Gentlemen-On September 7, 1915, the Department of Health requested the amendment of the \$25,000 corporate stock authorization of June 26, 1913, for additional water supply and water lines at the Municipal Sanatorium at Otisville, so as to include a pressure filter and to enclose the reservoir property with a non-climbable

The Bureau of Contract Supervision, to which this request was referred on

September 9, 1915, reports thereon as follows:

'The Department of Health requested that action be delayed on this request, as the necessity for the filter to clear the water, which is very dark and offensive in odor and taste, had not been fully established. The Department desires that no action be taken on the filter part of the request, until later on, when it will be known whether or not the water will clear itself through a spillway that has been constructed.

"The reservoir covers approximately forty acres and the water shed that feeds it has an area of about three hundred acres.

"In its present condition it is impossible to prevent trespassing on the part of fishermen, hunters, people from near-by villages desiring to bathe or skate, or the inmates of the Sanatorium; nor can cattle be kept from wading in the water and contaminating it. There are several approaches to the reservoir over which at the

present time pedestrians can travel without any restraint. "It is proposed to build a wire "non-climbable type" fence around the reservoir, including in its confines the most of the water shed. This fence is to begin at a point about one-half a mile from the southeast corner of the reservoir and run in a northerly direction, about one-eighth of a mile west of the reservoir, for a mile; thence in an easterly direction for a half mile; thence in a southerly direction for

a mile; thence in a westerly direction for a half mile to place of beginning. "Wherever the fence runs through the forest, it is proposed to substitute iron for wooden posts, so that in the event of a forest fire, the fence will not be destroyed

through the burning of the posts. 'The cost of the fence has been estimated at about \$1,400; \$400 for labor and

'There is at present an unencumbered balance of \$1,900.50 in this fund."

Gentlemen-On April 1, 1916, the COMMISSIONER OF PARKS, MANHAT-TAN AND RICHMOND, requested establishment of a grade of position, pursuant to section 56 of the Greater New York Charter. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"Purpose—(1) To establish the grade of position of Forester at \$2,280 per annum for one incumbent.

"Reason—(1) To provide for the employment of a scientifically trained and experienced head of a bureau which is to deal with the long-neglected tree situation in the city streets and parks. In the reorganization of the Department this position takes the place of an Entomologist at \$1,800 and an Arboriculturist at \$1,200, and will provide an assistant to the Chief Engineer, who, in addition to his former duties, now also has supervision of the maintenance and operation of the park working force, the position of Superintendent of Parks at \$4,000 having been eliminated.

"Finding—(1) The work falls in Grade 1 of the Forester Group of the Professional Service of the proposed standard specifications with a salary range from \$1,920 to \$2,700 per annum. This position has been specifically appraised at a minimum of

Gentlemen-On March 8 and 22, 1916, the Board of Education requested establishment, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of rates of compensation for the Janitors of Public Schools Nos. 3 and 48, Manhattan: 41, The Bronx, and the Bushwick High School, Brooklyn. In connection therewith we report as follows:

For the Janitor of the Bushwick High School a schedule of compensation for night activities is proposed, as set forth in the following resolution of the Board of Education adopted March 22, 1916:

"Resolved, That the following rate of additional compensation for night activities in the Bushwick High School be and it is hereby adopted, subject to action as may be necessary, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, pending the adoption of a revised schedule of rates for such activities generally applicable to schools of the system:

'(1) Allowance for Janitor's service as an individual on each and every evening when his presence is required at the school building on account of any evening activity authorized by the Board of Education, per evening.....

'(2) Allowance for overtime for the boiler room force from October 1 to May 15, per month..... 80 00 "(3) Allowance for overtime of cleaning force for all night activities other than Social and Recreation activities, per workshop

15 used "(4) Allowance for Social and Recreation Centre cleaning and patrol duty, per night "-and be it further

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to take action, if necessary, with reference to the matter mentioned in the foregoing resolution, in accordance with section 56 of the Revised Charter." It will be seen from the foregoing schedule that the additional compensation

to be allowed the Janitor of the Bushwick High School for night activities may vary from night to night, according to the number of rooms used. Additional compensation allowed by the Board of Education to Janitors of other schools in connection with night activities is in like manner based upon certain schedules which make the compensation for each night depend upon the number and kind of rooms used.

As regards the fixing of such schedules under the provisions of section 56 of the Charter, no action has heretofore been taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen in view of an opinion rendered under date of Nov. 3, 1910, by the then acting Corporation Counsel to the effect that the action which the last mentioned Boards are called upon to take under section 56 of the Charter contemplates the fixing of definite rates of salary and not merely the fixing of schedules or formulas which are to be used in determining definite allowances of compensation. It will therefore not be necessary for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take action upon the proposed schedule for compensating the Janitor of the Bushwick High School under the provisions of section 56 of the Charter.

The provisions and requirements of the preceding sections of this article, shall not be held to apply to any building, hall, room or rooms, in which only private theatricals, tableaus and other exhibitions for charitable and religious purposes are given, nor to the manager of exhibitions given by amateurs for the benefit of any church, mission, parish or Sunday school, or for any other charitable or religious purpose; nor shall the same be held to apply to any masonic temple; nor to the trustees of any masonic hall and asylum fund, so long as the revenues of said temple shall continue to be applied to the use of the masonic hall and asylum, or other charitable purpose; nor to the Educational Alliance, nor to the directors or officers thereof, as such, with respect to any building which shall in whole or in part be owned or leased, by said Alliance, while so owned or leased, or so long as the revenue thereof shall continue to be applied to the support of the Alliance and to the religious, charitable, social, educational or literary purposes thereof [.]: nor to any bona fide club, association or organization, duly incorporated under the laws of the State of New York for social, literary, educational or athletic purposes, nor to the directors or officers thereof, as such, with respect to any building which shall in whole or in part be owned or leased, by said club, association or organization, while so owned or leased, or so long as the revenue thereof shall continue to be applied to the support of the club, association or organization and to the social, literary, educational or athletic purposes thereof; provided, however, that not more than twelve performances are given during a calendar year.

No person shall sell or offer for sale any commodity or article of merchandise in any market or in any public street or other place, at or for a greater weight or measure than the true measure or weight thereof; and all ice, [coal,] coke, meats, poultry, butter and butter in prints, provisvegetables sold ions, and all other commodities and articles of merchandise (except by the head or bunch) sold in the streets or elsewhere shall be weighed or measured 6 feet from such building line, in any case. by scales, measures or balances, or in measures duly tested, sealed and marked by the commissioner or an inspector of the bureau; provided, that poultry may be offered for sale and sold in other manner than by weight, but in all cases where the person intending to purchase shall so desire and request poultry shall be weighed as hereinbefore provided.

the Code of Ordinances Relating to "Snow and Ice," as Amended.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Subdivision 1 of section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinan es, relating to "Snow and Ice," as amended May 11, 1915, and July 16, 1915, respectively, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

§ 21. Property owners' duties. 1. Must clear sidewalks. Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the city, abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall, within [4] 24 hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the deposit of any dirt or other material upon said sidewalk, remove the snow and ice, dirt or other material from the sidewalk and gutter [,the time between 9 p. m. and 7 a. m. not being included in the above period of 4 hours]; provided, however, that such removal shall in all cases be made before the removal of snow and ice from the roadway by the commissioner of street cleaning, or by the borough president of Queens or Richmond, or subject to the regulations of said commissioner of street cleaning, or of said borough president of Queens or Richmond, for the removal of snow and ice, dirt or other material; except that in the boroughs of Queens or Richmond any owner, lessee, tenant or occupant, or other person who has charge of any ground abutting upon any paved street or public place, for a linear distance of 500 feet or more, shall be considered to have complied with this section, if such person shall have begun to remove the show and ice from the sidewalk and gutter before the expiration of the said [4] 24 hours, and shall continue and complete such removal within a reasonable time.

[Whenever] Any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved who shall [fail] have failed to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the city for the removal of snow and ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or lot abuts, shall, upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine of not more than \$3. In the event that any of the persons above named shall fail to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the city for the removal of snow and ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or lots abuts, the president of the borough in which such building or vacant lot is located may cause such removal to be made, meeting the expense thereof from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund, and thereafter the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the said borough president to the comptroller, and the board of estimate and apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required for the said removal of such snow and ice [and snow], dirt or other

material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made, with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds which shall be sold by the comptroller, as provided by law.

The said borough president shall, as soon as possible, after the work of such removal is done, certify to the corporation counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each [piece of property] lot of ground affected.

The corporation counsel is hereby directed and authorized [to sue for and recover the amount of this expense, together with \$3 penalty for each offense, and when so recovered the amount shall be turned over] to immediately thereafter prepare and file in the office of the clerk of the county in which the particular lot of ground is located, a notice of lien in favor of The City of New York for the amount paid for the removal of such snow and ice, dirt or other material, and in addition thereto the further sum of \$3 penalty for each offense against the particular lot of ground affected; said lien to remain such against said property until paid. The corporation counsel shall serve or caused to be served by mail upon the owner of the property affected a copy of said notice of lien, contained in a securely closed postpaid wrapper, addressed to such owner at his last known place of residence. Upon payment of such lien the corporation counsel shall execute and deliver a satisfaction piece of such lien and turn over the amount so received and collected by him to the city chamberlain to the credit of the general fund of The City of New York for the reduction of taxation.

Section 173. License, Fee and Bond; Term.

The annual license fee for each keeper or proprietor of a massage parlor shall be twenty-five dollars (\$25), and every such keeper or proprietor shall give a bond to the City with sufficient security to be approved by the Commissioner of Licenses in the penal sum of one hundred dollars (\$100), conditioned for the due observance of the provisions of law or ordinance relating to such massage parlors. All licenses for keepers or proprietors of massage parlors shall be issued as of Febuary 1st and shall expire on the 31st day of January next succeeding the date of issuance thereof. Section 174. The lights shall be so placed as to be free from obstruction by other parts of said vehicle. No operator of any motor vehicle, while operating the same upon any street, shall use any acetylene, electric or other headlight, unless it shall be so shaded as not to blind or dazzle other users of the highway, or make it difficult or unsafe for them to ride, drive or walk thereon.]

rator of any motor vehicle, while operating the same upon any street, use any acetylene, electric or other headlight, unless it shall be so shaded as not to blind or dazzle other users of the highway, or make it difficult or unsafe for them to ride, drive or walk thereon.

That the headlights of every motor vehicle should throw sufficient light ahead to reveal any person, vehicle or substantial object upon the roadway straight ahead of such motor vehicle at a distance of at least 150 feet. These lights should be permanently so arranged that no portion of the reflected beam of light, when measured at a point 50 feet or more ahead of the car, shall rise more than 42 inches above the level surface on which a car stands. Said lights should also give sufficient side illumination to indicate any person, vehicle or substantial object within ten feet of the side of said motor vehicle at a point ten feet or more ahead of it.

The term "Beam" as used in this recommendation is to be construed as meaning the approximately parallel rays of light as gathered and projected by a reflector. Sec. 2—This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

This matter was referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision for investigation and report, which report states that the work is necessary and the estimated cost reasonable. The Committee, therefore, recommends that the accompanying resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of One thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500), the proceeds whereof to be used by the President of the Borough of Richmond for the purpose of repairing the storm water culvert across Richmond Turnpike.

The present culvert is too small and must be enlarged, in order to prevent damage by flooding property to the south of Richmond

Turnpike. I transmit herewith copy of a letter from the Corporation Counsel, dated February 1, 1916, in which he states:

"In view of the foregoing facts I would respectfully suggest that you take such action in the premises as will effectively remedy the conditions complained of and thus prevent further suits on the part of the Market Gardeners' Association against the City of New York."

I am also forwarding detailed estimate of the cost of this work.

You will note, from the Corporation Counsel's letter, that in addition to the judgment of \$6,420, which has been confirmed by the Court of Appeals, there are additional suits against the City still untried, amounting to \$173,075.

It is desired that favorable action be taken on this request at the earliest possible date, so that this culvert may be enlarged, thereby preventing any recurrence of damage from flooding. Very truly yours,

Sir-I desire to bring to your attention the following facts in connection with the masonry culvert located under the Richmond Turnpike, west of the Clove Road, Borough of Richmond, which was constructed in 1912, replacing two 24 inch culvert pipes encased in a rubble-stone wall constructed by the County of Richmond in 1896.

York, February 1, 1916.

In February, 1907, the Market Gardeners' Association commenced an action against the City of New York to recover the sum of \$7,000 damages sustained by it to seeds, plants and bulbs during the year 1903 and 1904, caused by the overflow of the water course, which runs under the Richmond Turnpike, due to the insufficient capacity of said culvert, and on April 14, 1909, a judgment was entered against the City of New York and in favor of said Market Gardeners' Association for the sum of \$6,420.

An appeal was taken from said judgment to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, and thereafter to the Court of Appeals, which latter Court affirmed the judgment of the Court below.

Subsequent thereto this department advised your predecessor in office, Mr. George Cromwell, of the decision of the Court of Appeals and suggested that the culvert in question should be reconstructed so as to avoid further overflow of the water course in question, likewise further liability on the part of the City.

In the month of July, 1912, the old pipe culverts were removed and replaced by a masonry culvert having a greater carrying capacity than said pipe culverts. On July 15, 1912, and before the completion of said new culvert, Mr. A. C.

Nellis, Manager of the Market Gardeners' Association, wrote Mr. Louis L. Tribus, Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Richmond, stating among other things,

* * As the work progresses, we are surprised to note that the alleged improvement will give little or no relief to the property south of the Turnpike. We are willing to take this matter up in conference between your engineers,

those of the water company and our engineer at any moment, and will do all in our power to arrive at some amicable settlement of the question without further litigation. However, if your Department insists upon going on with the present plans, we shall immediately turn the matter over to our attorneys.' Notwithstanding this protest, the work appears to have been completed according

to the original plan. On May 6, 1914, another action was commenced against The City of New York by said Market Gardeners' Association, to recover the sum of \$110,825.50 for damages to seeds, etc., caused by the flooding of their land during the years 1905 to 1913, and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue inclusive, which action is still pending and undetermined.

On March 10, 1915, a further claim was filed with the Comptroller of the City by said Market Gardeners' Association for \$65,250 damages to seeds and bulbs, caused Parks, Borough of Queens, for the purpose of certain departmental uses. by floods occurring in the year 1914.

On April 29, 1915, Mr. Theodore Oxholm, Engineer in Charge, Borough of Richmond, replying to a communication addressed to him by Spire Pitou, Esq., Acting President of the Borough of Richmond, requesting further information regarding the claim lastly referred to, stated:

"In reply to your request for additional information relating to the claim for damages of the N. Y. Market Gardeners' Association, and suplementing my report of April 15, 1915, will state that the new concrete culvert across Richmond Turnpike, referred to in the claim, was built without the knowledge of the Bureau of Engineers, which did not design it. In out opinion this culvert is at present inadequate to carry off water from any heavy storm of several hours duration, without flooding the property to the south of Richmond Turnpike.

'I would remind you of a former claim of this company against the City for damages from a similar cause, in which the case was decided adversely to the City.' On August 30, 1915, said Market Gardeners' Association commenced an action against the City to recover the sum of \$62,250 for damages sustained in the year 1914, which action is still pending and undetermined.

On January 10, 1916, said Market Gardeners' Association filed with the Comptroller of the City a further claim against the City for \$105,703 damages sustained in the year 1915, by reason of the flooding of their property.

In view of the foregoing facts, I would respectfully suggest that you take such action in the premises as will effectively remedy the conditions complained of, and thus prevent further suits on the part of the Market Gardeners' Association against The City of New York. Respectfully yours

Hon. Francis P. Kenney, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen: No. 353-President Borough of Richmond-Request for \$1,500 Special Revenue Bonds to Repair and Enlarge the Stormwater Culvert Across Richmond Turnpike.

Sir-In compliance with your request, the necessity for repairs or alteration to the culvert at the location described has been investigated.

This culvert is too small to accommodate the water which reaches it during heavy rainstorms. The result has been that water has backed up and flooded the low lands south of Richmond Turnpike doing alleged damage, in consequence of which suits have been brought against the City and claims filed amounting in the aggregate to some \$285,778.50, covering the period 1903 to 1916. One action brought in 1907 by the Market Gardeners Association for \$7,000, for damages sustained by it to seeds, plants and bulbs, resulted in a judgment being entered against the City to

the amount of \$6,420. The present culvert is of concrete, 5 feet wide by 2 feet 9 inches high. A water pipe crosses inside the culvert cutting off eleven inches from the top, thus reducing its height to one foot 10 inches.

The drainage area, which is stated to be about 410 acres will require the construction of a culvert with a capacity of not less than 410 cubic feet per second.

It is proposed to construct on the westerly side of the present culvert an additional concrete culvert 8 feet 8 inches wide by 2 feet 6 inches in height, which together with the present culvert will provide the capacity required.

It has scaled and rusted badly and should be cleaned thoroughly with a wire brush and receive one coat of red lead and two coats of paint. The amount requested is very reasonable for the work. Repairs to Plumbing, Highland Park, \$100; Repairs to Plumbing, Golf House, \$100.

Funds for these items of work were specifically provided in the 1916 budget. The unencumbered balance in the account should be sufficient to do all emergent repairs. Painting Band Stand, Highland Park, \$100.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Article 3 of Chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances,

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: That Section 1, Article 3 of chapter 24, of the Code of Ordinances relating to Rules of the Road," is hereby amended, by adding to the end thereof a new section o read as follows:

2. Any person riolating this provision shall, upon conviction, be punished by a ine not to exceed \$10 or imprisonment in the City Prison for ten days, or both.

This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor.

Brief Submitted by the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Favoring Proposed Horseshoeing Ordinance Introduced by Alderman Alexander Drescher and as Subsequently Amended Reading as Follows:

Between November 1st and April 1st, in each year, no horse, mule or other large animal used for the purpose of driving or hauling, shall be driven on any of the streets, avenues or highways of the City of New York, unless the animal is shod in such a manner as will prevent, or tend to prevent, slipping. Any person violating this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine not to exceed \$10 or imprisonment in the City Prison for ten days, or both." (Extract.)

The ordinance permits an owner to use his own judgment and discretion as to what character of device he will use and gives him a wide range of choice between pads, slippers, caulks, chains, rough shoeing or any other kind of emergency device

that will do the work, and prevent, or tend to prevent, slipping.

The ordinance has been endorsed by the most representative horse owners and users of the City of New York including the Coal Merchants Association; Retail Dry Goods Association; Safety First Federation of America; Bradley Contracting Co. (copy of whose letter of endorsement is herewith submitted); Degnon Contracting Co. (Mr. Louis Harrington, in charge of their horses and vehicles); Peter Doelger Brewing Co.; Flynn Bros., Contractors; the American Express Co.; B. Altman; Reinfrank Bros.; R. H. Macy; John Wanamaker; Bloomingdale Bros.; Lord & Taylor; J. B. Greenhut & Co.; E. D. & W. D. Stein; John Bingham and William Koster, stable keepers; P. Riordan, Truckman, Miller Bros.; Saks and Co., and the press of the City unanimously.

In addition, its adoption is urged by the Women's League for Animals; the Humane Society of New York; The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to

Animals; all humane workers, and the public generally.

The strong point in favor of the proposed ordinance lies in the fact that it does not describe a particular shoe or shoes, but simply states that "an animal shall be shod in such a manner as will prevent, or tend to prevent, slipping.

The Fire Department of the City of New York; the Bradley Contracting Co. (with over 1,100 horses), the Degnon Contracting Co.; most of the Department Stores and others, have, for a number of years, been shoeing their horses with rubber pads, helped out, in particularly slippery weather, with frost nails, and thus have prevented the slipping and falling of their horses on snow and ice in the winter time.

The Bradley Contracting Co., in relation to the matter, writes as follows: Bradley Contracting Co., 1 Madison Ave., New York, April 27, 1916. Hon. ALFRED WAGSTAFF, President The Amer. Society for Prev. Cruelty to Animals,

26th Street & Madison Avenue, New York City:

My dear Colonel-Your Mr. Freel called on us today in relation to the proposed ordinance relative to shoeing of horses between November and April in each year, inclusive. Briefly, we desire to say that for the past thirty years we have been operating all of our horses with rubber pads during the winter months and have been singularly free from accidents as a result of falls and injuries due to falls. In particularly slippery weather, where the loads are heavy, we sometimes added frost nails, and in that way we have prevented the possibility of our horses slipping. This has been our experience and as a result, we have reached the conclusion that slipping, may in a very large measure be prevented.

You have our authority to use this letter. Yours very truly,

If this can be accomplished successfully by the Fire Department and other repreentative horse owners, surely it is possible, with proper care and the outlay of a few additional dollars, for the rest of the horse owners and users of the City of New York to accomplish the same results.

The only thing that stands in the way of the adoption of this resolution, in the opinion of the Society, is the unwillingness of some horse owners to expend the few additional dollars required in order to provide the necessary and proper safeguards to protect animals from accident, injury and death, first; and second, the lack of a proper understanding of the ordinance, its objects and purposes.

The Coal Merchants' Association, which, as the Committee knows, is engaged in a very heavy hauling, forwarded a memorandum to the Thoroughfare Committee,

suggesting, by way of remedy, the following:

"The suggestion which we take the liberty of proposing is that the wording of the ordinance be changed in at least one respect; that, instead of providing that no horse shall be driven, etc., 'unless the animal is shod in such a manner as will prerent slipping,' the clause quoted should read as follows: 'unless the animal is shod n such a manner as will tend to prevent slipping.'

"This, it is at once apparent, will eliminate the oppressive and unreasonable features of the ordinance and will at the same time in no manner lessen the amount of precaution against slipping required on the part of horse owners. In fact, it will determine and place upon them an exact duty, and achieve the very object sought to be accomplished by the proposed ordinance, the difference being that the slipping is not proof of the crime, but the failure to properly shoe to prevent slipping is

fixed as the crime. "In conclusion, the Coal Merchants wish to reiterate their willingness and desire to co-operate in any move that will tend towards the betterment of traffic conditions and the elimination of the suffering of horses in the City of New York.

There is not a member of your Honorable body that will not recollect the hormember of your Honorable body cares to witness similar scenes on our streets again and we are pressing for the passage of this ordinance in order to serve a legal and timely notice on horse owners and users that they will have to prepare to furnish such necessary safeguards for the proper protection and safety of their horses as

May we point out that not a single representative citizen, man or woman, outside of some horse owners, appeared before the Committee to oppose the ordinance, and the horse owners who did appear in opposition represented only a small portion of the horse owners of our city, and we firmly believe a majority of them would not have opposed if they understood what it was the ordinance sought to accomplish.

We are confident that if your Honorable body will favorably consider and pass the ordinance, it will afford ordinary and proper protection to willing, faithful animals, will solve a most vexatious and annoying traffic problem and in less than a month after it goes into effect will be regarded as a proper reasonable and economic regulation by horse owners, users and drivers themselves.

MINORITY REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

The undersigned members of the Committee on Public Thoroughfares to which committee was referred on March 21st, 1916, (Minutes, page 741) the ordinance relating to "rules of the road" and particularly to the driving of horses, respectfully reports:

That a public hearing was held on this matter in the Aldermanic Chamber on Friday, April 28th, 1916, and was largely attended.

The proposed ordinance was amended with the following language which was added to Paragraph 1 "or tend to prevent slipping" upon the recommendation of the Coal Merchants' Association, through its counsel, Louis H. Moose, and in this way was eliminated what appeared to be oppressive and an unreasonable feature of the ordinance and at the same time not lessen the amount of precaution against slipping required on the part of horse owners, but in fact determined and placed upon them an exact duty and went towards achieving the very object sought. The difference is that it does not prove the misdemeaner, but the failure to properly shoe to prevent slipping is fixed as the misdemmeanor.

It was pointed out by those who appeared in favor of the ordinance that the enactment of the same would tend towards the betterment of traffic conditions and the

elimination of the suffering of horses in the City of New York. This ordinance will permit the owner to use his own judgment and discretion as to what character of device he will use and gives him a wide range of choice as long as he will employ some means that will prevent or tend to prevent horses from

The American Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals and all humane societies, it was asserted, found themselves this past winter powerless to relieve suffering and distress of animals without tying up the traffic and commerce of the City.

that they will have to prepare to furnish such necessary safeguards as will tend to prevent the slipping of their horses during a time when the City streets are covered with ice and sleet.

The proposed ordinance has the endorsement of the following concerns: R. H. Macy & Co., J. B. Greenhut Company, Lord & Taylor, Bloomingdale Brothers, John Wanamaker, Degnon Contracting Company, Safety First Federation, B. Altman Co., Rheinfrank Brothers, John Bingham, E. D. & W. Stein, Saks & Co., Bradley Construction Co., Miller Brothers, James Riordan, American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, Peter Doelger Brewing Co, Flynn Bros. Contracting, Coal Merchants' Association, Retail Dry Goods Association, Bradley Contracting Co., American Express Co., William Koster, and the press of the City unanimously.

In view of the foregoing the undersigned recommend the passage of this ordinance forbidding horses that are not so shod as to tend to prevent slipping from being driven on the streets in the winter time, thus doing away with the misery endured by many poor horses in the winter during the past when the streets were covered with sleet and ice. The passage of this ordinance will also do a great deal toward improving traffic conditions.

The proposed ordinance is presented with the further recommendation that the fine should not exceed ten dollars or imprisonment in the City Prison for more than two days (instead of ten) or both.

The undersigned minority members of the Committee on Public Thoroughfares of the Board of Aldermen recommend that this report be substituted for the majority report and that the following ordinance as amended herein be accepted.

That Section 1, Article 3 of chapter 24, of the Code of Ordinances relating to "Rules of the Road," is hereby amended by adding to the end thereof a new section • to read as follows:

Section 19—Horses, driving of: 1. Between November 1st and April 1st, in each year, no horse, mule or other large animal, whether led or used for the purpose of driving or hauling, shall be driven in any of the streets, avenues or highways of the City of New York, unless the animal is shod in such a manner as will prevent or tend to prevent slipping.

2. Any person violating this provision shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine not to exceed ten (\$10.00) dollars or imprisonment in the City Prison for two days, or both.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval by the

Form of certificate modifying the certificate of November 24, 1903, for Cordandt and Fulton street tunnels. The situation in respect of these modifications is

Extension to Grand Central Station-Under date of May 4, 1909, the Commission granted a certificate to Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company authorizing it to extend its line from then authorized terminus at 6th avenue and 33d street under 6th avenue, Bryant Park and 42d street to a terminal station between Vanderbilt and Lexington avenues. The Railroad Company secured the necessary consents and approvals, but did not begin the construction of the line within the period prescribed by the certificate. The Railroad Company some time ago applied for an extension of two years, but the matter of a long extension was held in abeyance pending the development of the plans for certain of the municipal railroads to be operated under contracts Nos. 3 and 4 so that the precise effect of their construction upon the Hudson and Manhattan Line and vice versa could more definitely be ascertained. In lieu of the long extension applied for by the Company short extensions of time have been granted by the Commission and the time of the Railroad Company to begin construction now expires on

May 1, 1916.
The construction of the Hudson and Manhattan Line affects and is affected by the construction of the City's Broadway Line at the intersection of Broadway, 6th avenue and 33d street and the construction of the City's Steinway Tunnel Line in 42d st. In order to safeguard the Broadway Line against the future construction of a subway under it at the 33d street intersection, a special floor design was developed whereby the floor of the City subway would also act as the roof of the future subway. This would require the ex-tension of the third track in the Thirty-third Street station a short distance further north than would otherwise be necessary and some

changes in levels. The plans for the Steinway Tunnel Line have not been developed to a point where a precise location can now be given for the Hudson and Manhattan Line in 42d street. The certificate of May 4, 1909, provides "The tunnels of the Railroad, but not including the stations thereof, where the same shall be in 42d street shall be located south of the center line of said street unless the Commission shall expressly authorize the location of the tunnels elsewhere in the said street." The certificate also locates the terminal station in 42d street between Vanderbilt and Lexington avenues. Both these locations are apt to conflict with the location of the Steinway Tun-nel Line and one of provinces of the proposed certificate is to place control of the entire situation in the Commission so that it may precisely locate the portion of the Hudson and Manhattan Line in 42d street so as to accommodate it to the location of the Steinway Tunnel.

Following the development of the special floor

ation to meet the increased expense due to the adoption of such a design which was estimated at Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000). This matter was before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for some time and after several conferences between the representatives of the Commission and the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen an understanding was reached that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would appropriate the amount requisitioned for the special floor design, but the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company should agree to reimburse the City for this expenditure if it extended its line and should generally agree to such relocation of its line as might be necessary to accommodate it to the construction of the City railroads, and that if these conditions were complied that an extension of two years to begin construction might be granted.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated the sum of Seventy-five Thousand Dolars (\$75,000) for the special floor design at the 33d street intersection and the proposed certifi-cate carries out the rest of the understanding. The amount to be repaid by the Hudson and Manhattan Company to the City when the Company begins the construction of its line is Seventy-tive Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) with interest at six per centum (6%) per annum from the first day of June, 1916. By this modifying certificate the certificate of May 4, 1909, is further revised so as to include provisions for the responsibility of the Hudson and Manhattan Company for any damages that may be caused by it to the City rapid transit railroads. The extension of time proposed to be granted by this modifying certificate is up to and including the first day of March, 1918.

Thirty-third Street Extension—The certificate of February 2, 1905, to New York and Jersey Railroad Company (of which the Hudson and Manhartan Railroad Company is the successor) authorized the construction of a railroad from the intersection of Greenwich, West 10th and Christopher streets in the Borough of Manhattan under Christopher street to 6th avenue, thence with one branch under 6th avenue to a terminal station at or near the intersection of 6th avenue and 33d street, and with another branch crossing diagonally under 6th avenue to 9th street, and thence easterly under 9th street to a terminal station at or near the intersection of 4th avenue and 9th street. The 6th avenue branch provided for in such certificate has been constructed and out in construction of the 6th of the street of the first state of the first put in operation, but the construction of the 9th street Branch has never been begun. Under the certificate as heretofore modified the time of the Company to construct the 9th street Branch begins to run from the time the Commission establishes certain levels. These levels have not been established.

Under the certificate of February 2, 1905, the City has the right to recapture either the 6th avenue Branch or the 9th street Branch or both after the expiration of twenty-five years from the date of beginning operation of any part upon paying an amount, based upon cost, to be ascer-tained as provided in the certificate. As a basis for this ascertainment the certificate provides that within a certain period after the completion of the 6th avenue Branch and the 9th street Branch the Company should file a statement of cost which, if agreed upon, should be the amount to be paid by the City upon recapture, and if not agreed upon the cost should be determined by arbitration. It seems advisable that this statement of cost of the 6th avenue Branch which is constructed and in operation should be furnished while the facts in regard to its construction are comparatively fresh in the minds of those connected with the work, and when evidence, documentary and otherwise, in regard thereto can be secured, and that this examination should not be deferred on account of the 9th street Branch, the construction of which is problematical. The second of the proposed certificates modifies the certificate of February 2, 1905, so as to provide that the statements of cost of the 6th avenue Branch shall be submitted by the Hudson and Manhattan Company within ninety days after the Commission shall notify it in writing to present such statement.
Cortlandt and Fulton Street Tunnels-Under

date of November 24, 1903, the former Rapid Transit Board authorized the Hudson and Manhattan Company to construct the portion of the Cortlandt street tunnels within of February 2, 1905, to New York and Jersey Railroad Company for Thirty-third Street authorization of the terminal station the Company was authorized to construct a passageway for foot passengers under Dey street from the terminal station to a connection with the present rapid transit railroad in Broadway. This passageway was never constructed and the purpose which it was intended to serve will be met by the construction of the new City subway in Church street. Although the time of the Hudson and Manhattan Company to construct this passageway has expired and the Commission by following the procedure set forth in the certificate, i. e., giving three months' notice, might declare the authorization in respect thereto vacated, it would seem to be preferable to eliminate the provision for this passageway by agreement. This is the province of the third of the modifying agreements transmitted herewith which provides for eliminating from the certificate of November 24. 1903, the provision for the construction of
