Petition for additional ferry accomodation between the City of New York and Staten Island.

In connection therewith Alderman Cleary offered the following:

Whereas, It appears by the petition, this day presented, of a large number of citizens of Staten Island, many of whom are engaged in business and pay taxes in the City of New York, that the present ferry accommodations between this city and Staten Island are inadequate, and that the convenience, comfort, business and property interests of great numbers of such citizens require the establishment and regulation by this Council of two additional ferries from this city to Elm Park, on the North Shore of Staten Island, and certain intermediate points on such shore.

Resolved, That the prayer of said petition, that two such ferries be established and regulated by this Council, be and the same is hereby granted, and that in accordance therewith two ferries be and the same are hereby established and regulated, as follows:

One ferry between Pier No. Eighteen, at or near the foot of Cortlandt street, in the City of New York, and Elm Park, on the North Shore of Staten Island, upon which ferry, when operated, steamboats adapted to the convenient transportation of foot passengers, teams and freight shall make at least ten round trips each day between said termini, touching, on each trip to and fro, at New Brighton, West Brighton and Port Richmond, also on said North Shore.

One ferry between the City of New York at the foot of Barclay street, or at any point between Coenties Slip on the East river and Barclay street on the North river, at which the lessee may be able to obtain proper landing accommodations, and Elm Park on the North Shore of Staten Island, upon which ferry, when operated, steamboats adapted to the convenient transportation of foot passengers, teams and freight, shall make at least ten round trips each day between said termini, touching, on each trip to and fro, at New Brighton, West Brighton, and Port Richmond, also on said North Shore.

The majority and minority of the Committee on Law Department each presented a report on the subject of amending or modifying the laws passed to improve the Civil Service in this State, as follows:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

We, the undersigned members of the Committee on Law of the Common Council of the City of New York, to whom was referred the annexed resolutions, marked respectively 8 and 11, do respectfully

REPORT:

That, in pursuance of notice from the Chairman of our Committee, we met on the 14th, 17th, 21st and 31st days of January, 1885, and considered the advisability of the adoption or rejection of the said resolutions by your Board.

That the Police Commissioners, the President of the Fire Department, and the Secretary of the Civil Service Advisory Board having been requested to appear before your Committee failed to attend and no testimony was adduced.

That the first testite resident was advised to regulate and improve the Civil

That the first statute passed by the Legislature of this State to regulate and improve the Civil Service thereof is to be found in chapter 354 of the Laws of 1883; that by section 8 of said act the members of the uniformed force of the Police and Fire Departments were specially exempted from the operation of said statute.

That thereafter, and on the 29th day of May, 1884, by section 2 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1884, section 8 of chapter 354 of the Laws of 1883, was amended so as to include the members of the uniformed force of the Police and Fire Departments of the City of New York for admission into the Civil Service

That said amendment was not to take effect until after three months after the passage of said act,

to wit: August 29, 1884.

That, in pursuance of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1884, the Mayor of the City of New York did, on the 22d day of August, 1884, prescribe the regulations for admission into the Civil Service of the

Now, therefore, your Committee is of opinion that inasmuch as the Civil Service laws relating to the Fire and Police Departments of the City of New York have been in force for a period of only five months, it would not be wise at this time to agitate a repeal or modification of the same, but on the contrary, your Committee is of the opinion that it is but just to the members of the Legislature and the Governor who approved of said laws that the same be given a fair trial, and that the aforesaid period of operation is not a sufficient trial of such laws.

And we therefore recommend to this Honorable Board that the annexed preamble and resolutions

And we therefore recommend to this Honorable Board that the annexed preamble and resolutions be not adopted. And your Committee request to be discharged from the further consideration of the annexed

preamble and resolutions.

The minority of the Committee on Law Department, to which was referred a preamble and resolutions requesting the Legislature of this State to so amend the laws passed to improve the Civil Service, as to exempt applicants for appointment to the Police and Fire Departments of this city from the operations of said laws, respectfully

Which was laid over.

#### REPORT:

That the preamble to the resolution so referred to the Committee so clearly sets forth the injurious effects of the laws named, apon the departments mentioned, that it appears to be superfluous to add any additional arguments to induce your Honorable Body to adopt the resolution. The reasons given, however, apply with equal force to other departments of the City Government. The Department of Public Parks, that employs policemen, gatemen, gardeners, etc.; the Department of Charities and Correction, which employs attendants in the asylums, and other minor officers; the Department of Docks, that employs skilled laborers, mechanics, etc., in every one of whom physical perfection is far preferable to mental acquirements, should also be excepted from the provisions of the Civil Service laws. In fact, the undersigned are clearly of opinion that the interests of the city, and the efficiency of its Civil Service will be promoted by excepting all the employees holding minor positions in the several departments and offices of the city from the operation of these laws. Entertaining these opinions and feeling assured that the Civil Service will not be injuriously affected, but, on the contrary, will be improved by the exemptions named above, the undersigned respectfully offers for your adoption the following resolution, in lieu of the preamble and resolution referred to the Committee:

Resolved, That the members of the Common Council, the representatives of the people of this city, hereby respectfully prays the Honorable the Legislature of the State of New York, now in session, to repeal the amendments or modify the existing laws passed to improve the civil service in this State, so as to except applicants for appointment in the Police and Fire Departments of this city from the operations of said laws; and also to except applicants for appointment in all the other departments and branches of the City Government whose wages or compensation will not exceed the sum of one thousand two hundred dollars each per annum, from the operations of said

exceed the sum of one thousand two hundred dollars each per annum, from the operations of said laws; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing resolution be duly authenticated by the signature of the Clerk of this Board, and transmitted to the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the Assembly, and to each of the representatives of this city in the Legislature of the State, who are hereby requested to use every honorable means to secure the repeal of the amendments of the Civil Service laws, so as to except the Police and Fire Departments of this city from their provisions, and a modification of said laws, so as to except applicants for appointment in all the other departments and branches of the City Government, whose wages or compensation will not exceed the sum of one thousand two hundred dollars each per annum, from the operations of said laws.

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 31, 1885

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,309.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,407.

During the past week 179 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 31 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 16 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 13 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks, 35 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 42 visits were made, and 38 disinfections and 10 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 8.

The number of vaccinations performed was 437, of which 22 were primary and 411 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 5,970 pounds of meat and 1,070 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 57; the number of analyses of same made was 7

The certificates of 579 births, 64 still-births, 282 marriages, and 677 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 31, 1885. This shows an increase of 23 births, 10 still-births, 113 marriages and 27 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was an increase of 9 births, 5 still-births, 43 marriages and 93 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 9; whooping cough, 1; creebro-pinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 6; puerperal diseases, 1; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 7; heart diseases, 9; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; gastrius, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1, cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 8; diphtheria, 10; croup, 6; erysipelas, 8; typhoid fever, 4; diarrheeal diseases, 6; bronchitis, 10; pneumonia, 2; aneurism, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 10; convulsions, 6; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 24; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; premature and preternatural births, 5. The number of deaths from cancer, surgical operations, and suicide was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 127 were in institutions, 386 in tenement-houses, 152 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 112 on the first, 177 on the second, 135 on the third, 72 on the fourth, 32 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 677 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 83 were stated to be single, 161 married, 81 widowed, and the condition of 352 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 677; still-births, 64; bodies in transitu, 14; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 74 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 579 births, 282 marriages, 64 still-births, 677 deaths; 14 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 139 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 14 of marriage, and 93 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 31, 1885, was 22.3 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.853, the mean humidity was 91, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,700, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.07 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 610 deaths and still-births, or 82.32 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 25; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 245; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 90; Greenwood (undenominational), 35; Lutheran (undenominational), 103; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 13; Evergreen (undenominational), 37; Woodlawn (undenominational), 17; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 14; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L.
