AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of the City of New York, the Board of Education, and for the payment of the quota of the State tax in the year eighteen hundred and eighty.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, to be raised, collected and paid according to law, for the support of the city government and the Board of Education, and for the purpose of paying the quota of the State tax imposed upon the City and County of New York for the year eighteen hundred and eighty, the sum of twenty-eight million one hundred and forty-two thousand nine hundred and ninety-one dollars and ninety-eight cents, which is the amount certified by the Comptroller of the City of New York to the Board of Supervisors, in pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, as the sum to be raised and collected in the year eighteen hundred and eighty by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation within the City and County of New York, which will more fully appear by the communication from the Comptroller, transmitting his certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year eighteen hundred and eighty, of which said communication, certificate, and Final Estimate the following are copies:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

In pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, I herewith transmit to you the Comptroller's certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 31st day of December, 1879, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty, to wit: the sum of twenty-eight million one hundred and forty-two thousand nine hundred and ninety-one dollars and ninety-eight cents; which amount, so estimated and certified as aforesaid, the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York is "empowered and directed to cause to be raised, according to law, and collected by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, within the said City and County of New York."

FINAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1880.

Made, pursuant to Section 112 of Chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York, on December 31, 1879.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 31st day of October, 1879, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty (1880); in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Aldermen, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, under date of November 25, 1879, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 26, 1879; and therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a

FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, the year eighteen hundred and eighty (1880), in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, as follows:

Sec. 2. In addition to the sum imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, there shall also be, and is hereby imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, and to be raised, collected, and paid according to law, the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, being the amount of an additional appropriation for the year 1880, made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 66 of the Laws of 1880, as appears by the following certificate of the Comptroller of the City of New York:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, September 10, 1880.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I hereby certify to your Honorable Board, that, as provided by chapter 66 of the Laws of 1880, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolution adopted on June 3, 1880, has appropriated the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars to the Department of Public Parks, for the purpose of providing means to complete the restoration of Tompkins square as a public park, and has added and included the said amount in the Final Estimate for the year 1880, transmitted to your Honorable Board on July 1, 1880, and that the aggregate amount of said Final Estimate, including the said appropriation of twenty-five thousand dollars, is twenty-eight million one hundred and sixty-seven thousand nine hundred and ninety-one dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$28,167,991.98), which amount the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York is empowered and directed by law to cause to be raised and collected by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation within the City and County of New York in the year 1880.

In addition to the sums imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, in and by the first and second sections of this ordinance, for the support of the government of the City of New York for the year 1880, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, and to be raised, collected and paid according to law, the sum of seven hundred and sixty-nine thousand two hundred and eighty dollars and ninety-two cents, said amount being deemed necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the amounts imposed and levied for the support of the government of the City of New York for the year 1880, and not exceeding three per cent. of the aggregate amounts imposed for that purpose by the first and second sections of this ordinance, in pursuance of the provisions of section 4 of chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873.

Sec. 4. The assessment rolls of the real and personal estates of the City and County of New York for the year eighteen hundred and eighty are hereby approved and confirmed, and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations thereof is hereby fixed at the sum of one thousand one hundred and forty-three million seven hundred and sixty-five thousand seven hundred and twenty-seven dollars and nine cents (\$1,143,765,727.09), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, for the year 1880, as follows:

To the Board of Fire Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN— I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of a letter from the Inspector of Buildings, requesting an opinion in writing as to the powers of the Board of Examiners, under the provisions of section 31 of the building law, referred to me September 22, 1880.

The Inspector propounds the following specific questions: "Can the Board of Examiners act on a petition in cases provided for by law?" (2) "Can the Board of Examiners authorize an 8-inch wall to be built where the law says it shall be thicker?" (3) "Can the Board of Examiners allow a builder to carry the walls higher than is specified in the law for a 12-inch wall?"

These questions will be best answered by a review of the powers conferred by the section in question. The first clause of section thirty-one gives the Department power over cases not specifically provided for in the act, and does not require any explanation. The Inspector's questions refer to the subsequent portion of the section, which is as follows: "The department of buildings, named in this act, * * * shall have discretionary power, upon application therefor, to modify or vary any of the several provisions of this act to meet the requirements of special cases, where the same do not conflict with the public safety and the public good, so that substantial justice may be done." The law then goes on to provide (1) that a record shall be kept by the Department of every such deviation; (2) that before the deviation is permitted a certificate shall be issued (by the Department) to the party applying for the same; (3) that such certificate shall be issued only upon an application setting forth the facts, sworn to by the applicant; (4) that said certificate shall be issued only after said application shall have been passed upon favorably by a Board of Examiners, etc.

The meaning of these provisions of law I understand to be that this Department has power to modify or vary any of the provisions of the building law. For instance, the law says that in a dwelling-house not more than fifty-five feet in height, the walls shall not be less than twelve inches thick; but the Department has the power, under section 31, to modify or vary this provision by permitting the walls of such a house to be erected of a less thickness. In other words, the directions of the Building Act are not intended to be absolutely unalterable and unbending rules. The Department may modify or vary their provisions to meet the requirements of special cases.

This is the natural construction of the statutes, and if any argument is needed to show that it is the correct one, it is sufficient to refer to the closing sentence of the sixteenth section of the act. That section requires that all buildings which are more than two stories, or twenty-five feet in height, except dwelling-houses or churches, shall have fire-proof metal shutters on every window and opening above the first floor. But the last clause of the section provides that all openings upon the street in any such buildings, and all openings in buildings used for school-houses and offices "may be exempted from the provisions and requirements of this section in the manner hereinafter provided." "In the manner hereinafter provided" can only refer to section 31, and here we have an express declaration that the powers conferred by section 31 are sufficient to authorize a deviation from the positive requirements of section 16. This seems to be conclusive as to the nature and extent of the power given to the Department by this section of the building law.

How is this power to be exercised? In the first place the power is discretionary with the Department. No applicant has the right to demand a modification of the law in his favor. In each particular case the Department will decide whether it will sanction a modification or variation of the provisions of the law, and from its decision refusing an application there is no appeal.

2d. This power is to be exercised only to meet the requirements of special cases. There must exist some special and sufficient reasons why the requirements of the law should not be complied with, growing out of or inherent in the peculiar nature or circumstances of the building or structure in question. And those reasons must be of such a character, and must possess such force, as to satisfy the Department that substantial justice will be done, both to the public and the applicant, by granting the modification or variation asked for.

3d. This Department must be satisfied that the granting of the application will not conflict with the public safety and the public good. The building law was intended to protect the public, and it must be presumed that a strict compliance with its provisions is necessary for the public safety and is for the public good. It is for this Department, under its solemn responsibility as the executor of the law, to decide whether the public safety and public good will be adequately protected in case a modification or variation of the act is permitted.

4th. There must be an application presented to the Department asking for the variation or modification desired, sworn to by the applicant, and setting forth the facts, that is, the reasons why the strict letter of the law should not be enforced.

Under these circumstances, and guided by the rules thus laid down by the law, it is the duty of the Department, in the exercise of a sound judicial discretion, to pass upon each application presented to it in proper form under section thirty-one. If the Department decides to reject the application, that decision is final. If, on the other hand, the Department is of opinion that substantial justice will be done by granting the application, then it is its duty to lay the case before the Board of Examiners.

That Board, acting under the same solemn responsibility to guard the public safety and the public good, and at the same time to do substantial justice to every citizen, under which this Department acts, and guided by the same provisions of law which controlled this Department in passing upon the case, will consider and decide upon the application as an independent tribunal. If its decision is adverse to the application, then the previous favorable conclusion of this Department goes for naught, and the application falls to the ground. But if the Board shall pass favorably upon the application, this Department will then be authorized to issue the certificate mentioned in the section to the party applying for the same.

It will thus be seen that the Board of Examiners has no original or independent power to permit a modification or variation of the provisions of the law. It may refuse an application, but its approval thereof would not bind this Department to issue a certificate authorizing the deviation. The Board of Examiners constitute an independent tribunal, co-ordinate with this Department, having absolute power of veto upon every application, but only able to concur in granting such application. For this reason it seems needless to present any case to the Board until it shall have first received the favorable action of this Department.

To the first of the Inspector's inquiries I answer, that the Board of Examiners may pass upon any petition made out in proper form and presented to it by this Department, but that its favorable action thereon requires the further concurrence of the Fire Department to become effectual.

To the second inquiry I reply, that the Board may concur with this Department in authorizing the thing named in a proper case.

To the third inquiry I answer, that the Board cannot allow the thing named, but that it may in a proper case concur with this Department to authorize a variation from the provisions of the law in the respect mentioned.

CHAPTER 105.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present. The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act heretofore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

ARREARS OF TAXES.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present. The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
