Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 13, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,133, as follows:

3 public buildings, 556 tenement houses, 130 private dwellings, 54 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 9 stores and warehouses, 28 stables, 42 slaughter-houses, 6 fat-rendering establishments, 2 public sewers and drains, 1 distillery, 1 quarry, 5 sunken and vacant lots, 21 yards, courts, and areas, 20 cellars and basements, 45 waste-pipes and drains, 84 privies and water-closets, 4 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 2 dangerous chimneys, 2 cisterns and cesspools, together with 105 visits to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received was 338.

During the past week 53 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation

and report.

18 Permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

5 Permits were granted scavengers to empty. clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 81 dwelings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 71 houses, 71 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

35 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital, and 2 dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending February 13, 1875: Typhoid fever 5, scartet fever 38, measles 2, diphtheria 84, small-pox 68, and cerebro-spinal meningitis —.

8 loads of night-soil were removed from the privy-vaults of the City by the night-scavengers during the week ending February 14, 1875.

The following amount of meat was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending February 13, 1875: Cattle, 2 carcasses; calves (bob), 12 cases; calves (case), 1 carcass; and 1 hog carcass.

During the week ending February 13, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 594 burial permits for city deaths, 30 for bodies in transitu, and 6 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 594 deaths, 182 marriages, 467 births, 47 still-births, 30 applications for transit permits, and 66 returns from Coroners. There were 27 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 6 transcripts of birth records, 1 of marriage, and 15 of death were issued from this Bureau; 3 cases of death were referred to the Coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health .

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—There were 594 deaths reported in this City during the week ending on Saturday the 13th inst., being six less than the number reported in the previous week, and forty less than the average weekly number of deaths during the month of January. The decrease occurred chiefly in diseases of the respiratory organs.

The following statement shows how excessive the mortality from these diseases was during the past month of January:

The decrease in mortality from small-pox, diphtheria, and scarlatina continues. No deaths from measles, and only 8 from typhoid fever have been reported during the past fortnight.

The death-rate in the first week of February

The death-rate in the first week of February was equal to 28.90 per 1,000. The rate reported in the twenty-one chief cities of Great Britain for the week ending January 23, was 27 per 1,000. But Dublin and Liverpool reported their death-rate as 33 per 1,000; Edinburgh reported 34, and London 24 per 1,000. The excessive mortality which prevailed in all the cities of Northern Europe, and in the chief American cities north of

the latitude of Savannah, has followed the excessive fluctuations and unusually long continued depression of temperature. This excessive cold appears to have ruled the death-rates in most of the cities of America and Europe.

Messengers, City Prison.

By Commissioner Brennan—
In order that facilities should be extended to every prisoner committed to the care of this Commission, I respectfully suggest that the following notice be issued by this Board, for the government of Messengers connected with our City Prisons:

NOTICE.

Prisoners desirous of communicating with their friends will be furnished with writing material, for that purpose, by applying to the Keeper on duty. Postage stamps will also be furnished at cost. For the convenience of prisoners, a Messenger is appointed to carry letters and messages to any part of this or adjacent cities. All messages shall be received from the prisoners by the Warden, or Keeper in charge of tier, and by him handed to the Messenger for delivery.

No Messenger shall be allowed to enter the prisons, or communicate with the prisoners, except by permission of the Warden or Keeper in charge. Prisoners desirous of communicating with their

Messengers receive no salary from the Department, and are not permitted to accept, as com-pensation for their services, more than the following rates :

City Prison-For delivery of letter or message to any part of this City below Forty-second \$0 50 Above Forty-second street To adjacent cities...... I 50 District Prisons To all parts of the City.....

[To take effect March 7, 1875.] AN ORDINANCE to amend Article II. of Chapter

SECTION 1. Article II. of Chapter XXXVI. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, is hereby amended by adding thereto two additional sections, as fol-

Hereafter it shall not be lawful for any person to sell, or offer for sale, within the corpo-rate limits of the City of New York, any hay or straw by the bale, unless the exact gross and net weight shall be legibly and distinctly marked on every such bale of hay or straw, under a penalty of ten dollars for each bale of hay or straw so sold or offered for sale in contravention of the provis-ions of this ordinance.

SEC. 16. The Commissioners of Police are here-by directed to cause the provisions of the ordi-nance hereby amended to be rigidly enforced. SEC. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in-

consistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 3. The ordinance shall take effect five months after the date of its adoption.

ORDINANCE Relating to Hackney Coaches or Carriages.

Rates and Prices of Fares.

An Ordinance amending the Ordinances enti-tled "Ordinances for the Government of Hackney Coaches in the City of New York," passed October 7, 1874.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, do ordain as follows:

The Title Third of said Ordinances shall be amended so as to read as follows:

TITLE THIRD OF THE RATES AND PRICES OF

The prices or rates of fares to be taken by or paid to the owners or drivers of hackney coaches or carriages, shall be as follows:

1st. For conveying a passenger any distance not exceeding one mile, fifty cents; for conveying two passengers the same distance, seventy-five

cents, or thirty-seven and a half cents each; and for every additional passenger, thirty-seven and a

all cents.

2d. For conveying a passenger any distance exceeding a mile, and within two miles, seventy-five cents; and for every additional passenger, thirty-seven and a half cents.

3d. For the use of a hackney coach or carriage by the hour, with one or more passengers, with the privilege of going from place to place, and stopping as often as may be required, one dollar an hour.

4th. In all cases where the hiring of a hackney coach or carriage is not at the time thereof. speci-

coach or carriage is not at the time thereof. spe fied to be by the day or hour, it shall be deem to be by the mile.

5th. For children between two and fourteen years of age, half price is only to be charged; and for children under two years of age, no

charge is to be made.

6th. Whenever à hackney coach or carriage shall be detained, excepting as aforesaid, the owner or driver shall be allowed after the rate of seventy-five cents an hour.
