

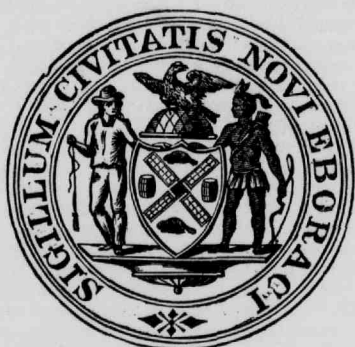

NEW YORK PENITENTIARY, BLACKWELL'S ISLAND,
April 1, 1882.

DEAR SIR—Annexed I beg to submit to your Honorable Board my report for the quarter ending March 31, 1882, the number of prisoners received and discharged, the labor on which they have been employed, and the results accomplished by such labor during the quarter.

Blacksmiths and Tinsmiths—Made 4 window guards, 26 pick-axes, 2 pair winding stairs (14 steps), 1 cleaver, 105 stone-cutters' drills, 121 chisels, 38 pitching tools, 149 points, 72 feathers, 260 bucket straps, 156 wheelbarrow spindles, 500 rivets, 340 mess pans, 38 feet stove-pipe, 28 feet four-inch leaders, 1 smoke-jack, 10 soup pails, 6 coal-hods, also all necessary repairs to carts, wagons, wheels, wheelbarrows, vans, machinery, tinware, etc., etc.

Carpenters and Painters—Made 734 coffins, 266 buckets, 29 wheelbarrows, 33 snow shovels, 22 benches, 1 circular washing machine, 128 salt boxes, 12 pails, 30 stands for wash tubs, 250 clothes pins, 85 table tops, 85 seats, 425 lineal feet sill; repaired 85 buckets, 23 wheelbarrows, 49 stools, 2 ambulances, 2 wagons, 4 buggies, 11 carts, 15 cart-wheels, etc., etc.

Tailors and Coat Makers—Made 220 pairs men's woolen pants, 102 vests, 100 jackets, 550 pairs mitts, 7 citizens' suits, 3 overcoats, 62 cot-bottoms; repaired 489 woolen jackets, 1,455 pairs pants, 247 vests, 29 caps, 111 pairs mitts, 50 cot-bottoms.

Broom and Brush Makers—Made 124 dozen brooms, 218 dozen scrub-brushes.

Shoemakers—Made 1,030 pairs men's, and 1,530 pairs women's shoes; repaired 1,560 pairs men's, and 44 pairs women's shoes.

At the Sewing Room—Female prisoners have made 463 baby's shirts, 72 dresses, 550 petticoats, 58 hoods, 400 aprons, 500 diapers, 440 men's shirts, 36 pairs men's summer pants, 200 women's wrappers, 100 chemises, 204 pairs mitts, 200 spreads, 200 pillow-ticks, 100 sheets, 165 towels, 1,448 pairs women's shoes bound; repaired 2,806 men's shirts, 1,507 undershirts, 1,377 socks, 153 dresses, 136 petticoats, 338 chemises, 117 stockings, 644 pillow-ticks, 7 bed-ticks.

At the Stone Shed—The prisoners are daily employed cutting building stone, water-table, window, door and sill jambs, lintels, etc., etc.

By prisoners employed at out-door labor, the sea wall and roads have been kept in proper repair; 1,650 tons of coal and 6 barges of dirt have been discharged, also 12 barges have been loaded with stone for Hart's Island.

The average daily number of male prisoners during the quarter has been 787, employed as follows:

- 52 men at Randall's Island, unloading barges, quarrying and grading.
- 70 " at Ward's Island, working on new wing Insane Asylum.
- 115 " as stonecutters.
- 40 " as stonebreakers.
- 110 " at quarrying and pulling out stone.
- 40 " at "Retreat" Lunatic Asylum.
- 24 " at new engine-house.
- 12 " at cook and boiler-house.
- 33 " as blacksmiths.
- 13 " as tinsmiths, roofing and plumbing.
- 50 " as carpenters, painters and coopers.
- 77 " as shoemakers, tailors, broom, brush and coat makers.
- 35 " as gardeners.
- 9 " as whitewashers.
- 18 " continually in Hospital,
- 20 " men in prison and locked in cell.
- 59 " employed in and around prison.
- 10 " repairing roads and walks.

**CITY PRISON,
NEW YORK, April 1, 1882.**

The following improvements and repairs have been made at First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth District Prisons from January 1 to March 31, 1882, by prison labor, and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction, except the cost of the material:

FIRST DISTRICT PRISON.

Placed Croton water on first and second tiers of female prison; used 156 feet of galvanized iron pipe, with the necessary faucets, etc., etc. The water and soil pipes in the male and female prisons, and in the yard, have been frequently repaired, and new faucets, valves, etc., have been placed in the pipes. A number of locks on cell doors have been repaired. The roof of prison has been repaired and painted. The cell windows have been painted on the first, second, and third tiers; the woodwork in cells on fourth tier and in new prison has also been painted, and the ceiling of male prison (25 feet wide by 142 feet long) has also been painted. Chimneys in boys' prison have been repaired. Closets, railings, etc., have been built, and considerable repairs have been made to carpenters' work, tin ware, etc., etc.

SECOND DISTRICT PRISON.

Repairs have been made to carpenter work, tin ware, and locks on cell-doors.

THIRD DISTRICT PRISON.

Repairs have been made to water pipes, tin ware, and roof of male prison.

FOURTH DISTRICT PRISON.

Repairs have been made to carpenter work and plumbing.

FIFTH DISTRICT PRISON.

Repairs have been made to tin ware.

SIXTH DISTRICT PRISON.

Considerable repairs, etc., have been made to carpenter work.

**NEW YORK CITY ASYLUM FOR INSANE,
May 10, 1882.**

Hon. THOMAS S. BRENNAN, President, etc.:

DEAR SIR:—I have the honor to forward hereby quarterly statement of labor performed by inmates of this institution during the three months ending March 31:

Out-door Improvements—Unloading, weighing, and carting coal for both institutions; digging and pitting vegetables; removing snow from ward yards and paths; cutting and housing 50 tons ice; killing and dressing 94 hogs; carting sand to new east wing; carting ashes; keeping yards, walks and roads in good order and repair.

Carpenters—New work in cellar of new west wing; platform made for washing machine in wash-house; three partitions put up in room for hot-water tanks; 25 new bed boards in Ward 3; cover and stool for sewing machine in tailor shop; two frames and small table for mat maker; three racks for ice cooler house in kitchen; one foot rack for wash-house; two bottoms and stand for wash-house; four paddles and one potatoe masher for kitchen; partition built in Ward 14; chestnut door casings made and doors hung in same ward; fence put up in front of main building; one frame for mat maker; one box for official papers in clerk's office; balance of time spent in new wing and general repairs in Ward 2, and jobbing throughout the building.

Painters—Wards 3 and 11 newly painted; wood-work in basement of new wing painted; painting dormitory windows; painted two bath-tubs; 201 bedsteads painted; varnishing folding door in Ward 14; painted 9 dozen spittoons; painted, varnished and kalsomined rooms on fourth floor, centre building; staining and varnishing two doors; completed painting on walls of stairway of new west wing; frescoed the reception rooms of Wards 3, 4, 7, and 11; painted desk and shelving in printing office; commenced work on the walls of Ward 7; also in dining-room of same; put in throughout the building 623 lights of glass.

Plumbers—Wash-stand in wash-house lined with sheet lead; repaired pipes in annex building; Ward 2, lined water-closet with sheet lead; Ward 18, repaired water-closets and gas-pipes; Ward 14, repaired gas-pipes and put in one L pendant cock; Ward 9, repaired gas-pipes and put in one urinal; Ward 13, soil pipe repaired; Ward 8, water-closets repaired and sheet-leaded same; Ward 1, gas-pipe repaired; repaired one tank in annex building; put bath-tub in work house male dormitory; cleaned out 300 feet pipe in cellar; put on 3 dozen globes in holders; repaired the main gas-pipe; balance of time spent in new wing; steam table erected in Ward 16; one steam heater put in attendant's room; put in two new bath-tubs with 100 feet 3/4-inch pipe and 50 feet 1-inch Ward 4.

Tailors—Made 210 pants, 68 vests, 138 jackets, 24 caps, 90 mittens; repaired, 1,555 pants, 577 jackets, 422 vests, 71 blouses.

Mat Makers—Made 12 extra size Ki-hai mats; 61 medium size Ki-hai mats; 12 medium size rag mats; 4 extra size fancy rag mats; one mat, 8 feet long by 2 feet wide, for Steamboat "Minnehannock"; 5 corn brooms for Ward 6; 2 pairs Ki-hai shoes; 3 sets rope quoits; 1 mat frame; spliced elevator rope for hospital.

Masons—Plastered night attendants' sleeping and dining-rooms; lathed and plastered walls in Ward 14; lathed partitions in Wards 13 and 18; general repairs to walls in Wards 7 and 11; put 1 register in attendants' room, Ward 9; tore down and rebuilt brick wall under windows south end of Ward 2; built steps leading to kitchen yard; built with brick 8 manholes in basement of new wing; built in same place brick wall in water-closet; put a coat of white mortar in attendants' dining room; cementing floor in bath-room and pantry in basement of new wing; plastered walls and windows of hallway in Ward 2; also partitions in Wards 13 and 18; lathed partition in Ward 2, and painted up cracks between flags in kitchen floor; scraped and painted up cracks in walls and ceiling of 8 rooms and hallway fourth floor, centre building; repaired plaster in 8 rooms of Ward 2.

Shoemakers—Made 67 pairs; repaired 1,161 pairs.

Tinsmiths—Made 1 new coffee can for Annex; two new boxes for wards; 1 drainer for kitchen; 2 dozen chambers; 1 dozen wash-basins; 6 dust pails; 6 dozen spittoons; 2 glue pots for carpenter shop; 1 butter-box for Annex; 3 large boxes for attendants; 3 casings for closets in hospital; 24 tin cans for Ward 10; stove-pipe for blacksmith's shop; 24 dust-pans for wards; 24 oil cans for wards. Repaired cans and dippers for wards; bottomed cans and boilers on large tank for painters; repaired stove-pipe for Annex; boilers in kitchen; 3 dozen drinking cups; ice-can for hospital; boilers in kitchen repaired.

L.) free; 1,000 blank receipts for R. M. SIR—I beg to submit to your Honorable Board the quarterly census and labor report of this Institution, for the quarter ending March 31, 1882.

Labor Report, First Quarter.

Carpenters—Have made new platforms for range in the Hospital kitchen, put new beams under and repaired kitchen floor, two step-ladders, three cistern covers, three trays, and new steps to kitchen entrance on both sides; put up partition in Matron's store-room for the Work-house to keep clothing; boarded up the north side of basement of Pavilion II, made marking-box for Store, 14 handles for dippers, and 7 slides for windows of Pavilions, put in 32 panes of glass, put on 13 locks and fitted 18 keys, repaired old locks and refitted old keys, besides much other work, such as keeping the Pavilions and other buildings in good repair.

Painters—Have painted Pavilion II outside and the blinds of Pavilions I and II and stove guards.

Engineer—Has thawed out and repaired pipes in all the Pavilions when necessary, repaired stove guards, cleaned gas-machine, packed and repaired pumps, connected the inspirator to boiler of steam pump and put it in working order, repaired tanks, water closets, etc., tried the salt-water connection at various times, packed steam pump, and blown off the boiler and cleaned it.

Patients—Have done the following sewing and mending, viz: made 369 dresses, 8 shirts, 43 aprons, 6 pillow cases, 132 pairs drawers, 92 petticoats, and knit 71 pairs stockings; repaired 2,473 bed-ticks, 1,557 pillow ticks, 1,612 sheets, 1,131 pillow cases, 367 spreads, 2,504 dresses, 3,858 chemises, 1,361 petticoats, 2,277 pairs stockings, 120 pairs socks, 1,562 pairs drawers, 84 aprons, 493 hoods, 165 night-gowns, 168 shirts, 59 jackets, 78 pairs pants, 8 towels, and 20 table cloths.

Work-house help—Have finished white-washing Pavilion D, put up and repaired leaders in Pavilion III, repaired tinware in kitchen, made tinware for stove, piled coal, cut brush, removed snow, taken stores from Dock to Store, clothes from Pavilions to Laundry, besides much other labor, such as keeping the roads, walks and grounds in good order, etc., etc.

Laundry—Female Work-house help have laundered for employees and patients 32,684 pieces.

For Branch Work-house.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held August 9, 1882.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held August 2d instant were read and approved.

From New York, Ontario and Western Railway Company—Submitting new plans for the proposed improvements at the ferry premises at Forty-second street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report thereon.

From Citizens Steamboat Company—In reference to procuring a permanent location for their boats to land at on the North river water-front.

From H. N. Twombly & Co.—In reference to repairing the east half of Pier 4, East river, leased to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to report specifically as to the repairs required to make the pier safe for the term of the lease, and under the conditions of the lease to the railroad company.

From Ridgewood Ice Company—Requesting permission to put up a temporary platform to land ice, at Pier 43, East river. Referred to the President.

From A. Sherman and R. Parker—Application for leave to erect a tally-house on the bulkhead at West Eleventh street, North river. Referred to Commissioner Voorhis.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Reporting as to ownership, etc., of the pier at Forty-third street, North river.

From Edward Mahon and others—Requesting the Department to build a pier, etc., at the foot of Seventy-fourth street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Police Department—Requesting that spring piles be driven at the pier at Third street, East river. Also for permission to erect shed thereon for their police row-boats. Secretary to advise that the pier is about being repaired by contract, and that the placing of spring piles will be included in the work to be done.

From Pennsylvania Railroad Company, lessees—Agreeing to, and accepting the terms of, the resolution as to the shed on Pier, new 28, North river. Secretary to acknowledge the receipt thereof.

From Bogert & Morgan, lessees—Requesting permission to make certain repairs to Pier, new 36, North river. Secretary stating that by direction of the Commissioners he had granted a permit therefor, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, his action was approved.

From John Kearney—In reference to wharfage collected by the Corporation Wharfinger at the pier at Fortieth street, North river. Secretary to advise that at the time the same was collected it was properly paid to and received by the Corporation Wharfinger for the benefit of the city.

From John Butler, Corporation Wharfinger—In reference to bill for \$294.50, for wharfage accrued at Pier 62, East river, by the floating dry dock located thereat. Secretary directed to send the claim to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection from John Petrie, the owner thereof.

From John Petrie—In reference to bill for wharfage on dry dock at Pier 62, East river, and stating that he had paid rent to James W. Smith for the south half of the said pier.

From Comptroller of the City—In reference to the ferry premises at Barclay street, North river. The President stating that he had personally replied thereto, his action was approved.

From P. Sanford Ross—Accepting the contract for dredging the westerly half of the slip, between Piers 18 and 19, East river.

From Iron Steamboat Company, lessees—In reference to the purposes for which Pier, new 1, North river, is used by them. Secretary to advise that the Board are pleased to learn from their communication that the use of the Pier, new 1, North river, for objectionable purposes has been discontinued, and they trust that in the future it will be used for the lawful and legitimate purposes for which it is intended to be used.

From August Braun—Requesting permission to place a floating bath between One Hundred and Twentieth and One Hundred and Twenty-first streets, Harlem river. Application denied.

From Patrick Lynch—In reference to injuries sustained by him on July 5 ult., on Pier, old 22, North river. Secretary to advise that only a portion of the said pier is owned by the city, and is leased to the Stephens & Condit Transportation Company, the other portion being owned by the Produce Bank, and that the owners or lessees are liable for all damages accruing on the premises, respectively owned or leased by them.

From Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Enclosing copies of contract for paving newly made land between Piers, new 42 and new 45, North river, with his approval indorsed thereon.

2d. Opinion in respect to building a pier at the foot of Fifty-seventh street, North river. Secretary to have the opinion recorded.

From Comptroller of the City:

1st. In reference to wharf property at the foot of Barclay street, North river, and requesting a diagram of the premises. Secretary directed to transmit diagram of the same, when prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, to Comptroller, as requested.

2d. In reference to penalties imposed upon Mahoney Brothers, for failure to complete their contract for building a new wooden pier at North Brother Island, and requesting the views of the Board in the matter. Secretary to advise that the Board duly considered the matter when it was acted upon by them on June 28th ult., and the resolution then adopted embodied the views of the members of the Board, and that nothing had occurred since to change or modify the views then expressed on the subject.

From Department of Public Works—In reference to the location of the Public Bath, at Pier, new 28, North river. Secretary directed to reply thereto, reciting the facts as to the selection of a location therefor, as they appear upon the records of the Department, and that the locating of the bath at Pier, new 28, North river, in place of at Pier, old 34, was done at the request of the representatives of the Department of Public Works; the bath to only remain there during such time as the Pennsylvania Railroad Co., the lessees of the said pier, should permit.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting amount of work done during the week ending August 5 inst.

2d. Reporting cost of the repairs made to the pier at Fifty-seventh street, North river, and the approach thereto.

3d. Reporting that the cost of repairing damage to Pier, new 43, North river, by the steamship "Chateau Laville," was \$50.74. Treasurer requested to make a bill therefor, and collect the same from Messrs. Funch, Edye & Co.

4th. Reporting that the contractor for building Pier, new 37, North river, had completed his contract, and the pier was ready for occupancy. RULES AND REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED for the government and proper care of piers, bulkheads, slips, and other wharf property, under the provisions of subdivision 7 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, by the Board of the Department of Docks, and published, to take effect on and after MAY 1, 1882.

The said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as follows:

The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regulation, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of said Board.

And every person guilty of a violation of or disobedience to any of the following rules or regulations, in addition to the penalties thereby fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions, is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and to be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or by both.

No. 1.—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on any part of the water-front of the city, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars, for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit any such work to be done upon his premises before such permit therefor has been obtained, and under the further penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day which shall elapse before any piles so driven, or platform so erected, or material so filled-in, without such permit being first obtained, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time which may be allowed for such removal, by a notice served upon such owner, lessee, or occupant, by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, to be also recovered from such owner, lessee, or occupant.

No. 2.—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or other structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoisting-mast, coal-hopper, sign, or advertising device, or other erection or obstruction of any kind be placed or maintained upon any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board; and if the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such premises, or the owner, lessee, or agent, of any such structure, erections, or obstructions, shall fail to comply with a notice served by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district to remove any such structure, erection, or obstruction, after the expiration of the time allowed by such notice for the removal, such owner, lessee, occupant or agent, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day, which shall elapse before any such structure, erection or obstruction, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time for the removal thereof specified in said notice.

No. 3.—No cargo shall be discharged from any vessel upon any bulkhead or wharf structure, at which such vessel is being unladen, after service by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, upon the owner, consignee, master, or other officer, or stevedore, of such vessel, of a notice that such bulkhead or structure will be endangered by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars for every such offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the damages of every description which shall be caused by the further discharging of cargo upon such bulkhead or wharf structure, after the service of the said notice, both of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, consignee, master or other officer or stevedore, severally and respectively.

No. 4.—All goods, merchandise, and materials of every kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, or upon reclaimed land, must be removed therefrom without unnecessary delay, and within twenty-four hours after the Corporation Wharfinger for

the district shall have served upon the owner, shipper, or consignee, of such cargo, a notice to remove the same, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each and every day, during which any part of said cargo shall remain upon such pier, bulkhead, structure, or land, after the expiration of the said twenty-four hours, to be recovered from such owner, shipper, or consignee, severally and respectively.

No. 5.—All goods, merchandise and materials of every kind encumbering any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, or reclaimed land, after the time designated for the removal thereof shall have expired, will be liable to be removed by the Board to any warehouse or yard, at the sole risk and expense of the owner of any such property, and all expense incurred for such removal and storage or otherwise, shall be and become a lien thereon, and such goods, merchandise and materials will not be delivered to the owner until the expense of such removal and storage has been paid.

No. 6.—No person shall construct or maintain any engine-house, tally-house, or other small structure, under a permit of the Board, on any unshedded pier, or other wharf structure, unless the same be placed on wheels so as to admit of easy removal thereupon when required, and to prevent the accumulation of dirt or refuse thereunder, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day which may elapse before the discontinuance of such offense.

No. 7.—No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or discharged by horse power, nor shall stones or similar cargo be discharged from any vessel, upon any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, unless proper planking be provided to protect the surface of such pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure from injury consequent upon the travel of the horse, or the throwing of the stones or similar cargo thereupon, under a penalty of five dollars a day for each horse so employed, and of twenty-five dollars for each offense of discharging stones or like cargo, upon such pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 8.—No sand shall be discharged from any vessel unless canvas or similar material be extended from the vessel's side to the bulkhead or wharf structure at which such vessel is being unladen, to prevent the falling of the sand into the water, and if the surface of any such wharf structure is not sufficiently tight to prevent the sand dumped thereon from going through into the water, then no sand shall be discharged thereon from any vessel, unless canvas or similar material be first laid thereon to receive the sand, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 9.—The owners, lessees and occupants of every pier, wharf and bulkhead in the City of New York shall keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent thereto properly dredged; and whenever, in the judgment of the Board, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices, signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or collector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or dredging are required by said Board, specifying the nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required, and the time within which such repairs must be made, or such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or occupants of such notice, they shall forfeit and pay a penalty of fifty dollars per day for every day which shall elapse before they comply with such notice.

No. 10.—No ashes, refuse, offal, fruit, vegetables or any other substances, shall be thrown into the waters surrounding or adjacent to any pier or bulkhead, or any other part of the water-front of the city, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant, severally and respectively, of any pier, bulkhead, wharf structure, or other property, from which any such substance shall be thrown, or from the person actually throwing the same; or if any such substance be thrown from any vessel lying in waters within the jurisdiction of the Department, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to be recovered from the owner, consignee, or master of such vessel, severally and respectively.

No. 11.—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the waters adjacent to the water-front of the city, except from the piers, bulkheads and other places designated from time to time, by the Board, for such dumping, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier, bulkhead or other wharf property, from which any such snow and ice shall be dumped, or from the person actually dumping the same, severally and respectively.

No. 12.—All lumber, brick, or other material in bulk discharged on any bulkhead not shedded, shall be at once removed, or, if not so removed, shall be placed at least twenty feet from the edge of the bulkhead, pending removal, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day, for each and every day such lumber, brick or other material shall remain on the bulkhead, to be recovered from the owner or consignee of such lumber, brick or other material, or from the person placing, or causing the same to be placed, on such bulkhead, severally and respectively.

No. 13.—The charges for wharfage and dockage of all vessels admitted to any of the piers or bulkheads constructed under the new plans adopted by the Department, shall be at the same rates as are now, or shall hereafter be, fixed and established by laws of this State, until otherwise ordered by the Board.

No. 14.—The term "Board" when used in the foregoing rules and regulations, shall be taken to mean "The Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York," and the term "Corporation," when so used, shall be taken to mean "The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York."

ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

THE COMMISSIONERS APPOINTED BY CHAPTER 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, in pursuance of said act and the amendatory thereof, give notice to all persons affected thereby that the notices required by the said act must be filed with the Comptroller of said city and a duplicate thereof with the Counsel to the Corporation, as follows:

As to all assessments for local improvements confirmed before June 9, 1880, on or before November 1, 1882. As to all assessments for local improvements completed before June 9, 1880, and since confirmed, on or before November 1, 1882. As to any assessment for local improvements known as Morningside avenues, within two months after the dates upon which such assessments may be respectively confirmed.

The notice must specify the particular assessment complained of, the date of the confirmation of the same, the property affected thereby, and in a brief and concise manner the objections thereto, showing, or tending to show, that the assessment was unfair or unjust in respect to said real estate.
