

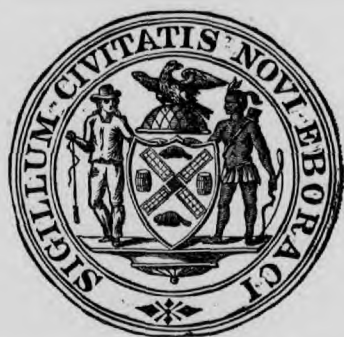

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor, New York City:

SIR—Pursuant to section 40, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and for the force for the three months ending December 31, 1890:

REPORT.

On the 31st day of December, 1890, the number of members of the force, of all grades, including Surgeons and Probationary employees, was 3,544.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries, for the quarter, and the details thereof, are shown in schedule annexed, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the time lost was..... 9,621 days.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses on felony report and on general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from the daily returns from the station-houses and the felony report from quarterly returns. An offense charged at the station-house, at the time the arrest is made, is liable to be and frequently is changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the magistrate.

From the Finance Department—Requesting the Board to transmit without delay the accounts current for November and December, 1890. The action of the President in replying thereto approved.

From the Department of Street Cleaning:

1st. Reporting that the dumping-board foot of East One Hundred and Ninth street has been vacated, and they are now occupying the dump foot of One Hundred and Tenth street, Harlem river.

2d. Requesting dredging under the dumping-boards foot of Canal and West Twelfth streets, North river, and at Seventeenth, Forty-sixth and Eightieth streets, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

3d. Stating that, in consequence of the frozen condition of the ground, they were unable to clean the Pier and bulkhead foot of Twenty-fifth street, East river.

From the Citizens' Steamboat Company—Desiring to be informed upon what conditions they will be permitted to extend the shed on Pier, new 46, North river. The action of the Secretary in replying thereto approved.

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company—Requesting permission to repair Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street, the pavement in front of the ferry premises foot of Desbrosses and Cortlandt streets, and make gas and water connections from street main to the shed on Pier, new 29, North river. The action of the President and Commissioner Cram in issuing the necessary permits approved.

From Foster and Thomson, Attorneys—Requesting the privilege of substituting Sol Sayles as surety in place of Joseph Henderson, on the bond of Messrs. Sanderson & Son, lessees of Pier, new 54, North river.

Whereas, The Board is desirous of acquiring in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, all right, title and interest in and to the land, and land under water in the said city, being described as follows:

All the right to the bulkhead and wharf property on the North river, between Thirty-ninth street and Fortieth street (one hundred and ninety-seven feet six inches); and between Fortieth street and Forty-first street (one hundred and ninety-seven feet six inches); together with all the right to wharfage, crannage, advantages and emoluments, and all the right, title, and interest in and to the land under water, and all appurtenances thereof, lying westerly of the westerly line of Twelfth avenue, covered by the grants from the city to Charles E. Appleby, August 1, 1853, between West Thirty-ninth street and West Fortieth street, and to Robert Latou, December 24, 1852, between West Fortieth street and West Forty-first street.

Whereas, It appears that Charles E. Appleby is the owner of the herein described premises, with all appurtenances connected therewith, including the riparian and wharfage rights;

Resolved, That this Board offers to purchase the said riparian and wharfage rights, and pay for a good and sufficient title therefor, free from all incumbrances, the sum of one hundred and twenty-five (\$125) dollars per lineal foot, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be served upon Charles E. Appleby, and he be and hereby is requested, within ten days after receipt hereof, to notify this Board in writing whether he will sell his riparian and wharfage rights and interests as aforesaid to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York for the price above mentioned; and in the event that he shall fail to notify this Board of his willingness to so convey his riparian and wharfage rights and interests as aforesaid, it shall be deemed that no price can be agreed upon for the said wharfage rights and interests between the owner thereof and this Department.

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report for the week ending January 24, 1891.

2d. Reporting that he had suspended Laborer William H. Decker and recommending that he be discharged.

On motion, the said William H. Decker was discharged.

3d. Recommending that the permits issued for privileges at Pier 43, East river, be revoked in order to enable the contractor for building the proposed new pier to proceed with the work of construction thereat without delay.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the permits authorizing and permitting the Ridgewood Ice Company to place an ice bridge, platform, weigh office and scales, and occupy berth at Pier 43, East river, together with the permit authorizing F. W. Wright to run a water-pipe underneath said pier, be and the same are hereby cancelled and revoked, and the aforesaid parties directed to remove their property and vacate said premises immediately.

4th. Reporting the death of John Sloan, captain of the tug "Manhattan." The Secretary directed to cause his name to be taken from the list of employees.

5th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 10624, that it is not the intention of Thomas H. Dorsey & Company to drive piles foot of Bloomfield street, North river, in accordance with the permit issued December 30, 1890.

On motion, said permit was revoked.

6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 10657, submitting tracing of that part of the new plan which shows the improvements to be made in the vicinity of Clarkson street as requested by the Corporation Counsel. The action of the President in transmitting said tracing to the Counsel to the Corporation approved.

7th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 10600, 10603, 10625, 10629, 10641, 10639 and 9021, that he had superintended replacing flooring and strengthening stringers on Pier 3, North river; that the order to superintend the erection of a dump on the north side of Pier at Forty-seventh street, North river, has been superseded by Secretary's Order No. 10633; that he had completed the work of cutting a hole through the concrete on ground floor at Pier "A," North river, for outlet of urinal pipes; that the order to superintend the repairing of sheathing on south side of Pier, new 28, North river, has been superseded by Secretary's Order No. 10636; that he had repaired bulkhead foot of Sixteenth street, East river; extended steam-pipes in the addition to the police-station on Pier "A," North river, and superintended the rebuilding of Pier foot of West Sixty-third street, North river.

The Secretary reported that the pay-rolls for the General Repairs and Construction Force for the week ending January 23, 1891, amounting to \$6,579.49, had been approved and audited and transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

On motion of Commissioner Cram, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to examine and report as to the repairs required to Pier 62, foot of Stanton street, East river.

Commissioner Cram moved that the Board authorize the building of a pier by the force of the Department, by day's work, at the foot of Twenty-fifth street, East river.

Commissioner Matthews moved to substitute Eighteenth street, in place of Twenty-fifth street, East river, as the location of the proposed new pier, which was accepted.

Whereupon the following resolution was unanimously adopted by the affirmative votes of President Post and Commissioners Matthews and Cram.

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of a new pier at the foot of East Eighteenth street, East river, with a temporary approach thereto, within the lines established for a pier thereat, by the New Plan for the improvement of the water-front, from East Seventeenth street to East Thirty-fourth street, on the East river, determined by the Board of Docks on the 17th of December, 1888, and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, on the 19th of December, 1888; and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 714 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and that it be done by the force of the Department, by day's work, except so much of the labor and material as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the materials, tools and dredging necessary therefor, and not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

On motion of Commissioner Cram, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for repairing the bulkhead between Piers 48 and 49, East river.

On motion of President Post, the Secretary was directed to notify the owners of the bulkhead northerly of One Hundred and Twentieth street, Harlem river, to make the necessary repairs to said bulkhead, in accordance with the terms and provisions of the grant made by the City of New York to Jacob Weidenfeld, dated November 2, 1867.

On motion, the subject matter respecting the purchase of an atlas containing maps of the Metropolitan District, City of New York, and its adjacent water-front, was referred to the Treasurer, with power.

Commissioner Cram reported that he had received for the Treasurer the following estimates for furnishing the Department with coal:

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
