings.

Contractor may use what radiators we have, and furnish the balance, to be of size sufficient to heat the room to 70 degrees in zero weather; contractor to furnish all valves, air valves, etc., required to render the same a practical working apparatus in every respect.

Covering—

This contractor to cover all cold and hot water and steam pipes where exposed, with sectional covering and moulded fittings.

Bronze all radiators, steam and return lines, the color to be selected by the City.

All of the above work must be done to the entire satisfaction of the Engineer in charge and approved by the Commissioner of Correction.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Street Cleaning Department of The City of New York to cause all sidewalks in front of any lot or lots, building or buildings to be cleaned of all snow and ice twenty-four hours after the falling of any snow or the forming of any ice on said sidewalk or walks, in front of any lot, lots, building or buildings, within the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Street Cleaning Department to cause to be made a list of the names of the owner or owners, or if the names of the owners cannot be ascertained, the street number, if any, or in case there is no street number the block and section number, or an accurate description by street or avenues on which said lot, lots, building or buildings are located, said list shall immediately be sent to the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York.

Sec. 5. The Corporation Counsel of The City of New York shall immediately cause to be filed in the Department of Taxes and Arrears a statement showing the amount due and costs of the penalty for the violation of this ordinance; and it shall be the duty of the Collector of Taxes of The City of New York to collect said penalty and costs against each and every owner of any lot, lots, building or buildings within the boroughs hereinbefore mentioned.

This amount is necessary to meet the deficiency in this appropriation. Ware, John A. Schappert, Elias Goodman, James Cowden Meyers, John J. Dietz, Charles Ahner, James Owens, John H. Dougherty, Philip Harnischfeger, Peter J. Stumpf, William E. Morris, Arthur H. Murphy, Frank Gass, Peter A. Sheil, Robert F. Downing, John J. Bridges, Moses F. Wafer, J. Richard Kevin, William C. Boerner, John Diemer, Patrick H. Malone, Frederick Lundy, Francis P. Kenney, Andrew M. Gillen, Ardolph L. Kline, James W. Redmond, John D. Gunther, Owen J. Murphy, Patrick S. Keely, Frederick Brenner, William Wentz, John Wirth, John Hann, Ferdinand Haenlein, Frank Bennett, Henry F. Grimm, Herman Koch, John E. McCarthy, William T. James, Martin W. Lochner, John J. Collins, John D. Gillies and Cornelius A. Shea, are members of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York and compose the said Board of Aldermen; that the above named Charles V. Fornes is President of said Board of Aldermen, and that the said Board of Aldermen is a body created by law, and that the said Charles V. Fornes, as President of said Board, is presiding officer thereof, appointed pursuant to law.

Third—That heretofore and in and by chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, entitled "An act to provide for rapid transit railways in cities of over one million inhabitants," it was, among other things, provided that in cities having over one million inhabitants, the Mayor of said city might any time after the passage of said act appoint five persons, residents of said city, who shall be Commissioners of Rapid Transit under the provisions of said act; that The City of New York is a city of more than one million inhabitants, and that the Mayor of The City of New York did heretofore appoint a Board of Rapid

Transit Commissioners, which Board duly entered upon the discharge of its duties, and that it or its successors are and were at the times hereinafter mentioned duly performing the same and exercising the powers and authority duly vested in them by said chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, and the amendments thereof.

Fourth—That said Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners has power, among other things, to consider and determine whether it is for the interest of the public and of the City in which it is appointed that a rapid transit railway or railways for the convenience and transportation of persons and property should be established therein, to locate the route of the railway or railways within the boundaries of such city as it may deem to be for the interests of the public and of the said City; that said act further provided, among other things, that after a determination by said Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners of any such route or routes and any such general plan of construction of said railway or railways, the said Board should transmit to the Common Council of said City a copy of said plans and conclusions as adopted. That said act, as amended by chapter 585 of the Laws of 1902, further provided that said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners may also, from time to time, grant a right or rights, franchise or franchises, or enter into a contract or contracts upon application to said Board of any railroad corporation owning or actually operating a railroad wholly or in part within the limits of the City in which said Board has power to act, and that upon the making of such agreement and fixing of the route of such railroad as therein provided should prepare a certificate setting forth the action taken and the grant made by the said Board in respect to connecting or extending the route or routes of said railroad; the said certificate being subject to the consent of the local authorities having control of the streets or highways above or under which is was proposed to construct or operate the said railway.

Fifth—That the said act further provides, among other things, that "It shall be the duty of such Common Council, upon receiving such copy of plans and conclusions, to appoint a day not less than one week nor more than ten days after the receipt thereof for the consideration of such plans and conclusions, and the said Common Council shall, on the day so fixed, proceed with the consideration thereof and may continue and adjourn such consideration from time to time until a final vote shall be taken thereon, as hereinafter provided. Within four weeks after the copy of such plans and conclusions adopted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners shall have first been received by said Common Council, a final vote shall be taken thereon by ayes and nays, in the form of a vote upon a resolution to approve such plans and conclusions, and to consent to the construction of a railway or railways in accordance therewith."

Sixth—That the New York Connecting Railroad Company is a railroad corporation duly incorporated under the Laws of The City of New York, and owns and actually operates railroads now constructed which are wholly within the limits of The City of New York; that said New York Connecting Railroad Company is desirous of connecting the railroad now constructed by it with the railroad of the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad Company, and thereby with the railroad of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, and also with the railroad of the Long Island Railroad Company, and with the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company; that said railroad company has duly filed its route and profile in the offices of the clerks of the Counties of Queens and New York, as required by the railroad law; and that thereafter the said railroad company, pursuant to section 32, chapter 4, of the Laws of 1891, as amended by chapter 584 of the Laws of 1902, made application to the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, to fix and determine the route or routes by which the said railroad company might connect with said railroad companies above-mentioned, and the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners did thereafter by concurrent vote of at least six of its members fix and determine the location and plans of construction of such new railroad company of the New York Connecting Railroad Company, and did issue to said railroad company a certificate as provided by said act prescribing the terms and conditions and setting forth the plan and route of said railroad as fixed by said Board.

Seventh—That heretofore and on or about the 28th day of June, 1904, the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, for The City of New York, transmitted to the said Board of Aldermen of The City of New York a communication containing a copy of the plan of construction of a railway to be constructed within The City of New York, together with their conclusions as to the necessity for the same; reciting that said railway was proposed to be constructed by a steam railroad corporation known as the New York Connecting Railroad Company, which already owns and operates a railway within the boundaries of The City of New York. Said communication contained also the certificate of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York to the said New York Connecting Railroad Company, authorizing said company to construct and operate said railroad in accordance with the terms and limitations of the said certificate and that said communication recommended that it is for the interest of the public and of The City of New York that the necessary constitutional consents to the construction and operation of said proposed railroad should be obtained as soon as possible; which said certificate and communication were adopted by said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, in pursuance of the powers vested in them by section 32 of said Act of 1891, as amended by chapter 584 of the Laws of 1892.

Eighth—That thereafter in pursuance of the requirements of said Rapid Transit act the said Board of Aldermen did appoint a day for the consideration of said plans and conclusions, and that a public hearing was held thereon on the 29th day of July, 1904, at which no opposition to said plan was manifested, but that said Board of Aldermen has wholly failed to take a final vote upon the said plans and conclusions, although the four weeks' time has expired within which by the terms of the said Act of 1891 the said Board of Aldermen is required to take such final vote upon a resolution to approve such plans and conclusions and consent to the construction of such railway in accordance therewith.

Ninth—That the said communication from the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners was referred to the Committee on Bridges and Tunnels by said Board of Aldermen, and that by section 22 of the Rules of the Board of Aldermen it is provided, among other things, "A committee to whom there shall have been referred any such matter as is specified in section 48 of the Charter, or any matter in regard to which any law or ordinance fixes a time limit for the consideration thereof by the Board shall, at the last regular meeting of the Board preceding the expiration of such time limit, be deemed to be discharged and from further consideration thereof."

Tenth—That an order to show cause, returnable in less than eight days herein, is asked for the reason that it is necessary that some action should be taken by the said Board of Aldermen either in favor of or against the said plan without further delay; that no reason exists why the Board of Aldermen should not convene and act; that it is necessary that the right of your petitioner to require the said Board to take action should be determined as speedily as possible; that the continued delay in passing upon this franchise is detrimental to the best interests of The City of New York and to the public.

Wherefore, your petitioner prays for an order to show cause why a peremptory writ of mandamus should not issue out of and under the seal of this Court directed to the above-named persons composing the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, requiring the said Board to convene and take a final vote upon the plans and conclusions adopted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for the construction of a railway within The City of New York by the New York Connecting Railroad Company by ayes and nays in the form of a vote upon a resolution to approve such plans and conclusions and to consent to the construction of a railway or railways in accordance therewith, or that your petitioner may have such other or further relief in the premises as to the Court shall seem proper.

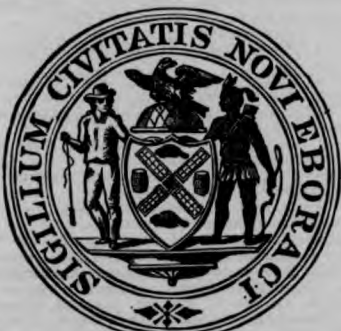

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath in writing of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
