Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending Au-gust 8, 1874 :

The number of inspections made by the Sani-tary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,233, as follows: 4 public buildings, 936 tenement houses, 196 private dwellings, 130 other dwellings, 15 manu-factories and workshops, 20 stores and warehouse, 103 stables, 2 markets, 7 fat-rendering establish-ments, 2 dumping-grounds, I head packing estab-lishment, 7 public sewers and drains, 39 sunken and vacant lots, 59 yards, couris and areas, 69 cellars and basements, 70 water-pipes and drains, 171 privaes and water-closets, 98 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 4 cisterns and cesspools, 6 piggeries, 15 other nuisances, together with 35 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease. The number of reports thereon received from

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 918

During the past week 73 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Inspec-tors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 57 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 36 houses, 36 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

sinks, together with clothing, beading, etc. In addition to the regular duties performed, they have disinfected 156 miles of street-gutters in the following Wards: First, Second, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Twentieth, and Twenty-second-They have also disinfected 657 privies and water-closets, 79 yards, courts, and areas, and 43 cellars and basements.

Twenty-five cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital, and τ dead body to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

Permits were granted consignees of 85 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of this Port.

175 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, August 11, 1874.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health :

SIR-

In the week ending on Saturday, August 8, there were 720 deaths reported in this city. This num-ber is less by 3t than that of the deaths reported during the previous week, and less by 14 than those which actually occurred in that week. The mean temperature last week was 68.2 Fahrenheit mean temperature tast week was 05.2 Panrennert in the Central Park. It was 73.7 for the week ending August 1, or 5.5 degrees warmer than last week. The average of atmospheric humid-ity last week was 61, and in the previous week 64, total saturation being 100. Both weeks were usually healthful for this season of the year.

There were 328 deaths of infants under a year old, and 447 deaths of children under 5 years of age, last week, against 380 and 490 deaths re-

ported at those ages respectively in the previous week. This decrease of infant mortality is con-

week. This decrease of infant mortality is con-siderably greater than the decrease in the total number of deaths at all ages. The deaths by vio-lence last week were 27 in number, and by phthisis 62, against 16 and 50 respectively in the previous week. With these exceptions, the decrease of mortality was general, at all ages. There were only 2 deaths by small-pox, and 3 during the previous week ; 14 from scarlatina, and 16 from diphtheria, against 12 and 17 deaths re-spectively the previous week; and 283 deaths from diarrheeal disease, against 311 by the same cause the previous week. The reported deaths last week are equal to a yearly death-rate of 36.00 per 1,000. The rate during the previous week was equal to 37.20 per 1,000. In the Eighth, Ninth, Eleventh, Thirteenth, Twentieth, and Twenty-second Wards the death-rate has for three weeks been a little more than twice as great as in weeks been a little more than twice as great as in the Fifteenth Ward, which still retains its reputa-tion as the most uniformly healthful ward in the city. Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held August 7, 1874.

Lane, Chamberlain, for the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000), to be charged to "The Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt," on account of the "Surplus Revenues" of said Fund, for the year 1874 : and credited to the "General Fund" of the City, in pursuance of chap. 163, Laws of 1862, and chap. 308, Laws of 1874.
