Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—In compliance with the requirements of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, the following report is submitted, showing the operations and action of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the quarter ending September 30, 1907.

As authorized by sections 909 and 910 of the Charter, the Commissioners caused the work of extending the tax for the year 1907 to be performed by the clerical force of the Department, without additional expense to the City.

## Surveyor's Office.

The following is a summary of the work done in the Surveyor's office for the quarter ending September 30, 1907:

## Lot Alterations.

Borough of Manhattan—Alterations were made affecting 183 lots in the 37 volumes of block tax assessment maps.

Borough of The Bronx—Alterations were made affecting 1,564 lots in the 31 volumes of block tax assessment maps and in the 6 volumes of tentative maps.

Borough of Brooklyn—Alterations were made affecting 1,952 lots in the 92 volumes of block tax assessment maps and in the 11 volumes of tentative maps.

Borough of Queens—Alterations were made affecting 1,457 lots in the 31 volumes of tentative maps.

Borough of Richmond—Alterations were made affecting 936 lots in the 13 volumes of tentative maps.

The duplicate copies of the tax maps used by the Deputy Tax Commissioners in all the boroughs and the copies of the block tax assessment maps in the offices of the Bureau of Arrears and Water Registrar in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, were corrected to correspond with the alterations made on the original maps.

## Block Tax Assessment Maps.

The necessary searches, surveys, calculations and drafting for the preparation of maps for Sections 22, 23 and 24, of the Borough of Brooklyn, were in progress during the quarter.



## Lands Acquired for Public Purposes.

Lands acquired for street and other public purposes in thirty-one proceedings were properly shown on the tax maps; eight of the proceedings were in the Borough of Manhattan, seven in the Borough of The Bronx, seven in the Borough of Brooklyn, four in the Borough of Queens and five in the Borough of Richmond.

## Street Closings.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment discontinued and closed six streets in the Borough of The Bronx, which were taken from the maps.

## Miscellaneous.

Maps were prepared for reports for the Deputy Tax Commissioners and for the Corporation Counsel, to be used in certiorari proceedings.

## BUDGET FOR 1908.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, viz.: One hundred and thirty-five million four hundred and seventy-four thousand four hundred and three dollars and eighty-nine cents (\$135,474,403.89); secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz.: Five million ninety-seven thousand eight hundred and sixty-two dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$5,997,862.28), and, thirdly, the amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1907, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz.: Three million dollars (\$3,000,000), amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one hundred and forty-three million five hundred and seventy-two thousand two hundred and sixty-six dollars and seventeen cents (\$143,572,266.17).

## FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

## Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show all receipts, disbursements and population in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller. Records must show the addresses of parents, guardians or nearest relatives of inmates and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institutions.
2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.
4. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall in his discretion suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.
5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon the per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges upon the City. Except in emergency cases in hospitals, the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals. *The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.*
6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.
7. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.
8. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.
9. Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and, when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the courts where no crime is proven against the child to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a court commitment.
10. The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide



that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

11. In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges (see Rule 5) the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the service actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections.

12. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities, and has been placed in this Budget by the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randall's Island.

My Dear Sir—I have the honor to forward the enclosed invitation, at the request of Major General F. D. Grant, U. S. A., commanding Department of the East, to you, as President of and representing the Honorable Board of Aldermen, to whose kindness and generosity we owe it that the flags of the First New York Volunteers are to be allowed to be placed in the Post Chapel of Governor's Island.

It is, I think, peculiarly fitting that this should be, first on the ground that this regiment was mustered into service on Governor's Island and second, that the Post Chapel ranks as a public government building, always open, and visited by thousands of people—American and distinguished foreigners.

The ceremonies on November 17, are to be made very impressive. The colors are to be put in place by veterans of this same regiment, and for a guard of honor they are to have the distinguished Society of the War of 1812, also the Loyal Legion (1861-5), Cincinnati and other patriotic societies, by representatives.

The commanding officers and their staffs of the Navy Yard, all the National Guard regiments of the City of New York and Naval Militia are invited, also the Governor of the State.

I mention this to show in what high regard the flags are held by those to whom the City has entrusted them.

They will be carefully preserved, and I may mention that we shall adopt the method used in Europe of enclosing them in black silk netting, whereby they are absolutely preserved and kept from dropping to pieces, which a glass case will not prevent, and also they can be seen and admired, as is not the case when they are rolled up tight, which also tends to destroy them.

In writing to His Honor, the Mayor, I have mentioned this, also the fact that we have in this Post Chapel, which is a museum of relics, two shields, set up in 1848, by Veterans of the Regular Army upon their return from Mexico; also we have two sacred pictures of oil very large, which Colonel Staniford, Third U. S. Infantry, brought from Mexico in 1848; so the colors will be in very appropriate surroundings.

Please accept on behalf of the Board of Aldermen, and if it is a proper procedure, please express to that Honorable Body the sincere appreciation of the officers and soldiers stationed on Governor's Island of their kindness and courtesy.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Fire Department:

Headquarters—Fire Department City of New York,  
Nos. 157 and 159 East Sixty-seventh Street,  
November 11, 1907.

Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—Since September 1, 1906, the steam launch "Velox" has been leased by this Department from Harry B. Mingle of No. 7 East Forty-second street, Manhattan, at a rental of fifty dollars (\$50) per month for the use of the Chief of the Nineteenth Battalion in charge of the fireboat fleet of this Department, in responding to alarms for fire along and contiguous to the water front of Greater New York, in making official inspections, and as a tender for the delivery of supplies for the fire boats, and an application is now pending before your Honorable Board to authorize the purchase of the launch for the use of this Department, without contract at public letting.

At 2.10 o'clock p. m., on the 6th inst., the launch was sunk opposite the coal pockets at the Erie docks, near Pavonia avenue, Jersey City, as the result of the steam lighter "Leonard J. Busby" colliding therewith, the facts and circumstances of the occurrence being set forth in the report of the Chief of the Nineteenth Battalion, dated the 7th inst., and reading as follows:

"New York, November 7, 1907.

"EDWARD F. CROKER, Chief of Department:

"Sir—In compliance with existing orders, I respectfully report the sinking of steam launch 'Velox,' through collision with steam lighter 'Leonard J. Busby,' at 2.10 o'clock p. m., on the 6th inst.

"The launch 'Velox' was proceeding from the foot of Essex street, Jersey City, to the berth of the fireboat 'George B. McClellan' at Ganessvoort street, North river. When opposite the coal pockets at the Erie docks, near Pavonia avenue, Jersey City, the pilot, James Gallagher, noticed the steam lighter coming out. He blew one whistle, which was necessary, but received no answering signal. As the steam lighter was coming toward him in such a way as to involve risk of collision, he blew his alarm whistle and immediately backed his boat. The pilot in charge of the steam lighter did not check the speed of his boat until too late to prevent the collision, nor did he answer the alarm signal. The steam launch 'Velox' was struck on the port bow, the force of the blow driving in the planking to such an extent that the launch sank while being towed to the Brown & Miller dry dock at Morris street, Jersey City.

"I called up the Merritt-Chapman Wrecking Company, and they sent a derrick to lift the launch. It will be necessary to dock her at once. A survey can then be held to determine damages. The office of the owners of the steam lighter is in the Produce Exchange Building. I shall look them up in the morning and report to you all necessary information as soon as possible. I was aboard the 'Velox' at the time the collision took place. On reaching shore, I at once notified Secretary Downes of the accident, and of my action in the matter.

The "Velox" is now on dry dock and cannot be floated in her present condition, and must be kept there at an expense of forty dollars (\$40) per day, until the work of repairs is ordered.

It is estimated that the expense of making the repairs and of dry docking the boat will approximate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000). There are no funds available to the Department for doing the work and it is imperative that the launch be repaired without delay. Copies of surveys are enclosed.

In order to provide for the emergency which confronts the Department in this matter, I have therefore the honor to request that the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, adopt a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding three thousand dollars (\$3,000), the proceeds thereof to be applied to the expense of placing the steam launch "Velox" in condition for service, and further, in pursuance of the authority conferred by the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, that your Honorable Board authorize and empower me to have the necessary work done without contract at public letting, it being imperative that this work be done with the least possible delay.

I enclose draft of preamble and resolutions designed to accomplish the object in view, immediate action upon which is urgently requested.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding three thousand dollars (\$3,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the expense of repairing the steam launch "Velox," and placing the same in condition for service, and for dry docking costs in connection therewith; and

Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Sir—On March 11, 1907, this Department requested the Board of Aldermen to appropriate the sum of \$32,400 to provide for an adequate nursing staff in the new Harlem and Fordham hospitals, and on June 18 a resolution was adopted by the Board of Aldermen authorizing the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$30,000 for this purpose. This resolution has not yet been acted upon by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the Nurses have been paid from the regular appropriation of this Department for Salaries. It is now ascertained that the deficiency in salaries will not be so great as was at first estimated, and that an additional \$18,000 will be ample to meet the needs of the Department for the fiscal year. A careful investigation, however, has shown that the other appropriations of this Department are insufficient. The Trustees, therefore, request that the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, under date of June 18, 1907, be rescinded, and that a substitute resolution be adopted authorizing additional appropriations to the funds of this Department as follows:

No. 2480.

The Committee on Salaries and Offices, to whom was referred on October 15, 1907 (Minutes, page 185), the annexed resolution in favor of fixing salary of position of Cashier of Department of Docks and Ferries at \$4,000 per year, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

Deputy Commissioner Judge appeared before the Committee and reinforced the statements contained in the report of Mr. Hervey, Chief Statistician and Examiner of the Bureau of Investigations of the Comptroller's Office, which was submitted to this Board with the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Mr. Judge stated that Commissioner Benschel was strongly of the opinion that the increase of salary was reasonable and was merited. The Committee, from its inquiry, is satisfied that such is the case. In a recent report upon the resolution increasing the salary of the Chief Clerk and Auditor in the same Department, the Committee recommended an amendment making the new salary take effect January 1, 1908. For the reasons stated in that report we make the same recommendation in this instance, and submit the following resolution for adoption:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby concurs in said resolution and fixes the salary of Cashier in the Department of Docks and Ferries as set forth therein, to take effect, however, on January 1, 1908.

Sir—In regard to the request of Commissioner Benschel, of the Department of Docks and Ferries, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen the fixing of the salary of the position of Cashier in his Department at \$4,000 per annum, referred by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen for report, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

Silas Strauss, the Cashier of the Department of Docks and Ferries, has held that position since February 4, 1904. His present salary is \$3,000 per annum.

The duties of the position have greatly increased during the past three years, a conspicuous feature of this increased work being that connected with the establishment and operation of two Municipal ferries. The daily receipts of the Staten Island and South Brooklyn ferries are received and deposited by him. He also receives all moneys collected by the twenty-one Dock Masters. In fact, all moneys paid to the Department of Docks and Ferries for leases, permits and privileges are received by him. The revenues of the Department from all sources amount to between \$4,500,000 and \$5,000,000. With the completion of the new docks now in course of construction the revenues of the Department and the duties of the Cashier will be correspondingly increased. Commissioner Benschel states that Strauss's position is one of the most responsible and important in the Department, and that he is justly entitled to a salary of \$4,000.

The request of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries would seem to be reasonable and just, and it is therefore recommended that the salary of the Cashier of the Department of Docks and Ferries be fixed at \$4,000 per annum.

The Committee on Salaries and Offices, to whom was referred, on October 22, 1907 (Minutes, page 229), the annexed resolution, in favor of fixing salary of Automobile Engineman, Department of Education, at \$1,500 per annum, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

Commissioner John A. Wilbur and Mr. Patrick Jones, Superintendent of Supplies, appeared before the committee. The committee also had the benefit of the report of Mr. Hervey, Chief Statistician and Examiner of the Comptroller's Bureau of Investigations, which was the basis of the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and a letter from Commissioner Barrett, Chairman of the Committee on Supplies of the Board of Education, addressed to the President of that Board, and referred by him to the President of the Board of Aldermen. From these sources the committee learns that a very competent man was employed by the Committee on Supplies to run the auto-truck purchased during the past summer, and that the experiment in regard to the use of the truck met the expectations of the committee. Through a misunderstanding of information derived from the office of the Civil Service Commission the Committee on Supplies exceeded its authority in employing the Engineman, in that the position had not been established nor a salary fixed therefor. When the mistake was discovered the employee was laid off, and application was made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the adoption of the necessary resolution. It seems that the work required of this employee is greater than that demanded of the ordinary chauffeur who is designated on the City payrolls as Automobile Engineman. He runs a commercial wagon of large power and capacity; he is charged as a mechanic with the duty of keeping it in repair; he is in charge of the supplies which are transported on the truck, and he assists in delivering and assorting them. The committee is convinced that under the circumstances the salary asked is a proper one, but as it has hitherto determined \$1,200 to be the prevailing rate of wages, it feels that a distinguishing title should be found for this man. It suggests as a proper title "Auto-truck Engineman and Mechanic." The committee recommends that the Board of Aldermen return the resolution to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for change of title merely, and that when the resolution is transmitted again to the Board of Aldermen it be adopted without reference to this committee.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held October 18, 1907, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of the position of Automobile Engineman in the Bureau of Supplies, Board of Education, with salary at the rate of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) per annum, for one incumbent."

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby concurs in said resolution and fixes the salary of the above position as set forth therein.

Sir—In the matter of a communication from the Board of Education requesting the fixing of the salary of the position of Automobile Engineman in the Bureau of Supplies at \$1,500 per annum, which communication was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, I beg to report as follows:

It appears that Mr. John D. Smith was regularly appointed to the position of Automobile Engineman by the Board of Education, and that he went to work in said capacity on July 24, 1907. His name first appeared in a supplementary payroll for July and August, received in the Department of Finance on August 28, 1907. This payroll was returned to the Board of Education because the salary of said Smith had not been fixed in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Charter.

At a meeting of the Board of Education held September 11 a resolution was adopted requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to recommend to the Board of Aldermen that the salary attached to the position of Automobile Engineman in the Bureau of Supplies be fixed at the sum of \$1,500 per annum, but as no action has yet been taken in the matter Mr. Smith's salary is still withheld, and your Examiner has been informed that the Board of Education is now in danger of losing the services of a very valuable employee unless favorable action is taken at an early date.

As to the rate of salary proposed for the position herein considered, it is higher than is paid for such services in some other City departments, but it would appear that the Committee on Supplies felt justified in offering higher compensation than is usually paid in order to obtain the services of Mr. Smith, because of his peculiar ability to meet the potential needs of the Board of Education. Although at the present time Mr. Smith's work is confined to running the one auto-truck used by the Bureau of Supplies, he has been employed with the understanding that he is to instruct and supervise the additional men to be employed hereafter at a lower rate of wages to run the auto-trucks which the Board of Education expects to have for delivering its supplies as soon as its proposed supply depository is completed. It is stated that the Committee on Supplies intends to have its own machine shop, where all repairs can be made, and Mr. Smith, who is a thorough mechanic, is to have charge of said shop.

Your Examiner would therefore recommend that the salary of the position of Automobile Engineman in the Bureau of Supplies, Board of Education, be fixed as requested, at \$1,500, according to the resolution attached hereto.

Hon. EGERTON L. WINTHROP, JR., President, Board of Education:

My Dear Mr. President—The Committee on Supplies, believing that if the Department had its own auto-trucks a great deal of money could be saved, advertised for one in the usual way and a truck was selected and delivered to the Department on July 5.

The agreement between the Department of Education and the concern from whom the auto-truck was purchased was that a thirty days' trial should be given free of charge and a man broken in to run the truck, as there was no one in the Department at the time competent to do so.



After due consideration and investigation, the Committee on Supplies decided that a competent man, capable of making all repairs had better be employed.

So as to comply with all rules and regulations when employing a person to run the truck, a representative of the Bureau of Supplies called on the Civil Service Commission and consulted with the proper authorities, who explained that they had no list from which to make an appointment, and that the position could be filled from a non-competitive list.

Mr. John D. Smith was examined by a committee appointed by the Committee on Supplies for the purpose, and after due investigation, it was found that Mr. Smith was a practical engineer and mechanic of many years standing and had a license to run a machine and met all other requirements. He was receiving a salary of \$1,560 per year, and his reason for wishing to change his position was because his hours were much longer than they would be in the Department of Education.

The necessary certificate was transmitted to the Civil Service Commission, who stated that everything was in accordance with their rules and regulations and that the appointment could be made.

The Board of Education approved the appointment of Mr. Smith on July 8, and he was put to work on July 24, so that he could familiarize himself with the running of the auto-truck before the expiration of the thirty days' trial.

I beg to assure you that if the Superintendent of Supplies or the Committee on Supplies had any doubt in their minds that they were violating any Charter provisions or Civil Service rules the appointment would not have been made until such provisions and rules had been complied with.

I have been looking into the question of this auto-truck very carefully, and, after due consideration, I am satisfied that it is doing work equivalent to at least three double trucks, which has resulted in a saving to the Department of about \$21 per day.

Besides running this machine, the Automobile Engineer has to have under his charge supplies which at times represent \$5,000. He must carry them to the various floors of the schools and assort them, so that the Principal will have no trouble in checking off same. You will, therefore, see that it requires a man of intelligence to handle the supplies. He has also made all the necessary repairs to the machine since it was purchased.

In the past we spent a large amount of money to collect summer school supplies. This year all this work has been done under the supervision of the person having charge of the physical training apparatus and Mr. Smith, which will result in a great saving for the year 1908.

In addition to the work above described, he has been transferring physical training apparatus and other supplies to the evening recreation centres, and has assisted the man in charge of this apparatus to make all the necessary repairs, so that the work which cost the Department of Education large sums of money heretofore is now being done at little or no expense.

These facts are brought to your notice to show you that the position is a very responsible one. The Committee on Supplies is so satisfied with the work performed by this auto-truck that it contemplates asking for another one, thus reducing the necessity of hiring outside conveyances to a minimum.

We feel that the auto-truck will within one year not alone pay for itself but will pay the salaries of the two men employed to work on the same.

The Committee, in acting as it has, believed that it was acting for the best interests of the Department of Education and had no other motive when it so acted. One thing is certain, the Superintendent of Supplies or the Committee on Supplies had no intention of violating, even technically, any Charter provisions or Civil Service rules or regulations.

In view of the foregoing, I would respectfully ask that because of the necessity of employing this man to be broken in before the thirty days expired, that you bring these facts to the proper authorities with a view to having our action approved.

Dear Sir—Referring to request of this date for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$32,500 for Supplies and Contingencies, I beg to state that such request is due primarily to the fact that while the department estimated the cost of meats for 1907 at \$79,000, the actual cost will probably be \$116,000. In 1906 the estimated cost of 1,135,000 pounds of meat was \$71,505, whereas the contract price for 1907 for the same amount of meat is \$101,190, an increase of \$29,685, or 41 51-100 per cent.

That the cost of meat will probably be as much as \$116,000 is due to the increased cost and also to the large increase in the census of inmates.

The request for \$25,000 for Supplies for Manufacturing Purposes is due principally to the increased capacity of the plant since its removal from the Kings County Penitentiary. The appropriation for 1907 having been exhausted, the additional amount requested is to be applied to the purchase of supplies for the manufacture of brooms, brushes, bedsteads, bedding and shoes, to be sold to the various City departments.

The \$10,000 asked for for Steamboats is for repairs of same, and also to fit them for constant service through the coming winter.

—which was referred by you to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

In the departmental estimate for 1907, Supplies and Contingencies, it was calculated that \$89,000 would be sufficient to purchase meats (beef, veal and mutton) for the current year. Of this amount the Board of Estimate and Apportionment allowed \$81,505, the same amount that was allowed for the preceding year. During the six months intervening between the preparation of the departmental estimate and the execution of the meat contract for the current year the price of meats of all kinds advanced considerably. For that reason the department was unable to enter into contracts for meat at the prices on which the departmental estimate was based. This fact, together with an increase in the number of inmates of the several institutions under the control of the department, accounts for the application for additional money at this time.

Below will be found a statement showing the increases in the contract prices for meats in 1907 over those of 1906:

In February of this year the prisoners confined in the Kings County Penitentiary, together with the manufacturing industries in which they had been employed, were removed to Blackwell's Island, where a larger plant was established, capable of giving employment to an increased number of prisoners who are engaged in the manufacture of brooms, shoes, bedsteads, bedding, knit goods, brushes, etc., which are sold to the several departments of the City government at prices that realize a handsome profit.

To purchase additional raw material from which to manufacture these goods, and thus to give employment to a larger number of prisoners who would otherwise be in idleness, with all its attendant evils—including insanity—application is made for Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$25,000. The Budget allowance for this purpose for the year 1906 was \$75,000, and the profit realized from that source was \$29,169.40, which, together with the original allowance, reverted to the General Fund.

For the year 1907, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated \$75,000 for this purpose, all of which had been expended up to August 31.

The Deputy Commissioner of Correction, who has charge of all the steamboats, after consulting with the Captains and Engineers and with the Department Inspector, Mr. Jamer, calculates that at least \$10,000 will be required to make imperative repairs to the steamboats "Bronx," "Minnahtonck" and "Massasoit," particularly the "Massasoit" which alone would cost approximately \$8,000.

Last spring the United States Government revoked the license of the steamboat "Thomas F. Gilroy" of the Department of Correction, because of the failure to make needed repairs for which there were no funds. The boat subsequently sank at her



pier at Hart's Island, where she now lies. To avert a similar fate to the "Massasoit," particularly, the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$10,000 is, it is claimed, imperative.

In addition to the Budget allowance for that purpose in 1906, Special Revenue Bonds for \$5,000 were issued for the repair of steamboats that year, all of which has been expended.

In view of all the foregoing facts, your Examiner is of the opinion that the issue of the Special Revenue Bonds for which the Commissioner of Correction applies, should be authorized, namely:

Dear Sir—The Department finds it necessary, in order to carry out the recommendations made by a Special Committee of the New York Fire Insurance Exchange and of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, who have given their special attention to the installation of the high-pressure fire service system in the Borough of Manhattan, to procure 230 hydrants more than contracted for, to be used in this service.

There is being manufactured under contract, by the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company, 1,050 four-nozzle hydrants and 40 two-nozzle dock hydrants. The contract



for the furnishing of these hydrants was awarded some time before the receipt of the recommendations of the Fire Underwriters to place additional ones along the line of this improved fire-fighting system. This hydrant of a special design and pattern was selected after a very thorough test, which placed upon the City quite an expense to conduct. The sample hydrants submitted by the several manufacturers were subjected to a very severe test, the City employing the fireboats to pump against said hydrants, in order to determine if they could withstand the pressure called for in the specifications which were drawn with a view of obtaining the best hydrant.

The A. P. Smith hydrant was the one selected. The engineers who conducted the test in the presence of the then Commissioner of this Department and the representatives of the several bidders certified that the Smith hydrant was the only one that conformed to the requirements of this Department, and the contract for same was subsequently awarded. A few of the bidders contested the award of this contract, but the courts sustained the Department in the selection of the hydrant made by the A. P. Smith Company.

The bid price for these hydrants was \$100.70 each. It is agreeable to the manufacturers to construct and furnish 230 additional hydrants at an increased cost of \$16.65 each over the contract price. This advance is accounted for by the increase in labor and materials since the letting of the contract in 1905. The total cost of the extra hydrants will be \$26,990.50, and the Department desires to obtain same, with the approval of your Board, without the necessity of advertising for competitive bids and proposals, thereby saving considerable time and a large amount of expense which would necessarily follow the employment of the same forces and help which the Department was obliged to secure in making the selection of this special hydrant, and it is deemed for the best interest of the City that the same manufacturer be authorized to furnish these additional hydrants on an open order.

I request that you submit this communication to your Board and ask the adoption of the enclosed resolution authorizing the expenditure of this money without public letting.

Resolved, That article 12 of chapter 6 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to "Surveyors" on the Calendar as General Order No. 331 (Int. No. 2340), be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Matter in italic is new matter; matter in parentheses is old matter.

Sec. 277. The City Surveyors employed by any Borough President shall receive compensation therefor as follows, nor shall any Surveyor's bill be paid unless the same be first certified by the Borough President so employing him:

For a preliminary survey in regulating a street or avenue or for making a country road for the first line of levels (three) *five* cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street, avenue or road, and for each additional line of levels (one cent) *one and one-half* cents per linear foot, to be measured in the same manner.

(For a preliminary survey in filling sunken lots, one dollar and a half per lot of twenty-five hundred square feet.)

For grading, when done alone, (five) *eight* cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For grading and setting curb and gutter, when done under the same contract, (eight) *twelve* cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For grading and setting curb and gutter and flagging or paving when done under the same contract (eleven) *fourteen* cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For setting curb and gutter alone (three) *four* cents per linear foot along the line of the work done.

For setting curb and gutter and flagging or paving, when done under the same contract, but not in connection with the grading, (nine) *twelve* cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the street or avenue.

For flagging, when done alone, (three) *five* cents per linear foot along the line of the work done.

(For setting stakes, making final survey, etc., in the filling of sunken lots, one dollar and a half per lot of twenty-five hundred square feet.)

For fencing, including preliminary survey, (three) *five* cents per linear foot.

For making a country road (ten) *fourteen* cents per linear foot, measuring through the centre of the road.

For establishing a new grade line (one cent) *one and one-half* cents per linear foot, measuring along the line.

For making the necessary surveys and furnishing all necessary copies of damage maps in street opening proceedings, three cents per foot, measuring along the exterior line of the street or avenue and along all interior boundary lines of each parcel included within said street or avenue lines (and for assessment lists and maps for street opening or other improvements, three cents per linear foot of map front), it being understood that the Surveyor shall (in every case), if required, furnish quadruple lists and maps without extra charge.

For furnishing copies of assessment lists and maps for improvements other than street opening, three cents per linear foot of map front, for each list required.

(A Surveyor employed by either of the said Borough Presidents to make a survey, the compensation for which is not otherwise provided, shall receive such compensation as shall be certified by the Borough President so employing him.)

A Surveyor employed by one of the Borough Presidents to make a survey, the compensation for which is not otherwise provided, shall receive such compensation as shall be agreed upon in writing between the Surveyor and said Borough President, before the survey or work be undertaken, and after the completion of the said survey or work the Surveyor's bill shall be certified by the Borough President in accordance with the terms of such agreement.

Sec. 280. A Surveyor shall be entitled to receive (ten) *fifteen* dollars for every certificate for payment to a contractor on any work done by contract made upon public advertising and letting, which shall be paid by the Borough President making the contract, and except as herein otherwise provided, no Surveyor shall be entitled to any payment for a certificate to a contractor.

The amount so paid for a certificate shall be deducted from the payment to be made to the contractor on account of the work certified to be done.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From September 17 to September 30, inclusive, thirty-four operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, three at Gouverneur Hospital, twelve at Harlem Hospital and nine at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

An additional Apothecary is urgently needed at Gouverneur Hospital where, in addition to the regular hospital work, 65,530 prescriptions were furnished in 1906, or over 200 prescriptions a day. One Apothecary looks after the hospital and Out-patient Department. Authority is requested to employ an additional Apothecary at the regular salary.

The specifications for the various supplies for the year 1908 have been prepared, and they are based on the distribution for the months of July, August and September, with 10 per cent. added for increased population. It is recommended that the specifications be completed for advertisement.

It is recommended that Miss Cutler, who has been Acting Dietitian in Bellevue Hospital for two years, and who is on the eligible list for appointment as Dietitian, be appointed to that office.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the appointment of an additional Apothecary at Gouverneur Hospital be authorized, such appointment being recommended by the General Medical Superintendent.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the specifications for supplies for the year 1908 be completed, and that they be advertised in the CITY RECORD.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the appointment of Miss Edna Cutler as Dietitian at Bellevue Hospital, at a salary of \$1,000 a year, be authorized.

#### Reports of Committees.

Mr. Tierney, of the Building Committee, reported on the communication of Messrs. Parish & Schroeder, architects, regarding alterations in the plans and specifications for lighting the building of the training school for women Nurses, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That this matter be referred to the President for further information and report.

Mr. Tierney, of the Building Committee, reported in the matter of the fixtures for Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital, and on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the style of fixtures recommended by the architects and by the Building Committee be approved by the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Tierney, of the Building Committee, reported on the bill of Messrs. W. H. Wright & Sons for extras on the balconies of Harlem Hospital, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That this matter be referred to the President with power.



Mr. Sachs reported on the employment of Clerks in the Assistant Superintendent's office and storeroom, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Cleveland system of accounts be adopted as soon as possible, provided the same meets with the approval of the Department of Finance.

Mr. Tierney, of the Building Committee, reported upon the matter of the disputed items at Fordham Hospital, and submitted letters from the John H. Parker Company and from the architect, Mr. R. F. Almirall.

On motion, duly seconded, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, One thousand dollars has been retained from the final payment to the John H. Parker Company, contractors for Fordham Hospital, in order to cover the completion of some matters of minor importance which it was impossible to finish at that time because of the incomplete work of other contractors, and also to cover the possible resurfacing of the elevator pits which were damp and appeared to leak; and

Whereas, The John H. Parker Company has been notified from time to time to complete this work without result; therefore be it

Resolved, That the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for his advice and opinion.

Mr. Stern, as a committee of one, made a report of progress in the matter of the bill of the American Time Detector Company, and after some discussion the matter was referred back to Mr. Stern with authority to make such arrangements as he deemed just.

#### Communications.

A communication dated September 30 was received from Mr. J. H. Freeland with a letter from Messrs. Kelly & Kelley, general contractors for the layout of the grounds at the new Harlem Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the architect the final payment on the contract be approved, but that \$1,000 instead of \$500, as recommended by the architect, be withheld to cover the cost of placing the lawns, grounds, etc., in good condition in the spring.

A communication was received from Dr. Albert F. Brugman, Secretary of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital, transmitting the minutes of the Fordham Hospital Medical Board for the meeting held on September 17.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Hollow concrete blocks being used, which Superintendent claims are not up to accepted standard.

These concrete blocks are manufactured of the very best material, namely, Atlas Portland cement, best grade Cow Bay sand, broken trap rock. Proportion, two parts sand, two parts broken stone, one part cement; that appellant believes these blocks to be in every way as good as North river brick, and a safe material to be used in the construction of small buildings; that appellant manufactures these blocks for his own use only; that when test was made on the samples selected by department the samples had been recently made, and were not sufficiently hardened to withstand severe test required by department; that blocks are now in good condition. Can he proceed with the erection of his house, using his own blocks as at present manufactured? That houses are very small; that houses are outside of fire limits, and that appellant honestly believes the proposed method of construction to be a safe one.

Appeal No. 68, New Building, No. . . of 1907, south side of Sixth street, 100 feet west of Third avenue, Brooklyn; W. J. Conway, appellant.

cial feet, or 20 per cent. more than allowed in section 32 of the Building Code; that the building would cover only 20 per cent. more than area allowed; that the building is only three stories in height, and that all side and rear walls will be provided with fireproof shutters.

Proposed bulkhead construction is unlawful.

State purpose for which bulkhead is to be used.

First—The Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of Manhattan has refused to approve the manner of construction or materials to be followed or used in the alteration of this building.

Second—It is claimed that an equally good and more desirable form of construction can be employed than that required by the Superintendent in this specific case.

An approval of the proposed bulkhead construction, the sides of which are to consist of 4-inch terra cotta blocks, steel uprights and galvanized iron clapboards, the roof of steel I-beams and terra cotta flat arches and slag roofing.

An approval of the purpose of using this bulkhead extension as a sleeping quarters for janitor.

The proposed extension of the bulkhead will cover only 3 per cent. of the roof area of the building, which is fireproof. To make the sides of this extension of brick walls will serve no structural or fireproofing purpose which cannot just as well be fulfilled by the block and steel upright construction, while it would add unnecessarily to the dead weight. The proposed form of construction is therefore more desirable than that required by the Superintendent.

Mr. Semsch appeared before the Board.

Appeal No. 70 of 1907, Alteration 520 of 1907, west side of Brook avenue, 75 feet north of One Hundred and Sixty-third street, The Bronx, M. J. Garvin, appellant.

Proposed alteration is unlawful.

To allow me to alter this one-story shed, which will be used for storage purposes only, and as the shed has not been increased in size or height, the only alterations to same being the open side and rear being enclosed with brick walls, the size of shed 30 feet 5 inches by 80 feet.

As the location of the proposed alteration is within 200 feet of the fire limits, located on the railroad in a practically isolated location. Furthermore, the shed being enclosed on two sides with brick walls and the framework being only temporary, it is our intention to eventually take down the same and rebuild the whole in brick.

Mr. Itzel appeared before the Board.

Appeal No. 71 of 1907, New Building 1001 of 1907, premises Lot No. 5, Block 2897, The Bronx; W. W. Ricker, appellant.

That he (the Superintendent) could not give a permit for a frame structure in this location.

The building is unlawful.

He (the Superintendent) has refused to approve the materials proposed to be used in the erection of said building.

It is desired to erect a wooden structure, to be used as a coal pocket.

The proposed structure is in an isolated location on New York Central Railroad property, with no other buildings in its immediate vicinity, the nearest being 230 feet distant, and with little prospect of new buildings being erected near it. It is to be used as a coal pocket, and the proposed type of construction is almost universally used for coal pockets in the different boroughs of New York City.

The object of such application is to obtain an order of the Court appointing three disinterested and competent freeholders, one of whom shall reside in the County of New York, and at least one of whom shall reside in the county where the real estate hereinafter described is situated, to act as Commissioners of Appraisal under said act and discharge all the duties conferred by the said law and the acts amendatory thereof upon such Commissioners of Appraisal, for the purpose of providing an additional supply of pure and wholesome water for The City of New York.

The real estate to be acquired herein is situated in the Towns of Gardiner, Plattekill and Shawangunk, and is to be acquired for the purpose of furnishing an additional supply of pure and wholesome water to The City of New York.

### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
