

The action of the President and Commissioner Cram in issuing the necessary permits

From Foster and Thomson, Attorneys-Requesting the privilege of substituting Sol Sayles as surety in place of Joseph Henderson, on the bond of Messrs. Sanderson & Son, lessees of Pier, new 54, North river.

Whereupon the following resolution was adopted : Resolved, That Sol Sayles be and he is hereby substituted in the place and stead of Joseph Henderson, as surety on the lease of Sanderson & Son, for Pier, new 54, North river, and upon the proper execution of the aforesaid bond by Sol Sayles as such surety, the said Joseph Henderson be released and forever discharged from further hiability in the matter.

From John Peirce-Requesting that the time for completing the deliveries of granite under Contract No. 338, be extended until May 1, 1891.

On motion, the time was extended until March 1, 1891, provided the written consent of the sureties be filed in this Department-

From Francis E. Moon, Chief Clerk-Requesting leave of absence for ten days on account of inued illness. The action of Commissioner Matthews in granting said request approved, and, continued illness. On motion, Edwin A. Gregory, Jr., Clerk, was authorized to sign audits in the absence of the Chief Clerk.

From Charles E. Appleby-Reporting that he is not the owner of the land under water between Forty-first and Forty-second streets, North river.

On motion, the preambles and resolution adopted January 15, 1891, were amended so as to read as follows

Whereas, By section 715 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of the De-partment of Docks of the City of New York is authorized to acquire for purchase in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, wharf property in said city, and all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and agree with such owners upon a price for the same, and in case of failure to so agree upon a price for the same, to initiate legal proceedings to acquire the same for the improvement of the water-front of said city ; and,

Whereas, The Board is desirous of acquiring in the name and for the benefit of the Corpora-tion of the City of New York, all right, title and interest in and to the land, and land under water in the said city, being described as follows:

All the right to the bulkhead and wharf property on the North river, between Thirty-ninth street and Fortieth street (one hundred and ninety-seven feet six inches); and between Fortieth street and Forty-first street (one hundred and ninety-seven feet six inches); together with all the right to wharfage, cranage, advantages and emoluments, and all the right, title, and interest in and to the land under water, and all appurtenances thereof, lying westerly of the westerly line of Twelfth avenue, covered by the grants from the city to Charles E. Appleby, August 1, 1853, between West Fortieth street and West Fortieth street, and to Robert Latou, December 24, 1852, between West Fortieth street and West Fortieth street.

Whereas, It appears that Charles E. Appleby is the owner of the herein described premises, with all appurtenances connected therewith, including the riparan and wharfage rights;

Resolved, That this Board offers to purchase the said riparian and wharfage rights, and pay for a good and sufficient title therefor, free from all incumbrances, the sum of one hundred and twenty-five (\$125) dollars per lineal foot, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be served upon Charles E. Appleby, and he be and hereby is requested, within ten days after receipt hereof, to notify this Board in writing whether he will sell his riparian and whartage rights and interests as aforesaid to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York for the price above mentioned; and in the event that he shall fail to notify this Board of his willingness to so convey his riparian and wharf-age rights and interests as aforesaid, it shall be deemed that no price can be agreed upon for the said wharfage rights and interests between the owner thereof and this Department.

From Dock Master Kenney: tst. Reporting his inability to collect from Oscar Compton wharfage for canal boat "Hoff-man." Referred to the Collector.

2d. Recommending that fire-hydrants be placed on the bulkhead between Seventy-fifth and Eightieth streets, North river.

Whereupon the following preamble and resolution were adopted : Whereas, Complaint having been made by captains of vessels and others doing business along the water-front of their inability to obtain an adequate supply of water between Seventy-fifth and Eightieth streets, North river ; therefore,

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and they are hereby requested to adopt a resolution authorizing the Commissioner of Public Works to place the necessary fire-hydrants along the said bulkhead. bulk

3d. Recommending that the pier foot of Seventy-ninth street, North river, together with the adjoining bulkhead, be cleaned. Request the Department of Street Cleaning to clean.

From Dock Master Abeel—Reporting that Isaac N. Burdick piled a quantity of lumber on the bulkhead between Piers, new 39 and 40, North river. The action of the President and Commis-sioner Matthews in directing the Dock Master to strictly enforce Rule No. 6 of the Rules and Regu-lations of the Department, approved ; and the Secretary directed to notify Isaac N. Burdick to appear before the Board Thursday, February 5, 1891, at 11 o'clock A. M., and show cause why a penalty should not be imposed for violation of said rule.

From Dock Master Ryan-Reporting that repairs are being made to the south side of Pier 62, East river, for which no permit has been granted.

From Dock Master Meehan-Reporting that the bulkhead from Sixtieth to Sixty-second streets, East river, requires cleaning. Request the Department of Street Cleaning to clean.

From Dock Master Coye—Reporting a dangerous hole in the pavement opposite bulkhead foot of Market slip, East river. Referred to the Department of Public Works.

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
