

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending July 9, 1887, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending July 2, 1887.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 1,276 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 9, 1887, which is an increase of 252, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 165 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending July 2, 1887, was 1,212, which is 396.0 more than the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 42.53 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,482,041.

If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc etc No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer.
