REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1906.

To the Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

Sir—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 230, of the Laws of 1898, I beg to submit the following reports of the proceedings of my Bureau for the three months ending December 31, 1906:

Number of estates reported to and investigated by the Bureau.....	120
Number of estates upon which letters of administration were granted to the Public Administrator upon the application of creditors or next of kin.....	11
Number of estates upon which letters were granted upon the application of the Public Administrator.....	60
Total number of estates upon which letters of administration have been granted.....	71

Five hundred and eighty-four estates are at present under administration.

The accounts of proceedings of the Public Administrator have been judicially settled and allowed by the Surrogate in twenty estates, and the estates distributed pursuant to the decree of the Surrogate.

Two thousand seven hundred eighty-one estates of little value were received from the Coroner's Office of the Borough of Manhattan, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, the Commissioner of Public Charities and the House of Relief.

Two hundred and forty-seven estates heretofore received from the Coroner's Office of the Borough of Manhattan, from Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, from the House of Relief and Commissioner of Charities have been paid directly into the City Treasury.

In sixteen cases citations were served on the Public Administrator to attend the probate of a last will and testament, and his appearance noted.

All reports and returns to the Comptroller, Board of Aldermen, and to the Supervisor of the City Record have been rendered.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, Tuesday, December 18, 1906, at 2 P. M.

Present—Commissioners Cowan (President), Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph.

Minutes of December 11, 1906, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers No. 18131 to 18146, inclusive, amounting to \$3,512.78, which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cowan, Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph—4.

The President orally reported that, pursuant to direction of the Commissioners at meeting of December 11, he had conferred with the Chief Engineer in regard to circular letter of the Mayor requesting synopsis of the work of the Commissioners for the year 1906, and stated that he had transmitted to the Mayor a copy of Report No. 1515 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 12, 1906, giving the information requested.

The action of the President was approved and the report ordered filed.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the President and Secretary be and they are hereby directed to advertise in the "Sun" and the New York "Times" a notice inviting sealed bids or proposals for the flashboard equipment on the spillway of the New Croton Dam, in the Town of Cortlandt, Westchester County, New York.

Adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cowan, Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph—4.

The Chief Engineer presented progress report for the week ending December 13, 1906, which was referred to the Construction Committee.

Communication from the Comptroller, dated December 11, 1906, in regard to final payment on contract of John Fox & Co., for furnishing and placing sluice gates, etc., at Jerome Park Reservoir, and also for furnishing and placing special castings and ladders, etc., for said reservoir, was received and referred to the Chief Engineer.

Communication from the Comptroller, dated December 12, 1906, returning certain vouchers for services rendered, with request that they be submitted to the Municipal Civil Service Commission in order that its certificates may be attached thereto, was received and referred to the President.

Statement from the Comptroller, dated December 13, 1906, that \$30,000 had been deposited to the credit of the Additional Water Fund, was received and ordered entered on the books and filed.

Communication from the Comptroller, dated December 15, 1906, in regard to final payment on contract of Coldwell-Wilcox Company for furnishing and placing sluice gates, etc., at the New Croton Dam, was received and referred to the Chief Engineer.

Communication from James Malloy & Co., contractors for the construction of the Croton Falls Reservoir, dated December 12, 1906, stating that the payment of ninety per cent. of the amount of monthly estimate, due under paragraph XXXV. of their contract for the construction of said reservoir, had not yet been made, was received and referred to the President with direction to confer with the Comptroller in reference thereto.

Communication from Henry C. Moore, dated December 13, 1906, in regard to non-payment of claim for repairs to old stone walls near Pines Bridge, N. Y., was received and referred to the President.

Request from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated December 14, 1906, for the transfer of William E. King, Transitman, to that Department, was received and consented to.

Fourth—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said abstracts, our final report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 26th day of February, 1907, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Fifth—In case, however, objections are filed to either of said abstracts of estimate and assessment, the notice of motion to confirm our final report herein will stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified, and of which notice will be given to all those who have theretofore appeared in this proceeding, as well as by publication in the City Record, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
