

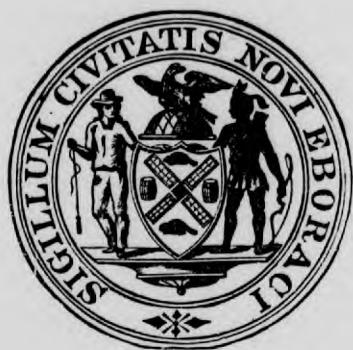

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
NEW YORK, September 24, 1878.

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports Received.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on work performed by Disinfecting Corps; on application for permits; on slaughter-houses; weekly report from River side Hospital; on sanitary condition of Marine Court Chambers; on soap manufacture at 142 West Seventeenth street; on premises 78 Grand street; on certain street pavements, etc.

From the Attorney and Counsel: Weekly and monthly report.
From the Register of Records: Weekly mortuary statement; weekly letter on mortality; weekly abstract of marriages, births, and still-births; weekly report on deaths from contagious diseases; weekly report on attendance of clerks; application to change record of death of James T. Roberts to Michael Fitzpatrick was received, and, on motion, denied.

Reports Referred to other Departments.

Resolutions.

Resolved, That the pay-rolls of this Department for the month of September, 1878, when approved by the Finance Committee, shall be duly signed by the President and Secretary, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon lot No. 78 Grand street, New York City, has become dangerous to life by reason of want of repair,

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on lot No. 78 Grand street be required to vacate said building on or before October 4, 1878, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life by reason of want of repair; and further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of said building, and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent; and further, that said building be not again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to correct the record of death of George Robinson, who died September 13, 1877, as follows:

Resident in city 12 years instead of 15 years, the same being a clerical error.

Resolved, That the services of the following named inspectors of fruit be and are hereby dispensed with from and after September 30, as the funds for this purpose have become exhausted:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to transfer the sum of three thousand dollars from the Fund for Small-pox Hospital and Contagious Diseases to the Fund for Disinfection.

Resolved, That John C. Duffy be and is hereby appointed an Assistant Sanitary Inspector with salary at the rate of \$75 per month.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 21, 1878:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,932, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 749 tenement houses, 169 private dwellings, 103 other dwell-

ings, 24 manufactories and workshops, 25 stores and warehouses, 47 stables, 53 slaughter-houses, 10 fat-rendering establishments, 1 lime kiln, 6 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 public sewer, 7 fertilizing works, 42 sunken and vacant lots, 1 gut cleaning establishment, 1 stock yard, 1 dangerous bridge, 66 yards, courts, and areas, 71 cellars and basements, 91 waste pipes and drains, 218 privies and water-closets, 112 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 7 smoky chimneys, 4 piggeries, 1 cesspool, 39 other nuisances, together with 74 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of Inspectors reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 799.

During the past week 165 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 104 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

111 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 22 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 21 houses, 21 privy-vaults, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of yellow fever was removed to hospital at Quarantine, and 3 cases of typhoid removed to Riverside Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 3,362 privies and water closets, 177 yards, courts, and areas, 304 cellars and basements, 295 garbage boxes, and 133 1/4 miles of street gutters.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

474 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 21, this is an increase of 14 deaths when compared with the preceding week, but 33 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of last year. The actual mortality for the week ending September 14 was 437, which is 123.2 less than the average weekly mortality for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.92 in every 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,086,285.

The increase of the mortality during the week was chiefly due to the following causes, viz.: Measles, 3; diphtheria, 9; typhoid fever, 2; alcoholism, 2; diseases of the heart, 7; marasmus and scrofula, 6; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 6; while membranous croup decreased 3, diarrhoeal diseases, 4; cancer, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; pneumonia, 2; and Bright's disease and nephritis, 5. Compared with the deaths of the corresponding week of last year zymotic diseases were 31 and violent deaths 15 less, while the deaths from constitutional diseases were 5 and from local and developmental diseases each 4 more.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 60 were in institutions, 264 in tenement houses, 138 in houses containing 3 families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 3 were on the basement floor, 115 on the first, 158 on the second, 77 on the third, 45 on the fourth, 9 on the fifth. 470 were stated to be residents of New York City and 4 non-residents. 53 were stated to be single, 105 married, 44 widowed, and the condition of 272 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 472 deaths and still-births, or 92.55 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 14; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 225; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 43; Greenwood (undenominational), 33; Lutheran (undenominational), 75; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 22; Evergreen (undenominational), 26; Woodlawn (undenominational), 10; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 1; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 2; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 11; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending September 14, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 4; Second, 0; Third, 0; Fourth, 7; Fifth, 2; Sixth, 11; Seventh, 16; Eighth, 17; Ninth, 16; Tenth, 21; Eleventh, 21; Twelfth, 33; Thirteenth, 8; Fourteenth, 13; Fifteenth, 9; Sixteenth, 20; Seventeenth, 30; Eighteenth, 19; Nineteenth, 63; Twentieth, 35; Twenty-first, 39; Twenty-second, 38; Twenty-third, 11; Twenty-fourth, 4.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 21, was 69.6 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.964, the mean humidity 78, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind 777, and there was no rain-fall during the week, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia, was 16.56; Brooklyn, 22.73; Chicago, 19.50; Baltimore, 19.19; Boston, 22.43; Cincinnati, 15.46; New Orleans, 17.48; Cleveland, 19.09; Richmond, 18.43; Charleston, 33.99; Dayton, 16.86; Erie, 26.47; Worcester, 18.05; Cambridge, 33.73; Fall River, 22.66; Lawrence, 30.41; Lynn, 23.70; Springfield, 13.24;—monthly returns—San Francisco, 13.76; Buffalo, 17.66; Washington, 31.88; Paterson, 28.31; Toledo, 14.18; Hudson County, N. J., 24.63. Foreign Cities—weekly returns—London, 18.4; Liverpool, 28.3; Birmingham, 26.3; Manchester, 22.5; Glasgow, 19; Edinburgh, 17; Dublin, 24.3; Belfast, 28; Cork, 25; Dundee, 18.6; Brussels, 17.4; Antwerp, 27.2; Paris, 23.8; Rome, 16.9; Turin, 20.3; Venice, 15.9; Berlin, 30.1; Munich, 37; Breslau, 32.72; Vienna, 28.1; Trieste, 36.2; Copenhagen, 22.8; Stockholm, 24.5; Christiania, 20.41; Amsterdam, 20.8; Rotterdam, 19.7; The Hague, 29.9; Calcutta, 26.8; Bombay, 34.8; Madras, 35.8; Geneva (with suburbs), 19; Basel, 20.9; Bern, 25.4; Warsaw, 32.99; St. Petersburg, 37.57;—monthly returns—Sydney, 29.15; Melbourne, 17.53.

During the week ending September 21, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 474 burial permits for city deaths, 23 for bodies in transitu, and 36 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 474 deaths, 170 marriages, 491 births, 36 still-births, 23 applications for transit permits, and 50 returns from coroners. There were 38 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of birth record, 3 of marriage, and 31 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—There were 474 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 21, 1878, which is an increase of 14, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 33 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending September 14, 1878, was 437, which is 123.2 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.92 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,086,285.
