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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held April 30, 1875:

Present—Hon. Wm. H. Wickham, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Magnus Gross, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted a report in relation to the sale of leases for two years, of real estate of the city, April 23, 1875; whereupon, the following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to lease at public auction, on appraisal, in accordance with the Charter of 1873, for a term to expire May 1, 1877, all of the property included in the sale of April 23, 1875, which was not disposed of at such sale, together with any other real estate which is now unoccupied or the leases of which will expire on May 1, 1875, and that he take whatever steps may be necessary to have such property appraised preparatory to the sale, and proceed with the sale in the manner prescribed by law. No parcel to be leased at less than the value at which the same shall have been appraised.

The Comptroller submitted a report of sales of real estate of the city in 1866 and 1867, the deeds of which have not been delivered, the purchasers having neglected to pay the balance of the consideration money; which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller to examine the facts in the case, and report the proper action to be taken in the matter.

The Comptroller called attention to the action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held February 25, 1875, requesting the Commissioners of Docks to furnish this Board with a statement of the expenditures and operations of the Dock Department for the year 1874; and stated that the information called for had not been furnished as requested.

The Comptroller also referred to a bill before the Legislature to increase the salaries of the Commissioners of Docks, and expressed his decided disapproval of the increase of the salaries of the said Commissioners, as contemplated by the bill referred to; when the Mayor decided the Comptroller to be out of order in his remarks, as this Board had nothing to do with regulating the salaries of the Commissioners of Docks.

The Comptroller entered his protest against the decision of the Mayor as to the question of order in this case, and his protest was allowed; when, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the Commissioners of Docks be and hereby are directed to furnish the information requested in the resolutions adopted by this Board, February 25, 1875.

An application was received from the Board of Police for a plot of ground, thirty-six feet front by one hundred feet deep, on the north side of Fifty-first street, between Third and Lexington avenues, adjoining and west of fire engine-house, for the purpose of erecting a police station-house thereon; and also for two lots, each twenty-five by one hundred feet, on the north side of Sixty-seventh street, between Third and Lexington avenues, immediately east of property now used as a fire engine-house, to be used for the erection of a police station-house thereon; which was ordered on file.

The report of the Counsel to the Corporation on the communication of the Comptroller in relation to ferry leases and other property connected therewith, submitted to this Board March 31, 1875, and referred to the Counsel to the Corporation for his opinion in relation to the execution of leases of ferry franchises, etc., was received and ordered on file.

The following resolution was submitted, and, on motion, laid on the table for further consideration, viz.:

Resolved, That all leases of ferry franchises, and other property, hereafter awarded or granted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, be executed on behalf of said Commissioners by the Comptroller; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized to execute the same on behalf of said Commissioners.
