On reading communication from the Department of Charities and Correction, on motion of Commissioner Voorhis, it was

The Chief Clerk submitted the following draft of a letter to Messrs. Jarrett & Palmer, and Messrs. Shook & Palmer, which was ordered to be entered in the minutes, and a copy sent to the parties named:

POLICE DEPARTMENT,

NEW YORK, January 12, 1875.

Messrs. JARRETT & PALMER, and Messrs. SHOOK & PALMER:

GENTLEMEN—I am instructed by the Board of Police to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of December 19, 1874, proposing to apply a moiety of the proceeds of certain entertainments to be given in your Theatres for the benefit of the Police Life Insurance Fund, and in reply to inform you that the Board fully appreciate the liberality of your proposition and the extent of the benefit it would be likely to afford to the Fund, and tender their thanks for the generous spirit of the proposition.

The Board however, after due consideration, are unwilling to depart from the settled rule and policy of the Department in this respect.

In view of conceded mischiefs which have resulted from allowing members of the Police force to engage in selling tickets for charitable purposes, the Board of Police, on the 3d day of June, 1874, amended Rule 598 of the Police Manual, by adding thereto the following language:

“Members of the force are prohibited from circulating subscription papers, selling tickets, or collecting money from citizens for charitable or other purposes, without leave of the Board.”

The Board are satisfied that the above prohibition is founded on sound policy, and that its general enforcement will benefit the public and the Police force. The Board would perhaps be willing to suspend the rule in favor of a demand for charity resulting from some extraordinary calamity, but they would not be willing to do so in a case where, as in this instance, the Police force itself was to be the beneficiary of proceeding.

The following opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation relative to removal of snow and ice, was ordered to be entered on the minutes of the Board:

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE
COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,
NEW YORK, Jan. 7, 1875.)

Hon. ABRAHAM DISBECKER,
Chairman to Committee of Street
Cleaning of the Police Department:

SIR—Your letter to me of the 21st ultimo states that the Committee on Street Cleaning of the Board of Police have considered the subject of the removal of snow and ice from some of the principal streets of the City, and that a resolution was adopted requesting my opinion whether the Board of Police has the authority, under the appropriation for street cleaning, to spend a portion of said appropriation in the removal of snow and ice from the streets of the City.

The Revised Estimates for the year 1874, among other appropriations for the Police Department, contain the following:

"Cleaning streets under Police Department:

"For Salaries of Clerks, Inspectors, Foremen, Steamboat Superintendents and employees; wages of sweepers, laborers, watchmen, trimmers, cart-drivers, and hostlers; expenses for hired carts, supplies, new scows, harness, horses and carts; rent of stables, and all expenses for this purpose, \$950,000 00"

The estimates for the year 1875 contain an appropriation for street cleaning in similar terms.

I have no doubt whatever that, under existing laws, the Board of Police has full power, in its discretion, to expend a portion of the moneys so appropriated for the years 1874 and 1875, in removing snow and ice from the streets.

On reading and filing communication from the Department of Docks, that they will receive, until further notice, at the foot of Christopher street, all ashes and clean fillings that the Bureau of Street Cleaning may have to dispose of, the Chairman of the Committee on Street Cleaning made the following report:

The Chairman reported his action in reference to the disposal of ashes and sweepings, which are now accumulating on the east side of the City. He stated that he had written to Francis Pidgeon, R. W. Adams, and the Department of Docks, in regard to the matter. Messrs. Adams and Pidgeon had called and expressed a willingness to permit this Department to dump the materials on their property, provided it would be without expense to them. He had appeared before the Dock Commissioners, at their session, and had called their attention to the fact that it would be expedient to use this material for filling for the benefit of the City.

The Commissioners of Docks expressed their approval of this course, and said they would be willing to receive the material and unload it, and should they conclude to pay for the material, would communicate with the Police Department in writing.

The Chairman had also called on his Honor Mayor Wickham, and reported these facts to him, and he signified his entire approval of this course, saying that it was unquestionably for the best interests of the City that this material should be used to make property for the City.
