RULE COVERNING CLASSIFICATION OF LABORERS.

Notice is hereby given that, in the interest of the public service and for the convenience of registration and certification of Laborers, the City of New York shall be divided into two districts,

District I.—That portion of the city lying south of the Harlem river and Spuyten Duyvil

District II .- That portion of the city lying north of the Harlem river and Spuyten Duyvil

In filling requisitions for positions in districts outside of city limits, persons shall be certified who stand first upon the eligible list within a radius of five miles of point of locality stated in

Persons registered and who reside in the above districts shall be certified for employment in accordance with this rule, and pursuant to the provisions of Regulations 68-74 of the Civil Service

In case a requisition is made upon any of said districts and there is no person registered for the position in that district, it shall be filled by the person residing in the adjoining district who is first on the eligible list. This rule shall apply to common labor only.

In all cases where requisition is made for Laborer with special qualifications, the Labor Clerk, in filling same, shall be instructed to determine, first, whether the specifications are covered by any subdivision, and, if such be the case, he shall ascertain if any one registered upon the eligible list of that subdivision is willing to accept the position as stated in the requisition; if so, he shall certify the one standing highest on the list. Should no one be willing to accept the position, then, and then only, shall certification be made from the subdivision of common Laborer.
