REPORT OF THE PUBLIC ADMINISTRATOR FOR THE THREE MONTHS ENDING JUNE 30, 1909.

To the Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

Sir—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 230 of the Laws of 1908, I beg to submit the following report of the proceedings of my Bureau for the three months ending June 30, 1909.

Number of estates reported to and investigated by the Bureau.....	140
Number of estates upon which letters of administration were granted to the Public Administrator upon the application of creditors or next of kin.....	18
Number of estates upon which letters were granted upon the application of the Public Administrator.....	65
Total number of estates upon which letters of administration have been granted.....	83

Three hundred and ninety-two estates are at present under administration.

The accounts of proceedings of the Public Administrator have been judicially settled and allowed by the Surrogate in twenty-two estates, and the estates distributed pursuant to the decree of the Surrogate.

Four hundred and twenty-three estates were received from the Coroner's office of the Borough of Manhattan, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and the Commissioner of Public Charities.

Three hundred and fifty-four estates heretofore received from the Coroner's office of the Borough of Manhattan, from Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, from the Commissioner of Charities and from the House of Relief have been paid directly into the City Treasury.

In fifteen cases citations were served on the Public Administrator to attend the probate of a last will and testament and his appearance noted.

All reports and returns to the Comptroller, Board of Aldermen and to the Supervisor of the City Record have been rendered.

Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge during the months of October, November and December, 1908.

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx is charged with the following duties:

1. To make the topographical surveys, computations, maps or plans and profiles and reports in connection with the following three (3) divisions of work:

(a) The preparation of a design for the street system in those parts of the Borough where a design is not adopted as yet, and the making of surveys, maps, etc., showing changes of adopted street systems and grades; also the preparation of three copies for filing of all matters which have been adopted by the Local Boards or approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(b) The actual demarcation on the ground by monument stones and copper bolts on the lines of adopted avenues, streets, public squares, places, etc., and the protection of the same when improvements are being made.

(c) The making of surveys, searches, maps, technical descriptions, profiles, etc., for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments in the matter of acquiring title by the City to avenues, streets and other public property.

II. To keep in custody the record and maps of all matters pertaining to work under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; also keeping in custody all maps filed in relation to the Borough of The Bronx under the Department of Public

Parks, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

III. To make examinations, maps and reports on miscellaneous matters referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

I—(a). Preparation of the Design of a Street System, Maps Showing Changes of Adopted Street Systems, etc.

Calculations, maps and plans showing dimensions of blocks and grades of streets and avenues were progressed on these sections which are not interfered with by the proposed railroads through the Borough.

The fixture sheets, which show the relation between the new street system and existing street lines and property lines by dimensions and co-ordinates, were progressed.

Computations were also made for all the changes or establishing of new street lines, grades, etc., which have been before the Local Boards and for which maps were forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for adoption and filing.

Calculations, in accordance with the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey Triangulation, were progressed on sections 35, 42 and 60.

Section 38 of the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx, prepared in accordance with the United States Triangulation, was forwarded for adoption November 25, 1908.

Section 39 of the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx, prepared in accordance with the United States triangulation, was filed in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx November 10, 1908.

Section 48 of the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx, prepared in accordance with the United States triangulation, was filed in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx November 10, 1908.

A map or plan showing the street system in Throggs Neck easterly of Fort Schuyler road and southerly of the Eastern boulevard and Town Dock road, was filed in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx November 28, 1908.

Tentative plans and changes in the street system, which were made during the quarter, are enumerated under "Maps forwarded for consideration and adoption."

Miscellaneous studies and maps for a street system are in progress for those portions of the district east of the Bronx River for which no plans have been submitted as yet to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The revision of the Spuyten Duyvil, Riverdale and Mount St. Vincent districts, in connection with the plans for the approaches to the Henry Hudson Memorial Bridge, and the proposed wide boulevards, was remodeled and progressed.

III.—To Make Examinations, Maps and Reports on Miscellaneous Matters Referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

During the quarter, 257 communications were referred for report in the Topographical Bureau by the Chief Engineer and the Secretary of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and 243 reports and letters were written on those subjects.

Numbering of Houses in the Borough.

The Board of Aldermen on April 26, 1904, resolved, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$5,000, in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8, section 184 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to be applied to the cost and expense of renumbering and naming the streets and avenues in the Borough of The Bronx, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 7, 1905, approved and concurred in the above resolution of the Board of Aldermen.

The work was assigned to the Topographical Bureau and a system was established for this purpose.

A map showing the house numbers for the Borough of The Bronx was prepared and has been photo-lithographed for distribution.

The occupants or owners of all the houses in the Borough have been notified of the new numbers of their houses. About fifty (50) requests for new houses have been given out as requested by the respective owners.

A record of the new house numbers is kept on atlases on file in the Topographical Bureau.

Miscellaneous.

During the quarter, the correcting and bringing up to date the atlases of the street system west of the Bronx River, in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Chief Engineer, Topographical Bureau, Bureau of Highways and Bureau of Sewers, was kept up.

The card index of street improvements in the Borough of The Bronx for the President of the Borough and the Chief Engineer was kept up.

Plotting and draughting of record maps, fixture sheets, maps for adoption, office sets and black prints of the sections east of the Bronx River was continued.

During the quarter work to bring up to date for reproducing the lithographed sections of the final maps west of the Bronx River, which were printed in 1895, was progressed.

Work on the mounted sheets of sections of the final maps was progressed.

The topographical map, on a scale of 150 feet to the inch, being a reduction of the original eighty-foot sheets, was continued.

The correcting of the tax maps of the Borough of The Bronx and in use in the Topographical Bureau was continued.

Map showing the proposed fixtures preparatory to comparing block dimensions in accordance with the United States Triangulation were progressed.

Instruction sheets for the computers of the sections of the final maps east of the Bronx River were progressed.

Work of revising and improving the nine-sheet map of the Borough of The Bronx for reprinting was carried on.

The set of tax maps of the Borough of The Bronx in use in the Topographical Bureau, was kept up to date as follows:

Section 10, Volume 8; Section 11, Volume 1, and Volume 17, Twenty-fourth Ward.

Three vaults of the Topographical Bureau were kept in order.

Three hundred and twenty-eight maps or plans on file in said vaults were given out for examination and returned.

Work on indexing survey note books of field parties, which were incomplete, was progressed.

Examinations of the 80-foot scale sheets of the Topographical Survey east of the Bronx River, are in progress in order to determine which field book refers to the respective sheets. This work is very laborious and requires great care.

The work of rearranging the weekly time reports since 1876 were progressed. Corrections were made on the following mounted sheets of the sections of the final maps: 29, 30, 32, 33, 34, 38, 39, 48, 49, 50, 54, 56, 57 and 59.

A perspective view of the entrance to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, showing the proposed site for the Heintz Monument, was made.

The following black prints were mounted and colored up, as copies of new maps, requested by the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:
