DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

Report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1879.

Department of Buildings, Office of Superintendent, No. 2 Fourth avenue, New York, July 1, 1879.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor of the City of New York;

Sir—I have the honor herewith to submit my report of the transactions of this Department for the three months ending June 30, 1879.

NEW BUILDINGS.

The number of plans and specifications submitted for new buildings was 344, and the number of buildings embraced therein was 770.

Of these plans 284 were, upon examination, approved, 41 were rejected, but subsequently amended and approved, and 19 were wholly rejected.

The estimated cost of the erection of these buildings was \$8,616,889.

The number of new buildings commenced during the quarter was 588, the number completed 364. and 961 are now in process of erection.

Of the foregoing buildings 605 were to be erected in that portion of the city north of Fortieth

ALTERATIONS TO BUILDINGS.

The number of plans and specifications submitted for alterations to buildings was 491, and the number of buildings embraced therein was 511.

Of these plans 396 were, upon examination, approved; 59 were rejected, but subsequently amended and approved, and 36 were wholly rejected. 140 were to be increased in height, 185 extended, 238 altered internally and 320 externally.

The estimated cost of the alteration of these buildings was \$1,202,534.

The number of alterations commenced during the quarter was 502, the number completed 460,

and 204 are now in process of alteration. The classification of the buildings proposed to be altered was as follows

UNSAFE BUILDINGS.

The number pending on March 31, 1879, was 99, and the number since reported was 206,

making a total of 305.

Of this number 19 have been taken down and entirely removed, 189 have been repaired and made safe, and 97 are in process of removal or repair.

The number of violations of the law reported during the quarter was 183, and in 117 of these cases the law has been complied with, and 29 violations reported prior to and pending on April 1, have been removed, making the total number removed during the quarter 146.

COMPLAINTS.

Received from the public during the quarter, 128; in 45 cases no cause for complaint was found; 12 were removed upon verbal notification given by the Examining Inspector; 49 proved unsafe buildings; and 22 violations of the various provisions of the law, of which the owners were duly notified.

FIRE ESCAPES.

The number of buildings reported as requiring means of escape in case of fire during the quar-

ter was 170.

Of these 72 were made to conform to the law upon notice, and 98 are now under process.

The number of cases of this class reported prior to and pending on April 1, and since removed, is 71, making a total of 143 cases in which buildings were provided with means of escape in case of

IRON WORK.

Arch girders tested during the quarter, 85; iron beams, 146; and iron lintels, 27; all of which were approved, having been found capable of sustaining the weight proposed to be imposed thereon.

LEGAL BRANCH.

During the quarter 61 cases have been sent to the attorney for prosecution, 17 of which were for insufficient means of escape in case of fire, iron shutters and unprotected hoistways, and 44 for violations of various provisions of the law.

NOTICES.

The number of notices and notes issued and served during the quarter was 2,623.

Of this number 617 were for additional means of escape in case of fire, iron shutters and unprotected hoistway and elevator openings, 378 various other violations of the law, 487 were for unsafe buildings, and the balance 1141, miscellaneous.

By reference to the foregoing comparative statements showing the operations of this Department during the six months last past and the corresponding period last year, you will perceive that the building interests of the city are largely on the increase, the number of buildings proposed to be erected and the cost of the same being much greater than for some years past, thus necessitating increased vigilance and exertion on the part of the officers and employees of the Department.

TRANSACTIONS OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

(Created under the provisions of section 31, chapter 625, Laws of 1871, as amended by section 8, chapter 547, Laws of 1874.)

During the quarter ending June 30, 1879, nine meetings of the Board were held.

89 petitions were filed to modify the law, relative to the erection of buildings, of which 75 were granted and 14 denied; 52 petitions were filed to modify the law relative to the alteration of buildings, 44 of which were granted and 8 denied, and 10 applicants were examined as to their qualifications to fill the position of Inspector of Buildings.

Thirty-three thousand eight hundred and forty-seven dollars (\$33,847) were expended by the parties in interest in securing and repairing the foregoing buildings under the orders of the Departmend. The number of cases of unsafe buildings sent to the Attorney of the Department for prosecution during the quarter was none, parties complying with the law in all cases. Four hundred and eight-seven (487) notices of unsafe buildings, consisting of "cautionary or first notices" and "second notices," etc., were issued and served during the last three months.

Six hundred and seventeen (617) notices for fire escapes, hoistways, iron shutters, etc., consisting of "cautionary or first notices" and "second notices," were issued and served during the last three months, and seventeen (17) cases have been sent to the Attorney for prosecution.

Six hundred and sixty-six (666) buildings have been examined by the Inspectors of this Bureau, and, except those reported, have been found provided with all the requirements of the law.

By referring to Exhibit "I," it will be noticed that there are one hundred and eighty-nine (189) cases for additional means of escape in case of fire still in process of removal, for many of which contracts are out and the proper work is being done. Of these cases in process of removal sixty (60) are in the hands of the Attorney for prosecution, in addition to which the Attorney also has three (3) cases for repairs to hoistways and three (3) cases for iron shutters.
