

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, ¿ NEW YORK, March 16, 1880.

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on applications for permits; weekly reports from Riverside Hospital; on work performed by Vaccinating Corps; on applications for relief from orders; weekly report of work performed by Sanitary Corps of Police; weekly report of work performed by Meat Inspectors; weekly report of work performed by Disinfecting Corps; weekly report of work performed by Milk Inspectors; report on platform of Manhattan Railway at Chatham square; on application for sewer in Avenue "A," between Tenth and Eleventh avenues; report on certain street pavements.

From the Attorney and Counsel: Weekly report and report on violations of tenement-house law to this effect: That in the construction of the tenement-house in course of erection on the north side of Ffty-sixth street, 150 feet west of Seventh avenue; all work on said building was discontinued by the builders, pending the application to the court, and consequently no injunction was applied for. Ordered on file.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 13, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,421, as follows, viz.: I public building, 757 tenement houses, 92 private dwellings, 63 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 18 stores and warehouses, 39 stables, 51 slaughter houses, I lime-kiln, I garbage dump, 2 manure dumps, I public bridge, I rail road, I lodging-house, I packing house, 4 sunken and vacant lots, 3 bone and rag houses, 33 yards, courts, and areas, 41 cellars and basements, 95 waste pipes and drains, 87 privies and water-closets, 20 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 22 dangerous stairways, 14 other nuisances, together with 67 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 568.

During the past week 88 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 42 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

92 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 80 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 59 houses, 59 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

11 cases of contagious disease were removed to Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 531 births, 40 still-births, 150 marriages, and 529 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bugeau during the week ending Saturday, March 13, 1880. This shows a decrease of 18 births, 4 still-births, 3 marriages, and 12 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 11 births and 19 marriages, and a decrease of 5 still-births and 75 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 1; diphtheria, 8; whooping cough, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; alcoholism, 1; pneumonia, 18; heart diseases, 10; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; convulsions, 4; apoplexy, 8; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 10; Bright's disease and nephritis, 10; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 14; erysipelas, 3; malarial fevers, 3; puerperal diseases, 1; inanition, 3; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 15; bronchitis, 3; aneurism, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 9, cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; premature and preternatural births, 4; suicide, 2, and drowning, 2. The number of deaths from croup, typhoid fever, diarrhoeal diseases, rheumatism and gout, hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, and cyanosis and atelectasis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 98 were in institutions, 278 in tenement houses, 142 in houses containing 3 families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 1 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 107 on the first, 144 on the second, 101 on the third, 55 on the fourth, 15 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 525 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 4 non-residents. 63 were stated to be single, 131 married, 50 widowed, and the condition of 285 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 529; still-births, 40; bodies in transitu, 30. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 63 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 531 births, 150 marriages, 40 still-births, 529 deaths, 30 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 30 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 9 transcripts of the birth record, 1 of marriage, and 17 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 13, 1880, was 29.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.109, the mean humidity was 93, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,310, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.85 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The actual mortality for the week ending March 6, 1880, was 552; this is 10 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 34.6 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.92 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,107,345.

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending March 13, 1880, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending March 6, 1880.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 529 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 13, 1880, which is a decrease of 12, as compared with the number reported during the preceding week, and 75 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending March 6, 1880, was 552, which is 34.6 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.92 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,107,345.
