COMMISSIONER'S MESSAGE



Dear Commissioner Doherty:


In these days of one "Bad News" story after another, what I saw on TV the other day was one of the most heart warming in a heck of a long time.

Sanitation's Sleek Garage Design Wins Art Commission's Award of Excellence

The Art Commission of the City of New York presented an Excellence in Design Award to DSNY's Michael Freidlander and staff, for their sleek and modern design of the new Queens East District 14 Garage and Salt Shed to be built at Alameda Ave. and Beach 51st St., Far Rockaway, Queens. The award was presented at the 22nd Annual Awards for Excellence gala at the Brooklyn Museum of Art.

The new 75,000 square foot Queens 14 garage will provide accommodations for climate-sensitive vehicles, offices, personnel space, truck washing, snow plow mounting, vehicle repair and maintenance. The front façade consists of a sleek curved glass curtain wall with both clear and shimmering shadowbox and spandrel glass bands atop a limestone base. A double open-ended salt shed will allow two loading operations to simultaneously access the 10,000 tons of rock salt. The salt shed will be constructed using a translucent fabric structure atop cast concrete push-walls. When lit at night during snow operations, the translucent fabric shell will glow and appear to hover over the salt.

The Art Commission was established in 1898 as the City's design review agency. The Commission reviews and approves works of art and architecture on City-owned property.





MARNI AARON: SANITATION'S IRON-WOMAN

Sanitation's "Strongest" aren't only on the streets of New York collecting garbage and cleaning the streets. Marni Aaron, Deputy Director of Waste Prevention, Reuse and Recycling, recently participated in a triathlon - - swimming 2.4 miles, biking 112 miles, and running 26.2 miles at the Lake Placid Ironman competition. Marni started with the Department in 1990 working in Community Outreach. She left in 1991 to attend graduate school, and returned in 1998.

Marni, 39, began training for this event two years ago and said it took total commitment for her to complete her conquest. Working out seemed more of a second job, as she was attending the gym before and after her full-time job with the Department. Marni said she exercised seven days a week and on weekends eight hours each day. From running eight to 15 miles twice a week, to biking one to three hours three times a week, Marni exhibits the strength and endurance of some of our well-toned Sanitation Workers.

Crossing the finish line in 14 hours and 27 minutes was something she will never forget. "People on the sidelines cheering you on, who don't even know your name, as you cross the finish line will be a lifelong memory of mine. It was the greatest part of the whole experience," she said.

Well done, Marni! What a fantastic representation for "New York's Strongest."

MEDALS OF HONOR

During the Department's Annual Awards Ceremony for calendar year 2003, several well deserving Sanitation employees were presented with Medals of Honor for their courage and Meritorious Action. The highest, the Gold Medal of Honor, is a prestigious medal given to employees who clearly risk their own physical safety to come to the aid of another employee or human being. Described below are the 2003 winners of this admirable award and their heroic tales:

Sanitation Workers James McFarlane and Steven Mincelli, **Queens West District 5 -** As they were beginning their lunch break from their recycling collection duties, they noticed smoke coming from a two-family home in Queens. SW Mincelli ran up the porch steps to attempt to open the door, but the knob came off in his hand. Thinking quickly, he spotted a plastic flower pot and threw it through the window. His partner, SW McFarlane, then dove through the window with SW Mincelli following close behind. Once inside, they searched the building as flames erupted on the second floor. They saw a very nervous dog on the first floor that SW Mincelli scooped up and handed to SW McFarlane. While searching the basement, the two Sanitation Workers found a nineteen year-old girl asleep. They awoke the girl and told her of the impending danger, reassuring her that they would lead her safely outside. After a brief statement to the police and the Fire Department, the Sanitation Workers completed their route without a break.

Sanitation Workers Charles Judge and William Ruocco, Queens West District 6 - While on collection duty, Sanitation Workers Judge and Ruocco smelled smoke and saw flames coming from a nearby three-family house. Stopping the truck, they ran up to the house and attempted to enter, but the flames kept them back. They saw Mrs. Madona Rosenfeld on the smoldering roof of her home. She had crawled out of her window and onto the roof to avoid the flames inside the house. People in the neighborhood did not react to the emergency. Thinking quickly, Sanitation Workers Judge and Ruocco got a ladder from a house. They climbed the ladder and guided Mrs. Rosenfeld down to safety.

Sanitation Workers William Whalen and Steven Urcinoli, Staten Island District 1 - While on collection duty, Sanitation Workers William Whalen and Steven Urcinoli observed flames shooting out of the window of a three-family home. Immediately, they stopped their truck, kicked down the door, and ran inside to tell the people to get out. Unbeknown to Mrs. Pietromonico, who lived next door, the fire had begun to spread. The Sanitation Workers urged Mrs. Pietromonico to come out but she had two infant children and a parrot that she could not leave behind. Without hesitation, Sanitation Workers Whalen and Urcinoli went into the house and assisted Mrs. Pietromonico to gather up the two infants and the pet and led them all to safety. Shortly, afterward both houses were consumed in flames.
