#### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

IN BOARD OF EXAMINERS, FEBRUARY 8, 1898.

The Board of Examiners met this day, 3.35 P. M.

The roll was called with the following result:

The reading of minutes of February 1, 1898, was laid over to next meeting.

Petitions were then submitted for approval as follows:

Plan 756, New Buildings, 1897—John Fish, petitioner—To allow first-story brick floor arches between I beams to be laid in cement and lime mortar, composed of two parts cement and one part machine made lime mortar, instead of cement mortar, as stated in petition; Nos. 75 and 77 East One Hundred and Tenth street. Laid over.

Plan 785, Alterations to Buildings, 1897—Thomas Dooner, petitioner—To allow a photographic gallery to be constructed on roof by extending side and rear walls upward 13 feet higher than at present, with a new tier of floor beams and another roof, front wall to be constructed as a mansard, of angle irons and fireproof blocks, as stated in petition; Nos. 463 and 465 Fifth avenue. Denied.

Plan 775, New Buildings, 1897—Henry Davidson, petitioner—To allow entrance hall partitions and ceiling above to be constructed of 3-inch fireproof blocks and angle irons, as stated in petition; south side of Seventeenth street, 223 feet west of Eighth avenue. Approved, on condition that the uprights, tees, channels and angles shall be not less than 4 inches, properly braced and set not more than 30 inches on centres, and filled in between solid with burnt-clay blocks or porous terra cotta or hard burnt-brick of not less than 4 inches thickness and plastered on both sides; ceilings to be not less than 2-inch tees, angles or channels, set not more than 2 feet apart, well braced and filled in between solid with burnt-clay blocks.

Plan 953A, New Buildings, 1897—Robert Glenn, petitioner—To allow building to be 38 feet in height from curb level to highest point of roof beams, as stated in petition; easterly side of Webster avenue, 98.46 feet northerly from East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street. Laid over.

Plan 2040, New Buildings, 1895—Louis Oberlein, petitioner—To allow plastering of visible bottom flanges of iron girders and beams to be omitted, as stated in petition; Nos. 644 and 646 First avenue; northeast corner of East Thirty-seventh street. Approved.

Slip Application 145, 1898—Bernhard Rosenstock, petitioner—To allow the erection of eight iron election booths, as stated in petition; northwest corner of Madison avenue and East Eighty-sixth street. Laid over.

Plan 19, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—Ralph S. Townsend, petitioner—To allow construction of vent shaft, as shown on plans, viz.: angle iron frame work extending through four stories, all to be framed together in best manner, and supported from steel beams above main roof, said frame work to be filled in with hard burnt terra cotta blocks, 2 inches in thickness, finished with cement plastering on both sides, as stated in petition; No. 494 Ninth avenue. Denied.

Plan 57, New Buildings, 1898—Louis F. Heinecke, petitioner—To allow one side of first story entrance hall and water-closet inclosures to be constructed with 3-inch angles and T bars, filled up with 3-inch hollow terra cotta blocks and plastered both sides, angles and T bars to be

Plan 45A, New Buildings, 1898—M. J. Garvin, petitioner—To allow mean height of building to be 40 feet, as indicated on front elevation and as stated in petition; southwest corner of One Hundred and Sixty-third street and Prospect avenue. Approved.

Plan 41A, New Buildings, 1898—George Hoffman, petitioner—To allow building to be constructed according to plans and specifications filed, chimney to start on bluestone flag, resting on floor beams, and flues to start 6 feet above floor, stone foundations being impracticable, as stated in petition; Baychester, east side of proposed Bridge avenue, 125 feet north of New Haven Railroad. Approved.

Plan 1148, Alterations to Buildings, 1897—John B. Snook & Sons, petitioners—To allow use of present party wall and new southerly gable wall, of thickness as shown on drawings, being 4 inches less than required thickness for bearing walls of required height, as stated in petition; Nos. 438 to 444 West street, southeast corner of Bank street. Plan 32, New Buildings, 1898—Nathan Langer, petitioner—To allow entrance hall partitions, and partitions referred to in objection No. 2, dated February 1, 1898, to be constructed of angle iron, filled in with brick, all to be four inches thick, ceilings of main hall to be made fireproof with brick arches, as stated in petition; No. 191 Stanton street. Denied.

Plan 957, New Buildings, 1897—James E. Ware & Son and H. S. Styne-Harde, petitioners—To allow construction of elevator enclosure and triangular ventilating shaft adjoining, as approved by Board January 11, 1898, to be amended as follows: To retain cast iron posts and steel beam construction forming a skeleton construction for basement, first and second stories only, and from thence up to top and above roof, substitute an eight-inch brick wall for iron and skeleton construction, walls to be formed of whole hard burned brick laid in clear cement and sand mortar, as indicated on plan dated January 19, 1898, and as stated in petition; north side of Eighty-third street, 90 feet east of Riverside Drive. Approved.

All as more fully set forth in the specifications to the contract, to which particular attention is directed.

No estimate will be received or considered after the hour named.

The form of the agreement, with specifications, showing the manner of payment for the work, may be seen, and forms of proposals may be obtained at the office of the Department.

Bidders must write out the amount of their estimate in addition to inserting the same in figures, stating the price per ton for each size and the total amount. The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Any person making an estimate for the work shall present the same in a sealed envelope to said Board, at said office, on or before the day and hour above named, which envelope shall be indorsed with the name or names of the person or persons presenting the same, the date of its presentation, and a statement of the supply to which it relates.

The Fire Commissioner reserves the right to decline any and all bids or estimates, if deemed to be for the public interest.

No bid or estimate will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation, upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

Each bid or estimate shall contain and state the name and place of residence of each of the persons making the same, the names of all persons interested with him or them therein, and if no other person be so interested it shall distinctly state that fact; that it is made with-out any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Municipal Assembly, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.
