

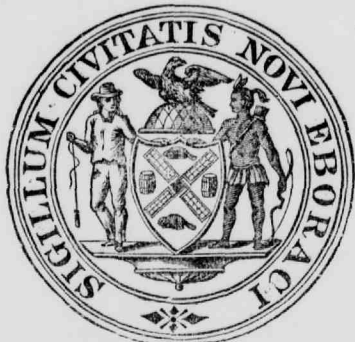

### APPROVED PAPERS.

*Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending September 22, 1877.*

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby respectfully requested to report to this Board, at his earliest convenience, his opinion as to the advisability of opening, restoring, and keeping in order all the old disused wells and pumps, with an estimate of the probable cost of the work; also the propriety or advisability of resuming the work of constructing new wells and pumps, where desired, by assessment, as formerly, with a view of providing two methods of supplying this city with water for domestic purposes, and to be prepared for any emergency that may arise by accident or injury to the works by which the city is supplied with Croton water.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 4, 1877.

Resolved, That the ordinance approved July 27, 1877, entitled an ordinance to amend section 55, of chapter XLV, of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, entitled, "Of nuisances and noxious things and practices," be amended by adding to said section 55 the following: "The provisions of this section shall apply only to itinerant musicians and side shows, and shall not be construed so as to affect any band of music or organized musical society engaged in any military or civic parade, or in serenading, who shall comply with the laws of the State relating to parades in the City of New York," so that said section when so amended, shall read as follows:

Section 55. No person shall beat any drum, or other instrument, or blow any horn or other instrument, for the purpose of attracting the attention of passengers, in any street in the City of New York, to any show of beasts or birds, or other things in said city, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offense; nor shall any person use or perform with any hand-organ or other musical or other instrument for pay, or in expectation of payment, in any of the streets or public places in the City of New York, before 9 o'clock A.M. or after 9 o'clock P.M. of each day, under a penalty of ten dollars for each offense. The provisions of this section shall apply only to itinerant musicians, and shall not be construed so as to affect any band of music or organized musical society engaged in any military or civic parade, or in serenading, who shall comply with the laws of the State relating to parades in the City of New York.

Whereas, By the recent calamitous fire at Tenth avenue and Thirty-fifth street, over one hundred and fifty poor families lost all their effects (in some cases the savings of years of toil), and are now in the most abject poverty, dependent upon the cold charity of the public for even the common necessities of life; and

Whereas, The present condition of these unfortunate people, sad and deplorable as it is, is aggravated by the contemplation of the additional miseries of the approaching winter, which, in their houseless, homeless, and seemingly friendless state, will be certain to add to their sufferings; and

Whereas, It seems to be the duty of the city authorities, in view of the deplorable calamity that has befallen these people, through no fault or neglect on their part, to do something to ameliorate their privations and sufferings; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to ascertain and report to this Board, at its next meeting, what steps, if any, can be taken to appropriate a sum of money (by transfer from any unexpended balance or otherwise), sufficient to alleviate in some degree the wants of these poor people, and to suggest how the money, if appropriated, may be disbursed to the sufferers of the conflagration at Tenth avenue and Thirty-fifth street.

Whereas, The Department of Public Works has on storage a vast quantity of vitrified sewer-pipe of Scotch manufacture, furnished under an old contract, estimated to have cost the city nearly \$100,000, and more than sufficient to answer the needs of that Department for many years to come, and

Whereas, The Department of Public Parks is charged with the construction of the sewers required in the annexed territory, and in the prosecution of that work will need, and is now purchasing sewer-pipe of the character mentioned, but of an inferior quality; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and is hereby requested to inform this Board, what steps are necessary to be taken in order that the Department of Public Parks may be enabled to use the sewer-pipe owned by the city, and controlled by the Department of Public Works, in order that the original cost thereof, at least, may be returned to the City Treasury without unavoidable delay.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the fourth day of September, 1877, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 188. That hereafter, no Texas, Colorado, or other dangerous cattle shall be driven through or along the public streets, except in those cases only where the cattle shall be landed at the foot of the street leading to the slaughter-house to which such cattle shall be destined, and where the street shall be effectually barred or closed, so as to prevent the escape of such cattle during the transfer from the dock to such slaughter-house, and no such cattle shall be landed except in accordance with the provisions and restrictions of this ordinance.
