BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held in the Committee Room of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, on Friday, October 23, 1903, at 11.15 o'clock a.m.

Present—N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel; James L. Wells, President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meetings not yet approved was dispensed with.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for alteration and improvement to sewer in Fifth avenue, between Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth streets, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of August 5, 1903, with instructions to reduce the assessments on Maps Nos. 1, 2 and 3 by one-half and to add the amounts thus reduced to Map No. 4, was presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the Board of Assessors under date of October 15, 1903, with objections of Matthew J. Byrnes to the assessment as revised, filed by James A. Dunn, attorney.

Mr. Dunn was heard in opposition to the assessment proposed to be charged upon the property of his client, on the ground that it is unjust and inequitable, as the property is not benefited in the amount of the assessment.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel, the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Ninety-second street, from the east side of Old Croton Aqueduct to Aqueduct avenue; Aqueduct avenue, from the summit south of East One Hundred and Ninety-second street to Kingsbridge road; Kingsbridge road, between the east side of Old Croton Aqueduct and Teeaw avenue, and objections of Robert B. Johnson, executor, and others, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, and of C. H. Larken and Robert Drunker, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of September 3, 1903.

Mr. Andrews, representative of Mr. Hottenroth, attorney, and Mr. Flannery, attorney, were heard in opposition to the cost of the work and the excessive expenses connected therewith.

After consideration, on motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to reduce the assessment by 12½ per cent. from the gross amount thereof—all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging the sidewalks, laying crosswalks, constructing drains and building fences where required in Napier avenue, from Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to Mt. Vernon avenue; Oneida avenue, from Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to Mt. Vernon avenue; Kepler avenue, from Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to Mt. Vernon avenue; Katonah avenue, from Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to Mt. Vernon avenue; Martha avenue, from Two Hundred and Thirty-fifth street to City Line; Vireo avenue, from Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to City Line; Two Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, from Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to Bronx river; Two Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Mt. Vernon avenue to Bronx river; Two Hun-

dred and Thirty-sixth street, from Mt. Vernon avenue to Bronx river; Two Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, from Napier avenue to Vireo avenue; Two Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, from Mt. Vernon avenue to Vireo avenue; Two Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, from Mt. Vernon avenue to Vireo avenue; Two Hundred and Forty-first street, from Mt. Vernon avenue to City Line; Two Hundred and Forty-first street, from Mt. Vernon avenue to City Line, with objections and applications for awards for damages, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of January 13, 1903, for further inquiry and for reference to the Corporation Counsel for his consideration of the question of awards, and also of the questions raised in the several objections filed against the assessment, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board under date of October 4, 1903, together with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel in said matter, dated August 31, 1903.

Mr. A. C. Hottenroth and Mr. John F. Foley, attorneys, were heard in regard to the claims filed by them for awards for damages by reason of the change in the grades of the streets.

On motion, the further hearing in said matter was postponed until the next meeting of the Board.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in the Southern Boulevard, between St. Joseph's street and East One Hundred and Forty-second street, and between East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Longwood avenue, and objections of the Southern Boulevard Land and Improvement Company, filed by Charles H. Brush, attorney; Simon H. Stern and others, by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney; David Rothschild and others, by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney; the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, as owner, etc., by Ira A. Place, attorney, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of September 17, 1903.

The objections of Max Weil, filed with the Clerk of the Board on September 24, 1903, by Edward S. Kaufman, attorney, were also presented.

Mr. Flannery, Mr. Henry H. Sherman, and Mr. Brush, by representative, attorneys, were heard in opposition, on the ground that the cost of the work is greater than the fair value thereof, and that the expense of Inspectors' and Engineer's fees incurred in the construction of the sewer are grossly excessive and unjust.

After consideration, on motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to reduce the assessment by 12½ per cent. from the gross amount thereof—all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in West Farms road, between Edgewater road and East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, and in Bryant street, from Home street to West Farms road, and objections of Fredrik Johannesen and others, by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney; Charlotte Blumenthal, by James A. Dunn, attorney; Henry D. Tiffany and another, by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of September 3, 1903.

Mr. Flannery, attorney, was heard in opposition to the expenses and to the charge especially upon Lot No. 60, and to the apportionment as being in violation of the Charter.

Mr. Andrews, representing Mr. Hottenroth, attorney, was heard, and objected to the expenses and to the apportionment of the assessment.

Mr. Dunn, attorney, was heard in opposition to the amount charged to the property of his client, upon the ground that the principle adopted in making the apportionment of the assessment is unconstitutional.

After consideration, on motion of the Corporation Counsel the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to consider the reduction of the assessment in respect to lots that front on two streets or more so as to make an equitable assessment; and with authority to apply, if the Assessors desire to do so, to the Board of Taxes and Assessments for an apportionment of the tax valuation of such lots, and also to reduce the assessment by 12½ per cent. from the gross amount thereof—all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewers and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street, between Boston road and Mohegan avenue; in East One Hundred and Eightieth street, between Boston road and Southern Boulevard; East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, between Boston road and Crotona Parkway; in East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, between Boston road and Honeywell avenue; in Vyse street, between East One Hundred and Eighty-second street and East One Hundred and Eighty-second street; in Daly avenue, between East One Hundred and Eighty-first street and East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, and in Honeywell avenue, between East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, and East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, and objections of Janette M. Barnett, by Leon B. Ginsburg, attorney; Thomas Kremer and others, by Charles P. Hallock, attorney; Maria Vitale and others, by Mulqueen & Mulqueen, attorneys; Mary B. Hughes and another, by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney; The City Trust Company and Wolf Rosenthal, by Anthony J. Griffin, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of September 3, 1903.

Mr. Hallock, attorney, was heard and objected to the expenses and to the apportionment of the assessment, and also to assessing the property for the sewer in East One Hundred and Eightieth street, between Honeywell and Daly avenues, as the same faces on Honeywell avenue and is not benefited by the sewer in East One Hundred and Eightieth street; and that in the case of Lot Map No. 208 the owner has no access to the sewer and should not be assessed therefor.

Mr. Ginsburg, attorney, was heard in opposition to the apportionment, and claimed that the assessment upon the property of his client is more than the proportionate share levied on similar property.

Mr. Mulqueen and Mr. Flannery, attorneys, were heard in opposition to the expenses connected with the work and to the apportionment of the assessment.

After consideration, on motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to reduce the assessment by 20 per cent. from the gross amount thereof, and to vacate the assessment upon lot Map No. 208—all the members voting in the affirmative.

At 1.30 o'clock p.m., on motion, the Board adjourned to meet on Friday, October 30, 1903, in the same place, at 11 o'clock a.m.

Which was carried by the following vote:


