Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 21, 1875 : The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,022, as follows, viz. : 3 public buildings, 1,123 tenement houses, 140 private dwellings, 18 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 16 stores and warehouses, 63 stables, 22 slaughter-houses, 7 fat-rendering establishments, 3 roadways, 2 manure dumps, 3 dumping grounds, 40 sunken and vacant lots, 95 yards, courts, and areas, 76 cellars and basements, 106 waste-pipes and drains, 164 privies and water-closets, 36 street-gutters and sidewalks, 6 other nuisances, together with 37 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 824.

During the past week 194 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

78 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

150 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 40 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 38 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also disinfected 2,519 privies, 562 yards, and 220 cellars.

23 cases of small-pox were removed to Hospital, and 1 dead body to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending August 21, 1875 : Typhus fever, 3 ; typhoid fever, 25 ; scarlet fever, 9 ; measles, 7 ; diphtheria, 50 ; small-pox, 36 ; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 3.

16 tanks and 3,139 tubs of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending August 21, 1875 : Cattle, 3 carcasses ; calves, 1 carcass ; sheep, 6 carcasses ; lambs, 5 carcasses ; beef, 120 pounds ; veal, 50 pounds ; poultry, 383 pounds ; and fish, 1,575 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending August 21, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 674 burial permits for city deaths, 40 for bodies in transitu, and 36 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 674 deaths, 109 marriages, 476 births, 36 still-births, 40 applications for transit permits, and 52 returns from Coroners. There were 25 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 1 transcript of birth record, 1 of marriage and 29 of death were issued from this Bureau.

Resolutions.

By Commissioner Bailey—

Resolved, That a conference be invited with the Commissioners of Police in reference to the designation of one policeman in each precinct to inquire into and report on cases of destitution which may require relief from the out-door poor fund during the ensuing winter, in order that said fund may be wisely dispensed, and that the information of need may emanate from one department and relief from another. Commissioner Bailey voted aye; Commissioners Brennan and Cox voted no.

Commissioner Brennan said—

My reasons for voting no on this resolution, are as follows:

First—I certainly cannot see the propriety of paying \$1,200 per annum to police officers to visit the poor at their respective domiciles when we can procure the entire services of good trustworthy men at the rate of \$700 per annum for the same period.

Second—In my opinion it is not necessary to have a policeman for that purpose, as it would seem the intention of this Board to intimidate the worthy seekers of charity instead of assisting them.

Third—I consider that no persons should be employed at any institution in this Department who are not directly responsible to this Board for the faithful discharge of their duties.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH
of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, on the 20th day of August, 1875, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That section 121 of the Sanitary Code be amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 121. That no person shall keep, retain, or allow or employ to be kept or retained, at any place within or adjacent to the built-up portions of the City of New York, any horse, ass, or colt, having the disease known as glanders or farcy, but shall at once report the fact to the Board of Health of said city, and under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent shall remove such animal in the manner designated by such Sanitary Superintendent. No animal having glanders or farcy, or any contagious disease, or that shall die thereof, shall be removed, disposed of, or exposed in any street or public place in said city, without a written permit from said Board of Health, and then only in accordance with the terms of such permit.

Resolved, That the following be and is hereby adopted as an additional ordinance of the Sanitary Code, viz:

SEC. 185. That every veterinary surgeon who is called to examine or professionally attend any animal within the City of New York, having the glanders or farcy, or any contagious disease, shall, within twenty-four hours thereafter, report in writing to the Board of Health of such city, the following facts, viz: 1st, a statement of the location of such diseased animal; 2d, the name and address of the owner thereof; 3d, the type and character of the disease.
