Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From September 19 to October 2, inclusive, forty-eight operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, nineteen at Gouverneur Hospital, thirty-three at Harlem Hospital and nineteen at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

A full attendance of the Visiting Physicians and Surgeons at the various hospitals during the month of September is reported.

Fire drills were held at Bellevue Hospital on September 28 and October 1, at Gouverneur Hospital on September 22 and October 1, at Fordham Hospital on September 22 and October 4, and at Harlem Hospital on September 30.

The positions of Purchasing Agent, Investigator, Bookkeeper, and about ten positions for Hospital Clerk are still unfilled. For the position of Purchasing Agent the Civil Service Commission has submitted one name, a veteran, from a list of Inspectors of Repairs and Supplies. Unless the Civil Service Commission has an appropriate list of persons, it would seem desirable to ask permission for an exempt appointment to this position. It is recommended that a Special Committee of the Board of Trustees be appointed to select a Purchasing Agent. It is recommended that the position of Bookkeeper at \$1,200 be filled on the recommendation of the Assistant Superintendent in conference with Mr. White, and that the position of Investigator be left open until the return of the General Medical Superintendent in order that he may have a voice in making the selection. To fill the vacancies of Hospital Clerk from the list supplied to us will undoubtedly result in the dismissal of nearly all of the present incumbents. It is recommended that the Civil Service Board be asked to confirm the present incumbents in these positions under the title of Hospital Clerk.

Until such time as a Purchasing Agent has been appointed and during the absence of the General Medical Superintendent, it is recommended that Mr. White sign all purchasing orders.

Mr. McHale, the Assistant Superintendent on night duty, has given long, faithful and efficient service, and it is recommended that his salary be increased to \$2,000.

It is desirable that a revision of schedules of salaries and wages be made to cover the month of October, and it is recommended that a revision be requested inasmuch as it involves no additional appropriation.

There is a rule in this Department that in case of alarm of fire all doctors shall report in their respective wards. In view of the fact that this necessitates traveling considerable distance whenever a fire drill is held and results in more or less unnecessary confusion, it is recommended that this rule be rescinded.

Mr. F. A. Ross, Fire Expert, recommends the purchase for the boat "Westfield" of twelve 3-gallon chemical fire extinguishers, two sets of axes and 8-foot fire hooks, for the boat "Southfield," eight fire extinguishers and two sets of 8-foot fire hooks, for the residence of the General Medical Superintendent, four fire extinguishers and one axe and hook.

It is recommended that the system of designating patients by bed numbers be discontinued and that in all instances where prescriptions are written for patients the prescriptions be written for patients by name and also by bed numbers.

A communication received from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, recommends a gas lighting system for the boat "Southfield" to be installed on the rental basis; also that the emergency gas lamps in Pavilions A and B be cared for by the Welsbach Company on the rental basis.

At a previous meeting a letter from Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, regarding a credit for seven sinks in Pavilions A and B supplied by Byrne & Murphy was referred to the General Medical Superintendent to be taken up with an engineer of the Finance Department. This has been done and Mr. Reid approves of the allowance.

After the last Board meeting it was found that it would be necessary to advertise again for poultry for the balance of the year at an estimated cost of about \$6,300. This advertisement was authorized and appeared with other advertisements then running.

Samples of silver to be furnished to the new Nurses' residence are herewith submitted, and it is recommended that these be accepted as to design and that the contractor be notified to make prompt deliveries.

A communication from the Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital containing suggestions on the use of the money remaining on the Gillis & Geoghegan repair contract at Gouverneur Hospital is herewith submitted.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the matter of selecting a Purchasing Agent for the Department was referred to the Committee on Offices and Employees with power.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the matter of filling the vacancy of Bookkeeper, at \$1,200 a year, was referred to the Committee on Offices and Employees with power, the understanding being that the position be filled upon the recommendation of the Assistant Superintendent in conference with Mr. White.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation of the General Medical Superintendent that the Civil Service Commission be requested to confirm the present incumbents in their positions of Hospital Clerks was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation of the General Medical Superintendent that Mr. White sign all purchasing orders until such time as a Purchasing Agent has been appointed and in the absence of the General Medical Superintendent was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation of the General Medical Superintendent that the salary of Mr. John F. McHale, the Assistant Superintendent on night duty, be increased to \$2,000, was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, a revision of the salaries and wages schedule for the month of October was authorized, such revision to be referred to the Committee on Offices and Employees for approval.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That no change be made at the present time in the rule requiring the doctors to report in their respective wards upon the sound of a fire alarm.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was directed to purchase the fire extinguishers, etc., for the boats "Westfield" and "Southfield," and for the residence of the General Medical Superintendent recommended by Mr. Ross, Fire Expert.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was decided that patients be known both by name and bed number, particularly when prescriptions are ordered for them by the Visiting and House Physicians.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was authorized to carry out the recommendations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity regarding the installation on the rental basis of a lighting system on the boat "Southfield," and the care of the emergency gas lamps in Pavilions A and B by the Welsbach Company on the rental basis.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the General Medical Superintendent in accepting a credit for the sinks in Pavilions A and B supplied by Byrne & Murphy, upon the recommendation of Mr. Reid of the Finance Department, was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the General Medical Superintendent in authorizing an advertisement calling for bids on poultry required for the remainder of the year was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the sample of silver furnished by John Early's Sons through the E. H. H. Smith Silverware Company for the Nurses' Home was approved as to design and the General Medical Superintendent was directed to ask the contractor to make prompt deliveries.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the letter from the Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital containing recommendations on the use of the unexpended balance of money on the Gillis & Geoghegan contract was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds for recommendation and report.

Mr. C. D. O'Neil, the Acting Superintendent, reported as follows:

From October 3 to October 16, inclusive, 37 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 21 at Gouverneur Hospital, 35 at Harlem Hospital and 18 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

Requests have been received for special temporary Nurses from Dr. J. B. Lee for a post-operative case in Ward 13; from Dr. H. R. Wilcox for a case of vaginitis in Ward Ground A; from Dr. John Howland for a case of vaginitis in Ward Ground A; from Dr. J. Rogers for a septic post-operative case in Ward 16; and from Dr. J. C. Edgar for a case of ophthalmia in Ward B6. As all of these Nurses were urgently needed they were supplied and authority for their services is herewith requested.

A fire drill was held in Bellevue Hospital on October 5 and 18, at Fordham Hospital on October 8 and 16, and at Gouverneur Hospital on October 7.

An application for leave of absence has been received from Dr. Byron C. Darling, X-ray Photographer at this institution. Dr. Darling has been serving the hospital since the 1st of January and a decision from the Board is requested in this matter.

Bids have been requested on the labor and material for erecting a clinic room and room for shower baths and other additions to the boat "Southfield," and three bids have been received—one from Albert Winteritz for \$559, one from C. W. Klappert's Sons for \$658, and one from J. H. Adamson for \$673. It is recommended that the lowest of these bids be accepted, namely, that of Albert Winteritz, for \$559.

On the evening of Tuesday, October 12, 1909, Abraham Shapiro, a patient in Ward 28, suffering from erysipelas, jumped from a window in the toilet of that ward to the ground below. He was returned to the ward apparently uninjured.

On the night of October 7, at 10.30, a slight fire occurred in the toilet of dormitory 42. There was no damage, but the matter was reported to Mr. Ross, fire expert.

Mr. Frederick Kenney, Chemist, calls attention to medical supplies on which it will be necessary to obtain bids. The total cost of these supplies will be about \$10,000. An unexpended balance covering the same remains in the supply account and authority is asked to advertise for bids.

The Superintendent of Training Schools asks that an appropriation be made to meet the expense of lectures to be given in the training school during the coming winter. It is estimated that such lectures will cost about \$400, and it is recommended that this amount be appropriated for the purpose named.

The Superintendent of Training Schools recommends that a door be cut which will connect the office of the Nurses' residence with the infirmary. At the present time it is necessary to cross the court to enter the infirmary, and in case of illness of Nurses it becomes necessary to engage a special Night Nurse and at times a Day Nurse for cases in the infirmary. This door can be cut without a great deal of expense and without mutilation to the building, but it is recommended that the matter be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds before action is taken upon it.

At the present time this Department has no Watchman for its buildings and it is recommended that a position of this kind be established and that the services of a suitable person be secured for the same.

It is recommended that a section of the roof garden of Pavilions A and B be set aside as a hand ball court for the members of the house staff.

It appears that the rule for increasing salaries of Helpers for length of service has not been enforced as was intended and it is recommended that, if the appropriation permits, the salaries of several Helpers who have served here for a year or more be increased in accordance with this rule.

Bids have been requested on the tennis court for Fordham Hospital. Three bids were asked for and two received. The lower of the two bids is that of Patrick May for \$300. This contractor built the court for Harlem Hospital and the Supervising Nurse reports that the work is entirely satisfactory. It is therefore recommended that the order for the Fordham Hospital court be given to Patrick May.

Dr. Norris, the Director of Laboratories, reports that Dr. Flournoy, one of the Pathologists, whose three weeks' leave expires to-day, is ill and unable to return to duty. It is recommended that Dr. Flournoy be allowed leave of absence on account of illness for a period of two weeks. Dr. Norris further reports that the Pathologist at Fordham Hospital, Dr. MacDonald Bell, is ill. He has been ordered to remain away for about six months and the work in the meantime is being attended to by the Pathological Interne.

A communication has been received from the Auditor, Mr. George A. White, recommending transfers of appropriations to meet the revised salary schedule for the remainder of the year, and it is recommended that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to make these transfers. The Auditor also reports that we shall need coal at Harlem, Gouverneur and Fordham Hospitals in addition to that already provided for on contract. Estimates and specifications, with proposed quantities at an estimated cost of \$3,750, are herewith submitted.

It is recommended that advertisements be authorized for sundry fresh meats for the last three or four weeks of the year. Specifications showing what will be needed for that period of time are herewith submitted, the approximate cost being about \$4,500.

A communication has been received from the receiver of the Watertown Engine Company regarding the unpaid bill of the Watertown Engine Company. Some time ago a transfer of funds was requested in order that this bill might be paid, but up to the present time the transfer has not been made. As the Watertown Engine Company has already been much inconvenienced by the delay in the payment of this bill, it is recommended that steps be taken to hasten action in the transfer of this appropriation.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the Acting Superintendent in supplying special temporary nurses at the request of visiting physicians and surgeons for urgent cases was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, two weeks' vacation with pay was allowed Dr. Byron C. Darling, X-ray Photographer at Bellevue Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the Acting Superintendent was authorized to accept the lowest bid on the labor and material for erecting a clinic room and room for shower baths and other additions to the boat "Southfield," that of Albert Winteritz, for \$559.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the case of the patient who jumped from the toilet room of Ward 28 to the ground below was referred to the President for report.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the fire in Dormitory 42 was referred back to the General Medical Superintendent for further investigation and report.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was authorized to advertise for bids in medical supplies for the remainder of the year.

At the request of the General Superintendent of Training Schools it was, on motion, duly seconded and carried, decided to appropriate \$400 to meet the expenses of lectures given in the training school.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the matter of cutting a door which will connect the office of the Nurses' residence with the infirmary, and the matter of setting aside a section of the roof garden as a hand ball court for the doctors, were referred to the Committee on Buildings for recommendation and report.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the matter of appointing a Watchman for the buildings and increasing the salaries of several Helpers who have served the Department for a long time, was referred to the Committee on Offices and Employees.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the Acting Superintendent was authorized to accept the bid of Patrick May on the Fordham Hospital tennis court.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, Dr. Thomas Flournoy was granted two weeks' leave of absence on account of illness.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, Dr. MacDonald Bell was granted leave of absence for six months, and the arrangement that the Pathological Interne at Fordham Hospital attend to the work in his absence was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation for transfers of appropriations to meet the revised salary schedule for the remainder of the year was laid over until the General Medical Superintendent returns, as was also the matter of the transfer of funds to meet the Watertown Engine Company bill.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, To accept the bid of Wells & Newton, amounting to \$2,227, it being the lowest of the seven bids received, and to award the contract to the Wells & Newton Company, subject to the approval of the sureties by the Comptroller of The City of New York, in accordance with the provision of section 420, chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter.

The Committee on Rules presented the following rules and regulations governing and for the guidance of the General Medical Superintendent, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To spread these rules upon the minutes, and to make them a special order for action at the next meeting:

Rules and Regulations Governing and for the Guidance of the General Medical Superintendent.

1. The General Medical Superintendent is the executive officer of the Board of Trustees, and as such shall, unless excused by resolution of the Board, attend all meetings of the Board and be subject to the directions of the Board of Trustees.

2. The General Medical Superintendent shall, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees, have general supervision and control of all hospitals of the Department, of all Bureaus or Departments thereof, of all officers and employees of the Department. He shall have control over the grounds, buildings and all appurtenances, and, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees, shall make regulations for the government thereof.

3. With the approval of the Board of Trustees, the General Medical Superintendent shall have the power to employ and dismiss all employees in the unclassified service, and to suspend any officer or employee in the classified service, pending action by the Board of Trustees. Unless otherwise ordered by resolution of the Board, all vacancies shall be filled by the Board of Trustees upon the nomination by the General Medical Superintendent. He shall assign the duties of all officers and employees, and shall see that such duties are properly discharged. He may grant leaves of absence for officers and employees in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board of Trustees. All applications for increases in salary shall be submitted to the Medical Superintendent for his recommendation before formal action is taken by the Board of Trustees. All bills shall be accompanied by a copy of the order and shall be certified by the person receiving the goods and by his superiors in order, including the General Medical Superintendent. They then shall be referred to the Auditing Committee of the Board for consideration. Payments on contracts or expenditures of money in any form shall be certified by the General Medical Superintendent and then also referred to the Auditing Committee for consideration.

4. He shall have control over and be responsible for the administration of the work of the Department, and the orders of the Board of Trustees shall be given through the General Medical Superintendent.

5. All correspondence of the Department, except that of the Board of Trustees, shall be conducted in his name and by his direction. He shall direct the purchase of all furniture, stores, provisions, fuel or other supplies for the Department in accordance with the contracts and provisions of law, and shall be held responsible for their proper and economical use.

6. He shall, in his discretion, discharge or transfer all patients recommended for such action by the visiting physicians and surgeons, and he may discharge any patient for misconduct and report the same to the Board of Trustees.

7. The General Medical Superintendent shall report to the Board of Trustees any dereliction of duty on the part of any member of the Medical Board, scrutinize the use of supplies by any visiting physician or surgeon or member of the house staff, and bring to his notice any unusual outlay. The members of the house staff shall be under his supervision and he shall see that they conform strictly to all rules and regulations. He may suspend and shall report to the Trustees any member who violates such rules or regulations.

8. He shall keep or have kept such books and records as will give an accurate account of all property for which the Department is responsible, of all stores purchased and issued, of all expenditures under the several appropriations, of all officers and employees, of all patients admitted and discharged, and also such other records as may be deemed advisable or as the Board of Trustees may direct.

When the Board of Trustees at any meeting adopts any resolution involving the expenditure of money, it shall be the duty of the General Medical Superintendent immediately to have recorded in proper record books every detail of such resolution. It shall further be his duty immediately to prepare letters or notification from the Trustees to the party or parties to whom any contract has been awarded by the Board, stating the amount, date, time and other details involved, and to submit such letter to the Secretary of the Board for his examination and signature and transmission.

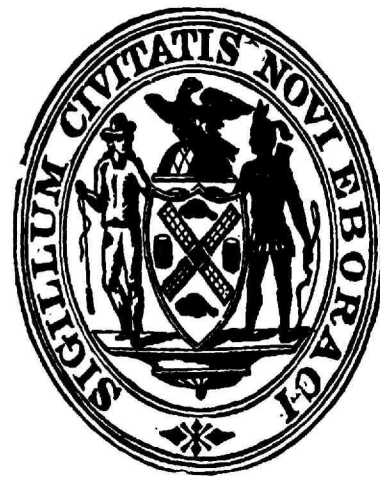
Permission (83707) was granted the Metropolitan Steamship Company to temporarily occupy, on the usual conditions as to insurance, etc., Pier 58, North River, rental to be at the rate of \$750 per month, for the period of occupation, payable monthly in advance to the Cashier, the permit being revocable at the will of the Commissioner, and will expire by limitation of time when the lessees of the pier are ready to take possession thereof.

Permission was granted Clark & Wilkins to unload a boat load of wood at Pier 62, North River, the Maryland Steel Company being relieved of all responsibility for any damage which may occur by reason of the berthing of the boat at the pier.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund (83726), were requested to approve a lease to the Saugerties and New York Steamboat Company of 223 feet of the inner southerly side of Barrow street, Pier 43, for a term of ten years from December 31, 1911, at a rental of \$3,666.67 per annum. In case the City should at any time decide to extend or cause to be extended the pier outshore, the City shall have the option of substituting in lieu of the premises above described a similar number of feet of the same pier at a location on the same pier to be selected by the City. NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
