Dixon and Harry Schumacher be withheld, that John Blank, Washington G. Davies, Charles M. Beagan, Joseph L. Cleary, Denis J. Hinchey, Charles J. Lephardt and Francis H. Harvey be summoned before the Commission and the other candidates mentioned in the report be marked "Qualified" on the list.

Report dated December 1 recommending that the eligible list of Bookkeeper, Third Grade, be promulgated, that certification of the names of Maurice J. Kluger, John J. O'Connor, Daniel Volkmar, Francis Kennedy, John Muldoon and Frederick Rosenkamm be withheld, and that Herman Pritchep, Benjamin E. Westervelt, Charles G. Werber, Walter Stalb, Charles Victory and George Silverstein be summoned before the Commission, and that the other candidates named in the report be marked "Qualified" on the list.

The recommendations were adopted.

After consideration of reports (2), dated December 2, from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, the following promotion eligible lists were promulgated:

Assistant Surveyor, Grade E, Department of Taxes and Assessments.

Medical Superintendent, Grades 4 and 5, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

Upon the recommendation of the First Assistant Chief Examiner in a report dated December 1, the following promotion examinations were ordered for the Bureau of Contract Supervision of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Assistant Electrical Engineer, Grade D, to be open to all Inspectors or Inspectors of Lamps and Gas eligible under clause 19 of Rule XV.

Assistant Engineer, Grade D, to be open to all Engineer Inspectors, Grade D, and Topographical Draftsmen and Transitmen, Grades C and D, eligible under clause 9 of Rule XV.

Upon the recommendation of the First Assistant Chief Examiner in a report dated December 1, an examination was ordered for promotion from Clerk, Second Grade, to Accountant, Third Grade, in the office of the Commissioners of Accounts.

A report dated November 27 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Ex-

aminer transmitting the request of the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated October 30, for authority to transfer all hospital clerks in various grades to the position of Clerk in similar grades. Upon the recommendation of the First Assistant Chief Examiner, the request was denied.

A report dated December 2 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner relative to the request of the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of The Bronx, for certification of the name of Robert E. Schauffelberg, a Clerk in the Bureau of Highways, for promotion from First to Second Grade Clerk. It appeared that the name of the said employee appeared upon the promotion list for the Administration Bureau, from which bureau he had been transferred to the Bureau of Highways, and that a list containing one name existed for the Bureau of Highways. The Secretary was instructed to certify both lists in accordance with the recommendation contained in the report.

A report dated December 1 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner stating that the Department of Public Charities had rated its employees for the second quarter of 1914 upon the old form of efficiency blank. The Secretary was instructed to accept the efficiency records as presented.

A report dated December 1 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner relative to the request of the Department of Health that the examination ordered for promotion from the position of Bacteriologist to that of Assistant Director, Serological and Diagnostic Laboratories be held merely for Assistant Director and recommending that the request be denied. The recommendation was adopted.

A memorandum dated October 27 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner stating that he had directed that Dr. Max Kahn, who had been rejected in the physical examination for Pathological Chemist, be given a medical re-examination for that position in view of the fact that only two candidates had passed the eliminating tests preparatory to the physical examination, of whom one was Dr. Kahn. The action of the examiner was approved.

Reports dated November 9 and November 30 were presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner relative to the employment of Janitors, Janitor Engineers and Cleaners assigned to perform the work of Janitors and making the following recommendations:

1. The Department of Education should be requested to furnish to this Commission a list of all the schools in the Department in which it is necessary to employ a Licensed Engineer at present, and that hereafter the Department should inform this Commission of the completion of new schools and the alteration of old schools in which the services of such Licensed Engineers are required. In such schools the Commission should refuse to pass the payroll of any person who has not the title of Janitor Engineer. This action to be taken in accordance with the provisions of Rule II, Paragraph 5.

2. In the meantime, an examination should be ordered for promotion from the position of Janitor to that of Janitor Engineer. Such examination to be open to all Janitors in the Board of Education who possess the necessary license from the Police Department to act as Engineer who shall have served for not less than one year in the position of Janitor or Janitor, Steam Heating, and who are otherwise eligible for examination. (Rule XV, Paragraph 19; Rule XV, Paragraph 7a.)

3. After the above examination has been held, an examination should be ordered for promotion from Cleaner to Janitor. Certification from the eligible list resulting from this examination would be made only to fill vacancies in small schools which do not require the services of Licensed Engineers. (Rule XV, Paragraph 17.)

4. After present conditions are adjusted in accordance with the above procedure, all future vacancies in schools requiring the services of Licensed Engineers should be made from the open competitive list for Janitor Engineer, and all vacancies in schools which do not require the services of a Licensed Engineer should be made from the eligible list for Janitor resulting from open competitive examination. There would be no objection, however, to filling vacancies in the position of Janitor from the eligible list for Janitor Engineer, if, in the opinion of the Board of Education, this procedure is advisable.

The recommendations were adopted.

The Commission ordered that all candidates for Captain of Police be examined according to the standards used in the last examination for promotion from Sergeant to Lieutenant and from Lieutenant to Captain and the Secretary was instructed to direct the Chief of the Bureau of Medical and Physical Examination to report to the Commission, setting forth in full the names and causes for rejection of candidates under the standards first used in the examination who could be passed under standards similar to those used in the last examination for promotion to Lieutenant.

The following reports were presented from the Secretary to the Advisory Board: Report dated December 1, recommending that open competitive examinations be ordered for Veterinarian (all departments) and Veterinarian, Department of Health.

Report dated December 1, recommending that an open competitive examination be ordered for the position of Inspector of Blasting, Grade 2.

Report dated December 1, recommending that the examination for Director, Bureau of Food Inspections, Department of Health, be re-advertised for two weeks in order to secure more applicants and that the advertisements be amended to read that a non-assembled test would be given in order that experts in the Federal Service and in the service of other States might be induced to enter the examination.

Report dated December 1, recommending that the eligible list of Draftsman, Grade C, be certified as an appropriate list from which to make appointments to the positions of Junior Topographical Draftsman, Grade B, Junior Mechanical Draftsman, Grade B, and Junior Architectural Draftsman, Grade B.

The recommendations were adopted.

A report dated December 1 was presented from the Secretary to the Advisory Board transmitting reports of the First Assistant Chief Examiner and the Chief of the Bureau of Medical and Physical Examinations, dated November 25 and November 18, respectively, in connection with a communication dated September 16 from the New York State Commission for the Blind in the matter of opportunities for the Blind in the City Service. The Secretary was instructed to communicate the substance of the First Assistant Chief Examiner's report to the Commission for the Blind.

A report dated December 1 was presented from the Secretary to the Advisory Board recommending that the position of Inspector of Blasting be classified in the Competitive Class, Part IV, Inspection Service, Group 5, Inspectors, Miscellaneous. The matter was referred back to the Advisory Board.

A report, dated December 2, was presented from the Secretary of the Advisory Board, recommending that the positions of Apothecary and Deckhand be stricken from the Non-competitive Class of the Department of Correction. The Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing in the matter.

Upon the recommendation of Miss M. B. Upshaw in reports (2), dated December 1, it was

Resolved, That Joseph H. Fargis, of 133 East 91st Street, New York City, be and he hereby is appointed an Expert Examiner in connection with the examination for Examiner of Charitable Institutions, with compensation at the rate of \$10 per day, under the provisions of Clause 8 of Rule XII.

Resolved, That Albert F. Seeker, of 160 Midwood Street, Brooklyn, N. Y., be and he hereby is appointed an Expert Examiner in connection with the examination for Chemist (Food and Drugs), with compensation at the rate of \$10 per day, under the provisions of Clause 8 of Rule XII.

A report (N-31), dated November 21, was presented from Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, stating that the efficiency records of the Department of Bridges for the second quarter of 1914, had not been prepared in accordance with the provisions of Clause 22 of Rule XV, as amended, and recommending that the matter be referred to the Board of Review. The recommendation was adopted.

A communication, dated November 24, was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, requesting approval of the extension of the temporary employment of the following named Carpenters for a period of three weeks from October 23, 1914: Moses H. Wall, 809 Bedford Avenue, Brooklyn; Charles Suydam, Far Rockaway, Long Island; Charles Schacht, Rosebank, S. I.

The request was granted.

A communication dated November 24 was presented from the Commissioner of Correction, requesting authority to employ George S. Anton of 344 Oakland Street, Brooklyn, N. Y., as Keeper, under the provisions of clause 3 of Rule XII. The Secretary was instructed to certify the eligible list of Patrolman-on-Aqueduct to fill the vacancy, and, pending the selection of an appointee from that list, the Secretary was instructed to pass the payroll for the services of Mr. Anton under a special certificate setting forth the facts in the case.

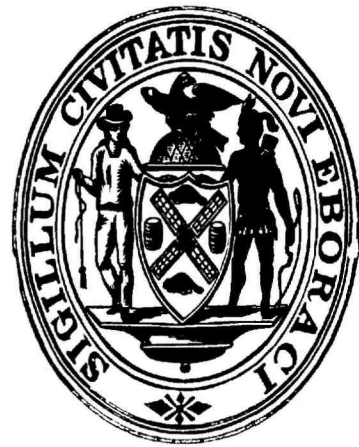

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits therefrom.
