MINUTES OF MEETING OF ART COMMISSION, HELD AT ITS OFFICES, ROOM 21, CITY HALL, ON TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 16, 1909, AT 4 O'CLOCK P. M.

Present—President de Forest, presiding; Commissioners Millet, Pine, Bigelow, Healy, Brunner, Russell, Adams, Pratt, and Hon. M. J. Kennedy, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, in respect to the designs for the Brooklyn Institute sculpture.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs for sculpture to be placed on the Eastern parkway facade of the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, represented by Exhibits "302-AE," "302-CW," "302-CX," "302-DA," "302-DB," "302-DC," "302-DD," "302-DE," "302-DF," "302-DG" and "302-DH," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. M. J. Kennedy, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs for sculpture to be placed on the west elevation of the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, represented by Exhibits "302-AL," "302-DK," "302-DL," "302-DM" and "302-DN," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. M. J. Kennedy, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

M. J. Kennedy, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves, but as preliminary sketches only, the designs for sculpture to be placed on the Eastern Parkway facade of the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, represented by Exhibits "302-B," "302-CY," and "302-CZ," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commissioner be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. M. J. Kennedy, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

On motion the Assistant Secretary was directed to notify Commissioner Kennedy that when the completed model of Exhibit "302-CZ," Greek Dramatic Art, has been prepared, it should be submitted to the Art Commission for final approval, as Certificate 826 is only preliminary action thereon.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

## Submissions 857 and 858.

The Committees on Police Headquarters Tablet and Police Headquarters Lighting Fixtures presented the following report upon designs submitted by Hon. Theodore A. Bingham, Police Commissioner:

"After mature consideration of the situation, your Committees on Submissions 857 and 858 have decided to recommend the approval of the designs submitted for the tablet and the electric fixtures to be placed in the new Police Headquarters.

"Your Committees in reporting favorably on these two submissions, wish to explain that their action has been largely influenced, if not wholly dictated, by discordant conditions which must under the circumstances be recognized as unalterable and therefore to a large extent mandatory.

"In the opinion of your Committees the building is not suitable and proper for the purposes for which it has been built either in general design or in details of finish. The designs of the tablet and of the electric fixtures are, apart from the building, equally unsatisfactory. But having regard for the harmony of the interior and recognizing that the objects intended to embellish and to furnish it must be selected because they fit their surroundings, rather than because they are appropriate or in good taste, your Committees have decided to recommend the approval of the two submissions.

"The following review of the history of the building clearly shows that the law fixing the duties and the powers of the Art Commission has been ignored or disobeyed in several notable instances.

"Your Committees desire to place upon record the reasons for their action in the present case, and also the history of the connection of the Art Commission with the design and construction of the new Police Headquarters, not in a spirit of recrimination, but as a warrantable action of self defense and further in order that it may serve to stimulate the Art Commission to exercise more efficient activity in making its duties and powers known to architects and contractors.

"The designs for this building were submitted on request of the Mayor to the Commission on November 24, 1903. At the meeting of the Commission on November 28 the Committee recommended approval of the designs and this recommendation was adopted by the Commission. But immediately following, upon a reconsideration of this vote, a motion that the designs be disapproved as of a building for the purposes and site proposed was lost. On request of the President of the Commission, Mr. John De Witt Warner, his vote was recorded in the negative and his memorandum of reasons therefor was received and filed. This memorandum after an argumentative survey concludes as follows: That the site is but inadequately utilized by the designs submitted; that, as designed, the appearance of the building will not be appropriate to the use it is to serve, and that it must be artistically ineffective on any such site when considered with relation to the surroundings that must be assumed. It seems to me that the design submitted should be disapproved."

"On December 8 of the same year the Assistant Secretary wrote to Messrs. Hopkin, Koen & Huntington, the architects of the building, calling their attention to the fact that the paintings, sculpture, etc., which were intended to be put upon this building should be submitted to the Art Commission in due time. This letter was acknowledged by the architects saying that when drawings, models, etc., were ready they would certainly submit them to the Art Commission for its consideration. But these were not submitted. Five important pieces of sculpture placed on the Centre street facade of the building have never been submitted to the Art Commission.

"Under date of March 6, 1907, the Assistant Secretary wrote to Police Commissioner Hon. Theodore A. Bingham, calling his attention to the fact that the mural decorations and sculpture for the new Police Headquarters had never been submitted to the Commission. The Commissioner replied to this saying that the architects had been requested to submit them.

"Inadequate designs for the interior decoration of the building such as marble, color scheme, etc., were submitted to the Commission on July 22, 1907. At the meeting of the Commission on the following day the designs were approved with the exception of the color scheme upon which action could not be taken until sketches or samples should be submitted showing the precise colors to be used. Commissioner Bingham was requested to furnish such a color scheme.

"At the meeting of the Commission on September 10 the color scheme furnished was found to be inadequate, as the various colors were merely marked in ink upon blue prints and again a request was made on the Police Commissioner to furnish a color scheme showing the exact colors to be used.

"This was submitted to the Commission on October 8 and at the meeting of the Commission on that day the Committee made the following report:

"Your Committee on Police Headquarters Interior Decoration, Submission 617, begs to report that they consider the decoration unsuitable for a building of that character. The numerous colors and kinds of materials indicated on the drawing produce a weak and unpleasant effect, and your Committee, therefore, recommend the disapproval of the designs submitted. The report of the Committee was adopted and the designs disapproved.

"Notwithstanding this unfavorable report all of the marble work thus disapproved is now in place in the building."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion the following resolutions were adopted:

## Certificate 827.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the design of a tablet to be placed in the entrance hall of the Police Headquarters, Manhattan, represented by Exhibits "108-AP" and "108-AQ," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. Theodore A. Bingham, Police Commissioner.

## Certificate 828.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs for lighting fixtures for the Police Headquarters, Manhattan, represented by Exhibits "108-AR," "108-AS," "108-AT," "108-AU," "108-AV," "108-AW" and "108-AX," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. Theodore A. Bingham, Police Commissioner.

On motion the Assistant Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of the report of the Committee to Commissioner Bingham for his information.

The Committees were thereupon discharged.

## Submission 861.

The Committee on Heintz Monument presented the following report upon designs (of a new work of art) submitted by the Louis J. Heintz Monument Association:

"The Committee on the proposed monument to Louis J. Heintz report that they have visited the site, and also the bronze foundry of Messrs. Aubry Brothers Company, No. 218 East Twenty-fifth street, and have examined the two bronze figures which are to form a part of the proposed monument. No model, drawing, photograph or other representation, showing the monument as a whole and as it will appear when completed, accompany the application; and a preliminary sketch only of the pedestal has been submitted. The Committee, therefore, in the absence of the necessary information, are unable to make a report; and respectfully recommend that action upon this submission be postponed until the next meeting of the Commission, in order that the necessary additional information may be furnished by the applicants."

On motion, the report of the committee was adopted and action postponed.

## Submission 871.

The Committee on De Witt Clinton Park Pergola recommended that the designs submitted by Hon. Henry Smith, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, be approved.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

## Certificate 829.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs for the alteration of the present pergola building in De Witt Clinton Park, represented by Exhibits "387-A," "387-B," "387-C" and "387-D," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. Henry Smith, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

The committee was thereupon discharged.

## Submission 872.

The Committee on Riverside Drive Comfort Station recommended that the designs submitted by Hon. Henry Smith, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, be approved.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

## Certificate 830.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves, but as preliminary drawings only, the designs for a public comfort station and shelter on the west side of Riverside drive, represented by Exhibits "388-A," "388-B," "388-C," "388-D," "388-E" and "388-F," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. Henry Smith, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

On motion, the Assistant Secretary was directed to notify Commissioner Smith that when working drawings shall have been prepared, they should be submitted to the Art Commission for final approval, as the foregoing resolution is only preliminary action thereon.

The committee was thereupon discharged.

## Submission 874.

During the consideration of this submission, Commissioner Adams retired from the room, he being the sculptor of this statue.

The Committee on Bryant Statue (Public Library) recommended that the designs (of a new work of art) submitted by Hon. Henry Smith, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, be approved.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

## Certificate 831.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of a statue of William Cullen Bryant to be placed in the rear of the New York Public Library, represented by Exhibits "390-A," "390-B" and "390-C," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. Henry Smith, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

The committee was thereupon discharged.

## Submission 875.

The Committee on Lorraine Street Fire Station, Brooklyn, recommended that the designs submitted by Mr. Alexander Stevens, Superintendent of Buildings of the Fire Department, be approved.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves the designs and location of an engine and hook and ladder house at Lorraine and Smith streets, Brooklyn, represented by Exhibits "391-A," "391-B," "391-C," "391-D," "391-E" and "391-F," of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified, with return of duplicates of exhibits herein noted, to Hon. Nicholas J. Hayes, Fire Commissioner.

The committee was thereupon discharged.

Carrere, of Carrere & Hastings, architects, inviting the Commission to view the interior decoration of the New York Public Library which is now being executed in accordance with the designs approved by the Commission several years ago, and reported that the invitation had been accepted and the work viewed with great satisfaction by the Commission.

On motion, the Assistant Secretary was authorized to employ an Expert Cataloguer at an expense not to exceed \$300 for the purpose of cataloguing the new books in the library of the Commission.

On motion, the meeting adjourned.

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Commission's Offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, January 27, 1909, at 10 a. m.

Present—President Frank L. Polk and Commissioners R. Ross Appleton and Arthur J. O'Keefe.

The President, Mr. Frank L. Polk, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of paragraph 12 of Rule XIX. (the labor class) by fixing the probationary period at one month, instead of three. Mr. P. J. Coffey, Labor Clerk of the Commission, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment, which was also approved by Mr. Elliot H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association. There being no opposition, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in Part II. of the labor class the following title: "Rockman and Blaster."

There being no appearances, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A supplementary hearing was had on the proposed transfer of certain Pilots employed in the Department of Docks and Ferries to the newly classified position of Assistant Superintendent of Ferries, to which position they had been temporarily assigned, pending its establishment and classification. Mr. John F. Ambrose, Superintendent of Ferries, addressed the Commission in behalf of the proposed transfer. Mr. Elliot H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, opposed the same. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

Michael Padian, of No. 367 West Eleventh street, then appeared before the Commission, as directed, to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Patrolman for a misstatement as to his age. It appeared from a communication from the Police Commissioner that a transcript of the records of births in the office of the Registrar General of Dublin, Ireland, showed that the candidate had been over thirty years of age on the date of the promulgation of the eligible list.

After the Commission had gone into regular session the minutes of the meeting held January 20 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the first clause of paragraph 12 of Rule XIX. (the Labor Class) be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

"12. It shall be the duty of an appointing officer to submit in such manner as the Commission may prescribe the report of appointments and changes in the Labor Class required by law, and upon the termination of an employment he shall in each case certify to the Commission the reasons therefor. Where such termination is due to a reduction of force the name of the person affected, if he has been employed for a period of one month, or less, shall be restored to the registration list, in its original relative order; if such person has been employed for a longer period than one month, he shall be deemed to be suspended from such employment, and shall be registered upon a preferred list for reinstatement, if his services be again required, in the manner prescribed by clause 1 of Rule XIII. for positions in the competitive class. Any necessary reduction of force shall be made from among those persons who have not been employed for a period of one month, persons who have completed their probationary period having preference for retention."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in Part II. of the labor class the following title: "Blaster."

On motion, the Secretary was instructed, in the event of the classification of the position of Blaster being approved by the Mayor and the State Board, to require applicants for that position to produce a license upon registering.

On motion, the request of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries for approval of the transfer of certain Pilots in the employ of his Department to the position of Assistant Superintendent of Ferries was denied, and the Secretary was directed to proceed with an examination for promotion to the position of Assistant Superintendent of Ferries, to be open to all Pilots (Captains) in the ferry service of the Department who had served as such for a period of six months.

On motion, the matter of Michael Padian was laid over in order to give him an opportunity to file additional proof as to the date of his birth.

A report was presented from Mr. Woodward, Clerk in charge of the Receipt of Applications, dated January 25, in relation to the case of Morgan Davis, a candidate for Patrolman, whose examination notice had been forwarded to one of his "vouchers" (the application having been filed without an address), and had failed to reach him, as the voucher apparently had no knowledge of his address. The matter was referred to the President.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the application of Charles E. Tobin, of No. 136 West Sixty-first street, a candidate for Patrolman, who had been permitted by the Clerk in charge of the Receipt of Applications to change the date of birth given in his application without the knowledge or permission of the Commission. The matter was referred to the President.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated January 23, forwarding copies of the report of the State Board in the matter of the investigation into the enforcement of the Civil Service Law and Rules in the Department of Finance of The City of New York, and inviting the attention of the Commission to the recommendations contained in pages 33, 34 and 35; also announcing that the next meeting of the State Board would be held in New York City on Thursday, February 11, and requesting the use of the Commission's board room for that purpose. The Secretary was directed to reply to the communication and state that the Commission would be glad to have the assistance of the Secretary of the State Commission in the matters referred to, and also to tender to the State Board the use of the board room for their meeting to be held on February 11.

A communication was presented from the State Civil Service Commission, requesting the Commission to take up at once the matter of a general revision of the classification of the City Service. The matter was laid over.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated January 21, stating that at a meeting of that Board, held on January 21, the following resolutions of the Civil Service Commission of New York had been approved:

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, boards or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, marked with the title of the services, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with the name or names of the bidder or bidders, the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at six or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be as become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or to the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the party, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 428 of the Greater New York Charter.
