Abstract of the Minutes of December 13,
1910.

The Board met pursuant to adjourn-
ment. Present—Commissioner of Health
and Health Officer of the Port.

The Finance Committee presented vari-
ous bills which had been audited by the

Chief Clerk, which were approved and
ordered forwarded to the Comptroller for
payment.

Action No. 10, brought against Julius
Goldsmith, was ordered discontinued.

The Sanitary Superintendent submitted
weekly reports of the work performed in
the various divisions of the Sanitary
Bureau, which were ordered on file.

Changes in the hospital service recom-
mended by the Sanitary Superintendent
for the period ending December 19, 1910,
were approved.

The following premises were ordered
vacated: 558 Sackett st., 560 Sackett st.
(front), and 195 W. 9th st., Borough of
Brooklyn; west side of Brown ave., about
250 feet south of Pacific st., Jamaica,
Borough of Queens.

Orders for vacation against certain
premises were rescinded, the cause for the
same having been removed.

The premises at 560 Sackett st. (rear),
Borough of Brooklyn, was declared a pub-
lic nuisance.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 16,
City Hall, Thursday, December 22, 1910.

(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT MATTER.)

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—John Purroy Mitchel, Acting Mayor; William A. Prendergast, Com-
ptroller; George McAneny, President, Borough of Manhattan; Alfred E. Steers, Presi-
dent, Borough of Brooklyn; Cyrus C. Miller, President, Borough of The Bronx;
Lawrence Gresser, President, Borough of Queens, and George Cromwell, President,
Borough of Richmond. William J. Gaynor, Mayor, was present during the considera-
tion of the communication of the Public Service Commission for the First District,
relative to the offer of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company.

The Acting Mayor, Hon. John Purroy Mitchel, presided.

After disposing of franchise and financial matters, the Acting Mayor asked and
obtained unanimous consent for the present consideration of the following:

ELIMINATION OF GRADE CROSSINGS ON THE FLUSHING BRANCH OF THE LONG ISLAND
RAILROAD, FROM LAWRENCE STREET TO BROADWAY, BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Whereas, On the 4th day of November, 1910, this Board instructed the Corporation
Counsel to concur, on behalf of the City, in the plan under consideration by the Public
Service Commission of the First District, for the elimination of grade crossings on
the Flushing Branch of the Long Island Railroad, from Lawrence street to Broadway,
Borough of Queens; and

Whereas, On November 11, the President of the Borough of Queens asked and
obtained unanimous consent for the reconsideration of the action of the Board in so
instructing the Corporation Counsel, had on the 4th day of November, 1910; and

Whereas, This Board did, on the 11th day of November, 1910, reconsider this
action of November 4, and did direct the Corporation Counsel to take no final position
in the matter before the Public Service Commission until this Board should further
consider the whole matter; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Public Service Commission of the First District be hereby
requested and urged to make no final determination in this matter until this Board
shall have opportunity to examine into the matter and submit a final recommendation
to the Public Service Commission; and be it further

Resolved, That a committee of three members, consisting of the Comptroller, the
President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Queens be
hereby appointed to consider this matter and report to this Board thereon at its next
meeting.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Acting Mayor, the Comptroller and the Presidents of the Bor-
oughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

BUDGET FOR 1911.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York
Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of the City
of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, being: First, the
amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business
of said City for the said year, viz., one hundred and fifty-eight million six hundred
and twenty-five thousand five hundred and twenty-nine dollars and ninety-one cents
(\$158,625,529.91); second, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges
and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the
said year, viz., five million four hundred and fifty-three thousand eight hundred and
five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$5,453,805.25), and, third, the amount estimated to
be the deficiency on January 1, 1910, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed

to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz., ten million dollars (\$10,000,000); be it further

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, with the exception that the items contained in the schedules under the titles of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," "Salaries, Temporary Employees," "Wages, Regular Employees," "Wages, Temporary Employees," "Compensation, Temporary Employees," in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—

- (a) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees."
- (b) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries, Temporary Employees."
- (c) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages, Regular Employees."
- (d) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages, Temporary Employees."
- (e) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Compensation, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Compensation, Temporary Employees."
- (f) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein for the various kinds of supplies and contingencies to any other than to a supply or contingency account.

Second—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," "Salaries, Temporary Employees," "Wages, Regular Employees," "Wages, Temporary Employees," "Compensation, Temporary Employees," herein contained, except (a) when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and (b) in the case of schedules under the title of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," or "Wages, Regular Employees," when such change will not increase the monthly rate of the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries," "Salaries, Regular Employees," or "Wages, Regular Employees," in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments, and (c) in the case of schedules under the titles of "Salaries, Temporary Employees," "Wages, Temporary Employees," "Compensation, Temporary Employees," when such change will not increase the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries, Temporary Employees," "Wages, Temporary Employees," "Compensation, Temporary Employees," in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—

- (a) That the heads of the several Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," "Salaries, Temporary Employees," "Wages, Regular Employees," "Wages, Temporary Employees," "Compensation, Temporary Employees," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and
- (b) That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payroll is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedules supporting any such appropriation or in case these schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the full schedules as changed.
- (c) That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the facts, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said number.
- (d) That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by twelve votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums which have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of the schedule items bear to the old totals.
- (e) That on all payrolls against schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," and "Wages, Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.
- (f) That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payrolls to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

—be it further

Resolved, That all appropriations for (1) supplies; (2) general supplies; (3) materials for repairs and replacements; (4) fuel, and (5) forage, to any Board, office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

First—That, in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for the purchase of such "Supplies," "General Supplies," "Materials for Repairs and Replacements," "Fuel" and "Forage" be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials fuel and forage hereafter to be promulgated by this Board.

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may hereafter be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying as to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which contracts for "Supplies," "General Supplies," "Materials for Repairs and Replacements," "Fuel" and "Forage" are to be paid shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies or materials, from which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform with such standard specifications; be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter,

First—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven be established in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments for the number of incumbents shown in said schedules, except that in all cases where a position or grade of position has previously been established for an unlimited number of incumbents, or for a number of incumbents

greater than the number shown in said schedules, nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to reduce the number of incumbents previously authorized.

Second—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules entitled "Wages, Regular Employees," "Salaries, Temporary Employees," "Wages, Temporary Employees," and "Compensation, Temporary Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of the City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven be established in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—Nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to nullify or abolish any position or grade of position in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments which has been previously established, but which does not appear in the schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," "Salaries, Temporary Employees," "Wages, Regular Employees," "Wages, Temporary Employees," and "Compensation, Temporary Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of the City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions, and acceptance of moneys by an institution shall be an acceptance of such conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts from all sources, all expenditures, population, addresses of parents, guardian or nearest relatives of inmates and such other information as shall be designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institution, and shall be in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts relating to all funds and from whatsoever source received shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection

tion and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance, and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. All institutions receiving public moneys shall, not later than March 31 of each year, submit to the Comptroller an annual report covering the period of the preceding calendar year, showing receipts from all sources and expenditures for all purposes in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall, in his discretion, suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and, upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

6. Where apportionments are made upon a per capita basis for inmates of private charitable institutions, there will be no payments unless the inmates shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges against the City; and except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals.

In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges, the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the services actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections. *The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding the acceptances of the Commissioner of Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.*

7. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

8. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

9. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of five years of age and over during ten months in the year, except that for abnormal or atypical children a special ruling may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving money under this section shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, as provided in section 1154.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City institution at Randalls Island.

11. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that the per capita rates hereinafter provided are too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate or rates for any or all institutions.

*Institutions shall be paid \$18 for the care of the mother and child during fifteen days of her confinement, and for services thereafter shall be paid at the rate of 45 cents per day for the support of the child, and also \$12 per month for the maintenance of the mother, if she remain in the institution nursing infant after the expiration of fifteen days.

Franchise Matters.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day the following proceedings were had:

Whereas, Conron Bros. Company has, under date of May 25, 1910, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate conduits, for refrigeration purposes, under and along West 134th street, 12th avenue, West 132d street, Broadway, West 130th street, West 129th street and the marginal street, wharf or place adopted by the Commissioner of Docks February 27, 1907, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 3, 1907, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York; and

Whereas, Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on October 28, 1910, fixing the date for a public hearing thereon as November 25, 1910, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in "The Commercial" and "The Morning Telegraph," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and by resolution adopted by the Board November 18, 1910, such hearing was adjourned to December 9, 1910, and was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the Conron Bros. Company, and the adequacy of the consideration proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by Conron Bros. Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to Conron Bros. Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 1910, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and Conron Bros. Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree, as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate certain conduits with the necessary branches and extensions therefrom, leading directly into private property, for the sole purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, provided that no conduit be of a greater outside diameter than twelve (12) inches, including insulation or other covering; the same to be constructed and operated only beneath the surface of such of the streets, avenues and highways situate within the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, as are included within the district bounded and described as follows:

On the north by the centre line of West 134th street, west of the centre line of 12th avenue, and the centre line of West 132d street, east of the centre line of 12th avenue; on the east by the easterly line of the marginal street, wharf or place, as adopted by the Commissioner of Docks February 27, 1907, approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 3, 1907, and laid down on the maps of the Department of Docks and Ferries; on the south by the centre line of West 129th street, west of the centre line of 12th avenue, as extended to the centre line of West 129th street, and the centre line of West 130th street, east of said centre line of 12th avenue as extended; on the east by the centre line of 12th avenue, from the centre line of West 134th street to the centre line of West 132d street, the centre line of Broadway from the centre line of West 132d street to the centre line of West 130th street, and the line which would be formed by the extension of the centre line of 12th avenue from the centre line of West 130th street to the centre line of West 129th street. Said district being more particularly shown by red lines on a map, entitled:

"Map showing district applied for by Conron Bros. Company to accompany petition dated May 25, 1910, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York."

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said conduits shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

Second—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for refrigerating rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the streets and avenues mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual, firm or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, in the same streets and avenues, or within the district hereinbefore described.

Fifth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the conduits and appurtenances of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its conduits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said conduit line, connections, manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Ninth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh—The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the conduit line and its appurtenances.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes to be contained within the conduits hereby authorized whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows:

(a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300) pounds per square inch.

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch.

A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates:

(a) Consumers making monthly contracts:

Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of not over 500 cubic feet.

Two (2) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of over 500 cubic feet, but less than 1,500 cubic feet.

One (1) cent per month per cubic foot for boxes of 1,500 cubic feet and over.

(b) Consumers making yearly contracts:

Fifteen (15) cents per year per cubic foot of box.

These rates to apply to boxes located not above the first floor of any building.

During the term of this contract the Board shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Fifteenth—The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person, firm or corporation whose premises are located within the district hereinbefore described shall extend its conduits to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at the rates herein prescribed or at such rates as may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided. The Company shall not be required, however, to furnish refrigeration to applicants whose premises are located above the first floor of any building.

Sixteenth—A correct map shall be furnished to the Board by the Company on the first day of February, 1911, showing the exact location of all conduit lines and manholes constructed, with reference to the street lines, the curb lines and the street surface, together with a statement of the total length of such conduit. On the same date of each succeeding year, during the term of this contract, a supplementary map shall be furnished the Board showing all conduits laid during the preceding year.

Seventeenth—The conduit lines hereby authorized shall be used only by Conron Bros. Company, and for no other purpose than supplying refrigeration.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any year the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted, the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of six hundred and fifty dollars (\$650) in cash within one (1) month after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), and which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

During the second term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350).

During the third term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five hundred dollars (\$500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be the total receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers.

(c) An annual payment of twenty-five cents (\$0.25) for each linear foot of conduit constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway, excepting, however, such conduits as are constructed within the vault space or vault spaces of any building or buildings used or occupied exclusively by the Company for the purpose of its business.

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31, next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and December 31 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before February 1 in each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding.

(d) Before any rights hereby conferred are exercised by the Company and within one (1) month from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the Company shall pay to the City the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750); said amount being due the City by reason of the unauthorized occupation of the streets by the Company or its predecessors.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any of the taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for refrigerating rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the streets and avenues mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

13. Amount, kind and capacity of machinery now in use and required for operation.
14. The total amount expended for same.
15. Quantity of refrigeration produced during the year and the average price received for same.
16. Quantity used in Company's own warehouses.
17. Quantity furnished to outside consumers.
18. Number and location of warehouses occupied by the Company, exclusively or in part, and the extent of such occupation by the Company.
19. Number of outside consumers supplied.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract, and on or before February 1 in each year shall make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the number of feet of conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

First—That the undersigned Commissioners of Estimate have completed their estimate of damage, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, having any objection thereto, do file their said objections, in writing, duly verified, with them at their office, No. 166 Montague street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in the City of New York, on or before the 28th day of December, 1910, and that the said Commissioners will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be

in attendance at their said office on the 29th day of December, 1910, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Second—That the undersigned Commissioner of Assessment has completed his estimate of benefit, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, having any objection thereto, do file their said objections, in writing, duly verified, with him at his office, No. 166 Montague street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in the City of New York, on or before the 28th day of December, 1910, and that the said Commissioner will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at his said office on the 30th day of December, 1910, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Third—That the Commissioner of Assessment has assessed any or all such lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises as are within the area of assessment fixed and prescribed as the area of assessment for benefit by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 17th day of May, 1907, and that the said area of assessment includes all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, in the City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz:

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or a certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either of any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the costs and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness, in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs of adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
