# BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 16, City Hall, Thursday, December 22, 1910.

(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT MATTER.)

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—John Purroy Mitchel, Acting Mayor; William A. Prendergast, Comptroller; George McAneny, President, Borough of Manhattan; Alfred E. Steers, President, Roman and Manhattan; Alfred E. Steers, Ro dent, Borough of Brooklyn; Cyrus C. Miller, President, Borough of The Bronx; Lawrence Gresser, President, Borough of Queens, and George Cromwell, President, Borough of Richmond. William J. Gaynor, Mayor, was present during the consideration of the communication of the Public Service Commission for the First District. relative to the offer of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company.

The Acting Mayor, Hon. John Purroy Mitchel, presided.

After disposing of franchise and financial matters, the Acting Mayor asked and obtained unanimous consent for the present consideration of the following: ELIMINATION OF GRADE CROSSINGS ON THE FLUSHING BRANCH OF THE LONG ISLAND

RAILROAD, FROM LAWRENCE STREET TO BROADWAY, BOROUGH OF QUEENS. Whereas, On the 4th day of November, 1910, this Board instructed the Corporation Counsel to concur, on behalf of the City, in the plan under consideration by the Public

Service Commission of the First District, for the elimination of grade crossings on the Flushing Branch of the Long Island Railroad, from Lawrence street to Broadway, Borough of Queens; and Whereas, On November 11, the President of the Borough of Queens asked and obtained unanimous consent for the reconsideration of the action of the Board in so

instructing the Corporation Counsel, had on the 4th day of November, 1910; and Whereas, This Board did, on the 11th day of November, 1910, reconsider this action of November 4, and did direct the Corporation Counsel to take no final position in the matter before the Public Service Commission until this Board should further

consider the whole matter; now therefore he it Resolved, That the Public Service Commission of the First District be hereby requested and urged to make no final determination in this matter until this Board shall have opportunity to examine into the matter and submit a final recommendation

to the Public Service Commission; and be it further Resolved, That a committee of three members, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Queens be hereby appointed to consider this matter and report to this Board thereon at its next meeting.

Which was adopted by the following vote: Affirmative-The Acting Mayor, the Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond-13.

BUDGET FOR 1911.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of the City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, viz., one hundred and lifty-eight million six hundred and twenty-five thousand five hundred and twenty-nine dollars and ninety-one cents (\$158,625,529,91); second, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York. Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz., five million four hundred and fifty-three thousand eight hundred and five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$5,453,805.25), and, third, the amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1910, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed

to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the greater than the number shown in said schedules, nothing in this resolution contained Laws of 1906, viz., ten million dollars (\$10,000,000); be it further

tion that the items contained in the schedules under the titles of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees;" "Salaries, Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Regular Employees;" "Wages, Temporary Employees;" "Compensation, Temporary Employees," in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Govern-

ments, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

(a) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries." or "Salaries, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees.

(b) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of Salar es, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries, Temporary Employees." (c) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of

"Wages. Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages, Regular Employees." (d) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of 'Wages, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule

than "Wages. Temporary Employees." (e) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Compensation, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Compensation, Temporary Employees."

(f) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein for the various kinds of supplies and contingencies to any other than to a supply or contingency account.

Second-That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries," or "Salaries. Regular Employees;" "Salaries, Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Regular Employees;" "Compensation, Temporary Employees," herein contained, except (a) when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and (b) in the case of schedules under the title of "Salaries" or "Salaries, Regular Employees," or "Wages. "Regular Employees," when such change will not increase the monthly rate of the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries." "Salaries, Regular Employees." or "Wages, Regular Employees," in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments, and (c) in the case of schedules under the titles of "Salaries, Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Temporary Employees;" "Compensation, Temporary Employees," when such change will not increase the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries. Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Temporary Employees;" "Compensation, Temporary Employees," in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

(a) That the heads of the several Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees;" "Salaries, Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Regular Employees;" "Wages, Temporary Employees;" "Compensation, Temporary Employees," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and

(b) That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payroll is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedules supporting any such appropriation or in case these schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the full schedules as changed

(c) That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the facts, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said

(d) That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by live votes of the Roard of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums w have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of the schedule items bear to the old totals.

(e) That on all payrolls against schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," and "Wages, Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the

monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed. (f) That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payrolls to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

Resolved. That all appropriations for (1) supplies: (2) general supplies; (3) materials for repairs and replacements; (4) fuel, and (5) forage, to any Board, office. Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be

"General Supplies," "Materials for Repairs and Replacements," "Fuel" and "Forage" be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials fuel and forage hereafter to be promulgated

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may hereafter be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying as to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which contracts for "Supplies," "General Supplies," "Materials for Repairs and Replacements," "Fuel" and "Forage" are to be paid shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies or materials, from which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications. Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open

market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform with such standard specifications; be it further

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tion and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance, and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. All institutions receiving public moneys shall, not later than March 31 of each year, submit to the Comptroller an annual report covering the period of the preceding calendar year, showing receipts from all sources and expenditures for all purposes in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall, in his discretion, suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and, upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

6. Where apportionments are made upon a per capita basis for inmates of private charitable institutions, there will be no payments unless the inmates shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges against the City; and except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals.

In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges, the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the services actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections. The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding the acceptances of the Commissioner of Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

7. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

8. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

9. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of five years of age and over during ten months in the year, except that for abnormal or atypical children a special ruling may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving money under this section shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, as provided in section 1154.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City institution at Randalls Island.

11. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that the per capita rates hereinafter provided are too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate or rates for any or all institutions.



One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, with out the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof. Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted, the following sums of money: sums of money:

(a) The sum of six hundred and fifty dollars (\$650) in cash within one (1) month after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), and which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

During the second term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350).

During the third term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five hundred dollars (\$500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual re-

to three (3) per cent. or its gross annual re-ceipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500). The gross recipts mentioned above shall be the total receipts from all business of furnishing rerigeration to consumers.

(c) An annual payment of twenty-five cents (\$0.25) for each linear foot of conduit constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway, excepting, however, such conduits as are constructed within the vault space or vault spaces of any building or buildings used or occupied exclusively by the Company for the purpose of its business.

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway.

The annual charges shall commence from the

date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31, next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and December 31 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall he paid on or before February I in each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding.

(d) Before any rights hereby conferred are exercised by the Company and within one (1) month from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the Company shall pay to the City the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750); said amount being due the City by reason of the unauthorized occupation of the

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or resolu-tion of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third-The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this con-(whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for refrigerating rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby grant-ed (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the streets and avenues mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee as-sumes and will be bound by all of said condi-tions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary

notwithstanding, and that the said assignce or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual, firm or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, in the same streets and avenues, or within the district hereinbefore

Gescribed.

Fifth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Com-pany or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof n any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth-Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the conduits and appur-tenances of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its conduits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh-The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is

hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made ander this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. Twentieth—In case of any violation or breach

or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be for-feited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the Company. or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the conduits con-structed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forth-
