Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 22, 1884:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,063.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 856.

During the past week 172 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 36 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds) 10 permits.

There were issued, to remove manure from stables in the city, 1 permit.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 2 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks, 65 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 32 visits were made, and 32 disinfections and 4 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 4.

The number of vaccinations performed was 779, of which 211 were primary and 568 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 10,785 pounds of meat and 900 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 87, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 30, and the number of arrests made was 1.

The certificates of 635 births, 67 still-births, 268 marriages and 603 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 22, 1884. This shows a decrease of 17 births and 56 deaths, and an increase of 29 still-births and 23 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was an increase of 43 births, 22 still-births, 18 marriages, and 2 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 15; typhoid fever, 2; inanition, 1; croup, 6; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 7; bronchitis, 18; pneumonia, 4; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 10; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 13; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and preterm births, 5; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 1; scarlatina, 8; whooping cough, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 7; heart diseases, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 3; and suicide, 2. The number of deaths from erysipelas and cancer was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 112 were in institutions, 351 in tenement-houses, 129 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 117 on the first, 137 on the second, 116 on the third, 71 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 11 on the sixth; 600 were stated to be residents of New York City and 3 non-residents; 72 were stated to be single, 148 married, 86 widowed, and the condition of 297 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 603; still-births, 67; bodies in transitu, 21. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 60 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 607 births, 268 marriages, 67 still-births; 603 deaths; 21 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 116 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 14 transcripts of the birth record, 11 of marriage, and 50 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 22, 1884, was 42.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.030, the mean humidity was 74, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,094, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.36 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 597 deaths and still-births, or 89.10 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 17; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 251; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 69; Greenwood (undenominational), 51; Lutheran (undenominational), 85; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 11; Evergreen (undenominational), 40; Woodlawn (undenominational), 18; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 11; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 8; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 14.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending November 15, 1884, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 5; Second, 0; Third, 2; Fourth, 12; Fifth, 10; Sixth, 18; Seventh, 23; Eighth, 14; Ninth, 28; Tenth, 25; Eleventh, 38; Twelfth, 73; Thirteenth, 13; Fourteenth, 23; Fifteenth, 9; Sixteenth, 27; Seventeenth, 40; Eighteenth, 27; Nineteenth, 126; Twentieth, 30; Twenty-first, 50; Twenty-second, 47; Twenty-third, 9; Twenty-fourth, 6.

The actual mortality for the week ending November 15, 1884, was 655; this is 84 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1883, and 96 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.82 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,372,237.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 22.53; Brooklyn, 21.04; Baltimore, 18.68; Boston, 28.21; New Orleans, 30.66; Richmond, 24.96; Charleston, 31.82; Erie, 18.27; Lowell, 17.45; Worcester, 12.00; Cambridge, 12.78; Fall River, 16.58; Lawrence, 17.13; Lynn, 12.17; Springfield, 9.56; Pittsburg, 22.78.
