At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held October 29, 1881, the following preamble and resolution were adopted, viz. : "Whereas, The Comptroller has reported to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the revenues of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, in the year 1882, are estimated at \$4,500,000, and that no bonds or stocks of the City of New York, for which said fund was pri-marily pledged, fall due during said year; and "Whereas, The total amount of bonds and stocks falling due in 1882, originally payable from taxation, is \$1,757,153.94; and "Whereas, The total amount of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks for which that fund is primarily pledged; therefore, "Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the revenues of the Sinking Fund do hereby certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the revenues of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, in the year 1882, are estimated at \$4,500,000, and that no bonds or stocks of the City of New York, of which said fund was primarily pledged, fall due during said year, and that the total amount of bonds and stocks, originally payable from taxation, falling due during said year, is \$1,757,153.94, and that the amount of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks tor which said fund was pledged before the passage of chap-ter 383 of the Laws of 1878, the securities held by said Sinking Fund being more than thirty-six millions of dollars, while the amount of bonds and stocks, for which said fund is primarily pledged, amounts to less than seventeen millions of dollars." SIR—There were 679 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 22, 1881, which is a decrease of 11, as compared with the number reported he preceding week, and 109 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending October 15, 1881, was 645, which is 147.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.76 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,253,280.
