## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held August 2, 1888.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Post.

The minutes of the meetings held July 26 and 27, 1888, were read and approved.

The communication from the Wholesale Oyster Dealers and Planters' Association of New York, requesting that Pier, old 54, North river, be appropriated for the sole use of oyster boats, was

On motion, laid on the table.

The following communications were received, read, and, On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary as stated, to wit:

From Department of Public Works:

Ist. In reference to constructing pier and bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Tenth street, Harlem river, and extending sewer outlet thereat. The action of Commissioner Post, in advising that the matter had been referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, was approved.

2d. Reporting that the pavement on the bulkhead between Piers 18 and 19, East river, has been repair

From Department of Street Cleaning—Respecting cellar dirt left on bulkhead between Stanton and Rivington streets, East river. The action of Commissioner Post, in advising that the said material will be removed by Brown & Fleming, was approved.

From Civil Service Supervisory and Examining Board—Submitting eligible list of names for position of Chainmen. The action of Commissioner Post, in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report as to the qualifications of said applicants, was approved.

From Daniel Robinson, lessee—Denying the charge of illegal dumping at the foot of Seventy-third street, East river. The Secretary directed to advise that the Department has corroborative evidence that material was dumped thereat, and that he will be proceeded against for violation of the law.

From John Gillies and James M. Cumings, sureties on contract of Duncan A. Gillies for building Pier 60, East river—Agreeing to the extension of time to July 31, 1888. The Secretary directed to file with the contract.

From New York and College Point Ferry Company—Requesting permission to redrive piles at northeast end of ferry rack, foot of Ninety-ninth street, East river. The action of Commissioner Post in issuing a permit was approved.

From W. H. McNeill—Requesting permit to run a pipe through the bulkhead on the north side of Pier foot of Thirty-eighth street, North river. The action of Commissioner Post, in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, was approved.

From Central Vermont Railroad and Steamer Line:

Ist. Requesting permission to drive about ten fender-piles at end and alongside Pier, new 29, East river, for temporary use.

2d. Requesting permission to cut one gangway eight feet wide in string-piece on Pier, new 29, East river, for temporary use, the same to be replaced, and the said piles to be driven and removed under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief. The action of Commissioner Stark in issuing said permit was approved.

From C. P. Huntington, lessee—Requesting permission to erect some elevated platforms at the outshore end of Pier, new 37, North river, in accordance with the plans and specifications submitted. The action of Commissioner Post, in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, was approved.

From W. L. Skidmore, owner and representative of owners of premises Nos. 219, 220, 221 and 222 West street—Requesting the Department to connect the "drain-pipes" running from said premises with the box-sewer foot of Franklin street, North river, at their cost and expense. All licenses or permit backers must be kept by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become day overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become day overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become day, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freeces and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urmals must not be left running under the penalty of five dollars imposed.

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The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-tronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of the

DUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 550 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed Juney, 1887 the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All evra charges for water incurred from and after june 9, 1889, shall be tracted, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have hereto-tore been treated.
