



REPORTS.

The Committee on Law Department, to whom was referred the annexed resolution requiring Committee on Legislation to visit Albany and advocate amendment to Senate Bill giving Mayor Strong power to appoint Commissioners to reorganize the Police Department, respectfully

REPORT :

That, having examined the subject, they believe the Mayor to be the proper person to make the said appointments. They therefore recommend that the said annexed resolution be adopted :

Whereas, Senate Bill No. , introduced by the Lexow Committee, providing for the reorganization of the Police Department of this city, gives to the Hon. Levi P. Morton, Governor of the State, the power of appointment of the three Commissioners under whose charge and direction said reorganization shall be effected ; and

Whereas, Such appointing power ought instead be vested in the Hon. William L. Strong, Mayor of this city, by virtue of his direct interest in, and responsibility for, a proper administration of all the departments of the city, because of his nomination and election as a strictly non-partisan Chief Magistrate, and because it is in line with the principles of home rule, which the citizens of this city generally demand ; therefore

Resolved, That the Committee of Seven, appointed on the 15th instant "to visit Albany and look after legislative interests," be and they are hereby instructed to advocate an amendment to Senate Bill No. , which will confer the power of appointment of the three Commissioners mentioned upon the Hon. William L. Strong, Mayor of this city, and to exert all proper and honorable influence to insure its adoption.

Whereas, The same section of the Constitution also provides that in cities of the first class "the Legislature may provide for the concurrence of the legislative body"; be it therefore

Resolved, That this legislative body of the City of New York request and demand from the Legislature of this State the right and power to act with the Mayor in behalf of the City on all special city law.

Alderman Windolph moved that the Board do now adjourn.

Minutes of a meeting of the Board of Electrical Control, held at the office of the Mayor, in the City of New York, on Thursday, January 17, 1895, at 11 o'clock A.M.

On motion of Commissioner Hess, his Honor the Mayor was elected President of the Board.

On motion of Commissioner Hess, Commissioner Henry S. Kearny was elected Secretary of the Board.

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board be and is hereby empowered and directed to grant all permits for overhead wire connections, such permits being for temporary use only, and subject to cancellation and revocation at the pleasure of the Board.



The 775 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.29, against 17.55 for the previous week and 23.79 for the corresponding week of 1894.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 194, 64, 111, 8 and 5, against 183, 52, 109, 8 and 4 for the previous week, a total of 382 against 356. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Twelfth, Twentieth and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Seventeenth and Eighteenth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Tenth and Twentieth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Eleventh, Twenty-first and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Nineteenth Ward. Four of the 8 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 2 of the remaining 4 were below Fourteenth street, East. Four of the 5 cases of small-pox were above Fortieth street.

Bowery, Broadway, Carmine street, Catharine street, Chambers street, Christopher street, College place, Cortlandt street, Desbrosses street, Essex street, Exchange place, Fulton street, Hester street, Hudson street, Liberty street, Nassau street, New street, Park Row, Varick street, Wall street, West Broadway.

Second avenue (East Houston street to Twenty-third street), Third avenue (Bowery to Harlem river, Harlem river to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street), Fourth avenue (Sixth street to Forty-second street), Fifth avenue (Washington place to Fifty-ninth street), Sixth avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street (East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street (Second avenue to Ninth avenue), Fifty-ninth street (First avenue to Tenth avenue), One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street (Third avenue to Ninth avenue).

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thereupon be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
