

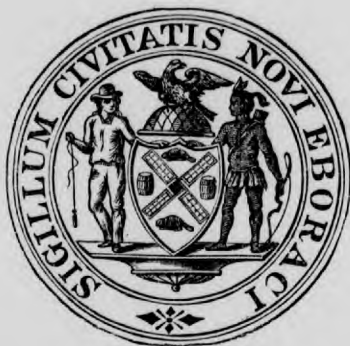

The Board of Health met this day.

The soap manufacturers appeared before the Board in respect to the proposed ordinance relating to the manufacture of soap, and after a hearing the consideration of the subject was postponed for two weeks.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 10, 1878:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,535, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 564 tenement houses, 182 private dwellings, 46 other dwellings, 14 manufactories and workshops, 32 stores and warehouses, 41 stables, 1 market, 15 slaughter-houses, 2 breweries, 4 manure dumps, 5 public sewers, 7 fat-rendering establishments, 1 lime kiln, 1

garbage dump, 23 sunken and vacant lots, 1 dangerous building, 50 yards, courts, and areas, 81 cellars and basements, 126 waste pipes and drains, 265 privies and water-closets, 34 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 5 cesspools, 2 smoky chimneys, 31 other nuisances, together with 66 visits of the Health Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 761.

During the past week 223 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 91 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

123 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 21 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 20 houses, 20 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 3,120 privies, 340 yards, 254 cellars, 254 garbage boxes, and 95¾ miles of street gutters.

The Ambulance Corps have removed one case of typhoid fever to hospital.

During the week ending Saturday, August 10, 1878, 560 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city, this is a decrease of 26 as compared with the preceding week, and 65 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of last year. The actual mortality for the week ending August 3, was 568, which is 144 below the average number of deaths which occurred during the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.23 per 1,000 in habitants, the population estimated at 1,084,653.

The mortality of the past week shows a favorable decline compared with the past four weeks. The deaths of children under five years of age were 20 less than the number reported to have died during the previous week, 118 less than the number reported during the week ending July 27, and 145 less than the number reported during the week ending July 20. Compared with the corresponding week of last year, the deaths of children under 5 years were 49 and the diarrhoeal diseases 32 less. A comparison of the mortality of the four weeks is as follows:

The deaths reported in tenement houses represent the lowest weekly mortality that has taken place in this class of dwellings during the past six weeks, but the deaths in institutions are still high; diarrhoeal diseases of children under five have decreased 16, and the number of deaths reported from them was less than the weekly number reported since the week ending June 29. The deaths of the 300 children during the week are distributed in the following wards, viz.: First, 2; Third, 1; Fourth, 10; Fifth, 4; Sixth, 4; Seventh, 12; Eighth, 8; Ninth, 11; Tenth, 16; Eleventh, 26; Twelfth, 24; Thirteenth, 9; Fourteenth, 11; Fifteenth, 4; Sixteenth, 6; Seventeenth, 19; Eighteenth, 8; Nineteenth, 42; Twentieth, 24; Twenty-first, 17; Twenty-second, 31; Twenty-third, 10; Twenty-fourth, 1.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 107 were in institutions, 290 in tenement houses, 153 in houses containing 3 families or less, 2 in hotels and boarding houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 112 on the first, 144 on the second, 106 on the third, 54 on the fourth; 18 on the fifth. 559 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 1 non-resident; 53 were stated to be single, 122 married, 43 widowed, and the condition of 342 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 557 deaths and still-births, or 91.61 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 10; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 244; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 85; Greenwood (undenominational), 36; Lutheran (undenominational), 90; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 18; Evergreen (undenominational), 25; Woodlawn (undenominational), 15; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 8; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 9; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 4; Washington (undenominational), 4.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending August 3 was in the following wards, viz.: First, 3; Second, 0; Third, 3; Fourth, 15; Fifth, 6; Sixth, 11; Seventh, 16; Eighth, 16; Ninth, 25; Tenth, 32; Eleventh, 38; Twelfth, 56; Thirteenth, 12; Fourteenth, 10; Fifteenth, 4; Sixteenth, 17; Seventeenth, 34; Eighteenth, 15; Nineteenth, 106; Twentieth, 35; Twenty-first, 35; Twenty-second, 61; Twenty-third, 14; Twenty-fourth, 4.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 10 was 77.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.670, the mean humidity was 78, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 886, and the amount of rain-fall was 3.36 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

During the week ending August 10, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 560 burial permits for city deaths, 23 for bodies in transit, and 48 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 560 deaths, 100 marriages, 432 births, 48 still-births, 23 applications for transit permits, and 56 returns from coroners. There were 33 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth-record, 3 of marriage, and 28 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—There were 560 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 10, 1878, which is a decrease of 26, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 65 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending August 3, 1878, was 568, which is 144.0 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.23 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,084,653.
