

ARMORY BOARD COMMISSIONERS. MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, September 17, 1886.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 2 P. M., at the office of his Honor

Mayor Grace. Present—Mayor Grace, Commissioner M. Coleman, of the Tax Department, General Newton, Commissioner of Public Works Department, Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald and Colonel Emmons Clark he minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Commissioner Coleman explained that the action taken toward securing the skating rink for quarters for the Second Battery, was too late, as the premises were leased by other parties. A communication was received from Mr. M. H. Orr, offering to supply Babcock fire extin-guishers for the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building. Read and ordered on file.

Morse Building, No. 140 Nassau Street, (New York, September 6, 1886.

To the Armory Board Commissioners :

To the Armory Board Commissioners: GENTLEMEN—I submit herewith for your inspection a sample of Indiana colitic limestone from the Salem quarries, with a view of securing its adoption for use in the proposed armory buildings, the plans for which are about being submitted. This stone although quarried for many years is only just now being introduced in this market, and consequently there are no buildings erected in New York City to refer to. I would instance, however, the Emigrants' Savings Bank on Chambers street, adjoining the Stewart Building, and the new building of the Mutual Life Insurance Co. on Nassau street, both built of Bedford limestone, which closely resembles the Salem stone, although the latter was recently selected for rebuilding the Trenton State House, by reason'of its supposed superiority. It can be delivered in this city at \$1 per cubic foot, which is below the price of all other stones of known merit and durability, besides effecting a great saving in cost of cutting, etc. I enclose herewith several cards containing cuts of buildings erected or in course of erection, where Salem stone is being used, together with pamphlets, etc., containing other information and giving evidence of its durability and advantages over other stones, excepting granite. The committee appointed to examine the plans that had been offered in competition presented their report, which was read and discussed. It was unanimously agreed that the report should be received and adopted, with the following provision : That the architects whose plans are named as most desirable should so modify their plans as to make them acceptable to the committee in charge thereof, and prepare sufficient working drawings to enable builders to estimate the cost; and provided also that such estimates satisfy the committee that the cost will not exceed \$330,000 for the Eighth Regiment Armory, and \$300,000 for the Twenty-second Regiment Armory. To the Armory Board :

GENTLEMEN—The Committee appointed at the meeting of September 6, to examine the plans for the new armories, respectfully report : That they met on the afternoons of September 6 and 13; that they received in all ten sets of plans, and, in the presence of the commanding officers of the regiments interested, gave to each architect an opportunity to explain in detail the plan presented by him.

Twenty-second Regiment.

For an armory for the use of this regiment, plans were presented by Messrs. Lindsay, Harding and Post. Those of the first two were found to be impracticable in many respects, and not accept-able to the officers of the regiment. The plans of the latter, with certain modifications, met the approval of the officers of the regiment, and with that of the members of the Committee. Your Committee therefore recommends :

That the plans presented by Mr. George B. Post for an armory for the use of the Twenty-second Regiment be adopted by the Board, provided certain modifications in the height of the drill-room, in the front elevation, and in the arrangement of the basement floor, and in such other particulars as the Board may require, be made.

Eighth Regiment and Second Battery.

For an armory for the use of this regiment and battery, plans were presented by Messrs. Leo, Luce, Jones, Harding, Thomas, Duncan and Young & Cable. After a very careful and exhaustive examination in detail of each plan, the Committee finally settled upon those presented by Mr. Thomas and by Mr. Duncan. The plan of Mr. Duncan having been arranged on the hypothesis that the battery required almost as much space as the regiment, when in fact it is one-tenth its size, and the cost being so much in excess of other plans, although it should be stated that Mr. Duncan's estimates seemed to be more complete than those of any other architect. Your Committee recommends : That the plans presented by Mr. Thomas for an armory for the use of the Eighth Regiment and Second Battery of Artillery be adopted by the Board, pro-vided certain modifications in the galleries on the sides of the drill-room and in the front elevation, and in such other particulars as the Board may require, be made.
